Chair's Report

August 1, 2024

Dear Commissioners,

Below is a summary of activities I participated in as Chair of the SHRC, as well as additional points of interest:

Commission Updates

o On 7/15/24 the SHRC Chair had a private meeting with Spokane Neighborhood Action Partners (SNAP) Director of Housing Services, John Hoover. This meeting happened after the SHRC Chair had email SNAP Leadership twice, in which those emails expressed deep concerns after learning from residents & staff of SNAP owned properties about how SNAP was currently operating their low-income apartment buildings. The SHRC Chair 1st reached out to SNAP on 5/20/24 after a resident had reached out to the Chair about SNAP removing AC units from their SNAP owned properties where low-income, disabled & senior people live at. In that email the SHRC Chair relayed the fact of the upcoming City Council's "Heat Health & Safety Ordinance ORD-C36523" which would guarantee a tenant's right to install and use a "portable cooling device" of their choice, provided that its use does not violate building code or damage the premises and follows state and federal law. In the Chair's 2nd email on 6/20/24, which was about SNAP "re-keying" the apartments of a whole building without giving a proper "48-hour Notice to Enter" those units and this then resulted in several residents reaching out to the SHRC Chair to let them know that SNAP had locked them out of their apartments for a night. At the meeting on 7/15/24 with SNAP & the SHRC Chair, in which a meaningful conversation was had by all —

while also passing along to <u>SNAP's Director of Housing Services</u> "handwritten witness-statements from residents" of <u>SNAP owned properties</u>. Also, during this meeting <u>SNAP's Director of Housing Services</u> acknowledged that taking over the property management duties from the last property management company has been challenging for the organization, but they are committed to doing better going forward. Plus, during the meeting, the SHRC Chair & the <u>SNAP Director of Housing Services</u> shared an "**Action-Plan"** together on how to improve the "safety & wellbeing" of those living at <u>SNAP owned properties</u> while also enhancing the "human rights & dignity of our low-income neighbors".

- On 7/18/24 the SHRC Chair was invited & attended a Private-Meeting with <u>City Council Member Paul Dillon</u> at City Hall with other <u>Community-Leaders</u>, in which this meeting was about the <u>enhancement & better funding</u> of the <u>City of Spokane Office of Police Ombuds</u>.
- Held an <u>SHRC Executive Committee Meeting</u> on 7/20/24.
- On 7/22/24 the SHRC Chair testified at the <u>City Council Meeting</u>, regarding the 1st reading of <u>City Council ORD C36549—an ordinance relating to the human rights & basic dignity of individuals experiencing homelessness</u>; amending sections 9.02.050, 18.01.010, 18.01.020, 18.01.030 of the Spokane Municipal Code; and enacting a new Section 18.05.040 of the Spokane Municipal Code. The 2nd reading & vote of this ordinance will be at the 8/15/24 <u>City Council Meeting</u>. This <u>City Council Ordinance</u> is based off of the <u>SHRC RESOLUTION 2023-03--A resolution concerning the human rights and basic dignity of individuals experiencing homelessness</u>, which was passed by the Commission on 10/5/23.
- O City Council Member Zack Zappone (a Spokane Transit Authority (STA)

 Board Member) reached out to the SHRC Chair on 7/23/24, in

 which they relayed the fact that the STA Board had made a

 decision of including NO "official-input" from employees of

 the agency or the public for the hiring of a new CEO for the

 agency. At that point Council Member Zappone let the SHRC

Chair know that a Community-Organization named <u>"Spokane Reimagined"</u> was working on a "Press-Release" and they had asked if the Chair would be willing to write a quote for the "Press-Release" that would be published on 7/24/24, which the SHRC Chair agreed to do that and also sent a very-lengthy-email to the <u>STA Board</u> about the need for Public-Input on the hiring of a <u>CEO</u>. On 7/25/25 during the <u>STA Board Meeting after community & transit stakeholder feedback, the STA will now implement a CEO hiring process with public & employee input.</u>

- The SHRC Chair had a private meeting with a "Homeless Service-Provider" & several "National ACLU Attorneys" on 7/30/24, in which we were informed that legal-readdress over the City's "Sit & Lie Law" will be happening very soon. Since May 2024 the ACLU has made multiple trips to Spokane in order to engage with our Homeless-Neighbors & "Homeless Service-Providers", in order for those attorneys to go forward with legal-readdress for those that have been harmed by being charged with the City's "Sit & Lie Law".
- Regularly communicated with the <u>Mayor's Office</u> last month about the process of filling 1 vacancy on the Commission and the <u>SHRC Executive Committee</u> wishes to thank this new <u>Mayor's Office</u> for their efforts to better collaborate with <u>Commissions & Boards</u> on filling the vacancies that have happened during the last administration.
- SHRC City Council Liaison Councilmember Lili Navarrete & their staff reached out to the SHRC Chair several times during the month, in order to update the Chair about how the City Council plans on addressing SHRC RESOLUTION 2023-03--A resolution concerning the human rights and basic dignity of individuals experiencing homelessness.
- Regularly communicated with the <u>SHRC Executive</u>
 <u>Committee</u> last month about *upcoming agenda items or other Commission issues*.

