1. **Roll Call**: Bob Anderson

The meeting was called to order at 3:39 p.m. See above for attendance.

2. Additions or deletions to the agenda:

3. Public comments:

- A. <u>Jeff Crum</u> Jeff Crum is a co-designer of the Camp Sekani disc golf course and has worked with the Parks Department to design several additional disc golf courses in the City. The parking lot at Camp Sekani is slated to be expanded in the next year which will affect the disc golf course and some of the structures he designed. While he is in support of the expansion and paving of the parking lot; however, he opposes the removal of design elements that he worked to implement. He is working with Parks planners regarding his concerns.
- B. Lee Williams / Mary Lou Sproul, leaders of the Friends of Coeur d'Alene Park, a subcommittee of the Browne's Addition Neighborhood Council Lee Williams spoke in support of the resolution authorizing the submission of an application to the Washington State Legislature for capital improvement funding within Coeur d'Alene Park. The Browne's Edition Neighborhood Council has adopted the park, and improvements at the park, as a major priority as per the Coeur d'Alene Park master plan. Lee spoke of the park's significance to the City of Spokane as its oldest established park and cited several reasons for its renewed importance to the Browne's Addition neighborhood and the City as a whole. She also outlined many of the reasons the park is need of repair and asked that the Board approve the resolution.

C. <u>Laura Renz</u> – Laura Renz spoke of her concern regarding off-leash dogs in Comstock Park. As the City of Spokane has a leash law, she suggested partnering with Scraps, who have authority to ticket the dog owner for the violation.

 - A. Park Fund: The December year-to-date operating expenditures for the Park Fund are approximately \$1.72 million more than the historic budget average. Year-to-date revenues are about \$1.79 million above the budget average. Revenues are exceeding expenditures nearly \$563,000.
 - B. Golf Fund: The December year-to-date operating expenditures for the Golf Fund are about \$485,600 less than the budget average. Year-to-date revenues are below the budget average approximately \$739,000. Revenues are exceeding expenditures about \$605,000 year-to-date.

Nick Hamad presented background for the authorizing resolution for a state funding application for capital improvements of Coeur d'Alene Park.

Browne's Addition is a high rental community which poses a need for yard space which most rental properties lack. Coeur d'Alene Park provides 10 acres of yard space in the center of the

neighborhood. Restrooms, pathways, and playground equipment need repair or replacement.

The Friends of CdA Park has a Master Plan for the future of the park, since 2015, which aligns with citywide planning. The most needed improvements at the park are also top-tier citywide community desires according to the Parks Master Plan, but funding is needed. City Council endorses this ask for phase one Browne's Addition Coeur d'Alene Park improvements as part of their tier one legislative priorities for 2024 with the State of Washington.

This resolution is asking for the Park Board's permission to submit an application for up to \$750,000 to the Washington State Legislature. Having sanctioning from the City Council and the Park Board, and a partnership with the Friends of CdA Park, may provide a compelling argument to the legislators when reviewing the application.

Parks is seeking levy funding later this year, which, if passed, would provide additional funding for this project and citywide park projects like this one. These funds would supplement levy funding allocated to Coeur d'Alene Park, not replace it.

Parks' legislative liaison, Eric Paulsen, has been in discussions with Greater Spokane, Inc. to ask them to place this project on their legislative priority list. GSI is not opposed to the ask but have not yet endorsed it.

The ask would go in, in February of this year, and would be a supplemental budget in 2025.

 - 2) RFP partnered with Numerica to provide 750 free ice missions and ice skate rentals.
 - 3) There were 43 igloo rentals.
 - 4) 127 all access annual passes were sold during the limited time offer.
 - 5) There were six DJ nights, four Learn to Skate paid instruction, and three free skate instruction at Coaches corner.
 - 6) 4,000 spectators attended the 12-minute New Year's Eve firework show which was broadcast statewide by KREM 2.
 - 7) Skate with the Spokane Chiefs will be January 23 with the first 300 skating for free, courtesy of Numerica.

- 8) A free skate and Carrousel day is expected on January 27, sponsor to be announced.

AMENDMENT TO INTERDEPARTMENTAL AGREEMENT

Title: **BOSCH LOT PROPERTY**

THIS INTERDEPARTMENTAL AGREEMENT AMENDMENT is between the City of Spokane, Utilities Division, on behalf of the Water-Wastewater Management Department, whose address is Second Floor City Hall, 808 West Spokane Falls Boulevard,' Spokane, Washington 99201, hereafter referred to as "Water-Wastewater Department" and the City of Spokane, Parks and Recreation Department, whose address is Fifth Floor City Hall, 808 West Spokane Falls Boulevard, Spokane, Washington 99201, herein after referred to as "Parks Department," hereinafter jointly referred to as the "Parties".

WHEREAS, on November 30, 2011, and May 4, 2015, the Parties entered into Interdepartmental Agreements for CSO Control Facilities and Stormwater Surface and Infiltration Facilities to be sited on Parks Property; and

WHEREAS, the Parties recorded permanent easements for CSO and stormwater projects installed on Parks-owned properties, including the Bosch Lot Property, which is located at the northwest corner of Summit Boulevard and Lincoln Street; and

WHEREAS, the Parties would like to use Riverfront Park Lot 6 as a staging area for the Post Street Bridge Project; and

WHEREAS, a change or revision of the Work has been requested, thus the original Contract needs to be formally Amended by this written document; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of these terms, the parties mutually agree as follows:

1. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.

