Meeting Minutes: Called to order at 5:32

Commission Briefing Session:

2. Roll Call and Approval of minutes:

- a. Commission Members Present: Lance Kissler, Hayley Harrison, Anwar Peace, Council Liaison Betsy Wilkerson (arrived at 5:50), Aaron Riley (arrived at 6:01), Jac Archer (arrived at 6:23)
- b. Commission Member not present: Lorna Hernandez
- c. Staff Members Present: Alex Gibilisco, Mark Carlos
- d. Gallery Members: Ombudsman Bart Logue, Rebecca Forbes
- e. March Minutes approved unanimously.
- 3. Quorum: Reached at 5:32.

Discussion Items

1. Chair Report

- a. Chair Kissler posted statements on social media as Chair
 - i. Cheney hate crime incident
 - ii. Anti-AAPI Hate Statement
- Chair Kissler and Kurtis Robinson will meet with City Officials about the Office of Civil Rights on April 7th
- c. We have a candidate for Youth Representative.
- d. Commissioner Applicants were forwarded to Mayor Woodward with feedback from current Commission Members.
- e. Commissioner Hernandez has accepted a job in Pudget Sound, potentially opening another seat on the Commission.
- f. Google Drive has a document for Commissioners to add their bio, relevant information, and pronouns. It also has a prompt for email signatures to incorporate personal pronouns.

2. Sikh Community Resolution

- a. Moved by Vice Chair Harrison, seconded by Commissioner Peace. Passed unanimously.
- b. Will be read at the next City Council Meeting.

3. Housing Action Plan Update

- a. Maren presented an update on Housing Action Plan.
- b. CM Wilkerson asked about the frequency of updates moving forward.
 - i. Maren said updates will be frequent as possible, at least annually to SHRC, City Council and Plan Commission.
- c. Commissioner Archer asked about outreach to impacted communities like communities of color and disability community. They also asked about how the plan impacts renters vs. homeowners.
 - i. Maren and Alex shared groups that they were working with such as the ZoNE, churches, Disabilities WA, HBPA, APIC and Mujeres in Action.
 - ii. For Comm. Archer's second question, Maren said that there are accountability measures for both landlords and renters like tenant protections, just cause evictions and exploring affordable housing options that are rentals and not just home ownership.
- d. Commissioner Riley asked a follow up question about affordability.
 - i. Maren said that policies surrounding AMI (Area Median Income) are being developed to ensure affordability at all levels and incomes.
- e. Commissioner Riley asked a question about predatory lending practices.
 - i. Maren said that building partnerships and awareness of that is important for the City to do and incorporating best preventative practices into the plan.
 - ii. Alex also mentioned that addressing these practices were brought up in Council's 1590 housing subcommittee.
- f. Commissioner Peace asked about the potential expiration of the Eviction Moratorium
 - i. CM Wilkerson said there are short term solutions but no permanent fixes to date. Amongst the short-term fixes were:
 - 1. \$5 million from the State Legislature
 - 2. \$84 million from the American Rescue Plan (ARP)
 - 3. Landlord Assistance RFPs
 - ii. Commissioner Archer said that without passage of Just Cause Eviction, it is concerning that landlords can use expiration of the Eviction Moratorium to evict their tenants and sell the property. They mentioned this as a renter.
 - iii. Commissioner Peace asked when ARP funds will be available.
 - 1. CM Wilkerson said that it will be available 60 days after President Biden signs the bill, sometime in May. The City is in the process of setting up a committee including being mindful of the needs of communities of color.
- g. Commissioner Riley asked about regional approach.

- i. CM Wilkerson said there is no regional approach. For example, 1590 was approved only in the City of Spokane and not in the Valley or at the county level.
- ii. Maren said that it is important for the region to work together because of the difference in housing markets and local ordinances.













Housing affordability is an issue for many, and is not felt equally among respondents.

Finding safe and quality housing that is affordable and meets household needs remains a challenge for many.

Homeownership is becoming out-of-reach for many, with many people wanting to buy but challenged by finding a house they can afford.

In-migration and population growth are contributing to housing affordability challenges and low vacancy rates.

COVID-19 has increased housing challenges for many already struggling.

Spokane Housing Experiences and Issues Community Surveys

The City completed two community surveys on housing experiences and issues as part of the Housing Action Plan: one focusing on residents of the City of Spokane and one focusing on people who work in Spokane and live outside the City. The survey was available in 6 languages: English, Spanish, Russian, Arabic, Marshallese, and Vietnamese. The survey was open in November and December, and we received over 1,200 responses. We also completed a survey of housing industry professionals. The following summaries provide an overview of responses.

Draft Displacement Risk Analysis

Displacement can have a life-changing negative effect on households that are directly impacted. It can also disrupt the social fabric and networks of trust and support that existing within a community. For these reasons, understanding potential displacement risks in a community is an important step in assessing housing needs. Displacement refers to instances where a household is forced or pressured to move from their home against their wishes. The Draft Displacement Risk Analysis provides an introduction into looking at what areas and who is at risk for displacement in the City.

Below is a summary of activities I participated in as Chair of the SHRC, as well as additional points of interest:

- Social Media (Facebook)
 - Posted the April 2021 Meeting Recap Video.
 - Posted a chair's statement regarding potential community response to the Derek Chauvin trial verdict via a KXLY interview.
 - Shared the City of Spokane's press release regarding the Civil Rights Officer position, including the Chair's quote and a clarifying note that the Commission hadn't formally endorsed the position.
 - Posted the May 2021 SHRC meeting.
 - Posted the Google Form (developed by Vice Chair Harrison) to collect topics and resources for the Community Resource Guides.
- OCR Exploratory Task Force
 - Met with city leadership to discuss the Civil Rights Officer position.
 - Met with Cupid Alexander several times to further discuss the position and connect him with the Task Force.
 - Facilitated two task force meetings.
- Responded to GSBA's invitation to represent the SHRC in their Civic Engagement Series (it's being rescheduled to a future date).
