### **MINUTES**

The meeting was called to order at 4:19 p.m. by committee chair Kevin Brownlee.

**Discussion Items:** 

<u>Chelsea Updegrove Resignation</u> and current opening – Chelsea's resignation leaves an opening on the committee. John Wallingford, a guest at the meeting who is a part of environmental events for the anniversary for Expo may be interested in the position. He needs some additional time to consider the position.

<u>Fuels Reduction Presentation</u> – Nick Jeffries, Wildland Planner from the City of Spokane Fire Department gave a presentation on the Fire Departments Fuels Reduction program. He opened by sharing his experience, which included that he is a Spokane native, was in the Marine Corps Infantry and went to Iraq several times. He attended Spokane Community College and Gonzaga and received a bachelor's degree with lots of Natural Resource credits. He fought some fires during the summer while in college for the Bureau of Land Management and got a job right out of college with the Department of Natural Resources. He has worked for the DNR for the last 10 years, with four years running offender hand crews and six years doing service forestry work.

He explained that Fuels Reduction is essentially removing vegetation to lessen the threat of wildfire.

There are two kinds of mitigation, either mastication or chipping. A masticator mows the debris on the ground to mitigate the brush layer whereas chipping leaves the brush on the ground.

Fuels Reduction involves thinning, pruning, and disposing of the material to reduce fuel loads and increase forest health. They leave 10-15 foot spacing between the bases of the trees, prune the trees up to 10 feet, and chip or masticate any materials to mitigate for bark beetles and wildfires. He explained that mulch and wood chips do burn but do not burn well or have high flame heights. They are only thinning trees 8 inches or less in diameter and are not cutting any trees to sell; they are only cutting trees for forest health and to reduce wildfire risk. He said people may be under the perception when they are thinning a forest that they are cutting big trees, but they're not, they are only cutting small stuff for regeneration.

Several ways Fuels Reduction work is done is by hand crews who use woodchippers and feed the cut material into the chippers, masticator machines, and rotary masticators which are used to mulch materials along roadways and right of ways and areas that are hard to reach.

Nick shared information regarding the WA DNR cost share program which is a 50/50 cost share and primarily applies to private property and focuses on small acreage. It reduces the cost of fuels mitigation on private lands. They are doing fuels mitigation on thousands of acres of land in the region outside of what the Spokane Fire Dept program is doing. The City has participated some in

the program, but the program generally disperses funds to small landowners. The program either offsets the cost of a contractor or pays the landowner to thin on their own property.

Of approximately 11,400 acres owned by the City of Spokane, the Spokane Fire department estimates at least 3,000 acres are unimproved property and need to be managed. The City has done a good job of managing their improved properties. The unimproved sections have just been managed as time allows.

Urban Forestry has helped to facilitate and educate on what the city has been doing and how the city has been doing the work.

Information was shared on the Community Wildfire Defense Grants including the amount applied for, matching funds, city needs, total match and total funding for fuels reduction. Nick advised they were 1 of 12 or 13 applications that got accepted in the state out of 46 total applications and that they applied for 1.5 million and were awarded that amount. It was noted that grant funds require a 75/25 match and that The Fuels Reduction program will have 5 years to use the funds.

### Projects completed:

- 1) Austin Ravine 17 acres were thinned, pruned, and chipped and that work was done by the WA DNR crew.
- 2) Excell Lane 11 acres off Excell Lane. There is also private work begin done by Excell Lane.
- 3) Indian Canyon Golf Course 39 acres adjacent to the golf course recently completed using a track chipper and DNR inmate crews.
- 4) Romine Conservation Area 25 acres thinned, pruned, and disposed. The right-of-way by the railroad was also done, with the railroad's permission.

There is potential private land work to be coordinated by SFD and Nick has been talking to a number of those agencies. They are already working with some private entities, such as homeowner associations. The Eagle Ridge HOA completed approximately 15 acres in 2023 using DNR monies.

The SFD program is going to work on areas outside of what the DNR's cost share program is already working on.

Home Ignition Zone (HIZ) Education was discussed. Nick will be able to talk with property owners about HIZ education and can conduct HIZ assessments for property owners.

The application process is open this year again for the grant, it will open for 3 more years. SFD intends to reapply in year 3 and if they don't get the grant then they could reapply in year 5.

The Parks Department is looking into providing some funds towards the match.

**2023** Annual Work Plan – Katie Kosanke presented the Urban Forestry 2023 Annual Work Plan, which provides an outline of the Urban Forestry and Finch Arboretum program for the year.

The 2024 Budget Process is being looked at throughout the year for potential budget needs.

The Susie Stephens Trail is underway and there will be more information coming soon about a dedication ceremony.

SpoCanopy campaign for restoration, replanting, and progress toward long-term canopy goals. Urban Forestry receives utility funding for various projects for planting and maintenance.

Staff development and training is taking place throughout the year. This includes continuing education credits to get arborist recertifications.

UF is asking for a new position to be considered in the 2024 budget process to help with getting through reactive work quicker and work on proactive work.

Staff created a chainsaw safety video and training which we share with the Safety Team and Public Works who assist with storm damage cleanup.

The Finch Arboretum is working on several Capital Projects and Operational Projects and Priorities related to the Finch Arboretum Master Plan. Events at the Arboretum include The Arbor Day Celebration in April and the Fall Leaf Festival in October, both events include live music and food vendors.

