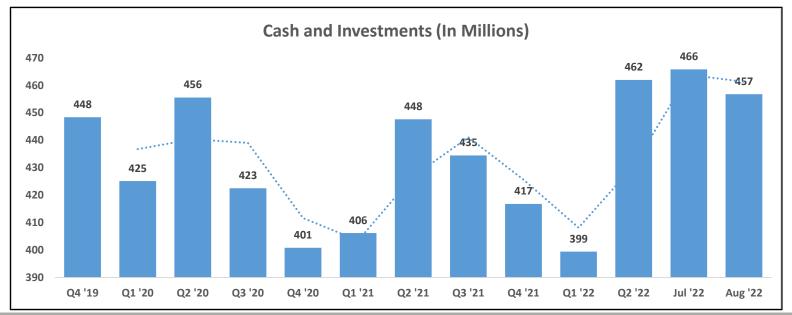

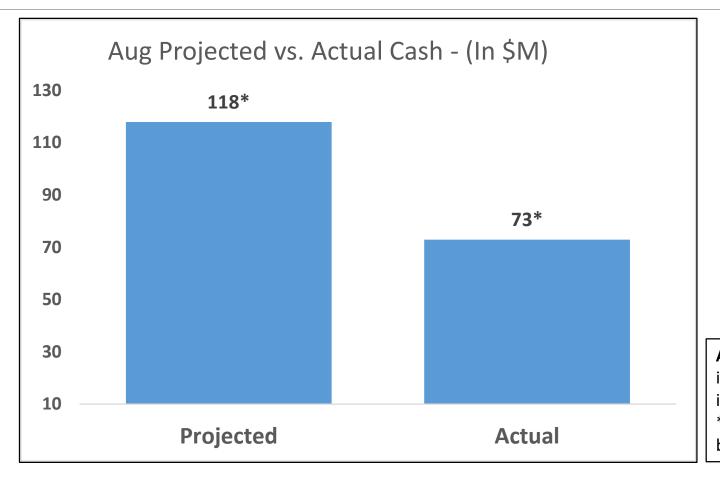

All participating locations provide daily census totals. Each site assesses if building capacity is reached and if so, alternative sites are activated.

#### **Interim SMC 18.05.020 Compliance Plan**

#### City of Spokane

Sept. 7, 2022

#### **BACKGROUND**

In July 2021, the City of Spokane Municipal Code (SMC) was amended by City Council, outlining revised criteria for the provision of temporary shelter spaces (via "safe centers") during various seasonal weather-related events. See <a href="Appendix A">Appendix A</a> for more information about the amendments.

Since January of 2020, eight total activations have occurred, to meet the requirements set out in <u>SMC 18.05.020</u>: (1) a safer air center in September 2020 due to dangerous <u>Air Quality Index (AQI) levels</u> from regional wildfire smoke, (1) a temporary warming center at the Spokane Convention Center December 2021 to January 2022 due to extreme cold and (6) cooling center spaces in July 2021 and July-August 2022 due to high heat.

#### **EXTREME WEATHER SHELTERING CENTERS**

The function of extreme weather sheltering is to provide temporary relief to people who are generally exposed to extreme weather (i.e., unhoused community members) and to people who are vulnerable to the effects of extreme weather (i.e., community members without air conditioning or low-income community members who may not be able to afford to use air conditioning during extreme heat).

#### **COOLING CENTERS**

Cooling centers are generally leveraged to provide a temporary temperature-controlled space to community members during the hottest part of the daytime, during periods of extreme heat. Cooling centers are unique from other year-round or temporary supplemental shelters in that the goal is to provide respite during the hot hours of the daytime. Therefore, public facilities that are already staffed and in operation (e.g., libraries, community centers) are often utilized to provide expanded access to air-conditioned public spaces during daytime hours.

#### SAFER AIR CENTERS

Safe(r) air centers are generally utilized to provide temporary shelter to community members when air quality conditions are unhealthy or hazardous to human health. This need could result from dangerous AQI levels from wildfire smoke, larger

HazMat incidents, volcanic activity (dust and ash) and more. This type of shelter is leveraged when it is determined that the region's existing shelter system does not have capacity (beds), to provide the at-risk population (people experiencing homelessness and people living in non-traditional spaces like RVs) with safer air space. As smoke or other air-conditions don't necessarily dissipate during nighttime hours, the need for safer air centers (whether through expanded capacity in existing shelter system OR the activation of an additional congregate shelter) is a 24/7 operation, until AQI returns to non-harmful levels.

