- Paul Kropp, Neighborhood Alliance - Mr. Kropp reported that the City installed flashing speed signs at Ferris High School and Regal. He also stated that the connection between transportation equity and housing equity needs to be explored.
- Rachel Callary, Lilac Services for the Blind - Ms. Callary stated that she is looking forward to attending the Transportation Research Board annual meeting next month.
- Mike Tresidder, Spokane Transit Authority (STA)- Mr. Tresidder reported that the Board is considering an update to its fare media policy, including adding a mobile app, although cash would still be accepted. They are also considering creating a fare cap which would eliminate upfront cost purchase on daily and monthly purchases. For example, once a rider reaches the monthly cap of \$60, all other rides are not charged for the rest of the month. There is a survey on the STA website regarding these possible fare policy changes and it is open until December 17.

2023 - 2028 Six-year Comprehensive Street Program – Kick-off to 2022 Update

Background

The Six-Year Comprehensive Street Program lists projects scheduled for design and construction, and which have received dedicated funding. The Transportation Subcommittee has worked closely with City staff in the past to bring together a prioritization matrix for arterial streets. This scoring matrix has been applied to all arterial streets that have not recently been reconstructed through the bond or other grant programs and have met pavement reconstruction criteria.

Generally, the next step is to reference the prioritized list of projects and select projects to fill the “out years” of the program (2027-2028). Another aspect of programming projects is to assure financial constraint and a schedule facilitating constructability. Over the past several years, costs for labor and materials have increased, so projects within the program are expected to cost more than originally estimated. Grant funding availability impacts the ability to deliver projects. The City is also coordinating schedules with STA where projects overlap with the City Line.

The selection of new projects will depend upon the program budget and availability of funding. Adding new projects may require delaying projects currently in the program.

Impact

Programming of projects prioritizes efforts to seek State and Federal grants to supplement arterial street funds. Balancing the program for budget adjustments is another important step in this process.

Action

None. This is a kick-off meeting to discuss program schedule, present preliminary budget reconciliation and potential project changes.
