





WHEREAS, substantial residential development is proposed within the Grandview/Thorpe neighborhood, and no mandatory impact fees or park land dedication is required for new residential developments, further necessitating the addition of public park lands within the area; and

WHEREAS, Parks is not sufficiently funded to be able to acquire and or develop new park lands in this area; and

WHEREAS, the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) owns approximately 192 acres of natural land (Thorpe Property) within the Grandview/Thorpe neighborhood which it intends to surplus; and

WHEREAS, the Thorpe Property is identified as 'potential open space' in the City of Spokane Land Use Plan; and

WHEREAS, DNR manages a special program, titled the Trust Land Transfer (TLT) program, intended to 'keep special places in public ownership' using funding appropriated by the Washington State Legislature, which may enable the DNR property to be maintained as public open space at no up-front cost to Parks; and

WHEREAS, Parks received support letters from several non-profit and neighborhood groups interested in Parks acquiring the Thorpe Property through the TLT program; and

WHEREAS, Parks submitted an initial letter of intent and application to the 2025-2027 TLT program for the Thorpe Property in September of 2023; and

WHEREAS, Parks desires submit a resolution to DNR further supporting the acquisition of the Thorpe Property via the TLT program; and

WHEREAS, Parks anticipates accepting the Thorpe Property if acquired through the TLT program, as acquiring additional park land in District 2 is identified as a third-tier priority goal in the adopted park and natural lands master plan.; and

BE IT RESOLVED by the City of Spokane Park Board to support the 'Thorpe Road Property' application to the Washington State Department of Natural Resources Trust Land Transfer Program in the 2025-2027 biennium.

Greetings,

We are writing in support of the memory garden pilot project in Manito Park championed by Bob Scarfo, Debby Dodds, and Adriano Eva. This kind of space is needed in Spokane because it will give care partners space to relax while ensuring their loved ones' safety, provide a safe space for people living with dementia to interact with nature in public, and contribute to Spokane as a dementia-friendly community.

Spokane has an urgent, growing need for respite for care partners. In our daily support work and as members of the Spokane Regional Dementia Friendly Community, we regularly interact with people who are living with dementia, caring for someone living with dementia, or working with people living with dementia. One of the running themes that we hear over and over again is that there is not enough respite care in Spokane. Caring for someone living with dementia is more than a full-time job, especially in the later stages when people living with dementia often need continuous care to ensure their safety. With the current workforce shortage, especially in the healthcare sector, many care partners find it difficult to fulfill even basic needs like grocery shopping, getting a haircut or going to their own healthcare appointments.

A public memory garden would give care partners space to both enjoy nature and relax with the peace of mind that their loved one is safe. They could meet with friends or other care partners in this garden, allowing the person with dementia to wander without worrying that they might get lost. It's hard to overstate how comforting such a space could be for an exhausted care partner.

When someone starts to experience dementia symptoms like memory loss, personality changes or difficulty with problem-solving, one common reaction is to isolate so that no one sees these symptoms. People living with dementia frequently stay away from social gatherings, church, work, and other social interactions so that they can keep their diagnosis or symptoms hidden. Likewise, care partners often encourage their loved ones to stay home so that they won't "cause a scene" or be hurt by others' reactions.

With the rising number of people living with dementia in Spokane, creating and maintaining inclusive, safe spaces for people living with dementia and their care partners is critical to reduce

isolation and support care partners. Many factors go into making a space safe for people living with dementia. While criteria for a safe space can vary from person to person and even moment to moment, there are a few common trends. For example, people living with dementia often feel more comfortable with fewer distractions like loud noises, crowds of people and intersecting sounds.

Establishing a Memory Garden that anyone can use would be a significant step toward making Spokane feel safe and welcoming for people living with dementia in Spokane. We would eventually love to see memory gardens in many public parks across Spokane, especially in underserved communities. However, we think that Manito Park is the best place to start this pilot project because it has spacious areas that are away from distractions like playgrounds and traffic, public restrooms that could be close to the memory garden, and several parking areas.

We hope that you consider this as the beginning, not the end, of a much-needed shift to make Spokane a more inclusive and inviting place for people living with dementia and their care partners.

I am writing in support of a publicly accessible Memory Garden in Spokane for those living with a host of different memory loss issues, as well as their caregivers. During my work with the library's Memory Café (a weekly meeting for those with dementia and their caregivers to socialize) we frequently hear from participants that they would like to spend more time outside and surrounded by nature.

When a friend or partner with dementia begins their decline, it can be overwhelming for a caregiver to commit to a simple hiking trail or picnic in the woods. Sometimes this is due to the misconception that the disease means you can no longer enjoy the activities you used to in a public space, or the fear that your partner may become moody or uncooperative in an isolated area, or the time it takes to reach a natural area that is likely on the outskirts of town or overly crowded. During one Memory Café, couples even requested a virtual tour through state parks on our TV screens because they could pretend to be surrounded by nature as we did a gardening related indoor activity, but it's not the same. Memory Café's first group field trip was to a tour of a fish hatchery, and they were thrilled to be out in the sunshine together enjoying a walkable area where they could interact with streams and fish and enjoy a light breeze. The Spokane community desperately needs publicly accessible, peaceful outdoor community spaces, and does not yet have one that welcomes those with dementia directly. A garden would be easily accessible and recognizable as a gathering space for those who have not yet found a dementia community.

