**Water Conservation on City Property & Water Conservation Master Plan Update**

and progress in the commercial space of water efficiency. **Background:**

The City's Drought Ordinance takes effect annually June 1-October 1. One of the most common comments we receive is that the City isn't adhering to the ordinance. Presenter Annikki Chamberlain has been working with several City and commercial properties over the years to improve efficiency and will share the progress. Additionally, the Water Department is currently working on the update to the Water Conservation Master Plan that will be presented in the next few months, Marlene will provide a sneak peek of what's to come.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

Over the last 18 months, the City has been integrating climate policy into its Comprehensive Plan Update as part of PlanSpokane 2046. Additionally, the City's Water Department is currently in the process of updating the Water Conservation Master Plan that was initially approved in 2020. The Water Wise conservation and efficiency programs support this work.

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

This information is does not have a deadline or a necessary action at this time. However it is timely as the state has been declared in drought and we are at the beginning of the Drought Ordinance months.

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**Subject:**

The City of Spokane is implementing a Participatory Budgeting (PB) process focused on identifying and funding community-led climate resilience and decarbonization projects within the East Central neighborhood. Through this process, community members will directly help determine how available grant funding is invested by proposing, developing, and ultimately voting on eligible projects. The project is funded through the Washington State Department of Commerce's Community Investments in Climate Resilience program and is being administered by the City of Spokane in partnership with community organizations and residents.

**Background:**

Participatory Budgeting is a democratic engagement process that allows community members to directly influence how public funds are allocated. Participatory Budgeting has been adopted by municipalities across the United States and internationally as a tool to increase civic participation, transparency, and community ownership of public investments.

In 2025, the City of Spokane was awarded funding through the Washington State Department of Commerce to facilitate a community-driven process focused on climate resilience and decarbonization investments in East Central Spokane. Climate resilience projects are actions that help communities prepare for, withstand, and recover from environmental, climate, and disaster-related challenges while improving quality of life.

The city's role is to design and administer the process, ensure compliance with grant requirements, provide technical support, facilitate community engagement, and oversee implementation of selected projects if future funding is appropriated by the Washington State Legislature. The process includes the formation of a community Steering Committee, extensive public outreach, project idea collection, project development, and a community voting phase.

This work supports the city's broader goals of community engagement, equitable investment, climate resilience, and neighborhood empowerment. The project is funded through a state grant and does not commit the city to ongoing local funding obligations beyond grant requirements.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

The Participatory Budgeting project supports several adopted city goals and policies, including:

- Advancing equitable community engagement by providing residents with a direct role in identifying and prioritizing public investments
- Supporting climate resilience, sustainability, and decarbonization objectives through community-selected projects designed to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve neighborhood resilience

- Strengthening neighborhood capacity and community partnerships by fostering collaboration between residents, community-based organizations, and local government
- Supporting Comprehensive Plan goals related to environmental stewardship, neighborhood vitality, civic engagement, and equitable access to public resources and decision-making processes

The project also aligns with the city's ongoing efforts to increase public participation in government decision-making and to ensure historically underrepresented communities have meaningful opportunities to influence public investments.

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

2026:

- Establish project staffing and administrative structure
- Recruit and convene a community Steering Committee
- Conduct public outreach and community education efforts
- Develop project eligibility criteria and engagement strategies
- Collect project ideas from residents and community members

2027:

- Review and refine community-submitted project ideas
- Conduct technical feasibility assessments and cost estimates
- Develop project proposals for community consideration
- Conduct a public voting process allowing eligible community members to select preferred projects.
- Finalize project recommendations and submit required reporting to the Washington State Department of Commerce.

Year Two and Beyond:

Subject to future legislative appropriation and funding availability, selected projects may receive funding and move into implementation.

Opportunities for resident engagement will occur throughout the process and include participation on the Steering Committee, attendance at community meetings, project idea submission, volunteer opportunities, outreach events, and participation in the final community vote. Additional updates will be provided to city leadership, advisory boards, neighborhood councils, and other partners and interested parties as the project progresses.

**BRIEFING PAPER: Inclement Weather Space Activations**

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**Subject:**

This briefing provides a historical overview of the costs associated with inclement weather space activations initiated through the City of Spokane's Emergency Management Program between 2020 and 2026. The review focuses on temporary community respite spaces activated during extreme heat, cold weather, or hazardous air quality events.

This briefing does not include the costs or operations associated with activating 24/7 congregate shelter beds for individuals experiencing homelessness, as those services are managed through the City's HHS Department.

**Background:**

The Spokane Municipal Code (SMC) requires the city to provide access to inclement weather sheltering or respite spaces during specified extreme weather and air quality conditions. These activations are intended to provide community members with a safe place to seek relief from hazardous environmental conditions.

Depending on the event, activations may include extended operating hours at existing community facilities or the establishment of temporary non-congregate respite spaces that provide cooling during extreme heat, warming during severe cold, or cleaner indoor air during hazardous air quality events. These services are available to all community members, regardless of housing status.

