3. **Public comment:**

A. Skate park at Riverfront Park's north bank – Matthew Fuller of the local skate community addressed the board with questions relating to the new skate park being built on the north bank of Riverfront Park. He explained the importance of having a roof on the structure to allow protection from inclement weather and the need for lighting so it could be used at night. Mr. Fuller asked if the roof and lighting is in the design, what the cost for including a covering/shelter and what funding mechanisms there might be available. Berry Ellison provided a map of the north bank project showing where the skate park is located. He also displayed an image of the facility depicting where the lighting would be installed. The base bid of the original 5,000-square-foot facility was about \$285,000. Additional funding was later secured to expand the size of the facility to 8,500-square-feet. This brings the total cost to about \$500,000. Mr. Ellison estimates a durable, commercial grade roof would cost approximately \$100 per square foot. There could be an option of covering the 5,000square-foot section which would cost an additional \$500,000. Garrett Jones explained during the public input phase of the project, skate community representatives shared that if additional funds were to be raised their top priority would be to have a facility expanded to 8,500-square-feet. Other priorities included having certain elements covered. He explained that the Parks Foundation's Riverfront fundraising campaign is currently raising funds for capital projects in the park which are not funded by the bond. There are also plans underway for the formation of a Friends of Riverfront Park which could also be a funding mechanism. Jennifer Ogden suggested Parks working with Mr. Fuller on identifying potential donors within the skate community. Mr. Fuller said he looks forward to working with Parks on making the roof/shelter a possibility.

5. Special Guests:

A. <u>Spokane C.O.P.S. park patrols overview</u> – *Patrick Striker*, Spokane C.O.P.S. executive director, presented an overview of some of the patrols in city parks, including the C.O.P.S. Mounted Patrol and the Off-Road Patrol. The Mounted Patrol Unit involves 55 volunteer riders/horses who are dedicated to improving public safety through community outreach. The Off-Road Patrol involves C.O.P.S. volunteers who ride four-wheelers to get into those areas that are hard to access and provide a presence for the community. Mr. Striker shared some inspiring stories about how these services benefit the community.

B. <u>Spokane Youth and Senior Centers' Association quarterly update</u> – *Jerry Unruh,* Hillyard Senior Center executive director, and *Kate Green,* Northeast Youth Center executive director, presented a recap of the activities, fundraising accomplishments and participation hours at Spokane's 10 youth, senior and community centers.

6. <u>Financial report and budget update</u>: – Mark Buening provided the July financial report and budget update. The July operating expenditures for the Park Fund are less than the historic budget average by about \$3.43 million. Year-to-date revenues are less than the budget average about \$1.54 million. Revenues are exceeding expenditures approximately \$2.15 million. The July operating expenditures for the Golf Fund is about \$232,000 less than the budget average. Year-to-date revenues are exceeding the budget average about \$45,000. Revenues are exceeding expenditures almost \$1.06 million year-to-date.

A. <u>Toro Company equipment purchase (\$361,595.37, plus financial fees, tax inclusive)</u> – *Mark Poirier* presented an in-depth presentation reviewing the process to select Toro and the benefits of purchasing the new maintenance equipment. The purchase would include nine pieces of equipment for the four city-owned golf courses. The existing equipment is outdated, and difficult and expensive to maintain. Net impact to the Golf Fund will be \$12,531.02 per year, for the next five years. The first payment installment is due May 2021.

Motion No. 2: Bob Anderson moved to approve The Toro Company equipment purchase for city-owned golf courses in the amount of \$361,595.37, plus financial fees, tax inclusive.

A. <u>Garco Construction gift agreement and sponsorship/Pavilion Elevated Experience (Value:</u> <u>\$130,000, tax inclusive</u>) – Jonathan Moog presented a proposed gift agreement and sponsorship with Garco Construction. The value is estimated to be \$130,000 of in-kind materials and labor for site improvements that expand capacity at the Pavilion to 5,100 persons. The scope of in-kind work includes widening and adding egress paths, as well as adding a fire hose standpipe that will eliminate the need for a fire lane through the amphitheater. The scope also includes signage and branding which will be negotiated and offered to the Park Board at a later date.

Motion No. 3: Bob Anderson moved to approve the Garco Construction gift agreement and to bring the sign language back to Park Board at a later date.

Lori Kinnear seconded.

Motion passed with unanimous consent (6-0 vote).

B. <u>LaRiviere Inc. change order #4/North bank (\$273,792.23, tax inclusive)</u> – *Berry Ellison* presented a proposed change order #4 with LaRiviere Inc. for work on the Riverfront Park north bank playground. The change order consists of 12 value-added improvements for the north bank playground project. Two of the items are eligible for reimbursement by the EPA for up to \$55,000, and two items are funded by project donors, Hooptown USA and the Parks Foundation up to \$46,000. Potentially, about \$106,000 of the change order could be reimbursed.

Motion No. 4: Bob Anderson moved to approve change order #4 with LaRiviere Inc., as presented, in the amount of \$273,792.23, tax inclusive, from the administrative reserve and non-bond funds.

Sally Lodato seconded. Motion passed with unanimous consent (6-0 vote). C. Riverfront Park redevelopment budget amendment #11 (\$0) - Berry Ellison presented a proposed amendment #11 to the Riverfront Park redevelopment budget. The budget amendment is necessary to properly allocate funds to various project budgets. The proposed budget reallocations are based on actual costs-to-date, forecasts, commitments of the Master Plan, agreements with other departments and Park Board authorized additional expenditures. Reallocations would include: 1) reallocate \$285,000 from the north bank project contingency to the north bank construction for the skate park; 2) release Park Fund balance reserve for the Under The Freeway (UTF) skate park relocation project; 3) reallocate \$250,000 tree mitigation funds to the north suspension bridge; 4) reallocate \$67,000 from West Havermale contingency to the north suspension bridge; 5) reallocate \$33,000 from north bank contingency to the north suspension bridge; and 6) reallocate \$65,000 from north bank owner management reserve to the north suspension bridge. Mr. Ellison explained that the north bank and West Havermale projects must be complete and/or fully funded prior to them being reallocated to the north suspension bridge. If the north suspension bridge project doesn't use all the funds allocated to the bridge, then that money needs to come back into Riverfront Park for capital improvements. Jennifer Ogden asked if any funds not used on the bridge could potentially be used for the skate park covering. Mr. Ellison said this is a possibility.

Motion No. 5: Bob Anderson moved to approve amendment #11 to the Riverfront Park redevelopment budget and unencumber the Park Fund balance reserve.

Jennifer Ogden seconded.

Motion passed with unanimous consent (6-0 vote).

D. The next regularly scheduled meeting is 3 p.m. Sept. 8, 2020.

9. Reports:

A. **Park Board President**: *Jennifer Ogden* referenced the more than 150 emails the Park Board received over the past month relating to the selection of an artist to create the second art piece at Riverfront Park as part of the redevelopment project. After providing an overview of the situation, Ms. Ogden offered clarification regarding the selection process and how Parks plans to proceed.

- a. Joint Arts Committee recommendation/public feedback "The Beaver" by Saya Moriyasu was the Joint Art Committee's recommendation for the second art piece. Shortly following the JAC decision, the Covid-19 shutdown occurred which changed the public's avenue for providing feedback since they could no longer physically attend committee and Park Board meetings. Due in large part to a high volume of emails received against the Beaver, Parks opened up an online survey to solicit public feedback on the four finalists' proposals.
- b. Communication between Spokane Arts and the artist Directly following the JAC meeting, Ms. Moriyasu was contacted by Spokane Arts regarding the JAC recommendation. According to the artist, she was under the understanding that she had been selected to create the work which would be installed in a very tight timeframe. Though Parks is not privy to the communication the artist and Spokane Arts had, Ms. Ogden explained it sounds like there were significant misunderstandings.
- c. **Request for reimbursement** Ms. Moriyasu has requested Parks reimburse her for the work she has completed to date on the Beaver. Ms. Ogden explained the city cannot pay unapproved expenses. The project is only one third of the way through the approval process. Without Park Board's approval and a contract in place, Parks cannot issue any funds because there is no authorization for the

project, as of yet.

d. **Moving forward** – During this week's Finance Committee meeting, it was agreed Parks will proceed with the art project by asking the JAC for their top two art proposal choices and request they contact the second place artist to be certain that their proposed artwork is still a possibility. Plans are to bring a recommendation to the Riverfront Park Committee next month which will proceed to the Park Board for a final decision at the board's Sept. 10 regular meeting.

