The Master Plan will identify and address gaps in our park system, and guide Parks & Recreation's focus, direction, and spending over the next ten years. So we asked the community: What should parks do next?

Here's how many people participated:

What did we hear?

Statistically Valid Survey Results

Residents value **conservation**, **preservation**, **and protection** of natural lands **over recreational** use of these resources.

During the summer and fall of 2021, Spokane residents had 26 opportunities to participate in the Master Planning process through surveys, workshops, pop-up events, and focus groups. The information below was collected from a statistically valid survey and mirrors themes found through other engagement methods.

felt a lack of functioning restrooms, trash bins, lighting, signs, or similar was an issue

76% of residents were satisfied with the level of maintenance of developed parks and natural lands, many still preferred to see an increase in the frequency of regular park maintenance.

70% support or strongly support changing portions of parks to meadows or natural spaces to be more sustainable and use less resources

Spokane parks are most used for simple pursuits, like **enjoying nature**, **walking**, **and spending time with family**.

71% of residents believe we should improve neighborhood access to a park by building new parks on land the City already owns, and 66% believe we should focus on renovating/enhancing existing parks and natural lands.

believe the City needs to do more to make parks and programs welcoming and accessible



believe an important purpose of Parks & Recreation facilities is to **enhance the community's economic vitality**, making Spokane attractive to work, live, and do business and provide places for people to maintain/improve their health.

40% of residents noted that a lack of familiarity with the City's parks and recreation offerings kept them from using them or using them more often.



About **6 in 10** residents felt the City should **seek additional funding** to create and maintain its existing offerings



About **half** considered it essential or very important to **acquire new property** for parks and natural areas

Our community relies on the value parks bring to Spokane – healthy recreation opportunities, quiet green space, and safe community-building. Parks continue to improve our quality of life, and with more than 100 park properties in Spokane, we have a lot of incredible space to nurture.

Here's a new opportunity for members of our community to work more closely with the Park Board – the Citizens Advisory Committee.

The Citizens Advisory Committee

The Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) exists to bring community members, volunteers, stakeholders, and Park Friends groups together. The CAC provides an opportunity to impact the capital needs, programming, and maintenance of our beloved parks, and collaborate with the Park Board.

Some examples of work may include:

- Finding partnership opportunities between Park Friends groups and civic/business groups
- Identifying gaps or needs, brainstorm solutions
- Supporting implementation of important projects (through volunteering, fundraising for matching grants, or similar)
- Increasing coordination between Park Friends groups for shared resources, ideas, concerns/issues, marketing, and support
- Finding ways that the Parks Master Plan and Friends priority projects align
- Supporting the creation of new Park Friends groups

CAC Structure

The CAC will be comprised of up to 12 members. A sample of the group's composition might be:

- 5 Park Friends group representatives
- 1 Community Assembly representative (from the Neighborhood Councils)
- 2 volunteer representatives (volunteers not associated to a specific Park Friends group)
- 2 business representatives
- 2 partner organization representatives

Pathway to the Park Board – the Development & Volunteer Committee

The CAC will report to the Park Board through the Development and Volunteer Committee (DVC). The DVC is a new committee of the Park Board. It was created to help

guide fundraising priorities – capital and programmatic – for the Parks & Recreation division, and to enhance the growth and coordination of Park Friends groups.

The DVC is comprised of all volunteers: 4 members of the Park Board, and 4 non-Park Board members. The 4 non-Park Board members will be 1 representative from the Citizens Advisory Committee (described below), and 3 at-large community members.

CAC Terms

Terms will be 2 years. The DVC makes appointment recommendations for the CAC, and CAC members are confirmed by the Director of Parks & Recreation. The CAC will create their own meeting structure, and elect their own Chair; in the interim, the DVC has appointed Kelly Brown, President of the Friends of Manito, to get