Separately, during certain extreme weather events, the city may support the activation of additional 24/7 shelter capacity within existing congregate shelter facilities serving individuals experiencing homelessness or living unsheltered. Because those activations are administered through the city HHS Department and involve distinct operational and funding structures, they are outside the scope of this briefing.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

While there is no direct nexus to the city's Comprehensive Plan, the provision of inclement weather respite services is required under Spokane Municipal Code. Understanding the historical costs associated with these activations is important for future budget planning and for ensuring the city can continue to meet its legal obligations during extreme weather and air quality events.

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

No action is requested of City Council or other boards and commissions at this time. This briefing is intended to provide historical cost information and context regarding the city's ongoing responsibilities related to inclement weather activations.

**Subject:**

While there are many studies and projects in progress that will inform Comprehensive Plan updates through [PlanSpokane 2046](#), a big part of any periodic update is a review and assessment of the many existing goals and policies. To this end, the City is undertaking a review of the current Comprehensive Plan, known as the Chapter Review process.

The current draft Chapters of the Comprehensive Plan were recently released on May 27, and have been updated based on legislative requirements, community engagement, public comments, and direction from the Spokane Plan Commission. This informational workshop will provide an overview of the Plan Commission's Chapter Review process, providing updates on the current drafts of the chapter and how climate and resiliency policies were integrated into the plan.

We encourage the public to include the Chapter name and Goal/Policy number(s) when possible. An additional release is expected later this summer, which will include all Chapters and their relevant maps and graphics, along with potential language updates based on feedback.

**Chapter Review Process**

There are 14 Chapters of the Comprehensive Plan: Introduction, Implementation\*, Growth Strategy, Transportation, Capital Facilities and Utilities, Housing, Economic Prosperity, Urban Design and Historic Preservation, Natural Environment, Community Health, Neighborhoods, Parks and Recreation, Local Governance Through Civic Participation, and Shorelines\*\*. Additionally, the Glossary has been updated to support a shared understanding for all users and readers of the Comprehensive Plan.

\* The Implementation Chapter was not released in May. This Chapter will include considerations for the state-mandated 5-year check-in of the Comprehensive Plan, for which the City is awaiting additional guidance on state requirements. This Chapter is also anticipated to be renamed, to better reflect the monitoring and reporting content of the Chapter.

\*\* While a topic of discussion, no changes to the Shorelines Chapter are currently proposed. The Chapter must be updated by 2031 to meet state requirements, at which time the Chapter will be updated to the PlanSpokane 2046 template and formatting.

**Climate Planning**

PlanSpokane 2046 presented a unique opportunity to integrate climate considerations into every aspect of our city's future, identifying goals and policies throughout the Comprehensive Plan that meet state requirements and community needs. The Climate

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Resilience and Sustainability Board (CRSB) voted to recommend climate policies to the Plan Commission on February 12, 2026 for consideration as part of PlanSpokane 2046, following months of robust community engagement. The climate policies were informed by community engagement, CRSB feedback, and City staff input, and were integrated into the draft Chapters released in May, identified with an icon and note.

**Environmental Justice Review**

An Environmental Justice (EJ) Review was conducted to evaluate proposed Land Use and Transportation elements draft policies that were not directly tied to the CRSB policy recommendations, with an environmental justice community workshop held in February 2026. The EJ Review identified impacted communities and where implementation guidance or policy language edits were recommended to strengthen equitable outcomes. Language suggestions developed during the process were integrated into the draft Chapters released in May, identified with an icon and note.

**Background:**

The City of Spokane has commenced a periodic update to the City's Comprehensive Plan as required by the Growth Management Act (GMA). A "periodic update" is the state's term for a full review of a Comprehensive Plan to make sure its in conformance with any legislative changes to state law. The last periodic update was completed in 2017. Since the last periodic update, state law has added additional considerations, especially around Climate Planning.

The City of Spokane is now required under GMA to have a climate element as part of the Comprehensive Plan. The climate element will be integrated throughout the Comprehensive Plan chapters, recognizing the interconnectedness of resilience and sustainability with the other topics considered in the Plan. The Climate Resilience and Sustainability Board served as the Climate Policy Advisory Team for the climate planning element, making policy recommendations to the Spokane Plan Commission.

The Climate Planning work was supported by a WA Dept. of Commerce climate planning grant which was funded through the Washington Climate Commitment Act.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

The Comprehensive Plan is a long-term planning document that establishes a vision, goals, and policies that guide all aspects of Spokane's growth and development over a 20-year horizon. City decisions, including regulations, programs, and budgets, should align with the goals and policies outlined in the Comprehensive Plan. The periodic update to the Comprehensive Plan, named PlanSpokane 2046, complies with the Growth Management Act, including the integration of a climate element. Prior plans, including the Housing Action Plan and City Council's Sustainability

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Action Plan, helped inform the development of the updated goals and policies, along with ongoing public engagement.

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

The CRSB considered the Draft Final Climate Planning Policies during its public hearing on February 12, 2026, forwarding the recommended policies to the Spokane Plan Commission for further review. The Plan Commission will ultimately make a recommendation regarding the Comprehensive Plan and related materials to City Council, with a final decision due in December 2026 to meet state requirements.