B. Liaisons:

- 1. **Conservation Futures** *Greta Gilman* reported 38.3 acres of private property in the Beacon Hill area bordering Camp Sekani Park was recently purchased through the Conservation Futures program. One parcel which was purchased will connect two sections of public land to ensure the trail will not be landlocked by private property and the other section will preserve a downhill biking trail.
- Parks Foundation Terri Fortner of the Parks Foundation thanked Parks staff for their collaborative work with the foundation on the Garco Construction's in-kind contribution and donation of their work on the Pavilion. Ms. Fortner reported the foundation is developing a list of potential donors for a dog park. She explained the foundation is looking to raise between \$350,000 to \$500,000 for the dog park.
- 3. City Council Lori Kinnear provided an update on a two-year pilot program underway which involves posting year-round, 20-mile-per-hour speed limit signs around parks, including Comstock and Mission parks. The fuel and fire mitigation program utilizing goats is in its final draft. The first area where goats will be introduced to browse, providing brush clean up and vegetation control, will be the Hangman area. Approximately 150 goats will be used in this area. The project will move to the north and northeast areas of Spokane next year. The goats are managed 24-7 by humans and dogs during their browse work.
- C. **Director**: *Garrett Jones* reported that a coalition is expected to be formed to address some issues at Coeur d'Alene Park. The group will look at opportunities for outreach for the homeless and vulnerable while keeping parks safe and clean.
 - a) Budget Mr. Jones commended staff for their diligence in keeping expenses to a bare minimum, for pitching in and performing tasks outside their regular work, and going over and beyond expectations. Since the March shutdown, Parks has either hit or exceeded budget.
 - b) Recognized employees Mr. Jones recognized a number of parks staff who were recently nominated for Employee of the Quarter, including Ed Anderson, Jesse Jones, Robert Lawton, Mike Shearer, Mike Dewey, James Taylor and Rhett McCall. The recipient of the Employee of the Quarter was Josh Oakes.



Motion No. 1: Jennifer Ogden moved to approve consent agenda items #1 - #3, as presented.

Bob Anderson seconded. Motion passed with unanimous consent (6-0 vote).

5. Special Guests:

6. **Financial report and budget update**: – *Mark Buening* provided the June financial report and budget update. Mr. Buening pointed out revenues and expenditures are consistently below historic averages. The June operating expenditures for the Park Fund are about \$2.47 million less than the two-year historic budget average. Year-to-date revenues are exceeding the budget average about \$1.33 million. Revenues are exceeding expenditures approximately

\$1.86 million. The June operating expenditures for the Golf Fund is about \$245,000 less than the budget average. Year-to-date revenues are about \$86,000 less than the budget average. Revenues are exceeding expenditures almost \$698,000 year-to-date. A recap of the redevelopment bond fund reflected of the \$68.4 million total budget, there is about \$900,000 which has not been spent or encumbered.

7. Special discussion/action items:

A. Garco Construction sponsorship and gift agreement/Pavilion Elevated Experience – Berry *Ellison* presented an overview of a proposed sponsorship and gift agreement with Garco Construction for the Pavilion Elevated Experience. Staff has been strategizing methods to increase the Pavilion capacity from 3,900 to 5,100 people. This added capacity will allow for several operational and programming opportunities that will make the Pavilion more attractive to big name performers and sponsors. Mr. Ellison explained the return on investment is considered significant with long-term benefits. Garco has offered to complete the necessary improvements required to increase the capacity, at no cost, in return for recognition within the Pavilion Amphitheater, specifically the Elevated Experience. The work has an estimated value of \$130,000, which includes design, permitting, construction, contingency and tax. The change order would expand pedestrian egress at the Pavilion's amphitheater space resulting in increased capacity to 5,100 persons. The scope of in-kind work includes widening and adding egress paths, as well as adding a fire hose standpipe that will eliminate the need for a fire lane through the amphitheater. The proposed recognition scope, including signage and branding, will be negotiated and offered to the Park Board at a later date. Garrett Jones explained staff is requesting the board to authorize proceeding with the site improvements at the Pavilion with the condition that the sponsorship agreement recognition scope be approved by Park Board prior to installation. Jennifer Ogden stressed the importance that Garco absorb any unforeseen conditions and Parks will not receive any bills of any kind for this change order. Ms. Ogden added this will ensure Garco will receive their full in-kind value. Nick Sumner asked if the current restrooms could accommodate an increased capacity. Mr. Ellison explained staff is working with Planning and Development, and building officials on a strategy to potentially phase in restrooms for a certain amount of time, possibly a couple of years. This time will allow staff to see how the Pavilion performs and be able to better assess those needs. He said planning and building officials would like Parks to build additional restrooms rather soon, but budget constraints and operations point to a portable restroom solution for now. This would be the most feasible and cost effective way to handle the increased capacity short term.

Motion No. 2: Jennifer Ogden moved to authorize the Parks director to proceed with the site improvements at the Pavilion with Garco Construction's in-kind offering with the condition that the sponsorship agreement recognition scope with Garco be approved by Park Board prior to installation with in-kind value of \$130,000.

Nick Sumner seconded. Motion passed with unanimous consent (6-0 vote).

B. <u>Redevelopment update</u> – *Garrett Jones* presented the Riverfront Park redevelopment update. Highlights included: 1) North bank project – the M&O concrete slab is in place and the skate park base and walls are being formed; 2) Ice Age Floods playground on the north bank – the addition of the Roskelley Performance Climbing Boulder has been made possible courtesy of the Jess Roskelley Foundation; 3) West Havermale Island project – equipment is being installed at the playground and the shade structure is being installed; 4) Stepwell art piece – completion is scheduled for late fall or early spring; 5) second art piece – the Joint Arts Committee selected four final art designs and chose one piece to recommend to the Park Board, "Beaver" and staff is currently gathering additional public feedback on all four finalists' designs.

Finance Committee: July 7, 2020, Bob Anderson

A. Swire Coca-Cola beverage contract/Division-wide - Jason Conley, Jonathan Moog and Mark Poirier presented an overview of the pouring rights and beverage contract selection process and recommendation. The current beverage contract with Pepsi expired in January. The master contract designates the selected vendor the exclusive beverage pouring rights at Riverfront Park, all city aquatic centers and golf courses, Dwight Merkel, Manito Park, and other mutually agreed upon Park properties. In exchange, Parks receives the following from the beverage provider: fixed-unit pricing, marketing and promotions funding, event support, beverage equipment, a fixed commission on vending machines sales, annual support product, and an estimated \$60,735 annually, based on historical average. Mr. Conley reviewed the process which lead to a staff recommendation to award Swire Coca-Cola, USA, the five-year agreement with an optional two-year renewal to begin July 10, 2020. This beverage agreement requires a competitive request for proposal (RFP) process administered by Purchasing Department. There were three vendors who responded to the RFP, including RC Cola, Swire Coca-Cola and PepsiCo. The evaluation committee, comprised of staff from Parks administration, Riverfront Park, Recreation, Golf and City Purchasing, determined Swire would be the best fit as a beverage partner. Some of the key elements Swire is agreeing to offer, as part of the proposed contract, includes: 1) 55% commission on vending machines; 2) \$20,000/year in annual support and sponsorship funds; 3) \$20,535+ annual rebate accrual; 4) \$7,500/year in major event sponsorship fees; 5) 400 cases of annual support product; 6) \$15,000 in ice-making equipment; 7) \$7,500 annual credit for Menu/Look of Success funds; 8) minimum of one Riverfront Park promotion per year; 9) special event staffing/equipment support for major events; and 10) marketing and promotional assistance. Mr. Moog explained he looks forward to this partnership with Swire.

Barb Richey arrived at the meeting at 4:15 p.m.

Mr. Poirier said this proposed agreement could be a great partnership which can help drive

rounds of golf at the city courses. If this agreement is approved by the Park Board, Swire could begin installation immediately with Golf being the first area converted to Coca-Cola. Riverfront Park Numerica SkyRide/Ribbon would be next followed by vending machine installations in other operational areas this summer.

Motion No. 3: Bob Anderson moved to approve a five-year contract with an optional two-year renewal with Swire Coca-Cola, as presented, for exclusive pouring rights for Spokane Parks and Recreation Division beverages sales.

Jennifer Ogden seconded.

Motion passed with unanimous consent (7-0 vote).

B. LaRiviere change order #3/Riverfront Park north bank playground (\$134,200.47, tax inclusive) – Berry Ellison presented an overview of change order #3 with LaRiviere for work on the Riverfront Park north bank playground in the amount of \$134,200.47, tax inclusive. This change order includes value-added improvements and credits, including upgrades to the large shade structure roof, reduction in drainage materials and concrete curb, modifications to faux rock and railings, structural upgrades to the M&O facility, addition of a performance climbing boulder as part of a philanthropic gift to Parks, increase height of parking lot screen walls, and added fixtures for public restrooms. The climbing feature would be funded by \$48,000 donation from the Jess Roskelley Foundation in memory of Jess Roskelley, a world-renowned outdoorsman who grew up in Spokane. Roskelley passed away last year while on a climbing trip. Mr. Ellison explained the additional 50 days being requested is needed due to delays caused by Covid-19 and the added scope of work in this change order. If approved by the Park Board, substantial completion is scheduled for Jan. 5, 2021.