#### **WARMING CENTERS**

Warming centers are employed to provide temporary shelter to community members during extreme cold winter conditions (e.g., snow, ice, very low temperatures). Generally, community members experiencing homelessness represent the primary users of warming centers. Therefore, the existing (homeless) shelter system of a region will pre-identify ways to expand the shelter system capacity to meet seasonal cold weather-related capacity needs (i.e., reduce barriers to entry). Additional temporary shelter spaces are sometimes activated when it is determined that the region's existing shelter system does not have the ability to expand capacity (available beds) safely (i.e., enough operational staff to meet guest needs).

#### **SMC AMENDMENT JULY 2021**

In 2017, the <u>SMC Chapter 18.05</u> was amended to include provisions for activating sheltering spaces (via "safe centers") for community members experiencing homelessness during extreme seasonal weather events.

The purpose of this document is to meet the new (July 2021) requirement set out in SMC 18.05.020 C, wherein the city shall publish and disseminate the city's plan for emergency warming, cooling and safe air centers for the coming year.

#### **CURRENT PLAN**

While the city works to develop a comprehensive plan for meeting the requirements set out in <u>SMC 18.05.020</u>, the city has implemented the plan below.

#### **COOLING CENTERS**

#### **ACTIVATION HISTORY**

- In 2022, cooling center space has been activated on 20 total days over four activation periods in July and August. These were generally during the hottest daytime hours of noon to 8 p.m., at four libraries, including Central, Liberty Park, Shadle Park and Hillyard.
- Overall, there was a 4.8% increase during all activation dates in total library gate count compared to the average during same day of the week in the past two months. Here is a breakdown of the increases by activation:
  - Tuesday, Aug. 30-Friday, Sept. 2 (3.8% increase in total visits compared to the same previous weekdays in July, August during this activation period)
  - Tuesday, July 26-Monday, Aug. 1 (8.6% increase in total visits compared to the same previous weekdays in July during this activation period)
  - Monday, Aug. 8-Wednesday, Aug. 10 (3.3% increase in total visits)
  - Tuesday, Aug. 16-Sunday, Aug. Aug. 21 (3.4% increase in total visits)
- Total capacity across all four libraries is 1,784. At no time during any day was any library near its capacity.
- For all activations, the biggest percentage increase for a single library was at Hillyard at 132% on July 31. The biggest percentage decrease for a single library was at Hillyard at -38.6% on Aug. 21.
- During the four activations, there were 46 total increases in individual library gate counts compared to the same weekday average in the past two months and 24 decreases.

#### **PROCESS IN PLACE**

• Facilities: Currently, the city leverages (city-staffed) four citywide public libraries and downtown park facilities and for cooling center spaces. Additional resources provided to center guests includes bottled water, wi-fi connectivity, access to social services personnel, restrooms and an interactive play area. Information on splash pads, aquatic centers, misters,

- drinking fountains and other ways to cool off was disseminated. In addition, community centers are often open to the public as cooling center space.
- Activation process: A working group consisting of NHHS, Emergency Management, Facilities, Libraries, Fire and security firms collaborated on the National Weather Service weather forecasts and activation. Daily gate reports were provided to the NHHS Division by the Spokane Public Library to gauge attendance. As temperatures were predicted to cool down sooner in the early evenings toward the fall, cooling center hours were modified accordingly, including the last activation.
- Operators/staff: City parks and library staff that are already working in the
  city-owned facility spaces serve as the on-site coordinators for the cooling
  center spaces when activated, supported by community volunteers and
  other city staff who volunteer to support the operations. Starplex provided
  security during the extra hours that the cooling centers stayed open from
  normal library closure hours.
- Public communications: The city communications team puts out public messaging in anticipation of upcoming extreme hot weather, based on National Weather Service (NWS) briefings and related data. In addition, the city publicly shares information about the city activated cooling center spaces and provides information about additional public spaces for cooling such as commerce centers, religiously affiliated facilities, splash pads, aquatic centers, drinking fountains, dangers of heat and the like. Press releases were sent before each activation. Communications channels included:
  - City's Community Update email newsletter
  - CHHS Department newsletter (sent to internal/external stakeholder groups, shelters, etc.)
  - Social media
  - City websites Hazard Sheltering
  - 311/MySpokane
  - Spokane Homeless Coalition
  - 211 state resource system
  - Other government agencies
  - Spokane Public Library

