MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 3:35 p.m. by committee chair Greta Gilman. (No video recording due to technical issues.)

Public Comments: None

Action items:

1. ALSC Architects / standard park restroom case-study, module design and deployment planning (\$73,865.00 nontaxable service) – Nick Hamad

The restrooms in the City Parks have been in declining condition for many years. Improving restrooms conditions & service is the highest park improvement priority of citizens responding during the citywide park Master Plan study. In general, park restrooms are aging, are in relatively antiquated condition, and ¾ of which require either major physical improvement or complete replacement to improve service. A thorough restroom condition assessment, completed by park staff, thoroughly documents these conditions is included in the 9/3/25 Agenda Packet.

In response to community feedback and desire, the proposed park levy included funding to significantly renovate restrooms, with the goal of providing reliable, clean, welcoming and safe restrooms within the park system. In an effort to expedite restroom improvement should the proposed park levy pass, park staff has solicited ALSC Architects is to complete additional restroom design background research and develop several 'standard designs' for park future park restrooms. This includes a scalable design which would apply to small neighborhood park restrooms, larger community parks, and regional parks / special use parks. ALSC has extensive experience in designing welcoming, easily maintainable, and highly durable structures throughout the Spokane region, most applicable include the new Spokane Transit Authority (STA) stations throughout the central city line. This contract develops the standard designs necessary for parks to improve restroom service throughout the city.

While funding for systemwide restroom replacement is dependent on the passage of the upcoming park levy, should that measure not pass, parks will still work to fund replacement of restrooms as department funding permits. Coeur d'Alene already has grant funding to for a 2026 replacement.

Motion #1 – Greta Gilman moved to recommend ALSC Architects / standard park restroom casestudy, module design and deployment planning (\$73,865.00 nontaxable service) – Nick Hamad Sally Lodato seconded. The motion passed unanimously (2-0 vote).

The committee agreed to present this recommendation as a regular agenda item on the September 11 Park Board meeting agenda.

2. STA / Upriver Drive Transit Stop easement (TBD) – Nick Hamad

STA is proposing an improved transit stop along Upriver Drive adjacent the Beau Rivage apartments in Spokane's Minnehaha Neighborhood. This stop improvement location which would serve approximately 1,400 individuals and would better connect nearby residents with nearby parks (Chief Garry, Beacon Hill) and the Centennial Trail. In order to connect the proposed transit stop to the adjacent private property, STA has requested an easement across a small portion of park land (Upriver Park Boulevard). The small walkway connection requested enhances community access and does not alter the function of the park land. The current assessed value of the easement area is +/-\$50-60. The proposed easement / walkway connection is supported by Master Plan Goal B Objective 2 Trails for Park Land, and the

connectivity created from the adjacent properties to the park system as a result of the enhanced transit connection represents a quantifiable net improvement to the park system.

Motion #1 – Greta Gilman moved to recommend STA / Upriver Drive Transit Stop easement (TBD).

Sally Lodato seconded. The motion passed unanimously (2-0 vote).

The committee agreed to present this recommendation as a consent agenda item on the September 11 Park Board meeting agenda.

Discussion Items: None

Standing Reports: Both the Right of Way (ROW) report and High Bridge/American Indian Cultural Center easement report will be presented in October.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 4:09 p.m.

Background/history: This contract funds park restroom case-study to determine what installations & techniques are most functional nationwide, develops design of several 'restroom modules' for future park restrooms in Spokane, and recommends a deployment strategy for replacing / improvement park restroom improvements within the city. 'Restrooms' were identified in the park and natural lands master plan as the 'highest priority asset to upgrade and add within city parks. The proposed park levy contains significant funding for replacement and enhancement of up to 85 park restrooms citywide. Park staff has completed a detailed condition assessment of all park restrooms and has developed draft guidelines for the improvement of these facilities. This contract is the next step in planning park restroom renovations citywide and is being performed prior to a levy vote to expedite these proposed enhancements. Motion wording: Motion to approve ALSC Architects time and materials contract for standard park restroom case-study, module design, and deployment planning not to exceed \$73,865.00



Background/history:				
STA is proposing a new transit stop along Upriver Drive at the Beau Rivage Apartments, located adjacent city parks owned tax parcel #35112.9015. In order to connect this transit stop to the adjacent sidewalk network on private property, STA needs to cross approximately 13 lineal feet of park land (+/-50 square feet).				
This park property is undeveloped and will remain largely unaffected by this change, while park users and adjacent park lands (minnehaha, beacon hill trailheads) will benefit from increased connectivity to public transit.


