

Incident 2022-20012711 took place on January 24, 2022, in the area of 2400 E. Desmet. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) completed the criminal investigation. The Spokane County Prosecutor's Office completed their review and found the shooting to be justified. The Administrative Investigation is complete and will be scheduled for a Deadly Force Review Board.

Incident 2022-20134271 (Pending Criminal Investigation)

2022-20134271 took place on August 3, 2022, in the area of 2nd and Sheridan. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) is conducting the criminal investigation.

Incident 2022-20156670 (Pending Criminal Investigation)

2022-20156670 took place on September 4, 2022, in the area of 2900 E. Wabash Avenue. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) is conducting the criminal investigation.

Incident 2022-20184192 (Pending Criminal Investigation)

2022-20184192 took place on October 16, 2022, in the area of 100 S Cedar. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) is conducting the criminal investigation.

Incident 2022-20214924 (Pending Prosecutor Review)

Suspect Arrested for Multiple Downtown Robberies

In the early morning hours of 04-07-23, a downtown business in the zero-hundred block of North Post Street was burglarized when a lone suspect broke a door lock and gained access to the building. Once inside, the suspect noticed a security camera and attempted to disable it. The suspect then proceeded to steal items with a value approaching ten-thousand dollars. Among the items stolen was a credit card, which the suspect promptly began to use at various Spokane businesses.

Downtown officers began investigating, and based on the available information, probable cause was established to arrest 43-year-old Marckus T. Beattiger for the burglary and associated crimes. On 04-24-23, Downtown patrol officers recognized Beattiger and took him into custody.

Beattiger was booked into Spokane County Jail for Burglary 2nd degree as well as theft and malicious mischief. Investigations into multiple burglary incidents are on-going, and additional charges are possible.

Additional investigative efforts linked Beattiger to another burglary of a Downtown business which occurred on 03-15-2023. Officers have forwarded charges of burglary, theft, and malicious mischief to the Prosecutor's Office related to that incident.

Beattiger has a criminal history which includes 8 felony convictions, three of which are for burglary.

12-year-old Arrested After Social Media Threats

In the afternoon of 04-18-23, SPD responded to Yasuhara Middle School (2701 N Perry St) regarding a threat call. School staff learned a juvenile had threatened another student via social media. The threat included a depiction of a firearm and text indicating the suspect's intent to harm a specific student.

School staff immediately worked to protect the school by placing the building in lockdown and notifying SPD. Officers arrived and ensured the victim was safe, and began conducting the investigation. Based on the evidence available, officers established probable cause to arrest a 12-year-old male for felony harassment (threats to kill) and threats to bomb or injure property (for classification, this is a legal statute that includes a variety of threat types, not just bomb threats).

Officers went to the suspect's residence where a parent was contacted and the suspect was taken into custody without incident. The juvenile was booked into Spokane County Juvenile Detention on the aforementioned charges.

SPD is committed to working with our partners to ensure schools remain safe and secure for students. Classmates, school staff, and parents often provide crucial information which allows SPD to investigate threatening behavior, protect students, and hold those responsible for making the threats accountable.



Sector Updates

Charlie Sector Community Outreach – Roll Call with a Cop

South Precinct Captain Matt Cowles held an outreach event in the East Central Neighborhood, in partnership with Fresh Soul, Spokane Eastside Reunion Association (SERA), and Greater Spokane Substance Abuse Coalition. The "Roll Call with a Cop" event allowed East Central residents and businesses to meet officers assigned to their sector and enjoy delicious food from Fresh Soul, with the cost donated by GSSAC. The event took place on April 21, 2023, with Mid-Shift roll call.



David Sector Crime Prevention Mission Vehicle Prowling Incidents are Down Last year, the Downtown sector was absolutely inundated with vehicle prowling incidents. So far this year they have dropped significantly due in large part to officers' hard work and visibility. January, February, and March were much lower than the corresponding months in 2022.



