A. April 12, 2018, regular Park Board meeting minutes

Motion No. 1: Mike Fagan moved to approve the April 12, 2018, Park Board meeting minutes.

Rick Chase seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

A. <u>SYSCA update</u> – *Jeff Edwards*, Corbin Senior Center executive director, presented a quarterly recap of the activities, fundraising accomplishments and participation hours at Spokane's 10 youth, senior and community centers.

B. <u>Friends of Manito update</u> – *Dave Lennstrom,* Friends of Manito president, presented update on Friends of the Manito recent community activities, fundraising efforts, projects and special events.

5. Claims: Claims for the month of April 2018 – Chris Wright

Motion No. 2: Chris Wright moved to approve claims for the month of April 2018 in the amount of \$3,775,985.81

Steve Salvatori seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

6. Financial Report & Budget Update: — Mark Buening provided the April Financial Report & Budget update. Park Fund revenue is tracking at 77.97% of the projected budget. Parks and Recreation expenditures are tracking at 98.45% of the projected budget. The Golf Fund revenue is tracking at 125.16% of the projected budget. The Golf Fund expenditures are tracking at 99.15% of the projected budget. Of the \$68.5 million Riverfront Park Bond, \$33.53 million have been expended and \$22.64 million committed, to date. This leaves a \$12.35 million budget balance.

8. Committee Reports:

Urban Forestry Tree Committee: May 1, 2018, Rick Chase

A. Action Item: None

B. The committee will meet at 4:15 p.m. June 5, 2018, for a field trip to Palisades Park.

Golf Committee: May 8, 2018, Steve Salvatori

A. Facility impact fees – Jason Conley provided on overview of the proposed facility impact fees which will increase overall golf fees from \$1 to \$4 beginning June 1, 2018. The golf facility impact fee will be a loan funding repayment source for the recently approved \$7.5 million Spokane Investment Pool (SIP) loan. Funds from the loan would be used to upgrade the four City golf courses' irrigation systems, and other on-course and off-course improvements over the next five years. These funds will solely be used for capital improvements. The first course slated for improvements is Indian Canyon in the amount of \$2.5 million. Mr. Conley reviewed the payback schedule through the facility impact fee. The payback for the first year is \$217,000 due June 2019. The proposed impact fees place the majority of the increase on the occasional and visiting golfer, and less increase on the frequent golfers. Park Board and staff will monitor this fee structure moving forward. Nick Sumner and Steve Salvatori noted data relating to the potential savings due to the new irrigation system. These benefits included: 1) water savings in the amount of \$20,000 to \$30,000 the first year following installment at Indian Canyon alone; 2) eco-friendly and efficient Smart-head watering system; and 3) improved course conditions and playability.

Motion No. 3: Steve Salvatori moved to accept the 2018 golf facility impact fees as presented.

Sally Lodato seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

Riverfront Park Committee: May 7, 2018, Ted McGregor

A. Riverfront Park signature artwork site recommendation – Garrett Jones provided on overview of the proposed Riverfront Park signature artwork site location as recommended by the Joint Arts Committee (JAC). During the April 25 JAC meeting, the committee reviewed a recommendation from Lead Artist Meejin Yoon to revisit a consideration to install the Stepwell artwork at Site #4 near the conservation area. In March, JAC had agreed on a recommendation to site Stepwell at Site #2 in the Clocktower Meadow, but it was later determined the meadow may be too crowded. The committee and Ms. Yoon believe this site allows the artwork to perch on the hillside offering spectacular views and greater connection with the falls. This location will also be adjacent to a proposed playground.

Motion No. 4: Ted McGregor moved to accept Site #4 near the conservation area as the site for Stepwell.

Jennifer Ogden seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

B. <u>Garco Construction change order #3/Pavilion and Promenade (\$174,093, plus tax)</u> – *Berry Ellison* reviewed change order #3 with Garco Construction relating to work on the Pavilion and Promenade in the amount of \$174,093, plus tax. The change order involves adding Davis Bacon wages, required for grant compliance; refurbishing and re-installing the Expo 74' Butterfly; replacing electrical receptacles on the south side of the Promenade; wayfinding sign footings; and other value-added improvements.

Motion No. 5: Ted McGregor moved to approve change order #3 with Garco Construction for work on the Pavilion and Promenade in the amount of \$174,093, plus tax.

Rick Chase seconded. Motion carried unanimously.

