

# **Economic Development**

#### Introduction

Economic development is the sustained, concerted actions of policy makers and community members that strengthen local businesses, support workforce development, and provide access to improved well-being and quality of life. A strong economy provides for a growing community through the creation of jobs and other business opportunities and builds a tax base that supports essential services such as schools, police, fire, and parks.

Either through services, incentives, or physical infrastructure, the City actively shapes the built environment to support and foster a healthy economy. Public-private partnerships as well as partnerships between all levels of government are also a crucial component in the promotion of long-term economic growth. The City's role in economic development involves providing public sector advocacy and investment in support of quality job creation, retention, and diversification.

#### **Goals and Policies**

Goals and policies provide specificity for planning and decision-making. Overall, they indicate desired directions, accomplishments, or aims in relation to the growth and development of Spokane.

#### **Goal**: ED-1, Cooperative Partnerships

Encourage cooperative partnerships between the City; regional jurisdictions and agencies; the private sector; and community members to support the economic expansion of the city.

**Policy**: ED-1.1, Participation in Regional Economic Development

Participate in regional economic development planning and programs with both the public and private sectors, ensuring plans and policies are coordinated, monitored for long-term success, and implemented in a timely manner

#### **Policy**: ED-1.2, Economic Development Progress

Work with regional jurisdictions, organizations, and community members to periodically review economic vitality metrics such as wages, percentage of population below the poverty level, and business formation and expansion, ensuring all economic development plans and actions are informed by and reflect current data.



The introduction has been substantially rewritten, as the current version is too focused in the past situation, not the current realities of economic development and the City's situation.



The first three original policies under goal 1 overlapped considerably. They have been combined into two policies here (1.1 and 1.2). Also, some of the omitted discussion language from the current document has moved into the policies themselves.

**Policy**: ED-1.3, Public-Private Partnerships

Partner with the private sector to extend infrastructure for development, provide incentives and education, and support the creation of well-paying jobs and quality affordable housing for Spokane's workforce.

**Goal**: ED-2, Development and Redevelopment of Land and Structures

Ensure the supply of industrial and commercial properties is sufficient to meet the future economic needs of the City.

**Policy**: ED-2.1, Land Supply and Site Selection

Remove barriers for entry for new, expanding, and relocating industries by providing various site-by-site analytics and feasibility information, and implementing incentives.

**Policy**: ED-2.2, Reuse and Revitalization Opportunities

Provide targeted redevelopment incentives and other support for historic, abandoned, or underutilized sites in parts of the city where infrastructure and service capacity already exist.

Policy: ED-2.3, Cleanup of Contaminated Sites

Offer clean up and redevelopment assistance for environmentally contaminated properties so that those sites can be revitalized or mitigated to protect the health of residents and the environment.

**Goal**: ED-3, Resilient, Sustainable, and Diverse Economies.

Foster a resilient, sustainable, and diverse economy that provides a range of employment and business opportunities.

Policy: ED-3.1, Economic Growth

Support the formation, retention, expansion, and recruitment of businesses through programs, incentives, and partnerships that support economic growth.

Policy: ED-3.2, Economic Diversity

Encourage economic diversity by creating programs and policies that support small and large businesses that provide a healthy balance of goodsproducing and service-producing jobs.

**Policy**: ED-3.3, Co-Locating Related Businesses

Allow firms or institutions in related and supportive economic sectors or industries to locate near each other, creating productivity advantages from their mutual proximity and relationships.

Housing as a topic has been **IIII IIII** added to policy 1.3 to support HB1110 and the requirements of HB1220. Education was also added to policy 1.3 due to input received during public engagement.



Policy 2.1 has been rewritten but has largely the same effect as the current version.



Reuse and revitalization can benefit Climate & Resiliency efforts, thus this policy may be updated later.



This was formerly policy 8.5 under a separate goal. It was moved here.



Policy 3.2 has been updated slightly to concern City action on this front.



Policy 3.3 was updated to include industries that *support* each other, not only those that are the same (i.e. lumber sales near cabinetmakers).



**Policy**: ED-3.4, Small and Locally Owned Businesses

Support opportunities to expand and increase the number of small and locally owned businesses in Spokane to provide economic stability and community-building.

Policy: ED-3.5, Home-Based Businesses

Encourage opportunities for creating and expanding home-based businesses that do not unreasonably impact the surrounding community.