SPD Chaplaincy Update



Chaplains are known for responding for DOA and critical incident calls; Chaplains responded to 661 calls for service in 2022, donating 8643 hours. Chaplains support SPD employees and their families in many other ways. The Chaplains like to visit various SPD departments. Recently, they brought baby goats to Dispatch.

In April, the Chaplains held a painting event for employees and their families. They also brought retired officers together for pizza.

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The Chaplains and Lieutenant Bart Stevens met with Quilts for Cops, a group that makes quilts for officers who have been injured in the line of duty. They donated several quilts to our officers.



Behavioral Health Unit Update

During April 2023, the Behavioral Health Unit responded to 503 calls that would be routed to patrol. 328 of those were grant contacts. 75% of contacts had an outcome other than jail or the hospital. 20% were emergently detained. 2% were arrested. No contacts involved a use of force beyond handcuffing.

Lifesaving Awards

The first Lifesaving Award medals were awarded to Officers Jared Meyer, Justin Druitt, and Corey Miller.



Officers Meyer, Druitt and Miller arrived on scene where they found the victim who was bleeding heavily from a gunshot wound to her left leg and was in and out of consciousness. They immediately recognized the severity of the injury and put on two tourniquets. Due to the large amount of blood on the floor, clothing and skin, it was not initially apparent just how effective they were. Very shortly after that, medics arrived and transported the victim to the hospital.

At the hospital, her condition was identified as life-threatening due to the large amount of blood loss, and it was discovered that there was an entry wound on the upper thigh and an exit wound on the lower leg. While in the trauma room I watched as the doctor started to loosen one of the tourniquets. As he started to loosen it, blood began rapidly squirting out of the lower exit wound, indicating that a major artery had been damaged. The doctor quickly reapplied the tourniquet stopping the blood flow.



Dr. Mueller, the ER doctor, said applying the tourniquets "100% saved her life." The correct application of the tourniquets allowed her to arrive at the hospital with a fighting chance and gave hospital staff the opportunity to save her life. He said he had to give her a rapid transfusion because she had lost so much blood. If not for the rapid and quick actions of the officers putting on not one but two tourniquets, that the victim would have died from blood loss before getting in the ambulance. Their actions bought her the time and opportunity to get to the hospital where she could receive further care.

The second award was awarded to Officer Jackson Henry.



Officer Henry was writing his reports and having lunch when he heard a medical call a short distance from his location. He is not trained as a medic; however, his dedication, character, and calling as a Police Officer made it such that he could not look the other way. He responded to the medical call without request. What he found was a female in shock on the phone with 911. The female opened the door to her residence and pointed to a bedroom. Officer Henry found a 54-year-old male lying on his stomach on the

floor. After turning the male over, he saw he was blue in the face, his arms were red and, above all, he was not breathing. Knowing the female was in shock, Officer Henry began giving her directions to go outside and direct fire personnel into the location. At the same time, he began chest compressions on the patient. After one minute, the male began breathing on his own; however, his breathing was extremely labored. He paused his chest compressions just as medics walked into the room.

Fire Lt. Knapp assessed the scene and saw the patient was in agonal breathing and advised Officer Henry to continue chest compressions as medics set up their equipment. Once medics were set, they took over chest compressions with advanced life support. Medics continued advanced life support for approximately 30 minutes before stabilizing the patient for transport.

Lt. Knapp stated Officer Henry's actions demonstrated a high level of initiative when he recognized he was the closest resource to a citizen in cardiac arrest and self-dispatched to arrive before any EMS. When Lt. Knapp arrived on the scene, he saw Officer Henry "had the patient on the floor and was performing excellent quality chest compressions." After EMS's arrival, he continued to use Officer Henry as a member of the cardiac arrest "pit crew," freeing up the rest of the crew to perform additional life-saving tasks. He felt "Officer Henry's actions directly contributed to a positive outcome for this patient."