C. Contractors Northwest Inc. change order #18/North Bank budget reallocation (\$43,119.09, plus tax) — Berry Ellison provided an overview of change order #18 with Contractors Northwest Inc. in the amount of \$43,119.09, plus tax. Modifications to the ammonia alarm and emergency ventilation system are necessary due to requirements determined by the Spokane Fire Department. This was not a budgeted item for the Recreational Rink. Stantec, the architect who designed the rink, has offered to reimburse Parks \$10,979.34, which is half of the cost of the exhaust fan. In return, Stantec is asking Parks to release them from any liability on this work on the exhaust fan. Once these anticipated funds are received from Stantec, the money will be allocated to the North Bank budget. This will eventually reduce the budget reallocation down to \$36,000.

<u>Motion No. 6:</u> Ted McGregor moved to recommend the Park Board approve change order #18 with Contractors Northwest Inc. in the amount of \$43,119.09, plus tax.

Gerry Sperling seconded.

The motion passed unanimously.

- D. Riverfront Park redevelopment update Garrett Jones presented the monthly bond update. Project highlights include: 1) Looff Carrousel grand opening is scheduled for 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday following the Junior Lilac Parade; 2) Stepwell next steps include developing construction documents, geotechnical surveys, and creating a maintenance and operation plan; and 3) Pavilion and Central/North Promenades demolition is progressing and the North Bank footprint expanded this week. The Park Board is expected to make a final decision regarding the Pavilion shading element at the June 14 board meeting.

Finance Committee: May 8, 2018, Chris Wright

A. Western Equipment Distributers Inc. value blanket/Toro equipment, repair and parts for parks and golf courses (\$60,000) – Chris Wright presented an overview of a proposed value blanket for the purchase of Toro equipment, and repair and equipment parts from Western Equipment Distributer on an as-needed basis through the end of 2022 in the amount of \$60,000. This is a sole source procurement process with legal and purchasing. A resolution naming Western Equipment as Parks' sole source was approved by the Park Board in June 2016. Today's action item is to reestablish the value blanket.

Motion No. 7: Chris Wright moved to approve the value blanket for the purchase of Toro equipment, and repair and equipment parts from Western Equipment Distributer in the amount of \$60,000.

Jennifer Ogden seconded.

The motion passed unanimously.

1. Nick Sumner reminded citizens to attend the Looff Carrousel grand opening 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday. Festivities include stilt walkers, roving balloon artist, Carrousel-themed art classes, face painting, a troubadour, and family-friendly Xbox games on a large screen.

- 3. Council Liaison *Mike Fagan* reported the Spokane Falls Boulevard building height ordinance has returned to Plan Commission for further review. Currently, there is a city ordinance which applies height restrictions on buildings along Spokane Falls Boulevard (DTC-100 zone) designed to prevent shading from buildings in Riverfront Park. The building height workgroup was tasked with reviewing possible alternative design

standards and identify scope for possible refinement to policy to be considered in the Downtown Plan update. The workgroup has developed the following recommendations: 1) plan for coordinated streetscape improvements along the boulevard; and 2) consider the elimination of the DTC-100 zone as part of the Downtown Plan update. Mr. Fagan asked the Park Board if there was interest in scheduling a joint study session with City Council and the Plan Commission. The Park Board agreed there is an interest. Mr. Fagan will discuss the option with City Council to see if a study session is an option.