Motion No. 4: Bob Anderson moved to approve change order #3 with LaRiviere for work on the Riverfront Park north bank playground in the amount of \$134,200.47, tax inclusive, from Administrative Reserve, Roskelley Foundation and FFE budget, and to add 50 calendar days to the contract.

Sally Lodato seconded.

Motion passed with unanimous consent (7-0 vote).

PERSONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT

Title: PARKS AND RECREATION SEASONAL ACTIVITY GUIDES

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between the **CITY OF SPOKANE PARKS AND RECREATION DIVISION** as ("City"), a Washington municipal corporation, and **TPC HOLDINGS, INC.**, whose address is 2210 North Dollar Road, Spokane Valley, Washington 99212 as ("Company"), individually hereafter referenced as a "party", and together as the "parties".

The parties agree as follows:

1. PERFORMANCE.

The Company shall provide Design, Printing and Mailing Services for the Parks and Recreation Seasonal Activity Guides, in accordance with Exhibit B, IRFP No. 5290-20 issued by the City, and Exhibits C and D, the Company's Proposal dated July 7, 2020 and Bid Response Summary, all attached here. In the event of a conflict between Company's Proposal and this City Contract, the terms of this contract will control.

2. TERM OF AGREEMENT.

The term of this Agreement begins on August 13, 2020 and shall run through August 31, 2025, unless amended by written agreement or terminated earlier under the provisions

3. COMPENSATION / PAYMENT.

Total annual compensation for Company's services under this unit price Contract shall be a maximum amount not to exceed **THIRTY NINE THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS** (\$39,000.00), per year, not including application tax, in accordance with Company's Proposal attached as Exhibit C, unless modified by a written amendment to this Agreement.

The Company shall submit its applications for payment to City of Spokane Parks and Recreation Division, 808 West Spokane Falls Blvd., 5th Floor, Spokane, Washington 99201. **Payment will be made via direct deposit/ACH** within thirty (30) days after receipt of the Company's application except as provided by state law. If the City objects to all or any portion of the invoice, it shall notify the Company and reserves the right to only pay that portion of the invoice not in dispute. In that event, the parties shall immediately make every effort to settle the disputed amount.

4. TAXES, FEES AND LICENSES.

A. Company shall pay and maintain in current status, all necessary licenses, fees, assessments, permit charges, etc. necessary to conduct the work included under this Agreement. It is the Company's sole responsibility to monitor and determine changes or

the enactment of any subsequent requirements for said fees, assessments, or changes and to immediately comply.

B. The cost of any permits, licenses, fees, etc. arising as a result of the projects included in this Agreement shall be included in the project budgets.

5. CITY OF SPOKANE BUSINESS LICENSE.

Section 8.01.070 of the Spokane Municipal Code states that no person may engage in business with the City without first having obtained a valid annual business registration. The Company shall be responsible for contacting the State of Washington Business License Services at http://bls.dor.wa.gov or 1-800-451-7985 to obtain a business registration. If the Company does not believe it is required to obtain a business registration, it may contact the City's Taxes and Licenses Division at (509) 625-6070 to request an exemption status determination.

6. SOCIAL EQUITY REQUIREMENTS / NON-DISCRIMINATION.

No individual shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefit of, subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in the administration of or in connection with this Agreement because of age, sex, race, color, religion, creed, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation including gender expression or gender identity, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, or use of a service animal by a person with disabilities. The Company agrees to comply with, and to require that all subcontractors comply with, federal, state and local nondiscrimination laws, including but not limited to: the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, and the American's With Disabilities Act, to the extent those laws are applicable.

7. INDEMNIFICATION.

The Company shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its officers and employees harmless from all claims, demands, or suits at law or equity asserted by third parties for bodily injury (including death) and/or property damage which arise from the Company's negligence or willful misconduct under this Agreement, including attorneys' fees and litigation costs; provided that nothing herein shall require a Company to indemnify the City against and hold harmless the City from claims, demands or suits based solely upon the negligence of the City, its agents, officers, and employees. If a claim or suit is caused by or results from the concurrent negligence of the Company's agents or employees and the City, its agents, officers and employees, this indemnity provision shall be valid and enforceable to the extent of the negligence of the Company, its agents or employees. The Company specifically assumes liability and agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold the City harmless for actions brought by the Company's own employees against the City and, solely for the purpose of this indemnification and defense, the Company specifically waives any immunity under the Washington State industrial insurance law, or Title 51 RCW. The Company recognizes that this waiver was specifically entered into pursuant to the provisions of RCW 4.24.115 and was the subject of mutual negotiation. The indemnity and agreement to defend and hold the City harmless provided for in this section shall survive any termination or expiration of this agreement.

8. INSURANCE.

During the period of the Agreement, the Company shall maintain in force at its own expense, each insurance noted below with companies or through sources approved by the State Insurance Commissioner pursuant to RCW 48:

A. **Worker's Compensation Insurance** in compliance with RCW 51.12.020, which requires subject employers to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers and Employer's Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000;

B. **General Liability Insurance** on an occurrence basis, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. It shall include contractual liability coverage for the indemnity provided under this agreement. It shall provide that the City, its officers and employees are additional insureds but only with respect to the Company's services to be provided under this Agreement;

i. Acceptable **supplementary Umbrella insurance** coverage combined with Company's General Liability insurance policy must be a minimum of \$1,000,000, in order to meet the insurance coverage limits required in this Agreement; and

C. **Automobile Liability Insurance** with a combined single limit, or the equivalent of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident for bodily injury and property damage, including coverage for owned, hired and non-owned vehicles.

There shall be no cancellation, material change, reduction of limits or intent not to renew the insurance coverage(s) without forty-five (45) days written notice from the Company or its insurer(s) to the City. As evidence of the insurance coverage(s) required by this Agreement, the Company shall furnish acceptable Certificates of Insurance (COI) to the City at the time it returns this signed Agreement. The certificate shall specify the City of Spokane as "Additional Insured" specifically for Company's services under this Agreement, as well as all of the parties who are additional insureds, and include applicable policy endorsements, the forty-five (45) day cancellation clause, and the deduction or retention level. The Company shall be financially responsible for all pertinent deductibles, self-insured retentions, and/or self-insurance.

10. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION.

The Company has provided its certification that it is in compliance with and shall not contract with individuals or organizations which are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible from participation in Federal Assistance Programs under Executive Order 12549 and "Debarment and Suspension", codified at 29 CFR part 98.

11. AUDIT.

The Company and its sub-contractor shall maintain for a minimum of three (3) years following final payment all records related to its performance of the Agreement. The Company and its sub-contractors shall provide access to authorized City representatives, at reasonable times and in a reasonable manner to inspect and copy any such record. In the event of conflict between this provision and related auditing provisions required under federal law applicable to the Agreement, the federal law shall prevail.

12. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING.

The Company shall not assign or subcontract its obligations under this Agreement without the City's written consent, which may be granted or withheld in the City's sole discretion. Any subcontract made by the Company shall incorporate by reference this Agreement, except as otherwise provided. The Company shall ensure that all subcontractors comply with the obligations and requirements of the subcontract. The City's consent to any assignment or subcontract does not release the Company from liability or any obligation within this Agreement, whether before or after City consent, assignment or subcontract.

13. TERMINATION.

Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, by ten (10) days written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, the City shall pay the Company for all work previously authorized and performed prior to the termination date.

14. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE.

The standard of performance applicable to Company's services will be the degree of skill and diligence normally employed by professional Companies performing the same or similar services at the time the services under this Agreement are performed.

15. OWNERSHIP AND USE OF RECORDS AND DOCUMENTS.

Original documents, drawings, designs, reports, or any other records developed or created under this Agreement shall belong to and become the property of the City. All records submitted by the City to the Company shall be safeguarded by the Company. The Company shall make such data, documents and files available to the City upon the City's request. If the City's use of the Company's records or data is not related to this project, it shall be without liability or legal exposure to the Company.

Under Washington State Law (reference RCW Chapter 42.56, the *Public Records Act* [PRA]) all materials received or created by the City of Spokane are *public records* and are available to the public for viewing via the City Clerk's Records (online) or a valid Public Records Request (PRR).