**Policy**: ED-3.6, Technology-Based Industries

Assist the development of advanced and emerging technology-based industries by supporting education, increasing residents' quality of life, and identifying key infrastructure improvements.

**Policy**: ED-3.7, Sustainable Economic Strategies

Develop and implement programs assisting and supporting businesses that minimize physical, social, and environmental impacts, specifically any businesses that specialize in environmental protection and remediation.

**Policy**: ED-3.8, Regional Marketplace

Support growth of the regional economic environment creating markets for local services and products, as well as supporting more well-paying jobs.

Policy: ED-3.9, Downtown Spokane

Promote Downtown Spokane as the economic and cultural center of the region by supporting the City's economic partners, continually improving Downtown's commercial activity and employment opportunities, attracting arts and entertainment, supporting tourism and recreation, and incentivizing the development of downtown housing.

**Policy**: ED-3.10, Development Standards and Permitting Process

Provide an efficient, predictable, and customer-focused permitting process to foster a positive business climate and ease needed development.

**Goal**: ED-4, Living Wage Jobs and Income Disparity

Enhance the economic conditions of the community by encouraging living wage jobs and reducing income disparity.

**Policy**: ED-4.1, Living Wage Jobs

Encourage the recruitment and expansion of businesses that pay at least a living wage while providing competitive benefits.



Polices ED 3.5 (locally owned business) and ED 3.6 (small business) have been combined here into policy 3.4, as they had similar intent and effect.



Home-based businesses can have Land Use ramifications. As such, a cross-reference to the Land Use chapter might be added here (policy 3.5).



Policy 3.7 is a combination of original policies 8.2 and 8.4. This topic will also be informed and/or updated by ongoing Climate work.



The selection of preferred alternative in the EIS may affect this policy, as the overall development strategy may amend downtown focus.



Formerly policy 7.6, this policy has been reworked to function better as policy.



This goal will likely be influenced further by the discussion of RDI and displacement in the City.

Policy: ED-4.2, Income Equity

Support local and regional community-based organizations and agencies to address income equity and employment opportunities.

**Goal**: ED-5, Education and Workforce Development

Improve Spokane's economy through a qualified and competitive labor force, responsive to the changing needs of the city.

Policy: ED-5.1, Youth Programs

Promote and facilitate youth programs that provide exposure and experiences that support future and potential employment opportunities, including through development of community resources and facilities for these types of programs.

**Policy**: ED-5.2, Post-Secondary Education and Job Training

Support continued efforts by the educational community to contribute to the health of Spokane's economy through post-secondary plans, programs, and activities.

**Policy**: ED-5.3, Communication Links

Encourage greater communication between the city, educational and training providers, businesses, employees, and residents to meet community educational and job-training needs.

Formerly policy 5.2, this policy has been substantially rewritten to be more applicable to actions the City can take.

- Policy 5.5 (formerly 5.8) has been updated to better match the role of libraries today and to strengthen connection to Economic Development.
- Goal 6 and its policies have been reworked to focus on economic development, not infrastructure in general. A cross-reference to the Capital Facilities chapter is likely to be included here.



**Policy**: ED-6.2, Infrastructure as a Catalyst for Private Investment

Recognize, support, and identify opportunities for targeted public infrastructure improvements that provide a catalyst for business and economic growth, supporting a healthy business climate in appropriate areas.

**Policy**: ED-6.3, Communication Facilities and Networks

Develop a program by which the City will co-locate communication and network infrastructure with other public infrastructure projects, ensuring support for new high-speed communication whenever possible.

Policy: ED-7.1, Revenue Sources

Ensure that tax revenue sources are stable, allocate costs equitably within the community, do not penalize certain types of businesses, and attract and retain businesses.

**Policy**: ED-7.2, Tax Incentives for Land Improvement

Support tax instruments and levies that encourage business investment and construction, especially in centers and other areas identified for significant development.

**Policy**: ED-7.3, Tax Incentives for Renovation

Use tax incentives and investments to encourage revitalization, modernization, or rehabilitation of deteriorated residential and commercial properties and buildings for new economic activity.

Policy 6.2 is new, highlighting a successful strategy employed many times by the City but not directly called for in policy before now.



Policy 6.3 has been updated to focus on co-location, while a new policy has been added below concerning these networks in general.



Policy 6.4 is new, highlighting the need for the plan to accommodate new economies and needs.



