MINUTES

The meeting was called to order at 2:15 p.m. by committee chair Sally Lodato.

Public Comments: None

Action items:

- 2026 Recreation Centers Contract Renewal for the combined amount of \$598,631 Jennifer Papich
 - a. There will be no modifications for the 2026 community center contracts. Other than dates, they will be identical to the 2025 contracts including amounts awarded. The funds are used to support recreational programming at the centers. The contracts allow Spokane Parks and Recreation (SPRD) to use the center facilities provided they are not being used for primary center programming. The contract requires the centers to provide monthly invoices to SPRD, which we then pay. They must also provide detailed recreation attendance reports and monthly volunteer data. SPRD has a full-page Spokane Youth and Senior Center Association (SYSCA) advertisement in every seasonal activity guide.
 - b. There will be a change to the 2027/2028 awarding process. See "Discussion Items" below.
 - c. From January through October, the centers have logged 49,001 volunteer hours, equivalent to \$816,523 staff dollars at minimum wage. During this time frame, they have welcomed 138,391 recreation participants.

Motion #1 – Sally Lodato moved to recommend 2026 Recreation Centers Contract Renewal for the combined amount of \$598,631.

Bob Anderson seconded. The motion passed unanimously (4-0 vote).

The committee agreed to present this recommendation as a consent agenda item on the December 11 Park Board meeting agenda.

Discussion Items:

- 1. Spokane Pickleball Club (SPC) Annual Report Craig Numata & Adam Martin
 - a. SPC was founded in 2023 as a 501©(3) nonprofit. Membership dollars and tournaments fund court improvements, nets and programming. The board members are all volunteer. SPC was very actively involved with raising awareness about the Together Spokane bond/levy initiative, as some funding from this will go towards new and renovated tennis and pickleball courts.
 - b. Currently, there are 12 courts at Comstock and 8 at Mission, which are shared with tennis. There are also 2 dedicated courts with permanent nets each at Corbin and Underhill Parks. Spokane Public Television KSPS did a wonderful program on SPC which can be found HERE. People can schedule play at Comstock, Mission and Corbin.
 - c. The Spokane Parks Foundation awarded Spokane Pickleball Club a grant to purchase 3 semi perm Dominator Pickleball nets, alleviating the need to lock up the nets and risk theft and vandalism of the lock boxes. A 4th net was purchased through membership dollars. They're much easier to use and swap out for tennis.
 - d. Highlights from 2025 included 2 Picklefest tournaments and the Comstock Classic. A disturbing "low"light, a lock box was vandalized, most likely opened by someone with access to the code, who stole all 9 nets. The nets have a retail value of \$200 each. SPC reached out to the community for help. The nets were never recovered, however, several people donated money to the Spokane Parks Foundation, who matched the funds, enabling SPC to purchase

new equipment.

- e. Recently, The Press Pickleball Club has opened their private indoor facility for winter use for SPC members and the public every Friday evening. This is a great opportunity for Spokane residents as Pickleball is increasingly popular not only among retirees, but twenty-somethings are really getting into the competitive side.
- f. Goals for 2026 include continued SPRD collaboration, striping improvements, primarily at Corbin and launching youth programs and activities.

2. 2027/2028 Community Center Funding Application Process – Jennifer Papich

- a. Several people were on the committee to develop the Community Center grant application: Al Vorderbrueggen (Park Operations), Sally Lodato (Park Board), Jerry Unruh (Community Center Director-retired), and Sara Sampson-Clements (Community Housing and Neighborhood Services).
- b. Historically, the centers have similar missions but varying needs and challenges. Although the Recreation budget has gone through several reductions in the last decade, funding the centers has not changed since 2013 and remains at \$629,823 for the 2026 budget.
- c. Moving forward, application goals include transparency with the funding decisions, linking the funding levels to specific recreation programming, and the development of a data-driven, equitable approach. Eligible applicants must be current Spokane Youth and Senior Center Association (SYSCA) affiliates who has operated at least 12 months and deliver recreational programming to the community.
- d. To receive SPRD funding for 2027-2028 grant period, each center must submit a thorough application by the stated deadline, which then goes through a scoring process. Each qualified center application will receive 80% of their prior year's funding. Additional funding is based on their score, which includes leftover funds from Southwest Spokane Center which closed in 2024. The Review Committee consists of 3 park board members, 2 SPRD staff members and 2 citizens at large.
- e. The tentative goal is to release the Request for Proposal on Jan. 12, followed by a required applicant webinar on Jan. 14. The proposal deadline is Feb. 20 and award notification will be Apr. 13. SPRD would like all future grant funding to run on this two-year cycle, however, there is a remote possibility that Park Board would reduce the amount of budgeted funding in 2027 and beyond. Jennifer opened the floor for questions and comments which will be addressed during the webinar.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 3:17 p.m.

Background/history: Corbin Senior Center, MLK Jr. Center at ECCC, West Central CC, Project Joy, MidCity Concerns, Southside CC, Northeast Youth Center, Sinto Senior Center and the Hillyard Senior Center provide recreational services and opportunities to the community in partnership with SPRD. Parks provides partial funding to these Centers to help pay for their recreational programming costs. The combine amount of \$598,631 is accounted for in the approved 2026 Recreation Budget. Centers are required to provide monthly recreation program reports and monthly related operational expenses when submitting their invoices. 




History, Highlights, and Goals (2023–2026)



Missing Nets at Comstock Park



- The Recreation Budget includes a line item of \$629,823 for Community Center funding support for recreation programs.
- Recreation Budget as a whole has gone through several budget reductions over the years - The Community Center funding line in the Recreation Budget has not been altered since 2013.

RECREATION FUNDING MODEL

Grant awards will be determined using a Baseline + Application Scoring model.

- Only qualifying SYSCA applicants who submit a completed application by the stated deadline will be approved for scoring and will automatically receive a baseline allocation equal to 80% of their prior year's funding.
- The remaining available funds will be distributed using a data-driven formula based on each qualifying Centers final application score.

RECREATION FUNDING MODEL - CONTINUED

Grant awards will be determined using a Baseline + Application Scoring model.

- This approach ensures that each center partner that submits a complete application:
 - Maintains a stable foundation of funding (80% min.)
 - And can also be rewarded for strong performance, innovative programming, and demonstrated community impact.
- This method ensures fair, transparent data driven results.

COMMUNITY NEED - RECREATION 30PTS.

This section justifies why the Center's <u>Recreation Programming</u> is essential to the community. By clearly articulating the community's needs—supported by data.

- **WHY** the Center's Recreation Programming is essential
 - *who* the Centers Recreation Programs serve
 - *How* they align with broader community priorities.
- Center's history, evolution, and SYSCA involvement.
- Target population and geographic reach served, including age groups, income levels, disabilities, and diversity.

A strong QUALITY section signals that the Center can deliver *impactful*, *equitable* <u>recreation</u> <u>programming</u> that participants will benefit from—and return to. It builds confidence that your recreation offerings are also *thoughtfully planned and responsibly managed*.