16. ANTI KICK-BACK.

No officer or employee of the City of Spokane, having the power or duty to perform an official act or action related to this Agreement shall have or acquire any interest in the Agreement, or have solicited, accepted or granted a present or future gift, favor, service or other thing of value from or to any person involved in this Agreement.

17. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- A. **Amendments/Modifications**: This Agreement may be modified by the City in writing when necessary, and no modification or Amendment of this Agreement shall be effective unless signed by an authorized representative of each of the parties hereto.
- B. The Company, at no expense to the City, shall comply with all laws of the United States and Washington, the Charter and ordinances of the City of Spokane; and rules, regulations, orders and directives of their administrative agencies and officers. Without limiting the generality of this paragraph, the Company shall comply with the requirements of this Section.
- C. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of Washington. The venue of any action brought shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction, located in Spokane County, Washington.
- D. **Captions**: The titles of sections or subsections are for convenience only and do not define or limit the contents.
- E. **Severability**: If any term or provision is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected, and each term and provision shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- F. **Waiver**: No covenant, term or condition or the breach shall be deemed waived, except by written consent of the party against whom the waiver is claimed, and any waiver of the breach of any covenant, term or condition shall not be deemed a waiver of any preceding or succeeding breach of the same or any other covenant, term of condition. Neither the

acceptance by the City of any performance by the Company after the time the same shall have become due nor payment to the Company for any portion of the Work shall constitute a waiver by the City of the breach or default of any covenant, term or condition unless otherwise expressly agreed to by the City in writing.

- G. **Entire Agreement**: This document along with any exhibits and all attachments, and subsequently issued addenda, comprises the entire agreement between the City and the Company. If conflict occurs between Agreement documents and applicable laws, codes, ordinances or regulations, the most stringent or legally binding requirement shall govern and be considered a part of this Agreement to afford the City the maximum benefits.
- H. **No personal liability**: No officer, agent or authorized employee of the City shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under this Agreement, whether expressed or implied, nor for any statement or representation made or in any connection with this Agreement.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants contained, or attached and incorporated and made a part, the parties have executed this Agreement by having legally-binding representatives affix their signatures below.

Then, files are sent to the computer-to-plate Kodak Trendsetters where a laser imprints the image on a plate. The chemical-free plates are bent on a three-point Burgess bender and developed with soy-based ink on the press.






Park Fund July 2020 Total Revenues vs. Historical Budget Average




Park Fund Total July 2020 YTD Expenditures vs. Total YTD Revenues

U.S. PAVILION ELEVATED EXPERIENCE RECOGNITION AGREEMENT

THIS RECOGNITION AGREEMENT ("Agreement) is entered into as of the _____ day of _____, 2020, by and among the Spokane Parks Foundation ("Foundation"), located in Spokane, WA., the City of Spokane Parks and Recreation Division ("City"), and Garco Construction, Inc., a Washington corporation ("Donor" or "Garco") with offices at 4114 E. Broadway Avenue, Spokane, Washington 99202.

RECITALS

A. The City owns and operates the elevated experience, a feature within the US Pavilion ("Elevated Experience"). The Elevated Experience is a scenic overlook located above the US Pavilion's outdoor amphitheater. It is comprised of columns supporting elevated landings, bridges and a staircase. The Elevated Experience is generally free and open to the public as a place of interest. When the events are held at the US Pavilion, the Elevated Experience may be used for following but not limited to supporting theatrical lighting, reserved seating, providing bar service and remaining as open space.

B. The Foundation represents that it is a qualified charitable organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Foundation's Federal Tax Identification number is 91-6033-504 and it is registered with the Secretary of State in the State of Washington.

C. Garco is a privately owned company, which as of the date of this Agreement specializes in general construction and design services.

D. Spokane Parks Board directed City to implement Garco in-kind service at the July 7 2020, convening of the Park Board in anticipation of this naming rights agreement. City authorized work through change order #23 to the Progressive Design Build agreement for the US Pavilion between City and Garco.

E. In recognition of Garco's charitable in-kind donation to the Spokane Parks Foundation and Spokane Parks and Recreation, Garco will receive naming rights recognition for the useful life of the Elevated Experience.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises, duties and obligations set forth herein, the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

AGREEMENT

1. **DEFINITIONS**.

- a. "Elevated Experience" refers to the outdoor elevated experience, including the elevated columns, landings, bridges and staircase above the amphitheater in the US Pavilion Facility.
- b. "Major Dispute" means any dispute between the parties involving (i) failure of the City to provide the signage substantially as set forth in Section 4. B., subject to the limitations set forth herein; or (ii) a default of this Agreement claimed by one party against the other.
- c. "Minor Dispute" means any dispute between the parties which is not a Major Dispute.
- d. "Effective Date" means September 1, 2020.
- e. "Term" means the period of the Effective Date through perpetuity or for the useful life of the Elevated Experience in its present configuration, whichever occurs first, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement. In the event that the Elevated Experience is demolished, destroyed, or ceases to be used by the City or Riverfront Spokane within ten (10) years after the Effective Date, or in the event that the space is relocated or substantially renovated within said ten (10) year period of time, the Executive Director of the Foundation and the Director of Parks and Recreation Division for the City of Spokane (or his or her designate), shall work with the Donor, or the

Donor's designee, to determine another appropriate form of recognition for the support provided by this gift.

2. RECOGNITION.

- a. Naming Rights Recognition
 - i. As of the Effective Date, the Elevated Experience shall be known as "TBD-Garco Something". The final name shall be subject to mutual written agreement of both parties. All references in this Agreement to the Elevated Experience shall then refer to "TBD-Garco Something."
 - ii. Garco shall have the exclusive right to retain the Elevated Experience name "TBD Garco Something."
 - iii. All references to the Elevated Experience, regardless of media, made by the City shall include the name selected by Garco. Such references shall include but not be limited to, all official documents, marketing materials (including, without limitations, news media, service providers, advertisers, promotors and sponsors), press releases, other print materials, and radio, web, and television broadcasts.
 - iv. The City shall use commercially reasonable efforts to refer to the Elevated Experience as "TBD-Garco Something" when so referencing the Elevated Experience.
- b. The City agrees that no sponsorships or other forms of advertisements related to the Elevated Experience may be offered to third parties in the general construction industry without prior approval by Garco, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.
- c. If at any time the Foundation and City determine that Garco's activities reflect negatively on either entity's public image, or are in material conflict with their mission or values, the Foundation and City will have the right to terminate naming rights.
- d. Signage.
 - i. Unless otherwise stated herein, the City will maintain the signage at no additional costs to Garco. The Parties will mutually agree on signage, location, and lighting.
 - ii. The City shall use best efforts to ensure the permanent signage is not modified, covered or digitally manipulated in visual images without the prior written approval of Garco.

3. IN-KIND DONATION.

a. The Donor, in consideration of its interest in the Foundation's Campaign for Riverfront Spokane and in consideration of the benefits provided pursuant to this Agreement, hereby performed certain demolition and construction work (widening and adding egress paths; adding a fire hose standpipe to eliminate the need for a fire lane through the amphitheater) valued at \$130,000 which will be utilized by the Parks & Recreation Division for Riverfront Spokane and the stated purpose hereinafter set forth.

4. MARK AND GRAPHICS LOGO.

- a. Intellectual Property.
 - i. Garco grants the City the right to use its trademarks, trade names and service marks, including Garco's logo ("Garco Marks") solely in connection with the identification of the Elevated Experience. The City acknowledges that its use of the Garco Marks shall inure to the sole benefit of Garco and shall not create any right, title or interest in favor of the City. The City agrees to comply with Garco's guidelines as may be provided to the City from time to time concerning the use of Garco's Marks. Garco reserves the right to prohibit the use of Garco Marks, or to modify any material depicting Garco Marks, if in its sole judgment such use may be illegal, misleading or inappropriate.
 - ii. The City grants Garco the right to use the Elevated Experience names and images for marketing purposes in any media, subject to prior and timely review by the City. Such review is intended to help the accuracy and coordination of marketing

and public relations efforts between Garco and the City related to Elevated Experience.