Policy 6.5 is a combination of original policies 6.1 and 6.4.



Policy 7.2 might change later, depending on the Preferred Alternative selected by the City.



Policy 2.2 and 7.3 work very closely together—2.2 calling for action and 7.3 providing a way to fund that action. As such, a cross-reference is likely to be included here.



#### **Goal**: ED-8, Creative Economy

Support the creative economy through targeted investments in infrastructure, incentives, education, workforce development, jobs, and business growth for arts, culture, film, music, nightlife, and other creative industry occupations.

Policy: ED 8.1, Creative Spaces

Collaborate in the creation of creative spaces to support start-up creative industries.

Policy: ED 8.2, Local Investment

Identify programs, incentives, and policies to support increased City and local investment in artists, arts and cultural nonprofits, and creative businesses.

**Policy**: ED 8.3, Creative Districts

Support and implement statewide programs, such as creative districts, to enhance the use of incentives and other economic development strategies.

**Policy** ED 8.4, Support Neighborhood Cultural Activities

Elevate and support neighborhood cultural assets, ensuring that residents and visitors can easily access the creative economy in every neighborhood.

#### Goal: ED-9, Recreation and Tourism Promotion

Protect the natural and built environment as assets that attract economic development opportunities and enhance the City of Spokane's quality of life.

Policy: ED-9.1, Promote Regional Natural Resources

Promote the region's outdoor amenities, recreational opportunities, and agritourism as features of both social benefit and potential economic growth.

**Policy**: ED-9.2, Supporting and Promoting Tourism

Partner with stakeholders on the promotion of the natural and built environment assets in the City of Spokane, as well as the larger region, to attract visitors and private investment in the city.

Policy: ED-9.3, Tourism and Events as an Economic Benefit

Attract and incentivize events in the city that bring in regional and outof-state visitors, supporting the local economy and raising national attention to Spokane.



This new goal and its policies have been a frequent topic of public engagement. Also, as it relates closely to arts and culture topics, a cross-reference is likely here to the Social Health chapter.

Originally, this was Goal 8. It has substantially reworked to better match the original effect while strengthening the relationship between the natural beauty of Spokane, it's tourism industry, and the economic environment.



Staff is actively exploring other policies that might be added here to highlight the economic and social value the environment holds for Spokane.



A cross-refence to both Natural Environment and Social Health is likely to be added for this goal and policies.

#### POLICIES REMOVED FROM THE TEXT:

The following policies in blue have been removed from the text, largely due to redundancy, unclear goals/success, and similar factors.

**Policy**: ED-2.3, Reusable Buildings Inventory

Continue to maintain an inventory of historic and significant older buildings that could be redeveloped for economic activities rather than demolished.

**Policy**: ED-2.4, Mixed-Use

Support mixed-use development that brings employment, shopping, and residential activities into shared locations that stimulate opportunities for economic activity.

**Policy**: ED-3.3, Enterprise Opportunities

Continue to create economic development opportunities utilizing tools available to the city which will foster the growth of Spokane's economy.

Policy: ED-4.2, Benchmark Indicators

Work with the private sector to establish benchmark indicators for employment and income levels, monitor progress toward reaching those levels, and prepare an annual status report on progress.

**Policy**: ED-5.1, K-12 Education

Work cooperatively with local schools to help maintain and enhance the quality of K-12 education in the city's schools.

**Policy**: ED-5.4, Program Evaluation

Support efforts to introduce new, high-quality programs into the curricula of area technical schools, community colleges, colleges, and universities that address the changing needs of businesses and employees.

Policy: ED-5.6, Employer Training Support

Encourage employers to support continuing education and training for their employees.

**Policy**: ED-7.1, Collaborative Nurturing of the Business Climate

Work with the business community, labor, economic development organizations and residents to maintain a good business climate.

Policy: ED-7.3, State Tax Changes

Lobby the state legislature for changes in state tax laws to allow more options or mechanisms to be available as incentives to business investment.

As a policy it does not inform decision making directly.



The City is unable to influence school curricula. Other policies remaining in the chapter allow for interaction with students. Thus, removal of policies 5.1 and 5.4 is recommended.



The City does not have the ability/tools necessary to directly influence how employers train their staff.



Policy 7.1 concerns more the overall concept of Economic Development rather than any policy direction the City can implement.



Lobbying is an implementation action and the purview of Council/Mayor, not overall City operations and decision making.