The 911 distress call was made at 11:41 am. Officer Henry was on scene and beginning CPR at about 11:46 am. The patient had been down for about 5 minutes. For every minute a patient is down, their chance of survival decreases by 10%. At the time of Officer Henry's arrival, the patient lost 50% chance of survival. Officer Henry began CPR one minute prior to medics arriving on scene and then continued CPR as medics set up advanced lifesaving equipment for over another minute before Advanced Life Support took over. In such emergencies, seconds count. The patient was blue in the face with no respiration when Officer Henry found him and began CPR. Officer Henry's selfless decision of setting his lunch aside, going to his car, driving to the location, and entering the residence on his own, gave a cardiac patient an added 10% chance of survival. Another 10% was added as he continued CPR while medics set up to take over ALS, precious time

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for a patient in cardiac arrest. This small amount of time allowed Advanced Life Support medical responders the time they needed to continue what he started to save the patient. Lt. Knapp advised the patient spent 3 days in the hospital before being discharged. He is scheduled for a defibrillator and is expected to make a full recovery.

The third award went to Officer Xenon Berkeley.



Spokane Fire Chief Brian Schaeffer sent an email commending Officer Xenon Berkeley for his off-duty response to an individual suffering from what would have been a life-ending heart attack had it not been for his efforts. At Gonzaga University event, Chief Schaeffer was one of the paramedics who responded to the call only to discover that Officer Berkeley had successfully performed CPR and used an AED to great success.

In his letter to the Department, Chief Schaeffer said, "When I arrived, the victim was lying supine in the walkway, and Officer Berkeley cared for him. Despite being off duty, the officer remained with the patient and passed the pre-arrival

information to our responders. Officer Berkeley executed CPR, utilized an AED, and managed the devices' defibrillation when recommended, and his performance was outstanding."

In addition to being a Police Officer, Officer Berkeley still maintains his EMT credentials and will periodically volunteer as an EMT for AMR or the Deer Park Ambulance service. Officer Berkeley is very passionate about serving his community whether as a Spokane Police Officer or as an EMT. There is no doubt in anyone's mind that without decisive intervention by Officer Berkeley this individual would have succumbed to his heart attack.

Crisis Assistance Program

The Crisis Assistance Program, made possible by Spokane Police Foundation, allowed officers to make an impact on their community.

CRISIS ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

#1: 88 year old Korean War Veteran, USMC, had vehicle stolen and later recovered by SPD. Could not afford the few hundred dollars to pay a locksmith to have a new key made. SPF immediately stepped in to cover the cost. \$239.00

#2: Family with financial hardships was identified. Les Schwab donated & put new tires on their vehicle. Community Outreach used the Crisis Assistance Program to fill the gas tank before the family got their vehicle back.

#3: 7 year old was victim to strong armed robbery and had her bicycle stolen. Officer replaced the bicycle using the Crisis Assistance Program. \$85.02



#4: Family fell victim, along with others, to local burglars. They woke to find their bicycle and attached child trailer missing. Although the suspect was arrested, the bike and trailer were not located. Using the Crisis Assistance Program, officers surprised the family with a new bike and trailer. \$653.41 (thanks to the Bike Hub providing a discount) – video on Spokane Police Foundation's website of surprising the family with the bike

#5: Provided safe place to stay and food for a family displaced due to a crime. \$389.58

#6: Provided a safe place to stay for an elderly couple displaced due to a homicide having occurred at their residence. \$165.42

#7: Victim had no money, clothing, food or shelter due to being displaced from her home due to safety concerns. Officer was able to get her a safe place for the night. \$131.79

A total of 173.47 hours over the following dates were worked in 2022 using this fund. 121 total tickets were issued and 153 total warnings were given - all focused on the north Division corridor. Please note that there were 40+ drive-offs as well that would likely have resulted in enforcement activity.