- iii. The City grants Garco the right to use the City of Spokane Parks and Recreation logo, which is a registered mark with the Washington Secretary of State's office, solely in connection with the identification of the Elevated Experience. Garco acknowledges that its use of the City's logo shall inure to the sole benefit of the City and shall not create any right, title or interest in same in favor of Garco. Garco agrees to comply with the City's guidelines as may be provided to Garco from time to time concerning use of the City logo. The City reserves the right to prohibit the use of its logo, or to modify any materials depicting its logo, if in its sole judgment such use may be illegal, misleading or inappropriate.
- b. The parties agree that the City shall develop, at the City's expense, the Elevated Experience Sign, provided that the final design (including the name, type and placement, and interpretive sign of pavilion history) shall be subject to the approval of Garco.
- c. Each party shall provide a single point of contact for any approvals required under this Agreement ("Approval Coordinator") as named below:

5. MAINTENANCE OF ELEVATED EXPERIENCE, NON-DISCRIMINATION.

- a. The City shall maintain the Elevated Experience in good and safe condition.
- b. The City shall ensure that in no event shall usage of the Elevated Experience discriminate on the basis of sex, race, religion, national origin, sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression, disability, and any protected classes enumerated in local, state, and or federal law.

6. INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS, RELEASES REQUIRED.

a. The City agrees to secure and maintain in force and effect throughout the term of the Agreement insurance coverages for all facilities and equipment located at the Elevated Experience consistent with that maintained by the City at all other municipal locations.

7. INDEMNITY.

a. To the extent permitted by law and up to the amount of its insurance coverage, the City agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless release Garco, its officers, employees, affiliates, agents, successors and assigns, from and against any and all claims, damages, liabilities, losses, government proceedings and costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit, arising out of or in connection with (i) the negligent or reckless acts or omissions of the City, its employees, agents or representatives relating to the maintenance and operation of the Elevated Experience, or (ii) the City's breach of this Agreement.

- b. Garco agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City and its officers, employees, agents, successors and assigns from and against any and all claims, damages, liabilities, losses, government proceedings and costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs of suit, arising out of or in connection with Garco's breach of this Agreement.
- c. Each party shall promptly notify the other party of any suit or threat of suit of which that party becomes aware which may give rise to a right of indemnification pursuant to this Agreement. The parties agree to cooperate in the settlement or defense of any such claim, demand, suit or proceeding.
- d. In the event of a breach or threatened breach of this Agreement by the other party, the non-breaching party shall be entitled, in addition to any other remedies available to it, to obtain relief by way of injunction or other equitable relief.
- e. The obligations of this SECTION 7 shall survive the expiration or termination of this Agreement.
- 8. **COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS.** In the course of their respective performance under this Agreement, both parties shall comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations, including, without limitation, laws and regulations pertaining to trademark and copyrights.
- 9. **NOTICE.** All notices required hereunder shall be sent by first class mail or electronic transmission, as appropriate, to the parties at the following addresses:

10. **WAIVER.** The failure of Garco or the City at any time to demand strict performance by the other of any of the terms, covenants, or conditions set forth herein shall not be construed as a continuing waiver or relinquishment thereof, and either may at any time demand strict and complete performance by the other of said terms, covenants, and conditions.

11. **MISCELLANEOUS.** This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the state Washington, regardless of any conflicts-of-laws provisions or principles to the contrary; if any provision, term or condition of this Agreement is declared void or unenforceable, it shall be severed from this Agreement and the remaining terms shall remain in full force and effect; this Agreement may be executed in two counterparts, which together shall be considered an original; and any terms not defined herein will have the meanings assigned to them in the Employment Agreement.

<u>CITY OF SPOKANE</u> <u>PARK BOARD RESOLUTION</u> <u>An Amendment to the Riverfront Park Tree Mitigation Resolution</u>

WHEREAS, Riverfront Park was created from the grounds of Expo 74 and opened to the public as a City Park in 1978; and

WHEREAS, The Parks Division (Parks) is redeveloping Riverfront Park with a voter approved Bond and in that development trees will be impacted; and

WHEREAS, Parks has adopted a Riverfront tree mitigation in March of 2016, recorded at City Contract # OPR 2016-0238 ; and

WHEREAS, Parks with oversite from Urban Forestry wishes to amend the Tree mitigation resolution as follows;

- 1. Trees removed from Riverfront Park within the Riverfront Park shoreline boundary will be mitigated by planting new trees within the shoreline jurisdictions of Riverfront Park or other City owned properties. The ratio of trees mitigated will be two (2) new 2" caliper trees planted for every one (1) 4" or greater caliper tree removed.
- 2. Trees removed from Riverfront Park outside the shoreline boundary will be mitigated by planting new trees within Riverfront Park or other City of Spokane public property at the discretion of the Urban Forester. The ratio of trees to mitigate will be two (2) new 2" caliper trees planted for every one (1) 4" or greater caliper tree removed.
- 3. And having reached capacity in Riverfront Park for replacement tree plantings, the net balance of tree mitigation has been calculated using \$500.00 per tree and totals \$250,000.00. The Parks department shall establish a new project within the 6 year capital improvement program and shall use Park funds to implement all required plantings over a three (3) year period. All future tree plantings shall be planted on City of Spokane public property at the discretion of the Urban Forester and Landscape Architect, with first preference going to Park Property.

WHEREAS, the tree plantings, now a designated Capital project, will be planted by December 31st, 2024 with Urban Forestry managing the species, placement and planting schedule: Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Parks and Recreation Division for the City of Spokane approves the amended tree mitigation for Riverfront Park; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Park Board authorizes the agreement.

Dear Park Board members:

I have reviewed the four art pieces proposed for RFP. My vote is for the Whispering Discs, then Seeking Place, then Redband Trout (Dancing) and last the Beaver. My sense is that the Discs are the most interactive and thus the best choice. I prefer the Seeking Place and the Dancing Redband because they are also interactive and colorful. I frankly find the Beaver very unattractive.

I am mindful the Beaver was the first choice of the JAC. Nonetheless, this is a Park Board decision, not the JAC's. Moreover, the JAC selection process is designed in part to generate discussion (which it has) that the Park Board considers as it makes its decision. Hey Spokane, it's me, Saya. The artist chosen by the Joint Art Committee to create a piece for the Riverfront Park. When we reacquainted for this project I felt a real kinship and love for you. Riverfront Park is amazing and the city reminds me of Portland (where I grew up) back in the day. Spokane Arts had a really "get it done" feeling with the quick timeline of the project. And the unofficial motto of Spokane, "Transcend the Bullshit" seems so cool. I was smitten.

I hope that this finds you and your family well. I realize the times we are in and the stresses we are all facing. I stand in solidarity with protests to bring equity and justice. I acknowledge and recognize the Spokane tribes and honor their heritage and culture in Washington State. I know that Art may seem unimportant at this time. But it's my life and livelihood and would like to be paid for my work.

I have kept quiet and expected that this would be sorted out. However, I feel the need to speak out to you directly.

To cut to the chase in case you don't want to read more, I want to be paid for my time and the project be officially cancelled or I want the project to be built. I was verbally hired in April and now in August still on the hook but not paid. This is not fair. Artwork is work. Here's the background ~ really cold be longer because of all the months this has been going on.

I sent my application in February. This included a letter of interest that included a quote. Upon seeing Maya, my 11-foot bronze sculpture located in Seattle, Cath Brunner - 4Culture (King County's Arts Commission) staff member wrote this:

I was walking down from Harborview yesterday and encountered your sculpture at the corner of Broadway & Yesler. As far back as I can remember in this practice, communities and stakeholders ask for a "welcoming," "iconic," and "timeless." Often requested, but far less often achieved. You nailed it!

Your artwork made me instantly feel warm, valued, and more acutely aware of my surroundings. It turned a walk down a city sidewalk into a powerful encounter in public space. That's what successful public art is all about.


In early March I was informed that I was a finalist. No contract about this first stage of the presentation of a proposal was given to me in writing. I was told to trust Spokane Arts and that I would be paid for the proposal stage. I visited Riverfront Park for a walk through of possible sites with other finalists. I carefully considered something that would be great for the park and visitors of all ages. The brief was for something colorful and interactive and special.

I spent the next month working on different ideas. I decided a fun beaver sculpture would be a great addition to the Park. Beavers once numbered 400,000 million in the USA. They were brought to the edge of extinction by fur traders bent on killing them and selling their fir to make hats in Europe. The loss of those beavers who created habitat for other animals changed the way our continent looked. Here is my graphic of the ways beavers connect to Riverfront Park.



I made many models of the piece to work through ideas. The commission required the piece to be completed in 2020 ~ whoa that's speedy for public art. So unlike other proposals, the sculpture had to be ready to roll. Fabrications and materials had to be sourced prior to selection to ensure the timeline could be met. Basically, hitting the floor running for whomever was selected.

Here are some of the models, the one on the top left is the one I proposed in the presentation. Weighing fabrication and design to make my decision. The sculpture is to be made in bronze and have a swivel function so that people can enjoy the many views while sitting on the beaver's tail.