#### ONGOING WORK

 Facilities: As cooling center space is generally offered during daytime hours (finite amount of time), the city will continue to identify city-owned and already staffed facilities to leverage for cooling center space. Northeast Community Center served as a backup in case of overflow.

- Operators/staff: The current process of employing spontaneous community volunteers to support the operation of cooling centers can sometimes prove challenging if volunteers aren't found in a timely fashion. Therefore, the city is working to create a more robust volunteer program. In addition, the city is working to pre-establish formal contracts with external agencies for secured staffing during activations.
- Public communications: The city created a stand-alone webpage on the city website (Hazard Sheltering), wherein all cooling center activation information can be posted in real time, to supplement the regular communication process identified above.
- *Transportation*: The city partnered with Spokane Transit Authority on finding a way to provide transportation to the identified venues for cooling centers.

#### SAFER AIR CENTERS

#### **ACTIVATION HISTORY**

- In 2020, the city activated a safer air center in September 2020. The center was open for six days (9/13/20 9/18/20) at the Spokane Convention Center, seeing an average of 50 guests per day (most guests were the same individuals each day, with the maximum guests peaking around 75 people on one day).
- Three meals per day were provided to guests, volunteers and convention center staff, and donated supplies were also provided for guests (hygiene items, books, clothing, bags, hand sanitizer, individually packaged snacks, etc.)
- Domestic pets were accommodated at the center, and both dogs and cats (caged and leashed) were sheltered during the activation. Too, donated pet food was provided to guests during their stay at the center and provided to guests to take with them post-activation.
- Community service providers (<u>SNAP</u>, <u>CHAS Street Outreach Program</u>, <u>SRHD's Street Medicine Program</u>) were present daily during the activation, working to connect shelter guests to community resources (longer term housing, job resources, medical and public health resources, military veteran resources etc.)
- In 2021, the regional AQI did not reach the threshold for activation of a safer air center (AQI 250)
- In **2022**, the regional AQI has not reached the threshold for activation of a safe air center. Monitoring continues. Departments such as Emergency Management, NHHS and Fire collaborate on possible future activations.

#### **PROCESS IN PLACE**

- Facilities: The Trent Resource and Assistance Center that opened at 4320 E. Trent on Sept. 6 will serve as the safe air center.
- *Operators/staff:* The Guardians Foundation is running the day-to-day operations of the center.
- Food/meal providers: The Guardians is providing three meals per day at the center.
- Public communications: The city communications team puts out public
  messaging as early as possible during poor AQI events based on <u>AirNow</u>
  data. In addition, the city publicly shares information about supplementary
  indoor safer air spaces like community centers, libraries, commerce
  centers, religiously affiliated facilities, and the like.
- **Domestic pet accommodations:** The city is in touch with regional animal care agencies for crate/cage lending and related resource support.

#### **ONGOING WORK**

- **Facilities:** The Trent Resource and Assistance Center, 4320 E. Trent, will continue to undergo improvements to add additional capacity as funding permits. The city continues to explore regional partnerships to identify ways for individuals to escape harsh weather elements.
- *Operators/staff:* The city formalized a contract with the Guardians Foundation this year for the 24/7 staffing needs associated with operating a safer air center.
- Public communications: The city created a stand-alone webpage on the city website (Hazard Sheltering), wherein all safer air center activation information can be posted in real time, to supplement the regular communication process identified above. Communications channels include:
  - City's Community Update email newsletter
  - CHHS Department newsletter (sent to internal/external stakeholder groups, shelters, etc.)
  - Social media
  - City websites Hazard Sheltering
  - 311/MySpokane
  - Spokane Homeless Coalition
  - 211 state resource system
  - Other government agencies
  - Spokane Public Library

Transportation: The city is working to identify ways to work with community
partners such the public transit system and the Guardians Foundation to
provide ways to support transportation to the identified venues for safer air
centers. The city has partnered with Spokane Transit Authority on finding a
way to provide transportation to the identified venues during harsh weather.