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**Subject:**

The Division of Transportation and Sustainability will provide an update on the progress of the Sustainability Action Plan (SAP) 5 Year Review.

**Background:**

The SAP provides a guide to mitigate risks from climate change, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and invest in strengthening our communities. The objective is to ensure the equitable prosperity of Spokane residents and the protection of our natural resources for generations to come. The 2021 SAP update included extensive public engagement.

The original technical advisory body for the SAP was the Sustainability Action Subcommittee (SAS). The Climate Resilience and Sustainability Board (CRSB) has replaced the SAS. Broader internal outreach is ongoing to fill in gaps in the status updates.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

These plans listed below relate to the SAP. Some of these documents already emphasize climate and sustainability solutions outlined in this Plan, while others will need to be updated to integrate sustainability and climate action.

- Spokane Comprehensive Plan “Shaping Spokane” (2017) – Climate is currently being integrated in the current Comprehensive Plan Update
- Spokane Water Conservation Master Plan (2020) - currently undergoing an update
- Spokane City Bicycle Master Plan (2017)
- Spokane Pedestrian Master Plan (2015)

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

The Division of Transportation and Sustainability presented a preliminary status review at the February 2026 CRSB meeting. Periodic updates to the SAP review will be presented to the CRSB throughout 2026.

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**Subject:**

Recommendations to the City Council for potential inclusion in the City's 2027 State Legislative Agenda.

**Background:**

Each year the Spokane City Council passes a resolution setting the City's state legislative agenda. CRSB board members have expressed interest in making recommendations to the Council for possible inclusion in that agenda. Board members will have an opportunity to suggest general priorities or specific policies related to climate resilience and sustainability for consideration by the entire board. In April the board had a workshop detailing climate and sustainability legislation faired in this year's legislative session. In May the board discussed potential topics for inclusion in a recommendation to City Council.

**Relationship to Plans/Actions:**

The CRSB may recommend policy considerations to the City Council for potential inclusion in the City's state legislative agenda.

**Timeline/ Further Action:**

The City Council passes its legislative agenda in the fall. If the board can come to agreement on legislative priorities the CRSB should pass them in a hearing before the end of August for the recommendations to be properly considered.

## CLIMATE RESILIENCE & SUSTAINABILITY BOARD RECOMMENDATION

### NO. 2026-003

A Resolution adopting the City of Spokane's Climate Resilience and Sustainability Board (CRSB) legislative emphasis areas for the coming 2027 state legislative session.

**WHEREAS**, Spokane Municipal Code section 02.03.030 provides that the “legislative agenda to be advocated for by the City of Spokane at the state or federal level shall be adopted, and may be amended by resolution of the City Council, after consultation with the Mayor, as the official legislative agenda of the City of Spokane”; and

**WHEREAS**, Spokane Municipal Code section 04.41.010 provides that “the purpose of the Climate Resilience and Sustainability Board is to provide advice and recommendations to the Mayor, City Council, and community on the actions necessary to achieve the community’s sustainability and climate goals consistent with the City’s Comprehensive Plan, Sustainability Action Plan, environmental stewardship policies of the City as adopted by the City Council, and within the requirements and parameters set forth in state law”; and

**WHEREAS**, the CRSB has identified a list of legislative emphasis areas for the coming session of the Washington Legislature to advance climate action identified in the attached exhibit; and

**WHEREAS**, the CRSB requests the Spokane City Council consider inclusion of the items identified in the attached exhibit in its 2027 legislative agenda or pursue opportunities to advocate for them during the legislative session.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** that the Spokane City CRSB hereby adopts its CRSB 2027 State Legislative Emphasis Areas, as specified in Exhibit A to this Resolution.

#### **2027 State Legislative**

#### **Emphasis Areas**

##### **Heat Pumps and Weatherization**

Support state funding for the installation of heat pumps, weatherization improvements, and energy-efficiency measures that help underserved communities reduce costs and adapt to the impacts of climate change.

##### **Sidewalk Funding and Infrastructure**

Support the creation of a sidewalk utility program or other sustainable funding mechanisms for sidewalk construction, maintenance and improvements to the pedestrian environment that make walking a safer, more accessible and viable alternative to vehicle trips.

##### **Microgrids and Community Solar**

Support increased access to microgrids and community solar projects through enhanced state support, reduced regulatory barriers and expanded funding opportunities.

##### **Plug-in Solar**

Support policies and incentives that expand access to plug-in solar technologies and distributed renewable energy systems.

##### **Clean Energy Economy and Workforce Development**

Support investments in clean energy industries, workforce training, and job development opportunities that strengthen the clean energy economy.

##### **Construction Funding for Key Clean Energy Upgrades for City Buildings**

Support capital funding for the City of Spokane to assist with compliance under the Washington Clean Buildings Performance Standard and to advance municipal clean energy projects, including improvements at City Hall and Northeast Community Center.