I had my project reviewed by several other public artists prior to presentation. One suggested I make a story to help people connect with the idea behind the artwork. It's created from the beaver's perspective. I got really into the idea of a beaver who's done all the necessary work of making the dam, den and collected trees for the winter. The beaver then decides to make a throne for people to enjoy. It's whimsical and funny. The beaver's hair is made of colorful logs. Colorful because beavers live off wood and eat all the colors of the trees. Beavers sit on their tails so why not make it swivel and the back be a beaver tail.

Since the piece is from the beaver's perspective, I would never give it a name like Pierre or James who hunted and killed them. Should I give it a Japanese name? I could but I felt that the beaver would choose a name from the culture who sees beavers as connected to humanity rather than separate. I found the Salish word for moon, Saka'am and used that in the proposal story.

I acknowledge the Spokane Tribe of Indians and respect that they were the first people.

Remember this was in a **proposal**. So I'm working on an idea I'm presenting. Not the final design or name for the piece. In hindsight, yes, I should not have used the Salish word, period. And I have written an email to the Spokane tribe stating that and apologizing.

In my presentation, we talked about this and that the word could be different. And I would like to contact the tribe and work through that part of the proposal.

After presenting, on April 17, 2020, I was called and told that I was chosen to create the piece for Riverfront Park. I was thrilled. Spokane! Wow! So happy! There was no caveat or hint that the Joint Art Committee's decision could be reversed. The Zoom presentation had so many people on it. So there was a rigorous process. I've sat on many selection panels and this process was much more in depth than any of those with more stakeholders present.

My understanding is the Joint Art Committee is composed of both Spokane Arts Commissioners and Park Board Members. So they work jointly to select art for the park. My piece was the final selection so the Joint Art Committee had been working together for sometime.

Spokane Arts said they would reach out to the Spokane Tribe but that they were closed because of the Stay at Home orders.

Spokane Arts gave me a contract draft for the commission and I was asked to visit the Park again. Spokane Arts asked that I visit again to consider a new area of the park that had previously been off the table. At that time I was paid for the presentation phase and again that confirmed that Spokane Arts was to be trusted, even without a formal contract. The contract for the commission had the delivery date to be in August. A swift deadline for sure. I continued firming up details: the structural engineer, cement contractor, bronze foundry scheduling, crating and shipping companies. To be on top of the project, I put away all the projects I was working on, revamped my studio, and purchased recycled styrofoam for the sculpture and bought clay. To make the deadline I knew that I had to work ahead of the contract to get it done.

THEN, the project slid into what everyone seems to blame on Covid. Covid! Geez how can it ruin everything? *sigh* What? Did it turn into some popularity contest? People on facebook weighing in? What's going on?

Again, my trust in Spokane Arts, the Joint Art Committee's fair and open process, I was sure that this would get worked out. April, May, June, July have come and gone and still no conclusion. I'm hoping in August that we can get this ball rolling.

My studio had been totally revamped, recycled styrofoam bought and in my studio. I was totally impacted and it didn't make sense to undo my work until the next Park's board monthly meeting. So I began carving the beaver. I had already secured a date with the foundry and getting it installed before winter is necessary to have the epoxy set. Why not be ahead instead of behind?

Now after working on this project from March, FIVE months or six if you count the application, it seems that it will be cancelled. I thought, well at least pay me for my time. But that looks like it won't happen either if the contract gets cancelled.

I want to be paid for my time or the piece to continue.

Of course, I have fears and wonder if people see my "foreign" name and unconsciously or consciously bring a little more negativity to it. There is an increase in hate crimes and I do fear violence that hopefully none of you feel because of your heritage. I have seen how people's faces fall when I say my name. Their faces say "that's too much," " too foreign," "who are you?" Twice this year, I've had to prove that I am an American citizen this year to Washington State. My friends with names like Susan did not have to go through that extra step of sending their passports.

I hear of vigilantes with guns roaming the streets of Spokane during Black Lives Matter. That does not make **me** feel safe. Fear you may not have, but I do. And it colors how I take the attempt to revoke my commission and some of my feelings about completing this commission at all.

How will this look to future artists applying for projects in Spokane? Essentially, my verbal contract may be cancelled and a non person of color could be put in my place. That just doesn't sit well with me after me trusting the process and winning the confidence of the selection panel. I heard the decision was unanimous. What the heck is going on?

Hey Spokane, can we *transcend the bullshit* and get this made or me paid? It's been created with love and fun for you the citizens, regional and international visitors to the Park.

I understand that Saya Moriyasu was called on April 17, 2020, and told that she had been chosen to create her sculpture, "Beaver," for the Spokane Waterfront Park, the proposal for which she had submitted to your committee. She was expected to have the bronze sculpture installed in August, 2020, which is an "unimaginable" time limit for the scope of the project.

Unfortunately, she was given a verbal agreement at that time, and a written contract was not issued to her. Because this involved project required input from engineers, metal fabrication specialists, and other technical experts, Saya decided to move ahead to address these details in order to meet this "ungodly" deadline. In other words, she has spent innumerable hours and her own money to make arrangements with these experts in order to meet this deadline.

Apparently, Spokane Arts has not been forthcoming with the status of this project since April, and now it appears that the commission may be cancelled, but hopefully not. With the time and effort expended to meet your deadline, she has spent much of her own financial resources that could have been spent elsewhere to earn a living.

As a longtime professional artist who grew up in Spokane, it is disappointing to me that the City of Spokane's Park Board and Joint Art Committee has "dropped the ball" and left Saya Moriyasu responsible for a financial burden that was accepted by your committee, when you selected her for the commission. If this project does not go forward, she should be reimbursed for the time she has spent on this project.





Dear members of the Joint Arts Committee, the Spokane Parks commission, and elected officials.

I am an arts professional who worked in museums around the country for 30 years, most recently as the Chief Curator and Director of Exhibitions and Collections at the Henry Art Gallery of the University of Washington. I currently teach in adjunct positions throughout Seattle (Seattle University, Cornish College of the Arts, the Photographic Center Northwest, University of Washington) and consult in modern and contemporary art. I have served on national and international arts commissions and peer review boards, including several years as a peer specialist for the US GSA, developing public art projects for Federal Buildings throughout the US. I know a great deal about artist's processes and about addressing the needs, desires, and whims of the public. I also know Saya Moriyasu's work very well. When she tackles public commissions, she is exemplary, really taking to heart the need to bring in members of the public and speak to everyone's concerns, while developing thoughtful and beautiful pieces that will endure: work that will sustain continued attention over many many years (very hard to pull off) yet also ensures the lasting physical integrity of the work.

I write in strong support of Moriyasu's beaver sculpture, which was selected for Spokane. I love the piece she made for Seattle and I am looking forward to visiting Spokane for Saka'am's inauguration, and to seeing it again and again for years to come. Please honor the choice made by the Joint Arts Commission and honor the commitment you made to this work.

The artist has already devoted countless hours and a great deal of resources to creating this work in order to meet the tight time frame you gave her. Despite the many social crises we face--and which surely distract you from paying attention to art commissions and other issues that don't threaten lives --it is important on the one hand to continue to add art to our lives (one of the few things we can do to "make things better") and, on the other hand, to respect the integrity of process and promises.

A note of advice: arts professionals have noted a recent surge of "crowd-sourcing," as if majority votes could substitute for expert opinions and careful procedures. Sometimes these votes produce nothing except a waste of time and money that goes nowhere. In the "best" case they sometimes produce cute or obvious (one-liner) objects that satisfy a majority of the people for a year or so, then turn into long-term obstructions or conspicuous mistakes. You need a real artist, truly thinking about a sculpture, to realize something that will hold up over time. Please don't lose the opportunity to add a marvelous invention to the public spaces of your great city.

I understand that Saya Moriyasu was called on April 17, 2020, and told that she had been chosen to create her sculpture, "Beaver," for the Spokane Waterfront Park, the proposal for which she had submitted to your committee. She was expected to have the bronze sculpture installed in August, 2020, which is an "unimaginable" time limit for the scope of the project.

Unfortunately, she was given a verbal agreement at that time, and a written contract was not issued to her. Because this involved project required input from engineers, metal fabrication specialists, and other technical experts, Saya decided to move ahead to address these details in order to meet this "ungodly" deadline. In other words, she has spent innumerable hours and her own money to make arrangements with these experts in order to meet this deadline.

Apparently, Spokane Arts has not been forthcoming with the status of this project since April, and now it appears that the commission may be cancelled, but hopefully not. With the time and effort expended to meet your deadline, she has spent much of her own financial resources that could have been spent elsewhere to earn a living.

As a longtime professional artist who grew up in Spokane, it is disappointing to me that the City of Spokane's Park Board and Joint Art Committee has "dropped the ball" and left Saya Moriyasu responsible for a financial burden that was accepted by your committee, when you selected her for the commission. If this project does not go forward, she should be reimbursed for the time she has spent on this project.