In 2022 we used a total of \$15,501.04 of the allotted funding. Total allocated per the SBO was \$42k so we only used about 37% of the funds. Please note that we did not start the emphasis until mid-July and that we are expanding for use beyond the North Division corridor speed issue. This request is to use overtime funds for additional DUI, speed and other traffic enforcement in other Precincts/areas as well.

I don't believe an MOU is necessary for reporting, as we can send monthly stats to be included in the PSCHC meeting reports on the use of this fund if you like.






Highlights:

- IR 23-11: A community member was concerned about the police policy involving domestic violence and wondered if it was biased against men being the victim: SPD / IA





Deployments By Week











RESOLUTION NO. 2023-____

A Resolution relating to improving livability in the Logan Neighborhood near the City's Water Department and recognizing the new middle school use adjacent to this site.

WHEREAS, the City's Water Department is located at 914 E. North Foothills Drive in the Logan Neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, the Water Department has owned and operated out of this site since at least 1900; and

WHEREAS, in 2019, the City of Spokane and Spokane Public Schools entered into a partnership agreement to deliver new and renovated public school facilities, library facilities and recreational facilities; and

WHEREAS, that partnership included the transfer of property on the east side of the Water Department site to SPS for a new middle school; and

WHEREAS, meanwhile, in a similar time frame, the City also sold another portion of the Water Department site at the northeast corner of North Foothills Drive and Nevada Street to Catholic Charities for the construction of 72 units of affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, the sale of this property also required the construction of a new employee parking area on another portion of the site; and

WHEREAS, combined, these changes led to the relocation of dirt stockpiles—from repairs done on the water system—to a location along Marietta that is more visible than before; and

WHEREAS, employees haul this material to the site to be screened and reused on future repairs; and

WHEREAS, some work occurs in late night or early morning hours because it often stems from the need for emergency work to repair main breaks; and

WHEREAS, Logan neighborhood residents have experienced the negative impacts that have come from these relocated operations, including noise, dust, and aesthetic issues and have shared these concerns with Council Members; and

WHEREAS, lack of pedestrian facilities connected to City-owned property in the neighborhood have furthered neighbor frustrations with the site; and

WHEREAS, the Logan neighborhood is located in an area of Spokane which has been subject to historical under-investment; and

WHEREAS, the current site of these activities is inconsistent with the revitalized nature of this area that has resulted from the new school and new housing; and

WHEREAS, with its support of new uses in this area, the City Council intended to improve the livability and desirability of this location and improve equity in the Logan neighborhood.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City of Spokane intends to move the dirt stockpiles and related screening operations from the Water Department site out of this neighborhood.

BE IT ALSO RESOLVED City Council is requesting that by September 1, 2023, the Public Works Department suggest an alternative location where these operations could more reasonably exist and a plan to address the lack of a sidewalk on Marietta adjacent to Water Department property and as well as any additional mitigations necessary for the neighborhood.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council is committed to engaging with any neighborhood across the City to ensure municipal operations have limited negative impacts.

ORDINANCE NO _____

An ordinance establishing the Spokane Opioid Abatement Council and defining its composition, powers and duties; adopting a new chapter 04.39 to Title 04 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, as part of a class action settlement of opioid related claims, the City of Spokane is a Participating Local Government pursuant to the One Washington Memorandum of Understanding (hereafter the "WA MOU") with municipalities and counties within the State of Washington; and

WHEREAS, local jurisdictions in Spokane County, including the City of Spokane, Spokane County, the City of Cheney, the City of Spokane Valley, and the City of Liberty Lake are all "Participating Local Governments" pursuant to the WA MOU (hereinafter collectively referred to as "Participating Local Governments"); and

WHEREAS, all of Participating Local Governments are also participants in the "Allocation Agreement Governing the Allocation of Funds Paid by the Settling Opioid Distributors in Washington State" (hereafter "Allocation Agreement"); which funds from the settlement have been distributed directly to the Participating Local Governments commencing in 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Participating Local Governments further anticipate receipt of additional funds resulting from settlements with opioid pharmaceutical supply chain participants pursuant to the WA MOU (collectively referred to herein as "Opioid Funds") as well as future settlements as defined in the One WA MOU; and

