BRIEFING PAPER: Thorpe Tunnel Bike Warning Signal Discussion City of Spokane Bicycle Advisory Board 8/19/2025

The city is working with a consulting firm to design a connection from the Fish Lake Trail down to Thorpe Road. The route continues through the 200' long tunnel under the BNSF tracks, which has 9' lanes, a 5' sidewalk and no internal lighting.

One design option under consideration is a pushbutton actuated flasher that cyclists could activate before biking through the tunnel.

Background:

The Fish Lake Trail connection has been in the planning stages for years. It needs to have a safe connection to the nearby residences.

Relationship to Plans/Actions:

Thorpe Tunnel is currently marked as a "difficult connection" on the City's Bicycle Master Plan.



RE: ALLEY VACATION APPLICATION – NARRATIVE

We are proposing a partial vacation of an existing alley located south of W College Ave and North of W Bridge Ave in Spokane, Washington. The purpose of this vacation is to maximize the land use and support the area's future growth by creating additional housing opportunities which would be a benefit to the public and align with City's growth and planning goals. The alley is currently not in use, please see attached photos, and there will be no parcel of land denied access to the public right-of-way with the vacation of this alley.

The proposed vacation includes approximately 240 lineal feet of the western portion of the existing alley, extending from W Bridge Ave to the eastern property line of 2718 W Bridge Ave. The vacated right-of-way is intended to accommodate portions of the proposed residential lots, internal access roads, and pedestrian sidewalks. The affected properties, 2718 W Bridge Ave, 2725 W College Ave, and 2722 W Bridge Ave, each maintain right-of-way access from either W college Ave or W Bridge Ave. Additionally, the site improvements include internal access roads and a 22-ft wide access easement connecting the remaining eastern portion of the Alley to W College Ave, supporting efficient site circulation. As a result, the western portion of the existing alley is no longer required for public access or circulation.

There will be five parcels directly affected by the alley vacation. Among these parcels, two property owners are in favor of the alley vacation, and one is opposed. The two owners in favor are Good Neighbor Companies, LLC (parcels 25133.0517 and 25133.0508) and Grant Cashen (parcel 25133.0516). The owner against is Melodi Sue Wynne (parcels 25133.0503 and 25133.0504) and she has stated that she is not interested in an alley vacation and is against any development in the area. Although there are only three property owners directly affected by the alley vacation there are three additional parcels that are adjacent to the existing alley to the east, where it is not being proposed to be vacated: Becky Phillips (parcel 25133.0505) who is aware of the proposal and has no concerns, Steffan Wachholtz (parcel 25133.0506) who supports the vacation and has no concerns, and Andy Louie (parcel 25133.0507) who has provided no response to attempts at contact.

In addition to the alley vacation, the proposal includes rerouting the 10-inch and 12-inch existing sanitary sewer mains that currently cross private property to enter the alley. These existing sewer mains will be removed and rerouted along public right-of-way as needed for the vacation of the alley and for future site development.

For both residential and commercial property owners, vacating an unused or unneeded street, alley or other public right-of-way can be a valuable option. If your property is adjacent to an unused street, you might consider a street vacation.

The below list of required items can be submitted in person on the 3rd floor of City Hall or can be mailed to the address listed at the bottom of this page.

(Applications must be for the entire block. Appropriate justification must be submitted with this application in order to deviate from this standard.)

Completed Vacation Application The vacation application must be filled out and signed by the adjacent land owners. Application Fee A link to pay the application fee will be provided after all the checklist items are received. Site Plan A dimensioned site plan showing the conceptual layout of the vacated right-of-way after it has been vacated and developed. If the right-of-way is to remain the same after being vacated please indicate this on the site plan. If the vacation area abuts other right-of-ways, the site plan must show how the vacated right-of-way will be closed and how it will interact with the

remaining right-of-way.

A written narrative describing the purpose or reason for the proposed right-of-way vacation, a description of what is proposed for the vacated area, and a description of how the vacation is a benefit to the public.

Responses to the Below Questions

- How will the use of the right-of-way change after it becomes private property.
- Will the vacation result in any parcel of land being denied sole access to a public right-of-way?





Subject:

Mobile meeting discussion for September 2025

Background:

Twice annually the Bicycle Advisory Board takes their meeting on the road to check out new and upcoming projects and/or ride routes that need further attention.

- In May 2025 the BAB rode from the Centennial Trail at Kendall Yards up Elm to Garland & Belt and down Post St ending at David's Pizza. This route highlighted upcoming 27x27 projects currently under construction.
- August 2024, the BAB rode Inland Empire Way to the Spokane-Cheney interchange, finishing in Kendall Yards.
- May 2024, the BAB rode from Grant Park through East Central and finished back at Grant Park.
- October 2023, A Bike Town Hall with Senator Billig and Council Member Zappone, riding from the U-District Bridge to Bennedito's Brewpub on Sprague.
- May 2023, the BAB started near the Gonzaga campus and rode north to Columbia and Market St. and back down to Gonzaga campus.