Below is my letter to the Parks Board.

August 5, 2020

Hey Spokane, it's me, Saya. The artist chosen by the Joint Art Committee to create a piece for the Riverfront Park. When we reacquainted for this project I felt a real kinship and love for you. Riverfront Park is amazing and the city reminds me of Portland (where I grew up) back in the day. Spokane Arts had a really "get it done" feeling with the quick timeline of the project. And the unofficial motto of Spokane, "Transcend the Bullshit" seems so cool. I was smitten.

I hope that this finds you and your family well. I realize the times we are in and the stresses we are all facing. I stand in solidarity with protests to bring equity and justice. I acknowledge and recognize the Spokane tribes and honor their heritage and culture in Washington State. I know that Art may seem unimportant at this time. But it's my life and livelihood and would like to be paid for my work.

I have kept quiet and expected that this would be sorted out. However, I feel the need to speak out to you directly.

To cut to the chase in case you don't want to read more, I want to be paid for my time and the project be officially cancelled or I want the project to be built. I was verbally hired in April and now in August still on the hook but not paid. This is not fair. Artwork is work.

Here's the background ~ really cold be longer because of all the months this has been going on.


I sent my application in February. This included a letter of interest that included a quote. Upon seeing Maya, my 11-foot bronze sculpture located in Seattle, Cath Brunner - 4Culture (King County's Arts Commission) staff member wrote this:

I was walking down from Harborview yesterday and encountered your sculpture at the corner of Broadway & Yesler. As far back as I can remember in this practice, communities and stakeholders ask for a "welcoming," "iconic," and "timeless." Often requested, but far less often achieved. You nailed it!

Your artwork made me instantly feel warm, valued, and more acutely aware of my surroundings. It turned a walk down a city sidewalk into a powerful encounter in public space. That's what successful public art is all about.


In early March I was informed that I was a finalist. No contract about this first stage of the presentation of a proposal was given to me in writing. I was told to trust Spokane Arts and that I would be paid for the proposal stage. I visited Riverfront Park for a walk through of possible sites with other finalists. I carefully considered something that would be great for the park and visitors of all ages. The brief was for something colorful and interactive and special.

I spent the next month working on different ideas. I decided a fun beaver sculpture would be a great addition to the Park. Beavers once numbered 400,000 million in the USA. They were brought to the edge of extinction by fur traders bent on killing them and selling their fir to make hats in Europe. The loss of those beavers who created habitat for other animals changed the way our continent looked. Here is my graphic of the ways beavers connect to Riverfront Park.



I made many models of the piece to work through ideas. The commission required the piece to be completed in 2020 ~ whoa that's speedy for public art. So unlike other proposals, the sculpture had to be ready to roll. Fabrications and materials had to be sourced prior to selection to ensure the timeline could be met. Basically, hitting the floor running for whomever was selected.

Here are some of the models, the one on the top left is the one I proposed in the presentation. Weighing fabrication and design to make my decision. The sculpture is to be made in bronze and have a swivel function so that people can enjoy the many views while sitting on the beaver's tail.



I had my project reviewed by several other public artists prior to presentation. One suggested I make a story to help people connect with the idea behind the artwork. It's created from the beaver's perspective. I got really into the idea of a beaver who's done all the necessary work of making the dam, den and collected trees for the winter. The beaver then decides to make a throne for people to enjoy. It's whimsical and funny. The beaver's hair is made of colorful logs. Colorful because beavers live off wood and eat all the colors of the trees. Beavers sit on their tails so why not make it swivel and the back be a beaver tail.

Since the piece is from the beaver's perspective, I would never give it a name like Pierre or James who hunted and killed them. Should I give it a Japanese name? I could but I felt that the beaver would choose a name from the culture who sees beavers as connected to humanity rather than separate. I found the Salish word for moon, Saka'am and used that in the proposal story.

I acknowledge the Spokane Tribe of Indians and respect that they were the first people.

Remember this was in a proposal. So I'm working on an idea I'm presenting. Not the final design or name for the piece. In hindsight, yes, I should not have used the Salish word, period. And I have written an email to the Spokane tribe stating that and apologizing.

In my presentation, we talked about this and that the word could be different. And I would like to contact the tribe and work through that part of the proposal.

After presenting, on April 17, 2020, I was called and told that I was chosen to create the piece for Riverfront Park. I was thrilled. Spokane! Wow! So happy! There was no caveat or hint that the Joint Art Committee's decision could be reversed. The Zoom presentation had so many people on it. So there was a rigorous process. I've sat on many selection panels and this process was much more in depth than any of those with more stakeholders present.

My understanding is the Joint Art Committee is composed of both Spokane Arts Commissioners and Park Board Members. So they work jointly to select art for the park. My piece was the final selection so the Joint Art Committee had been working together for sometime.

Spokane Arts said they would reach out to the Spokane Tribe but that they were closed because of the Stay at Home orders.

Spokane Arts gave me a contract draft for the commission and I was asked to visit the Park again. Spokane Arts asked that I visit again to consider a new area of the park that had previously been off the table. At that time I was paid for the presentation phase and again that confirmed that Spokane Arts was to be trusted, even without a formal contract. The contract for the commission had the delivery date to be in August. A swift deadline for sure. I continued firming up details: the structural engineer, cement contractor, bronze foundry scheduling, crating and shipping companies. To be on top of the project, I put away all the projects I was working on, revamped my studio, and purchased recycled styrofoam for the sculpture and bought clay. To make the deadline I knew that I had to work ahead of the contract to get it done.

THEN, the project slid into what everyone seems to blame on Covid. Covid! Geez how can it ruin everything? *sigh* What? Did it turn into some popularity contest? People on facebook weighing in? What's going on?

Again, my trust in Spokane Arts, the Joint Art Committee's fair and open process, I was sure that this would get worked out. April, May, June, July have come and gone and still no conclusion. I'm hoping in August that we can get this ball rolling.

My studio had been totally revamped, recycled styrofoam bought and in my studio. I was totally impacted and it didn't make sense to undo my work until the next Park's board monthly meeting. So I began carving the beaver. I had already secured a date with the foundry and getting it installed before winter is necessary to have the epoxy set. Why not be ahead instead of behind?

Now after working on this project from March, FIVE months or six if you count the application, it seems that it will be cancelled. I thought, well at least pay me for my time. But that looks like it won't happen either if the contract gets cancelled.

I want to be paid for my time or the piece to continue.

Of course, I have fears and wonder if people see my "foreign" name and unconsciously or consciously bring a little more negativity to it. There is an increase in hate crimes and I do fear violence that hopefully none of you feel because of your heritage. I have seen how people's faces fall when I say my name. Their faces say "that's too much," " too foreign," "who are you?" Twice this year, I've had to prove that I am an American citizen this year to Washington State. My friends with names like Susan did not have to go through that extra step of sending their passports.

I hear of vigilantes with guns roaming the streets of Spokane during Black Lives Matter. That does not make me feel safe. Fear you may not have, but I do. And it colors how I take the attempt to revoke my commission and some of my feelings about completing this commission at all.


How will this look to future artists applying for projects in Spokane? Essentially, my verbal contract may be cancelled and a non person of color could be put in my place. That just doesn't sit well with me after me trusting the process and winning the confidence of the selection panel. I heard the decision was unanimous. What the heck is going on?

Hey Spokane, can we transcend the bullshit and get this made or me paid? It's been created with love and fun for you the citizens, regional and international visitors to the Park.

I read with some concern about the process for the commissioning of sculpture at your Riverfront Park by Saya Moriyasu. I am an artist with many years of public art experience and though I am not totally familiar with the circumstances surrounding her commission, I would like to express support for an open, transparent, fair and ethical process. Artists are professionals in their field. Public Art programs are professionals in their field. Both need to adhere to long established best practices, but mostly, both need trust in each other and the process. The field of public art has spent much time and effort developing good processes and trust, and it is important not to be derailed.

The current situation with the pandemic has thrown much of the process into uncertainty and the unpredictability of how or when we will emerge from it is very concerning for all. However, it seems that even more than ever a robust dialogue between the artist and agency is necessary during these times. Her proposed project was selected/ approved by the selection committee which is generally the standard for moving ahead. Not abiding by their recommendations puts your organization in a potentially unethical situation. However, even with the selection of the artist and the proposal, continued conversation/dialogue is important as the artwork is developed further and all the details and logistics are worked out. But there needs to be a commitment to the artist before that can happen in a constructive way. It appears this has not happened. It is unfair to keep the artist uncertain whether the project will continue or not. It is not fair to ask a selected artist to trust you and then not commit. This may jeopardize her ability to deliver the work on time. It also puts the artist in a potentially difficult situation as she develops her work to understand and respond to areas of concern or need for clarity. A good final artwork depends on this dialogue for further development. I am urging you to honor your verbal commitments to Saya Moriyasu and to move forward officially with her commission or at a minimum, if there is cause not to move forward with the panel's recommendation, to pay her for her work done so far, which she did in good faith and in trust of your verbal commitments.

