Briefing Session:

Minutes from the October 6, 2020 meeting approved unanimously with edits. To update Thomas Sanderson updated to CTAB Liaison to PCTS and to attendance. Mary Winkes abstains.

1. Chair Report - Clifford Winger

- Mr. Winger commented that since I-976 was re-established by the court and Legislature issued new taxes so for the next 6 years the focus needs to be lowering costs and better customer service.
- 2. Secretary Report Louis Meuler
 - Mr. Meuler reported that Clifford Winger has taken over as Chair of PCTS.
- 3. Council Liaison Report Michael Cathcart
 - None
- 4. Stakeholders Report -
 - Paul Kropp, Neighborhood Alliance Commented that the City adopted new Street Standards since the last PCTS meeting and that it was a well-done project by the City.
 - Rachel Callary, Lilac Services for the Blind Reported that she attended the Transportation Research Board annual meeting and got a lot of great information about multi-modal transportation, micromobility, new installations, roundabouts, and other forms of transportation.
 - Mike Tresidder, Spokane Transit Authority (STA)- STA/SRTC has been engaged in land use study along
 Division corridor and currently has a story-map on Divisionconnects.org. A virtual open house was held

Feb. 11th to discuss what enhanced transportation might look like along the Corridor. Mr. Tresidder also reported that bus chargers are going up at Spokane Community College and at the Moran Station. The City Line Bus will soon be doing road tests as well.

- Rhonda Young, Bicycle Advisory Board (BAB) Reported that the BAB is looking at possible connections between the Ben Burr Trail and the Palouse Highway. The BAB also considered a Bike Bell ordinance but did not support that ordinance in order to keep biking as accessible as possible. The BAB stated that education would be a better route to take. Ms. Young also reported that the BAB is considering Fish Lake Trail Connections as well.

- Mary Winkes, Plan Commission/Community Assembly Liaison Commented that Manito/Cannon Hill Neighborhoods have submitted a traffic calming proposal for Grand from 29th to 37th to City Council.
- Charles Hansen, Whitman Neighborhood Council, PeTT Committee None
- Eve McMenamy SRTC- Reported that SRTC is in final stages of 190-US 195 study to improve safety and board will be reviewing recommended packages and will be presented to the public once they are at that stage. On March 1st, SRTC will start a 6 million dollar call for preservation projects.
- Thomas Sanderson, CTAB- Commented on the City Council rejection of Comp Plan Amendment on 53rd Ave. due to traffic impacts but there was no traffic study. Mr. Sanderson wanted to know how to get traffic studies for main arterials for future considerations. He was specifically interested in traffic studies about turning lanes on arterials.

Shauna Harshman reported that 2021-22 Residential Street Maintenance plan was going before Council for approval and included projects for unpaved roads and sidewalks. A traffic calming Council Committee met to approve a new process and start workshopping with community members.

Secretary's draft discussion items for minor updates to the PCTS Rules of Procedure:

Amend Rule 5.1 updating the webpage location where the agenda and meeting notice is now located on the Plan Commission Transportation Sub-committee webpage:

"Unless a law specifies particular notice requirements for an agenda item, and except as provided below, the agenda is the only required notice. A copy of the agenda is provided five (5) calendar days in advance of the Subcommittee meetings to Commission members and other interested parties and on the Spokane Planning & Developer Services website (http://spokaneplanning.org) Plan Commission Transportation Subcommittee web page."

Amend Rule 9(a) specifying that draft minutes will be posted on the Subcommittee webpage, if there is not a regularly scheduled meeting to be held within the next month:

"The Secretary prepares official minutes of the meetings containing the actions of the Subcommittee and a substantive account of the proceedings. Draft minutes shall be provided as a part of the next Subcommittee meeting agenda materials or posted and marked as "DRAFT" on the Plan Commission Transportation Subcommittee web page if there is not a regularly scheduled meeting to be held within the next month. The minutes of all meetings shall be approved by the Subcommittee, signed by the Secretary, posted on the Plan Commission Transportation Subcommittee web page, and placed on public record in the office of the City Clerk."

Subject

2022 - 2027 Six-year Comprehensive Street Program – Programming Consistency

Background

In support of the State Growth Management Act and the City of Spokane's Comprehensive Plan, the City must maintain 6-year capital financing plans for certain providers of public facilities and services. Accordingly, the City must maintain a 6-year capital financing plan for its capital street program. Pursuant to RCW 35.77.010 the capital street program must be adopted before July 1 of each year, and filed with the Secretary of Transportation not later than 30 days after adoption. To determine the plan's consistency with the Comprehensive Plan, it is scrutinized by the City Plan Commission. The Plan Commission then makes a recommendation to the City Council as to the program's consistency with the Comprehensive Plan. The City Council then accepts or modifies the plan accordingly.

Each new project to the 6-Year Program is assessed for compliance with the Comprehensive Plan by verifying fulfillment of the Transportation goals and policies (TR's). Staff have prepared an assessment, and seek PCTS recommendation to Plan Commission regarding program compliance.

Impact

Staff will present a draft assessment of new projects being brought into the 2022 – 2027 6-Year Comprehensive Street Program. The assessment includes a review of each project for consistency with the comprehensive plan, particularly the transportation chapter.

Action

This item will be informational for discussion purposes during the meeting. Action will be requested in April for a recommendation to the Plan Commission.