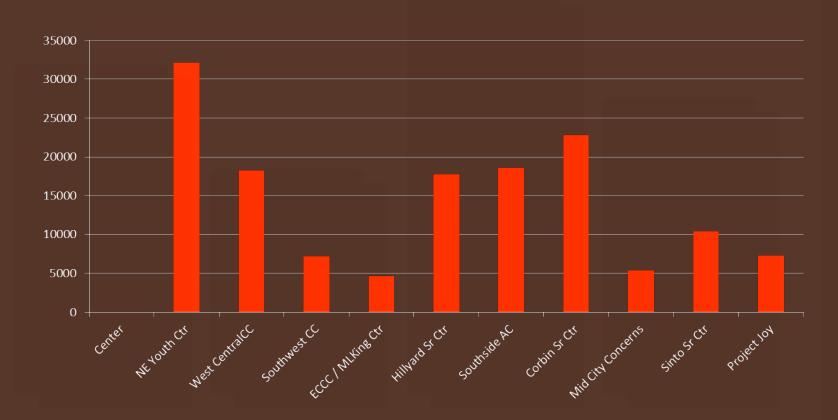

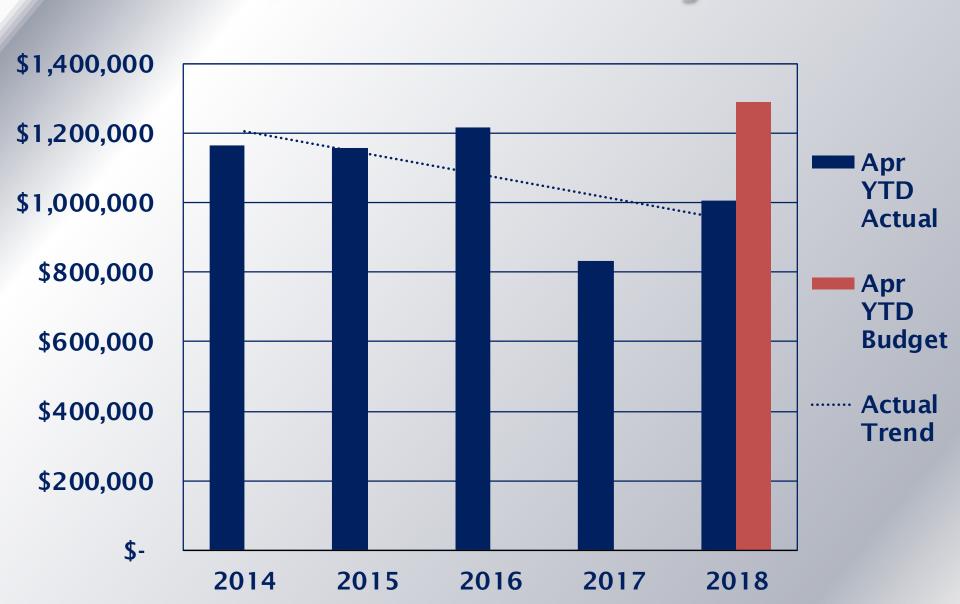

Park Fund Revenue 5 Year Trend & YTD Budget

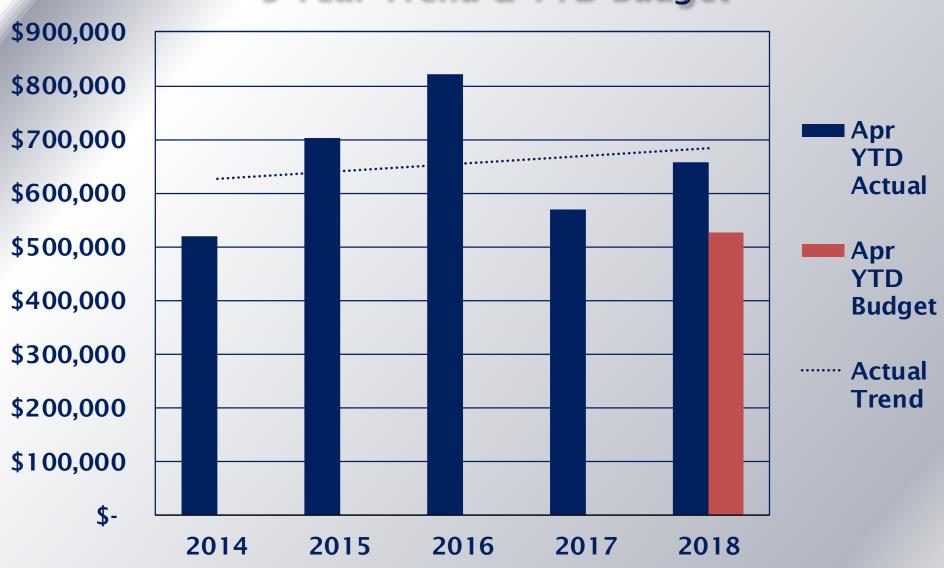

# Design & Specification Report for Riverfront Park Butterfly Wings and Tension System

GuildWorks was hired by Garco Construction to design a solution to attach fabric under tension to the existing butterfly frame shown to the right. The "Riverfront Park Butterfly Wings and Tensioning System" conceptual design process is now complete and this is a report of GuildWorks's findings.

The photo to the right shows the original fabric, note how it wrinkles and not totally smooth. This is because of inadequate tensioning. This wrinkling effect is not great for logos and other art visuals. GuildWorks solution offers even tensioning.