There were 300,000 unpaid dementia caregivers in Washington state last year (2022), and the number of people developing dementia continues to increase as a large generation ages and the diseases' cure remains unknown. The waiting list to be officially diagnosed with dementia in Spokane is typically over six months long because specialists cannot keep pace with demand. The number of people over 65 with Alzheimer's alone, not counting the other 70+ forms of dementia, is projected to be 140,000 in Washington state by 2025. 75% of people with dementia live at home, and their caregivers desperately need a break. I believe an opportunity to be outdoors in a dedicated quiet space would help the wellbeing of both caregivers and those with dementia immensely. A Memory Garden would send a clear message that those with dementia belong out in our community appreciating flowers, seeing friends, and enjoying the last years of their lives, not locked away to decline. Best of all, it could be utilized by other members of the public, such as veterans or those struggling with depression, who might benefit from a place of solitude and beauty.

I believe you're uniquely suited to make this happen as a licensed landscape architect who has connections in the dementia community. The Friends of Manito are well known for their ability to keep gardens beautiful, and with their support, I'm confident a garden in the Manito area would be a success as well as a resource for dementia groups located on the South Hill. I would like to see additional Memory Gardens implemented across the area, notably in Spokane Valley and the West Plains. Please let me know if there is anything the library can do to support your endeavors.

I wholeheartedly support your efforts to introduce a Memory Garden to the City of Spokane. I think it's important to communicate with the Park Board about the opportunity to get aboard a growing movement that the WA State legislature embraces.

I coordinate and manage activities set in Seattle's Memory Garden, known as Maude's Garden at the Memory Hub, led by the University of Washington's Memory and Brain Wellness Center. Instead of speaking to the need for more memory gardens across the state, I thought I would share testimonials from people who have experienced our memory garden and let them speak to the value of what you are striving to accomplish in Spokane.

Below are insights and quotes from people and my own observations. As a caveat, I'll say that the value of Maude's Garden is very attached to the Memory Hub, a dementia-friendly community center, as people who participate in Memory Hub programs and events held in the garden are the ones who give quotes that I record. I am not always there when people from the public come by to explore plants, meditate on the benches, and have lunch at the tables.

Over six million Americans live with Alzheimer's-type dementia. It is becoming a social and policy imperative for cities to become more age- and dementia-friendly. In fact, the WA State Dept. of Social and Health Services' Dementia Action Collaborative (DAC), developed the Alzheimer's State Plan to recommend that the WA State legislature support initiatives to improve dementia care, early diagnosis, and awareness, including building dementia-capable and friendly communities to prepare from the coming increase in people living with memory loss and caregivers—by supporting people in early stages in staying physically active. Because of the DAC's work, the WA State legislature funded Dementia Friends WA, and \$100,000 state dollars now supports Dementia Friends WA expansion, in an effort to increase acceptance and awareness and empower families to seek care sooner in every region of WA State.

In our view, this momentum and legislative buy-in is validating the larger reason why a Memory Garden can bring value to a community. A Memory Garden is one example of what an age- and dementiafriendly community is all about. In a dementia-friendly community, people living with memory loss deserve to feel like they have opportunities to be social and included in the public sphere. Having a memory garden is a way to make people living with memory loss and their friends and family feel like they belong and access experiences that improve their welling. It really is a social imperative, specifically in WA State.

Here are some observations from me, and some quotes.

- Watching what happens during the Garden Discovery Program, when we ask what everyone is noticing in the garden, is incredibly validating. There are people who have been silent and speak very little in social scenes—and then start talking in full, meaningful sentences about the garden. It is as if the garden is a catalyst for helping someone feel like they can express themselves and that their opinion will be valued by others in a safe environment.

- We have given feedback forms at the end of every 3-session Garden Discovery Program. In every batch people, virtually all caregivers and the people living with memory loss (who take the survey together) mark either "Greatly increased" or "Increased slightly" on statements: My sense of calm and relaxation....My sense of accomplishment and self-esteem, my sense of community connection, My sense of connection to nature...
- The garden has become the site of the annual Garden of Inspiration art show, where we invite everyone in the Memory Hub community to create art inspired by gardens. This has been a raging success and simply is another way to create opportunities for people living with memory loss and to encourage and recognize their creativity and talents—and show the wider community that people living with memory loss have many gifts to offer.
- One program at the Memory Hub, the Elderwise Day program, makes use of the program everyday, rain or shine. Participants and staff of this program are always remarking on how the garden is a healing environment, and constant inspiration for their group conversations and artwork. The garden also provides opportunities for them to take care of hummingbird feeders and do small cleanup projects.
- In all, a Memory Garden can bring possibilities to a community in a general sense in becoming a dementia-friendly community. It's a space in which support groups can be held, art shows can happen, volunteers can work. It's also a place that provides a safe and accessible natural environment for people who are mobility impaired, or use a wheelchair, or need lots of places to sit. It's a place where people who often feel alone or can no longer participate in activities they once did, can feel like there is a place made just for them. I also notice that cities (at least in my small view) fund sensory gardens for children. So why not follow the same reasoning for people living with memory loss?