#### WARMING CENTERS

#### **ACTIVATION HISTORY**

• During past extreme cold events, the city has worked with the existing regional sheltering system to identify ways to expand capacity (beds) for community members experiencing homelessness. Through a method of activities, such as reducing normal barriers to entry at shelters, the city has been able to maintain capacity for the community experiencing homelessness during extreme cold events. The addition of the Trent Resource and Assistance Center that opened on Sept. 6, 2022, will be a significant addition the existing sheltering system. A temporary warming center was activated at the Spokane Convention Center for 15 days from Dec. 26, 2021 to Jan. 9, 2022. It was staffed by the Guardians Foundation and utilized a partnership with the Public Facilities District. Peak usage of the temporary shelter ranged from 103 to 343 guests between 2 and 6 a.m. The Guardians served more than 9,000 meals. Guests were tested voluntarily on three separate days for COVID, all with negative results.

#### **PROCESS IN PLACE**

Facilities: The Trent Resource and Assistance Center that opened at 4320 E. Trent on Sept. 6, 2022, will complement the existing shelter system as a warming center. This is a significant addition to the sheltering system. Initial capacity is expected to be 150 individuals with separate spaces for men, women, couples, employed and LGBTQ+. Additional areas can be added based upon need. Capacity will grow to at least 250 over time. In recent previous years, the city previously leveraged the existing shelter system, to expand capacity temporarily during extreme cold weather events through the following actions: (a) gain approval from City Council for the Guardians Foundation 24/7 access facility contract starting 10/1/21, (b) extend and maintain contract with Truth Ministries through 6/30/21, (c) increase services at Hope House (Volunteers of America), (d) open the Way Out Facility (Salvation Army) for 90-days with continuous stay housing in

- November 2021, (e) work with regional partners to bring the <u>Volunteers of America Young Adult Shelter online</u> ASAP.
- Operators/staff: The Guardians oversees day-to-day operations of the Trent Resource and Assistance Center. In addition, by also leveraging the existing shelter system, there is limited need for contracting with additional operators/staff.
- **Food/meal providers:** By leveraging the existing shelter system, there is no need for contracting with additional meal providers.
- Public communications: The city communications team puts out public
  messaging in anticipation of upcoming extreme cold weather, based on
  National Weather Service (NWS) briefings and related data. In addition, the
  city publicly shares information about expanded capacity in the existing
  shelter system and provides information about additional public spaces for
  warming like libraries, community centers, commerce centers, religiously
  affiliated facilities, and the like. Communications channels include:
  - City's Community Update email newsletter
  - CHHS Department newsletter (sent to internal/external stakeholder groups, shelters, etc.)
  - Social media
  - City websites Hazard Sheltering
  - 311/MySpokane
  - Spokane Homeless Coalition
  - 211 state resource system
  - Other government agencies
  - Spokane Public Library
- **Domestic pet accommodations:** The city is in touch with regional animal care agencies for crate/cage lending and related resource support.

#### **ONGOING WORK**

- Facilities: The city is working to identify venues that are willing to enter preevent contracts with the city, for this need. Establishing contracts with one
  or more venues ahead of cold weather events eases the burden on city staff
  who often face just-in-time challenges identifying available venues.
- Operators/staff: The city is working to formalize the contract with the staffing agency, for the 24/7 staffing needs associated with operating a warming center.
- Public communications: The city intends to create a standalone webpage
  on the city website, wherein all warming center activation information can
  be posted in real time, to supplement the regular communication process
  identified above.

• Transportation: The city is working to identify ways to work with community partners like the public transit system to provide ways to support transportation to the identified venues for warming centers. The city has partnered with Spokane Transit Authority on finding a way to provide transportation to the identified venues during harsh weather.