# What was accomplished:

- Full FEM analysis of wind loading on butterfly structure to give Coffman the data needed to reengineer the mast to support the butterfly with fabric wings plus giving our own structural suggestions which included:
  - Concept and discussions with Coffman about design some locking pins into the rotation and lift on the butterfly to be held in place during changing the fabrics so the structure does not pivot and move during that time
- Investigations into how to mount the fabrics into the structure to accomplish the following:
  - Fabrics to be in full tension and presenting completely smooths with minimal to no wrinkles
  - Be easy to replace and install by park personnel
  - Be possible to mount onto existing frame without to much structural work
  - o Removed the use of battens in the design due to cost of installing battens
  - Battens would add difficulty to installation process and they would likely break the smooth surface required for including logos and other artwork.
- Investigation into materials of the fabrics with the following in mind:
  - Life span concept to be determined
  - Ease of adding imagery to the fabric wings
  - Ease of installing based on weight and type of fabric
  - Potential to change out butterfly wings for specific events, seasonal art, or simply to refresh over time.
  - Potential to print on the fabrics or do applique designs
- Pricing out new fabrics and potential replacement cost

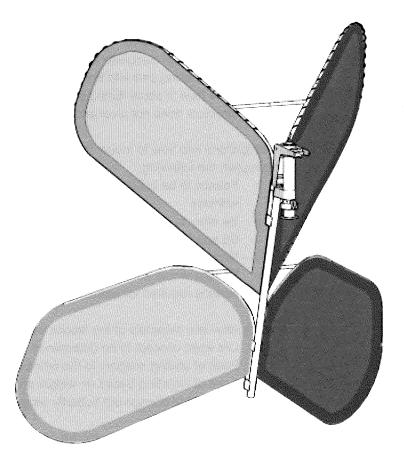


# **Mounting Solution**

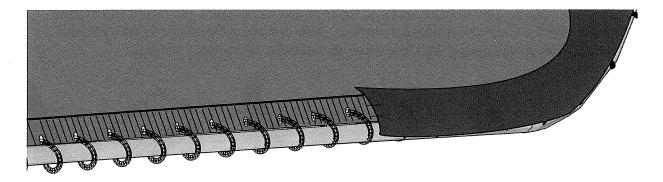
GuildWorks has settled in on "Lashing" an older relatively low tech way of attaching the butterfly sails to the frame. We have looked at many modern high tech systems and determined lashing would be the best suited method for the following reasons:

- This method is simple and anyone can do it allowing the sails to be mounted with just a very simple set of instructions.
- The ease of attachment means that changing the sails on the butterfly can be considered for special events or seasonally as desired without specialized labor.
- This method allows for tension of the fabric to be slowly applied one lash at a time increasing the tension on the overall sail as it is lashed to the frame. This pretensioning is very important to the smooth look of the fabric installed as well as removing any flapping, and increasing longevity.
- This method has does not require additional structural framework or for new frames unlike some higher tech attachment techniques which would require full rebuilding of the existing frame.
- be provide an extra safety precaution in the engineering of the structure. The rope can be designed to break in very high wind load situations—i.e., winds over 70 mph. This would only be an issue in a rare case where the wind does not lift or pivot the butterfly on the mast as it is designed to do but instead curls around the backside pushing quickly into the butterfly and pushing it against the mast before it has had a chance to spin. In this case the rope could break releasing the fabric, there by lower loading on the overall frame and mast.

The following image shows the "Basic Lashing System" around the frame, It should be noted that the fabric is reinforced where the sail is grommeted, along the outside edge of each sail.



The image below shows how there could be flap added to the sail of each wing which could hide the grommets and part of the frame bar from the front side. Please note it would still be visible from the back but you would never see light through the holes of the grommets so they would disappear more.



# **Materials**

GuildWorks is suggesting one range of materials for the sails of the butterflies based on the following

- Provide a material that is not to heavy so that one person could hold the fabric easily while working in a lift basket for installation
- Provide a material that can be dye sublimation printing so that logos, artwork, and other visuals
  can be presented on the butterfly wings as desired and show from both sides
- Provide a material that is a reasonable cost allowing for lower cost special orders for events

The choice we found is standard within the advertising printing world, these fabric are lightweight structural cloths used some times for large backlighting printed visuals. They have polyester bases with coatings to allow them to hold up to UV light for a period of time but light and easy to install.

- A cloth of this sort as the base can take dye sublimation printing, which is the best way to place any image, visual or artwork onto the butterfly with the least cost and fastest turnaround.
- Can last 1-2 years easily outside with a good printed image (up to 3 years total)
- Durable enough to be taken down and reinstalled if needed for a custom event.
- Lightweight compared to longer lasting coated cloths.

GuildWorks will be providing samples of these cloths soon as we are gathering the different options now.

# Applying an Image - Printing vs Applique

GuildWorks envisions the butterfly sails being changed out and different colors and imagery happening on them throughout the year. This could be seasonal, but could also be per event. Our fastest way to place visuals on the cloth is through dye-sublimation printing. There are also options using different colored clothes and using an sewn applique technique which will result in a different look and feel.