The original Agreements, dated November 30, 2011, and May 4, 2015, and the first Amendment attested by the City Clerk on May 2, 2016, any previous amendments, addendums and / or extensions / renewals thereto, are incorporated by reference into this document as though written in full and shall remain in full force and effect except as provided herein.

2. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Contract Amendment shall become effective on January 1, 2023 and shall remain in effect until the earlier of completion of the two (2) construction projects or August 31, 2024.

3. AMENDMENT.

The Original Agreement and First Amendment are revised to include the following:

- 3. CONSIDERATION: The parties agree as follows:
- b. Utilities will pay to Parks for the number of parking stalls used during the duration of each project. The expected number of stalls for the Bosch Lot is 42 charged at a rate of \$924 per stall annually and upper portion of Parking Lot #6 is 29 charged at a rate of \$2003 per stall annually. Total annual compensation is \$96,865.
- d. Utilities will pay Parks a prorated share on a **monthly** basis of EIGHT THOU-SAND SEVENTY TWO AND 8/100 DOLLARS (\$8,072.08) for the term of this Agreement or when the contractor for the Post Street Bridge Project vacates Bosch Lot, whichever action occurs first.

4. TERMINATION.

CITY OF SPOKANE PARKS

Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause, upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other party.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants contained, or attached and incorporated and made a part, the parties have executed this Contract Amendment by having legally-binding representatives affix their signatures below.




Parks Financials



Key Concepts:

- December had a net gain of \$91,259 which was slightly higher than last December at \$65,816.
- Parks has earned 102% of all budgeted revenues and spent 98% of all budgeted expenses.
- YTD revenues are ahead of expenses by \$562,930. Depending on the timing of expenses, the majority of this will be absorbed with 13th month expenses.
- Parks staff and leadership had tremendous discipline with expense control in Q4 to get back in alignment to budget.






Key Concepts:

- With courses closed, there was minimal financial activity in December.
- Through December, golf earned 114% of budgeted revenues and spent 105% of budgeted expenses.
- Golf has revenues exceeding expenses by \$391,238 excluding the facility improvement fee and corresponding debt service payment (\$604,852 including both).
- There was a surplus of \$213,615 added to the FIF Fund Balance in 2023.

Background/history: Park staff, in partnership with the Friends of Coeur D'Alene Park and the Browne's Addition Neighborhood Council, seek full park board authorization to apply for a 'member requested local community project' in the amount of \$750,000 to fund 'Phase 1 improvements' within the park. If funding is granted, improvements funded will include a playground & adult fitness equipment, restroom renovation / replacement, and ADA accessible park walkways, all of which are supported by the city park master plan and the browne's addition CDA park master plan. If approved by Park Board, the application will be submitted in early February 2024. If approved by WA State, funding will be available in 2025 for improvements. Local matching funding will be provided by the current irrigation and electrical project scheduled for winter & spring of 2023/2024. RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION authorizing submission of an application to the Washington State legislature for capital improvement funding within Coeur d' Alene Park.

WHEREAS, under the City Charter, the Spokane Park Board has exclusive jurisdiction and control over city park land and facilities located within and outside the City of Spokane; and

WHEREAS, the City of Spokane owns and maintains land known as "Coeur d' Alene Park" (CDA Park) within Spokane's Browne's Addition Neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, in 2015 and in partnership with the Spokane Park Board, the Friends of Coeur d' Alene Park and the Browne's Addition Neighborhood Council completed the CDA Park master plan, which outlined neighborhood desires for improvements within CDA Park; and

WHEREAS, the CDA Park master plan identified "play areas", "public bathroom structure", and "perimeter walkway & exercise stations" (amongst other items), as priorities for improvement; and

WHEREAS, in 2022 the Spokane Park Board adopted the citywide 2022 parks and natural lands master plan (OPR 2022-0454), which outlined community wide priorities for park improvements for the next 10+ years; and

WHEREAS, the citywide park and natural lands master plan identified "playgrounds", "restrooms", "trails", and "trailheads" as 'Top Tier community desires'; and

WHEREAS, within CDA Park, the physical condition of the existing playground is near failure and in need of complete replacement to ensure future functionality, the restroom building is highly susceptible to damage from vandalism, and improvements are needed to improve the park and restroom accessibility; and

WHEREAS, without supplemental grant funding the City Parks lacks sufficient capital funding to complete the renovations and improvements within CDA park as necessary to meet community desires; and

WHEREAS, on December 4th, 2023 the City Council adopted resolution 2023-0095 to place a long term park levy on the August 2024 ballot to provide additional funding for improving neighborhood parks citywide, which if passed will provide the majority of the funding necessary to repair and improve CDA Park over a 20 year period; and

WHEREAS, on December 4th, 2023 the City Council adopted resolution 2023-0102, establishing the legislative priorities for the City of Spokane, which identified "\$750,000 for phase 1 improvements to install new playground equipment and restrooms at Coeur d'Alene Park…" as a City of Spokane Tier 1 Legislative Priority; and

WHEREAS, the requested state funding, if approved by the Washington State legislature, would augment park levy funding to complete the most desired park improvements as quickly as possible; and

WHEREAS, the Park Board recognizes the need for improvements within CDA park, the need for supplemental funding to complete the improvements, and the value in continued partnership with neighborhoods, community groups, and parks "friends of" groups to maintain, enhance and improve the park system citywide.


NOW, THEREFORE,

Park Location