#### **ADDITIONAL PLANNING IN PLACE**

In addition to the current planning listed above, the city has also completed the following pre-event planning:

- Formalized "trigger" events/thresholds, to guide shared planning steps for each type of potential extreme weather event (i.e., high temperatures, very low temperatures, and air quality index values)
- Identified a pod/container leasing entity, for the storage of personal belongings of guests for standalone center activations
- Developed "roles and responsibilities" for city leadership and staff, as it pertains to activations for congregate standalone centers
- Developed "roles and responsibilities" tool for volunteers
- Established a process for post-activation assessments, using after-action reports and improvement plans
- Outlined considerations for access and functional needs considerations for congregate standalone center activations
- Created a process for executive leadership briefings during congregate standalone center activations
- Created a process for notification of external support partners during activations, such as healthcare facilities, medical transport partners, public health partners, community resource partners, and english second language support agencies

#### APPENDIX A: SPOKANE MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 18.05

Content that was amended in July 2021 is bolded below; non-bolded font represents content that remained the same.

- City Council finds that the City must approach the emergency weather sheltering issue with the foresight, increased resources, and prior planning which is a characteristic of prepared and resilient cities around the world, so that Spokane is ready at all times to handle the types of conditions that require the provision of emergency shelter for all people in Spokane who need it, including securing written agreements with private and government entities to provide additional shelter on short notice (18.05.010 E)
- City Council finds that providing protection to Spokane residents from extreme heat, cold and unsafe air is an essential government function (18.05.010 F)
- Warming centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals seeking shelter in Spokane will be activated on each day during which the temperature is predicted by the National Weather Service to be 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower and designated low-barrier shelter space was at ninety percent (90%) capacity or greater during the previous night. The warming centers will operate at a minimum during the hours that temperatures are lower than thirty-two (32) degrees Fahrenheit. The City may, by contract with its center provider(s), raise the activation temperature for warming centers, but in no event will the activation temperature be lower than thirty-two (32) degrees Fahrenheit. (18.05.020 A1)
- Cooling centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals seeking cooling shelter within the City and sheltered individuals who lack air conditioning will be activated when the temperature is predicted by the National Weather Service to be 95 degrees Fahrenheit or higher for two consecutive days or more. The cooling centers will be operated at a minimum during all hours when the temperature is 95 degrees Fahrenheit or higher. The City may, by contract with its center provider(s) extend the hours of operation and/or lower the activation temperature for cooling centers. (18.05.020 A2)
- Safe air centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals seeking safe air shelter within the City will be activated for the entire day on which the Spokane Regional Clean Air Agency forecasts the current air quality index to reach 250 or higher. (18.05.020 A3)

- Emergency centers may also be activated by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee on any day in which a civil emergency or extreme storm or weather condition exists or is predicted to occur and which, in the determination of the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, poses a severe threat to the health or safety of unsheltered homeless individuals and families in the City of Spokane. (18.05.020 A4)
- The Community Health and Human Services ("CHHS") Department shall implement the appropriate policies and procedures, including without limitation making funding requests; recommendations regarding center providers; the designation of specific locations to be used as warming, cooling, and safe air centers; ((and)) the arrangement of other appropriate measures to the City Council in order to carry out the specific provisions and intent of this section; and shall continuously maintain contracts and/or appropriate non-monetary agreements scalable to the need for emergency warming, cooling and safe air center provider services, with no lapse in coverage at any point in time throughout each year, regardless of whether the services are provided under contract or by city staff. (18.05.020 B)
- No later than September 30 of each year, and annually thereafter, the City shall publish and disseminate the City's plan for emergency warming, cooling and safe air centers for the coming year, which shall provide details of the name(s) and location(s) of center providers and similar resources, the capacity and scalability of all emergency centers, by type and population(s) focus (if any), activation criteria, cost, funding source(s), partnerships and the communications and publicity plan to ensure that people experiencing homelessness will know where they can obtain these services. (18.05.020 C)

ORDINANCE NO.	C

An ordinance improving the standards for the City's efforts to help unhoused and vulnerable people; amending section 18.05.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, homelessness continues to be an issue of public concern in Spokane; and

**WHEREAS,** at the same time, Spokane is in the midst of a severe shortage of available housing for all people, at all income levels, and this shortage is a crisis for those who need shelter and related services in Spokane; and