# **Dye-Sublimation Printing**

# Pros:

- Images are permanent and do not peel
- Dye does not build up on the fabric but is bonded into it
- Colors can be extraordinarily brilliant due to the bonding of the dye to the transparent fibers of the synthetic fabric
- Truly continuous tones can be achieved that are equivalent to photographs, without the use of special techniques such as half-screen printing
- The image can be printed over the entire wing with no difficulty in printing edge to edge
- Fine detailed lines, art and photographic images can be presented
- An artistic image can be exactly scaled and transferred at a lower cost and exactness
- Transmitted backlight & back sunlight would show through the image brilliantly

# Cons:

- The image can look a little bit lighter more faded on the back side in reflected light—i.e., street lamp lightings towards the back side
- Sunlight will degrade the image causing it to fade faster than solid colored cloth.

# Sewn Applique

# Pros:

- fabric applique is a brilliant looking technique when done well and can graphicly make a big visual impact
- Fabric colors will last longer than the printed image
- Color reads the same from both sides in all lighting situations
- Simple applique like the original colored bands could be comparable or lower cost than dye sublimation printing.

## Cons:

- Time consuming and higher budget to produce
- Image detail & resolutions is limited due to sewing fabric together vs printing an image
- Not good for photographic imagery or art reproductions

# Summary of Applique vs Dye sublimation

Both options work well and there are good reasons for either depending on the purpose - for a
one time special event dye sublimation is likely the best way to go due to cost savings in
production. However for ongoing daily park use and park branding, applique might offer a longer
life design and feel more sophisticated.

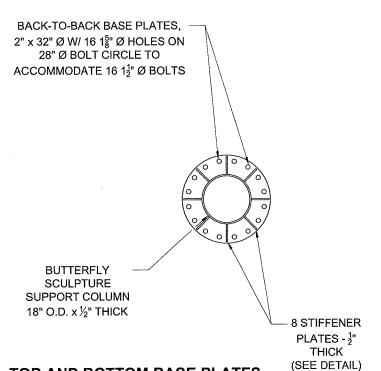




STIFFENER PLATE DETAIL SIDE VIEW: 3" = 1'-0" SCALE

- Are the anchor bolts priced as stainless steel or galvanized? If SS can you give us a deduct for galvanized? A
  deduct for galvanized can be applied. I asked the question and didn't hear back so I priced per plan.
- The general pricing to do the work seems reasonable but the GCs seem a little excessive.

#### GCs:

 You are charging .75 months for the backhoe. This is over 1 day for each footing - I would think at least 2 per day is more

reasonable. You also have money in equipment under excavation?

We'll need to backfill and compact once we strip the forms. The cost shown in excavation is for j-tamp for compaction pre/post

- Please explain why you are charging mobilization since you currently have 3 excavators on site. Different equipment being used and need to get over to the INB site
- You are charging disposal in both the GCs and the earthwork?
   Disposal in the GCs is for refuse from the forms and etc. Disposal in earthwork is for hauling excess material to stockpile or dump
- Unless you are adding a superintendent I'm not sure why you are charging for this. He is already paid for in the base contract including his site truck.

It's added scope that will take additional coordination of crews and paperwork, we can change that to a GF but the cost are similar

• Usually small tools are part of your labor costs?

The way we put this together in our estimating program the labor cost are only labor and fringe package

What is the other charge of \$500 for safety?

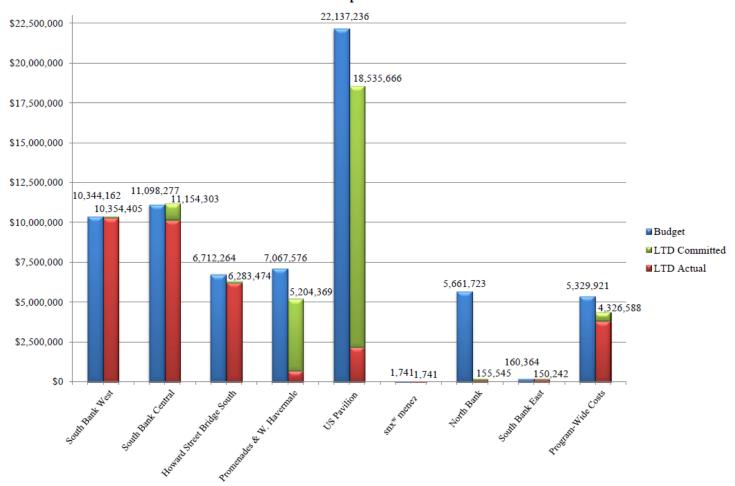
### **Bond Budget Utilization Through April 2018**