Here are some quotes from participants living with dementia who take part in programs in Maude's garden.

"The garden put me at ease"

"I love the sense of community, even though I don't know everyone. The help here is enlightening."

It's nice to get out." At first, I was self-conscious and not knowing what to expect. But then, I saw things I hadn't seen before and it was satisfying.

Not just OK, but, like, a lot."

"I came here once before. Now I'm addicted."

"It was nice to slow down and observe things."

"It changed my way of thinking."

"It was so nice to be creative."

"It was wonderful to spend time with my mother."

"Today was about noticing what we otherwise wouldn't have—the vibrant greens...drink it up"

"Just the colors...I love being here."

"I came in anxious and this is calming"

"It's nice having this time to spend with my Mom."

The tranquility of nature is so inspiring.

These thoughts bring up a big point. While a Memory Garden can bring the benefits of socialization, sensory/emotional stimulation, and physical activity; or a place to cope and manage one's grief—I understand that is likely not enough to uniquely justify a memory garden for a city. Because what makes

a garden therapeutic specifically for dementia, rather than some other population? The answer is that a memory provides opportunities and activities that suit the needs of people living with memory loss and help them to interact and be involved with the garden. If at all possible, when your memory garden becomes a reality, do consider including Spokane's horticultural therapist in the development of activities and therapeutic opportunities.

I would also recommend supervising a volunteer living with early memory loss in the maintenance of the garden. Side note, I have more people (not patients, but people with love of gardening) than I can handle contacting me and asking if they can volunteer in Maude's Garden, so you could frame it as a community engagement project.

Then she leaned over and pulled a flower, smelled it and gave it to me, a daughter whose name she could no longer recall. At that point I knew that a mother's love was still there.

From a professional standpoint, I have been involved with the environmental and care planning for persons with memory loss. The organizations I worked with when planning a housing environment for Alzheimer's patients always included a garden with colorful plants, trees, benches, and a walking path. Both our residents and families enjoyed time together there.

Hello,

I am writing to put my unreserved support behind the memory garden pilot project in Manito Park championed by Bob Scarfo, Debby Dodds and Adriano Eva. This is desperately needed in Spokane because it will give care partners space to relax while ensuring their loved one's safety, provide a safe space for people living with dementia to interact with nature in public, and contribute to Spokane as a dementia-friendly community.

Spokane has a growing, urgent need for respite for care partners. As the Dementia Resource Catalyst at Aging & Long Term Care of Eastern Washington (ALTCEW) and a member of the Spokane Regional Dementia Friendly Community, I regularly interact with people who are living with dementia, caring for someone living with dementia, or working with people living with dementia (PLWD). One of the running themes that I hear over and over again is that there is not enough respite care in Spokane. Caring for someone living with dementia is more than a full-time job, especially in the later stages when PLWD often need 24-hour care to ensure their safety. With the current workforce shortage, especially in the healthcare sector, many care partners find it difficult to fulfill even basic needs like grocery shopping, getting a haircut or going to their own healthcare appointments.

A public memory garden would give care partners space to both enjoy nature and relax with the peace of mind that their loved one is safe. They could meet with friends or other care partners in this garden, allowing the person with dementia to wander without worrying that they might get lost. It's hard to overstate how comforting such a space could be for an exhausted care partner.

When someone starts to experience dementia symptoms like memory loss, personality changes or difficulty with problem-solving, one common reaction is to isolate so that no one sees these symptoms. People living with dementia frequently stay away from social gatherings, church, work, etc. so that they can keep their diagnosis or symptoms hidden. Likewise, care partners often encourage their loved ones to stay home so that they won't "cause a scene" or be hurt by others' reactions.

It's our responsibility to create and maintain inclusive, safe spaces for PLWD and their care partners throughout Spokane to encourage people living with dementia to remain in our community. Many factors go into making a space safe for people living with dementia. While criteria for a safe space can vary from person to person and even moment to moment, there are a few common trends. For example, people living with dementia often feel more comfortable with fewer distractions like loud noises, crowds of people and intersecting sounds.

Establishing a Memory Garden that anyone can use would be a significant step to making Spokane feel safe and welcoming for people living with dementia in Spokane. I would eventually love to see memory

gardens in many public parks across Spokane, especially in underserved communities. However, I think that Manito Park is the best place to start this pilot project because it has significant space, more large areas that are away from distractions like playgrounds and traffic, public restrooms that could be close to the memory garden, and several parking areas.

I hope that you consider this as the beginning, not the end, of a much-needed shift to make Spokane a more inclusive and inviting place for people living with dementia and their care partners.