Then the SHRC added a comment above that which said, "Happy Pride Month, in Spokane, "we all belong!!!". Plus, in the comment section was posted a news story from <u>KREM-TV</u>, about <u>"Washington AG testing hate crime hotline in three counties, including Spokane"</u>.
- o Re-posted a post from <u>"Spokane NAACP"</u>, in which the post was a <u>meme-video about celebrating the Birthday of the Spokane NAACP Vice-President & new SHRC Commissioner Kurtis Robinson</u>. Plus, the SHRC added a comment above that which said, "Wishing SHRC Commissioner Kurtis Robinson a very happy birthday. Thank you for all your hard work and the love that you show our community!!!
- Re-posted a post several times from "<u>City of Spokane Municipal Government"</u>, in which the post was about "<u>Cooling Areas Available"</u> —High temperatures are expected in the region. Those in need of relief from the upcoming heat can visit <u>Spokane Public Library</u> locations or the <u>Trent Resource & Assistance Center (TRAC)</u> or the <u>TRAC Homeless Shelter</u>. For more info.
- Re-posted a post several times from <u>"CoolSpokane"</u>, in which the post was about <u>asking our community to start thinking</u> <u>about volunteering</u>, <u>donating</u>, <u>or hosting a pop-up cooling-</u> <u>stations</u>.
- Re-posted a post from the <u>City of Spokane Mayor's Office</u>, in which the post was about <u>"Mayor Lisa Brown is happy to</u>

- announce Kevin Hall as the new Chief of the City of Spokane Police Department. From public feedback to department personnel, it was clear our community wants a leader who demonstrates character, integrity, & accountability, brings best practices to the department, & is dedicated to the safety of everyone in our community. Chief Hall is that leader and I am grateful that he has agreed to serve in this role". Which the following is the Mayor's press-release.

DRAFT [1st Read] RESOLUTION 24-001

A resolution proposing amendments to SMC 04.10.020 to assist the Spokane Human Rights Commission in the recruitment of applicants for and retention of members in the Youth Representative position.

WHEREAS, the City of Spokane Human Rights Commission (the "Commission") is dedicated to addressing issues related to human rights, unjust discrimination, and program implementation that accounts for the needs of all residents of the City of Spokane ("the City"), and one of its nine members is designated as Youth Representative to further this mission; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's members who have served in the Youth Representative position have provided invaluable insight on human rights matters and have brought fresh perspectives to the Commission's deliberations; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's members who have served in the Youth Representative position have discharged their duties diligently and conscientiously, strengthening the quality of the Commission's work; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has encountered difficulties recruiting applicants for and retaining members in the Youth Representative position in part due to certain requirements in SMC 04.10.020; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's current Youth Representative is, upon information and belief, believed to be the first Youth Representative member who has ever been reappointed to a second term as Youth Representative, in part due to the requirements in SMC 04.10.020; and

WHEREAS, the Commission's incumbent Youth Representative currently serves on the Commission's Executive Committee as Secretary/Treasurer, exemplifies the characteristics set forth in the recitals herein, and the Commission has recommended her reappointment; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has determined that amending SMC 04.10.020 will alleviate certain difficulties the Commission has encountered in recruiting for and retaining members in the Youth Representative position, and also increase continuity and stability in its membership;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Commission hereby recommends amending SMC 04.10.020 in a manner consistent with the proposals set forth in **Exhibit A** hereto.

<u>Title 04</u> — Administrative Agencies and Procedures

<u>Chapter 04.10</u> — **Human Rights Commission**

Section 04.10.020 — Appointment

- A. The commission consists of nine members nominated by the mayor and appointed by the city council to staggered three-year terms commencing on the date of appointment. Membership shall be composed of one (two?) member(s) from residing in each of the council districts. The remaining six positions shall be designated as at-large positions and shall be filled by qualified City residents regardless of the council district in which they reside.
- A.B. In addition to the nine positions set forth in Subsection (A), Two of the six at-large three additional positions may be filled with a Yyouth Representatives, with no more than one Youth Representative residing in each of the council districts. The Yyouth Representative positions shall be open to any person under the age of eighteen with for a term of one year commencing on the date of appointment, with the option of one-year renewalreappointment to additional one-year terms if the person has not reached the age of seventeen eighteen or is enrolled in high school at the time the first-yearprevious term expires.
- B.C. Vacancies <u>for all positions</u> are filled by appointment to unexpired terms, <u>after which the member may be reappointed</u> to a <u>subsequent term</u> in the same manner.