**WHEREAS,** these crises, which persist even during normal weather conditions, are exacerbated whenever Spokane faces extreme conditions, such as smoke from wildfires which make the air unsafe to breathe; and

**WHEREAS,** wildfire smoke has been on a consistent rise in the past two decades, with Spokane averaging eight "unhealthy" days per year; and

**WHEREAS**, an air quality index of 150 is considered "unhealthy" for all people per the Environmental Protection Agency; and

**WHEREAS**, the City of Spokane recognizes the dangers to public health and safety caused by wildfire smoke and closes all aquatic and outdoor recreation programs once the air quality index reaches 150; and

**WHEREAS**, in order to protect unhoused individuals who are at a greater risk of health concerns from wildfire smoke, the City of Spokane must activate Safe Air Centers; and

**WHEREAS**, per section 18.05.020(A)(3) of the Spokane Municipal Code, the City of Spokane opens Safe Air Centers when the air quality index reaches 250; and

**WHEREAS**, the dangers to public health and safety are apparent at an air quality index of 150; and

**WHEREAS**, all of these facts establish that there exists in Spokane emergency conditions which present a threat to the public health and safety, and which require that this ordinance be made effective immediately pursuant to Section 19(A) of the City Charter.

**NOW THEREFORE**, the City of Spokane does ordain:

**Section 1.** That section 18.05.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

#### Section 18.05.020 Activation Criteria

- A. The activation criteria for inclement weather centers beyond existing homeless shelter capacity in the City of Spokane are as follows:
  - 1. Warming centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals and other vulnerable individuals seeking shelter in Spokane will be activated on each day during which the

temperature is predicted by the National Weather Service to be 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower and designated low-barrier shelter space was at ninety percent (90%) capacity or greater during the previous night. The warming centers will operate at a minimum during the hours that temperatures are lower than thirty-two (32) degrees Fahrenheit. The City may, by contract with its center provider(s), raise the activation temperature for warming centers, but in no event will the activation temperature be lower than thirty-two (32) degrees Fahrenheit.

- 2. Cooling centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals and other vulnerable individuals seeking cooling shelter within the City will be activated when the temperature is predicted by the National Weather Service to be 95 (ninety-five) degrees Fahrenheit or higher for two (2) consecutive days or more. The cooling centers will be operated at a minimum during all hours when the temperature is 95 (ninety-five) degrees Fahrenheit or higher. The City may, by contract with its center provider(s) extend the hours of operation and/or lower the activation temperature for cooling centers. The City should seek out a network of cooling center locations throughout the City at schools, libraries, churches and community centers and encourage other municipal governments to join in providing a regional cooling center network.
- 3. Safe air centers sufficient to meet the shelter needs of currently unsheltered homeless individuals and other vulnerable individuals seeking safe air shelter within the City will be activated for the entire day and evening on which the Spokane Regional Clean Air Agency forecasts the current air quality index to reach ((250)) 150 or higher.
- 4. Emergency centers may also be activated by the Mayor or the Mayor's designee on any day in which a civil emergency or extreme storm or weather condition exists or is predicted to occur and which, in the determination of the Mayor or the Mayor's designee, poses a severe threat to the health or safety of vulnerable and unsheltered homeless individuals and families in the City of Spokane.
- B. The Community Health and Human Services ("CHHS") Department shall implement the appropriate policies and procedures, including without limitation making funding requests; recommendations regarding center providers; the designation of specific locations to be used as warming, cooling, and safe air centers; the arrangement of other appropriate measures to the City Council in order to carry out the specific provisions and intent of this section; and shall continuously maintain contracts and/or appropriate non-monetary agreements scalable to the need for emergency warming, cooling and safe air center provider services, with no lapse in coverage at any point in time throughout each year, regardless of whether the services are provided under contract, by interlocal agreement or by city staff.
- C. No later than September 30 of each year, and annually thereafter, the City shall publish and disseminate the City's plan for emergency warming, cooling and safe

air centers for the coming year, which shall provide details of the name(s) and location(s) of center providers and similar resources, the capacity and scalability of all emergency centers, by type and population(s) focus (if any), activation criteria, cost, funding source(s), partnerships and the communications and publicity plan to ensure that people who are vulnerable or are experiencing homelessness will know where they can obtain these services.

