#### **Minutes**

- 1. **Call to order** The meeting was called to order at 4:05 p.m. by DVC Committee chair Jennifer Ogden. See list above for attendance.
- 2. Public comment: None
- 3. DVCAC discussion items:

A. None

#### 4. **DVCAC** standing reports:

- A. DVCAC member news Kelly Brown
  - 1) Friends of Coeur d'Alene Park Lee Williams
    - a. The Friends applied for a grant through Spokane Preservation Advocates to add to funds for electrical work for the gazebo. They are considering approaching the Neighborhood Council for assistance.
    - b. Park Operations is doing all the trenching and laying of pipe for a fully new, automated irrigation system, which is a tremendous savings.
    - c. A consultant, Amy Matlock, has been contracted for the Summer Concert Series. She will be responsible for securing sponsorships and entertainment.
    - d. Friends of Coeur d'Alene Park appreciate their great working relationship with Al Vorderbrueggen, Director of Park Operations.
    - e. The Friends' bid for legislative funds was not successful this year.
  - 2) Friends of the Bluff Jeff Lambert
    - a. The member appreciation event well. A presentation on fire risk and safety issues was shared.
    - b. Budget and insurance will be discussed at the annual business meeting next month.
    - c. Brush on the Bluff has been growing in popularity and planning for the event is underway.
  - 3) Friends of Palisades Paul Lindholdt
    - a. PFAS water contamination coming from Spokane International Airport and Fairchild AFB is a concern. Free water testing is available through the Department of Ecology.
    - b. The Parks Department is securing funds to develop a parking area. They are collaborating in planning which entrances to develop and considering accommodating equestrian traffic.
    - c. Illegal dumping continues to be a problem. The Friends hold cleanup events twice per year. Their next event is Saturday, April 20.
    - d. A Friends brochure is being created to help recruit new members.
  - 4) Community Assembly Lindsey Shaw
    - a. Nick Hamad presented a Parks levy update.
    - b. Lindsey is excited about upcoming cleanup days at Palisades, which is scheduled for the Saturday closest to Earth Day. She is also impressed with Urban Forestry's dead tree mapping project which she thinks will be very useful in the future.
    - c. Lindsey asked whether meeting start time could be moved a little later as she has a regular engagement prior which doesn't allow her enough time to arrive to the meeting promptly. Jennifer suggested a 4:15 start time and moving the meeting to the Pavilion. This change will be in effect for the next meeting on March 20, 2024.
  - 5) Friends of Manito Kelly Brown
    - a. Planning is in progress for the annual plant sale and art festival and working on a fundraising plan for the children's pollinator garden.
    - b. The Friends are hiring a seasonal/temporary Plant Sale Manager as soon as possible.
- B. EXPO+50 update Kelly Brown
  - 1) Each of the five pillar committee chairs have sent emails to notify groups of approved events.

- 4) Visit Spokane is collecting donated Expo memorabilia for the celebration.
- 5) On Saturday, KHQ Connect Center will be dedicated to Expo Club 74. It will run from 7:00 to 9:30 a.m. and include live and pre-recorded interviews from people involved in the original Expo '74, tribal groups, and sponsors.

#### 7. **DVC** standing reports:

- A. Levy outreach plan Fianna Dickson
  - 1) From February 2021, through May 2022, Parks engaged in community outreach which resulted in adoption of the Park Master Plan in June of 2022 and a draft Investment Program in March/April of 2023. An Executive Team was formed in May 2023, to help guide next steps and the Parks Levy will appear on the August ballot. Phase I of informational outreach will occur through April this year with a ramped-up Phase II to begin in May.
  - 2) Key themes will include "What's in it for me?", safety & maintenance of the parks, and why the levy is needed.
  - 3) Outreach will include:
    - Events & activations
    - Digital outreach
    - Collateral & mail
    - Earned media & advertising
  - 4) Fianna outlined some of the many areas volunteers could help, both in City-led outreach and political action committee activities without the use of City resources. The marketing team is working on a Volunteer Toolkit to assist. Per the Parks Master Plan, there are 11 playground improvements in District 3, nine in District 2, and 12 in District 1 being planned for if/when funding becomes available.
  - 5) Fianna has posted the presentation in Basecamp.
- B. Q4 volunteer report Fianna Dickson
  - 1) 3,726 volunteers donated approximately 20,800 hours.
  - 2) Examples of projects include:
    - a. SpoCanopy volunteers with Urban Forestry and The Lands Council planted over 40 trees.
    - b. Girl Scouts and Whitworth students volunteered over 50 hours at Finch Arboretum.
    - c. Friends of Manito and Parks & Recreation held the 2023 Manito Holiday Lights Celebration, raising money for education, preservation, and improvement projects for Manito Park. 7,500 visitors attended!
  - 3) Q4 volunteer value was approximately \$623,000.


### Volunteer Support
