MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 2:15 p.m. by committee chair Sally Lodato.

Discussion Items:

- 1. Winter Recreation Trail Grooming Locations Andy Fuzak
 - a. For the last 7+ years, Indian Canyon Golf Course has served as a winter recreation destination for Nordic skiing, snowshoeing, etc. It is being proposed to move the snow grooming operations to Finch Arboretum. It has been a great trial but has run its course.
 - b. Although the terrain at Indian Canyon is more advanced with steep hills and a 2.5-kilometer loop, set in a picturesque location close to downtown, there is a risk of damage to the turf, especially with less snowpack. To keep people on track, the trails need to be marked with rope lines, which could lead to injury. The location is also prohibitive to users with disabilities.
 - c. By moving the snow grooming to Finch, turf damage is not as critical of a concern, as this park is noted for its abundance of beautiful trees, therefore, trail rope lines would not be necessary. There is better accessibility for people with disabilities and is flatter and gentler, for less experienced users. However, the trail is shorter until the full potential is realized. Unlike the golf courses in general, people are already using Finch for winter activities. Finch also has better access for machinery.
 - d. Greta suggested more signage regarding fat bikes, as they damage the groomed trail leading to potential injury. Bob Anderson noted that the road to Finch as well as the parking lots are plowed more consistently than they are at Indian Canyon.
- 2. Recreation Activity Guide RFP Jennifer Papich

A 3-year contract is currently in process. Recreation develops the content, and the designer takes care of the layout, puts the books together, prints, and does the mailing. The same vendor, TPC Printing, won the bid again this year and their price is very close to their last contracted price. The approval process for this contract will be going through Finance Committee next month.

Standing Reports:

- 1. Recreation Report Jennifer Papich
 - a. In Athletics, adult softball continues to grow. It reached full capacity within 72 hours of opening and 6 waitlisted teams. Youth NFL flag football saw a record number of girls this year which has earned some media attention. The new concessionaire is now fully operational at Merkel. Spring volleyball just concluded with 174 teams. Summer volleyball is beginning this week.
 - b. Therapeutic Recreation saw 140 participants over last spring and many additional classes. They are doing remarkable.
 - c. Corbin Arts Center hosted 198 participants in 34 classes. The rentals are also going well. They just finished their Train the Trainer training for camp staff. If you visit, you will

notice behind the house has received a large makeover. This not only helps with forest health and fuels reduction, but also safety and vagrancy.

- d. Aquatics is in pre-season with only Witter open. Already they have had 472 lap swimmers, 1,411 lane rentals, 52 lifeguard certifications and 31 swim instructors certified. Maintenance issues included the Witter boiler and deck jacking to prevent trip and falls at AM Cannon, Comstock, Hillyard and Shadle Aquatic Centers. They are planning for a full season opening June 16th.
- e. Outdoor Rec is a bit slower in summer, yet the archery and rafting classes are full. They brought back orienteering this year. Adventure Camp is being rebranded as Base camp and is proving to be very popular. There is a new nature program in development with the Department of Fish and Wildlife for women and girls, which will be held in the fall.
- f. The Community Center Funding Review Committee had their first meeting. Because of the Purchasing Department's new requirements, a new application removing any bias is being created. The questions are now weighted and scored accordingly. Based on an incomplete application, Southwest Community Center's request for funding was recently denied. They will be permitted to reapply later this year with all the centers.
- g. The HOPE Soccer Mini Pitch Project is a smaller version of a soccer field. A current, non-usable sport court in a vulnerable area would be converted to a mini pitch soccer field. HOPE Soccer will be covering the cost of the project. If this is successful, Spokane Parks would have the opportunity to purchase more Mini Pitch fields for other areas. There are several non-playable, damaged tennis courts which could be utilized again until Parks acquires the funding to restore those sport courts.
- h. The Fall Activity Guide process will begin in early July.


Finch Arboretum Winter Snow Grooming Proposal

What we are looking at doing

Moving snow grooming operations to Finch Arboretum due to turf damages, labor intensive and unsafe "fencing", and less than ideal access for users at Indian Canyon Golf Course.

Strengths and Weaknesses of Indian Canyon Golf Course

Strengths

- Longer sustained trail lengths
 - ~2.5 km loop
- Dogs allowed on leash
- More advanced terrain
- **Beautiful location**
- Close to downtown
- Free of charge to use
- Brings winter enjoyment to facility

Weaknesses

Turf damages

- People going off trail during times of turf sensitivity
- Variable snowpack and temperatures puts turf in danger

Trail rope lines/posts

- Labor intensive
- Metal tee posts create hazard of injury
- Access for users
- Access for equipment
- Steep hills



Strengths and Weaknesses of Finch Arboretum


Strengths

- Turf is not a main priority
- Trail rope lines/posts are unneeded
- Better access for users
 - Potential for ADA Accessibility
 - Good access for equipment
- **Beautiful location**
- Flat and gently rolling terrain
- Close to downtown
- Free of charge to use
- Enhances winter use to facility

Weaknesses

- Shorter trail until full potential is realized
 - 1.1 km one way
- Dogs not allowed
 - Fat Bikes may not be allowed








Aquatics Updates

WITTER PRE-SEASON

- Public Lap Swim
 - 472 lap swimmers from May 5th to May 31st
- o Swim Team Lane Rentals
 - 83 hours rented with a total of 1,411 swimmers
- Lifeguard Certification Courses
 - 3, two-week sessions with a total of 52 students
- Swim Instructor Certification Courses
 - 3, two-week sessions with a total of 31 students
- The boilers at Witter Aquatic Center required attention prior to opening for preseason.
- The small pool at Witter Aquatic Center has been closed due to a computer controller outage. A new part has been ordered and we hope to install before the season begins.
- Deck jacking projects took place at AM Cannon, Comstock, Hillyard, & Shadle Aquatic Centers to raise the concrete in places to remove trip hazards.

FULL SEASON PREPARATIONS

- <u>3 Nights of Hiring Fairs</u> Over 100 employees met with Aquatic and Human Resources Staff to complete hiring assignments and discuss the upcoming season.
- <u>4 Nights of Manager Training</u>
 26 individuals attended this training.
- <u>2 Nights of Customer Service & computer training</u>
 40 individuals will attend this training at the Liberty Park
 Library.
- <u>All Staff Orientation</u> All of our 180 aquatics employees will be attending this event.
- <u>3 Days of Pump Room Training</u> Pool Staff teams will train in the pump room to learn the pool's mechanical system and maintenance.
- <u>All staff training weekend</u> This weekend, staff will undergo training, practice the emergency action plan, and clean their facilities in preparation for opening day Monday, June 16th.

Other Recreation Updates

- Community Center Funding Review Committee
 - Had First Meeting
 - Committee reviewed and declined Southwest Com. Centers' request for funding this year as they attempt to reopen based on an incomplete application, lacking sufficient key details regarding their budget, key onsite staff and long-term financial sustainability planning.
 - Scheduled 2nd meeting later this month
- HOPE Soccer Mini Pitch Project
 - A mini pitch soccer field is a smaller version of a soccer field designed for recreational play in smaller spaces. Typically, 60 yards x 40 yards.
 - Park Planning in very early phases of contracting to convert an out-of-service sport-court in a vulnerable area into a mini-pitch soccer court at no cost to the city.