Forest health and fuels reduction work is being done in natural areas. Wildland Program Manager Nick Jeffries with assistance of WDNR has completed several projects and is working on several more. Restoration work continues to be done and UF will be working with Spokane Ponderosa on a tree planting project.

Typical planting, pruning and removals will continue throughout the parks.

Priority Parks for 2023 include Underhill Park where there was a large group of beetle killed trees, various removals throughout the park system, including at Comstock and Audubon and a full prune of trees at Friendship, Franklin, and Logan Peace Park.

Permits and Plan Review is work Urban Forestry does in conjunction with Development Services. It includes typical licensing for tree services, reviewing tree permits, sending notices to property owners, and permit reviews and demo reviews to make sure trees are protected during those processes. Urban Forestry is looking at a new tree inventory program which will help meet the needs of monitoring trees.

Urban Forestry receives some funding from utilities department. Those funds are put into nursery tree stock, the SpoCanopy partnership planting program, some pruning work along Parkways and Boulevards, and some funding was provided to the Perry business district to help prune their trees.

Occasionally UF receives some parking funds for tree work downtown. Those funds have not been received for several years due to COVID and lack of parking funding coming in.

Lots of engineering projects are being done. UF is involved in every project to make sure the impact to trees is minimal. If trees are to be removed UF helps communicate this information to the abutting property owners and we try to replant trees if possible. The Engineering Department tries to work around trees to make sure there are minimal impacts to the trees.

Many public outreach and education events take place throughout the year including the Arbor Day Celebration, Fall Leaf Festival, a tree planting video, distribution of watering brochures and video, a Pine beetle blog, outreach through neighborhood councils and schools, and much more.

A Master Planting Plan is being worked on by Ted Hensold, a GIS professional who is also on the sustainability action committee. All the trees have been inventoried and the planting plan will help UF determine potential planting spots for trees. It will also help generating mailing lists for street tree plantings.

Urban Forestry is working on a program with the Downtown Spokane Partnership for a possible education program and/or a grant opportunity to address tree mortality in the downtown core.

### Standing Report Items:

1. Citizen Advisory Report - Kris Neely, UFCAC chair gave the Citizen Advisory Report.

Paul Lower with the Downtown Spokane Partnership was voted to be a member of the UFCAC and will represent the Downtown position. Ted Hensold gave a presentation on data he has collected for a tree planting plan. John Wallingford who is on the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary for Expo Committee indicated the committee has a desire to help contribute significantly to improving the tree canopy and using the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the expo as a platform to help.

### 2. <u>Urban Forestry Monthly Update</u> – Katie Kosanke

Urban Forestry has been working on the Design Standard updates for distance trees can be planted to utilities and the planting details. A lot of progress has been made and we hired a consultant who provided many great recommendations. The planting standards for planting distances is an engineering document and it will take some time for the changes to be made. Urban Forestry met with Garrett Jones, Park Director, the Public Works Director, Development Services and Planning and a MOU will be put in place which will allow deviations for plantings now until the changes can be made to the Design Standard document. Changes were needed now due to many lots being extremely narrow and our planting distances, which are the most restrictive in the nation, wouldn't allow any trees to be planted. UF just received the final revisions of the draft of the planting details, and it will be sent out for feedback, and it will also likely be on the agenda for this committee as well.

Urban Forestry applied for the Inflation Reduction Act grant which will assist with planting lots of park trees, street trees, and caring for trees we already have, and maintenance of park trees and trees in low-income areas. All the work would be contracted out, using temporary employees, consultants, and contractors.

Lots of projects happening and many engineering projects with tree work are underway at this time of year. The UF tree crew is working on lots of items including beetle killed trees in the parks and ongoing removals at Manito, Comstock, Underhill, and Liberty Parks. There will also be a full routine pruning done at Friendship Park and lots of re-active work is being done which includes removal of hangers and broken branches, clearance issues in parks and sign and visibility issues.

3. <u>Urban Forestry Financial Report</u> – Katie presented the June financial report.

UF is on track for the year. Katie is working on getting funds encumbered for some of the projects that are being contracted out.

Other Discussion Items: None

Katie welcomed Nick Sumner to the Committee.








# WA DNR COST SHARE PROGRAM

WA DNR 50/50 cost share primarily applies to private ground and focuses on small acreage. The advantage for the City of Spokane is that our Grant match is 25%, so the City's dollars can mitigate more acres per dollar spent. The City will be focusing on larger acreages



### WA DNR 50/50 Cost Share:

The Landowner either pays 50% of the cost of the work to a contractor or performs the work themselves. The landowner is reimbursed up to 50%, no greater than the capped allocation amount.



Forest Improvement - Thinning, Pruning, Slash Disposal, Brush Control









Of the approximate **11,400 acres** owned by the City of Spokane, The Spokane Fire department estimates at least **3000 acres need to be treated now** and will need a **10-15 year maintenance plan** to keep it fire resistant. This is not counting the thousands of acres outside city ownership that could be treated.





The Community Wildfire Defense Grants are intended to help at-risk local communities and Tribes plan and reduce the risk against wildfire.

Amount applied for \$1,500,000

Spokane City Parks, Conservation Futures \$50,000

Avista \$25,000 for 5 years, totaling \$125,000

City needs \$200,000

Total Match \$375,000

Total funding for fuels \$1,875,000

Grant funds require a 75/25 Match, which means the City of Spokane will be responsible for 25%.