Dear Members of the Spokane Park Board:

I am writing in regard to a public artwork commissioned as part of the redevelopment of Riverfront Park. According to Riverfront Spokane's webpage ("New Art in Riverfront Park"), four finalists were chosen from 26 applicants to an open call for artists in February 2020. The finalists each prepared a design for an artwork and were interviewed at the Joint Art Committee's public meeting on April 17. At that meeting, the Committee unanimously selected Saya Moriyasu's design for a whimsical beaver sculpture/seating area. Given a short deadline to complete the work, Ms. Moriyasu proceeded in good faith, without a signed contract, working to create the piece and line up engineers, fabricators, and shippers.

On July 2, Spokane Parks and Recreation posted a link to all four proposals on the Riverfront Spokane webpage, saying "Take a look at the finalists and submit your own feedback!" To back out of the Joint Art Committee's unanimous selection and verbal commitment to the artist after three months is incredibly dishonest. To make Facebook Spokane's platform for public comment on a project funded by tax dollars is irresponsible. (As of August 9, my comment was the only one on Facebook. Have earlier comments been deleted? Now that would be deceptive.) The only honorable thing to do is to carry out the Joint Art Committee's decision and extend Ms. Moriyasu a signed contract. If the city of Spokane lacks the funds to complete the project, the artist should be paid for her time and expenses to date, and the project formally cancelled.

Public art is a public benefit and a public responsibility. Selecting, working with, and paying artists requires the same integrity that any business would expect in dealing with the city of Spokane, or any government.

Dear Spokane Parks,

After viewing the finalists on the New Art in Riverfront Park, here is my feedback on the submissions.

My two favorite ideas are *The Seeking Place* and *Redband Trout*. Both of these sculptures look like they would enhance the beauty of the park. They have lovely, flowing lines and a sense of movement. I like that they invite you to walk through them and explore them.

While I like the idea of a beaver sculpture that you can sit on, *Saya Moriyasu's* sculpture is very odd-looking. It does not look like a beaver at all and, frankly, it is unattractive. I do like the photos of Moriyasu's "*Maya*" sculpture in Seattle. *Maya* is friendly looks inviting and embracing. But, the beaver sculpture just is not friendly or inviting looking at all. I showed photos of all the sculptures to my two sons (ages 12 and 16) and their immediate reaction to the Beaver was Not positive: "Hideous" and "Horror-Beaver" were their responses. Hello Ms. Clarke,

I am confident that the Parks Board also received numerous positive comments to honor the original Joint Arts Committee's unanimous selection of Saya's artwork. There was not a fair representation or comparison stated in your meeting notes and I'm curious to know whether individual Board members received all of these supportive emails (including mine) – or - did they only receive a summary drawn up by one Parks staff member which doesn't provide detailed explanations by those who spent time voicing their opinions?

There is a valued protocol with the artist selection process for a public art project that is based on experience navigating the minefields of creating art in the public realm. Like most professions, there are roadmaps that should be followed for success rather than an on-line public vote without the benefit of understanding the learned process and nuances of what it takes to have a successful outcome of a finished artwork. Unlike a "Yelp" review for a restaurant, there are dozens of important factors that go into the decision of selecting the best fit for an artist and artwork for each unique site.

Dear Spokane Parks Board and Spokane Joint Art Committee:

I am writing to you with concerns over your lack of communication and payment with artist, Saya Moriyasu, for your Riverfront Park project. I see through your Joint Arts Committee minutes, that she was chosen unanimously through your committee in April and then officially hired verbally. Because of your project's shortened timeline, Saya spent endless hours preparing a multitude of necessary art production fabrication steps in anticipation of meeting your rushed 2020 scheduled completion.

I am aware of the overwhelming amount of time Saya has spent to create a beaver sculpture that will pay tribute to the public conveying: surprise, delight, mystery, sparking conversations about beavers, environments, humor, and possibly through it's artwork title a recognition and education to the local Spokane tribe. The artwork is approachable for all and especially a fun interaction no matter what age, sex, and background - whether taking selfies along with the beaver's face, or taking a rest seated on the beaver's swivel tail. Easy to imagine this special bronze beaver to be a logo on the park's T-shirts, mugs, and tourist websites.

Like all successful and thoughtful public artists – Saya spent a great deal of time with site visits, researching various histories: Spokane, Native, environment, beavers, site design as well as coexisting with the other nearby 26 sculptures adorning Spokane's Sculpture Walk. This on top of hours creatively experimenting with drawings and creating models for a multitude of designs that would best meet the needs of your park.

Saya's concern about her race being a factor for maybe being dismissed is valid and especially highlighted during this time of George Floyd and Black Lives Matter. Representation of all underrepresented people is vital and is important to support at your Spokane park for locals, visitors, young and old alike.

After working 29 years with the Seattle Office of Arts & Culture as a Public Art Project Manager, I understand the challenges that take place with art projects in the public realm. Delays are not unusual, artwork taste is subjective (impossible to get everyone to agree) and yet there are ways to find consensus. Saya's proposal was only preliminary and concerns could be discussed. We can all understand the unprecedented Covid and protest times that have complicated our world now.

What I cannot understand is the lack of communications and payment for work completed that should be made to Saya immediately. This is not a fair system policy and it affects yours and other public art agencies and Parks practices negatively.

It appears that there may be some type of Facebook intervention that upends the decision of Saya's already approved Joint Art Committee decision? I sincerely hope this is not the case as it sets up precedence and upsets the <u>validity</u> of the Public Art Selection Process – not just for Spokane – but for other public art programs regionally causing unnecessary havoc. I would appreciate receiving a reply about an amicable resolution soon for Saya's public art project

including payment for Spokane's Riverfront Park, and wish you all the best.

Hello. Please forward this message to the office of the Director of Parks and Recreation, the Director of the golf program of the Parks Department, and to the Chairman and members of the Spokane Park Board Golf Committee.

To: the Director of the Spokane Golf Course Program,

Our experience is with the daily activity at Indian Canyon. The Governor's active mask-related and golf course operations orders are not being adhered to by customers or enforced by staff. The key phrase in the Governor's active mask order is "in public". Relevant active orders and guidelines are attached.

Masks are not commonly worn by customers in the pro shop and restaurant and on the driving range and practice green. Players are vary rarely wearing masks on the course. Players sharing carts are not wearing masks. Proper mask wearing by staff in the pro shop and restaurant and on the driving range is inconsistent. Range staff congregates at the cart return and do not wear masks. New signs regarding mask policies arrived Tuesday. Once posted there has been no change in patron or staff practices.

Compliance with State Golf Phase 2 and Restart golf operations requirements and recommendations is inconsistent. Perhaps your office inspect current operations for adherance to these requirements.

Proactive measures which go beyond the Governor's minimum requirements would benefit the health of patrons, staff, and our community. All doors and windows in the pro shop and restaurant could remain open through the balance of the warm weather. HVAC in both buildings could be upgraded to high volume air handling with HEPA (see https://www.nytimes.com/wirecutter/blog/can-hepa-air-purifiers-capture-coronavirus/).

Indian Canyon is a City property. If course management and staff are unable or unwilling to achieve compliance with State orders and guidelines we suggest that your office and the Parks Department consider alternative compliance enforcement options.

Hello Spokane City Council and Park Board,

Lam very concerned with the level of dryness I have witnessed as a homeowner near Audubon Park. An updated automated irrigation system such as the one in Corbin Park or Manito Park could save Audubon Park from dying, being a fire hazard and just unsightly, especially with the size and age of the Ponderosa pines. 100-foot + tall Ponderosa pines are dangerous in wind storms and can cause a lot of property damage or destroy homes, as we saw in 2015. Irrigation of Audubon Park is still continuing to be a problem; especially as the weather has gotten hotter each summer. I'm also aware it is Coronavirus time and there is some sort of budget shortfall, but in seeing the roses being watered up in Manito and the Duncan Gardens so resplendent, it does make me wonder why one is allowing Audubon Park to simply die with no flowers and nothing extra? An automated watering system of some kind is a very important investment with the amount of property surrounding the park environs and a smart insurance policy for any kind of future damage from trees that fall due to being dried out, as well as offering beauty to homeowners and keeping up property values for taxpayers.