**Section 2.** That the City Council declares that an urgency and emergency exists such that this ordinance is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions, and that because of such need, this ordinance shall be effective immediately, under Section 19 of the City Charter, upon the affirmative vote of one more than a majority of the City Council.

ORDINANCE NO.	C-
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AN ORDINANCE relating to Recidivism Reduction, Community Safety, and Victim Justice; amending Sections 05A.18.020 Article VI of Title 05A.18 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

Whereas, protecting the health, safety and lives of its residents is the primary purpose of city government; and

Whereas, Spokane's Community Court has been recognized by the Center for Court Innovation as a model for successful problem-solving courts; and that participants are able to access services that include case management, substance abuse treatment, mental health care and housing referrals; and

Whereas, Spokane's Community Court does not penalize homelessness, but rather serves as a mechanism for assisting unsheltered persons to access and engage in the services and programming that assist individuals in exiting homelessness and through diversion, allows participants the opportunity to change their trajectory without a criminal conviction; and

**NOW**, **THEREFORE**, the City of Spokane does ordain:

**Section 1.** That 05A.18.020 <u>Section 05A.18.020</u> Therapeutic Court Established

- A. Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a Community Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the community court core team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation, except for the following requirements:.
  - a. No defendant shall be referred to community court more than once in an 8 month period nor more than 3 times in a 36 month period
- B. Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a Veterans Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the Veterans Court Core Team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation.

Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a DUI Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby

codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the DUI Court core team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Washington Traffic Safety Commission.

### **CWDG Grant Request Briefing September Finance Committee**

As a result of the Council budget and legislative support in 2022 for wildland fire risk reduction efforts, the Fire Department (SFD) has hired Nick Jeffries as the City's first Wildland Fire Planner. Mr. Jefferies started on August 1, 2022, and his focus is to mitigate the community's risk from wildland fire through planning and fuel mitigation practices.

The SFD requests permission to apply for this grant opportunity. This brief explains what, why, and how the SFD can implement wildland fire fuels mitigation practices on City and privately-owned properties, specifically forested grounds at a higher risk for wildland fires. The foremost step can be accomplished by Grant funding that we are applying for and City matching funds (25% of the grant award).

The Community Wildfire Defense Grant is a Federal Program designed to assist at-risk local communities with planning for and mitigating the risk created by wildfire. The grant pays for thinning, pruning, and disposal by chipping, masticating, or burning small diameter trees under 8 inches at chest height, commonly known as Fuels Reduction. Thinning accomplishes two primary objectives. First, it reduces the risk of catastrophic wildfires by reducing fuel to burn. Second, it increases forest health and resilience against insect attacks. Both challenges exist in abundance in our community.

The grant goals follow the cohesive wildland management strategy to restore and maintain landscapes, making them resilient to fire-related disturbances. In addition, creating "Fire Adapted Communities" will make human populations and infrastructure more resilient to wildfire. This grant will also improve wildfire response by making and implementing safe and effective risk-based management decisions.

SFD needs \$750,000 in grant funding for fuel mitigation to accomplish the first two primary objectives in the highest-risk areas. This grant requires a 25% match. As a result, the SFD requests that \$187,500 be committed during the next two years to match the Federal contribution. The grant will expire in five years; however, if the funding is readily available, we could put full implementation of the budgeted ground into a contract well before it expires in the fifth year.

If the grant and the City's contribution are approved, we will target approximately 470 acres of high-risk vegetation in the next five years. The project will require \$937,500.00 total (grant + city funding), at a maximum cost of \$2000 per acre (this amount is the highest cost per acre for planning purposes), which will treat a minimum of 470 acres for fuel reduction. A rough calculation of the City of Spokane-owned forested ground is approximately 1850 acres and over 2000 acres of private property.

These funds will be assigned to fuel reduction contracts completed addressing City properties in critical need of action. In addition, a nationwide project designed with the Federal, State, and local agencies using Intterra (geographic information system) will track the location, size, and type of treatment in real-time, allowing partners to track progress and assist in tactical decisions during emergencies such as the recent fire in Palisades Park.