WHEREAS, it expected that the City of Spokane and Participating Local Governments will receive Opioid Funds until at least the year 2038; and

WHEREAS, the terms of the WA MOU and Allocation Agreement, and related documents, require the Participating Local Governments to establish, together or independently, local opioid abatement council(s) to ensure that Opioid Funds are expended in the manner provided for in the WA MOU and Allocation Agreement, and related documents; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the One WA MOU and Allocation Agreement, local opioid abatement councils must be comprised of individuals with experience pertaining opioid treatment, prevention and/or training .

WHEREAS, the City of Spokane desires to establish its own opioid abatement council to oversee expenditures of its Opioid Funds, and further desires its opioid abatement council to collaborate with other similar opioid abatement councils in Spokane County and Eastern Washington to share administrative and programming costs, where appropriate, but to maintain the autonomy of the City of Spokane with respect to its Opioid Funds allocation.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. There is enacted a new chapter 04.39 to Title 04 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Chapter 04.39	Opioid Abatement Council
04.39.010	Establishment and Purpose
04.39.020	Definitions
04.39.030	Membership
04.39.040	Officers
04.39.050	Administration and Support
04.39.060	Interlocal Agreements

04.39.010 Establishment and Purpose.

There is created the Spokane Opioid Abatement Council (SOAC) to oversee expenditures of Opioid Funds received by the City of Spokane from opioid litigation consistent with the terms and conditions set forth in the applicable settlement documents, including specifically the following oversight functions:

- A. To identify potential vendors and programs eligible for funding under the Settlement Agreements;
- B. To recommend to the city council and the Mayor the development and funding of opioid treatment, prevention and training programs to serve the City of Spokane consistent with the Settlement Agreements;
- C. With city council approval, to contract with vendors and program providers to provide opioid treatment, prevention and training programs in the City of Spokane;
- D. To report annually to the Mayor and the City Council on all expenditures of Opioid Funds;
- E. To recommend to the city council and the mayor opportunities for pooling of settlement funds with other participating jurisdictions to maximize the

effectiveness and efficiency of regional opioid treatment, prevention and training opportunities; and

F. To enjoy such powers, and to perform such other functions, as are generally assigned to opioid abatement councils established pursuant to the Settlement Documents.

04.39.020 Definitions

- A. "Allocation Agreement" refers to that "Allocation Agreement Governing the Allocation of Funds Paid by the Settling Opioid Distributors in Washington State" executed by the City of Spokane on or about September 2, 2022.
- B. "One WA MOU" refers to that One WA Memorandum of Understanding executed by the City of Spokane on or about March 30, 2022.
- C. "Opioid Funds" refers to all funds payable to the City of Spokane under the Settlement Documents.
- D. "Participating Local Governments" refers to those jurisdictions in Eastern Washington that are signatories to the Settlement Documents, including, but not limited to, Spokane County, Stevens County, the City of Cheney, the City of Spokane Valley, and the City of Liberty Lake.
- E. "Regional Councils" refers to other opioid abatement councils established pursuant to the Settlement Documents.
- F. "Settlement Documents" refers to collectively the One WA MOU, the Allocation Agreement, and all such other opioid settlement agreements or instruments to which the City is a party and which govern use of the Opioid Funds.
- G. "SOAC" refers to the Spokane Opioid Abatement Council established pursuant to this title.
- 04.39.030 Membership and Meetings.
 - A. <u>Membership</u>. The SOAC shall consist of five (5) members, appointed by the Mayor with the approval of the city council. At least three members must be employed in the behavioral health and/or addiction field and residents of the City of Spokane. Two members may be nonresidents of the City of Spokane

so long as each has recognized expertise in opioid treatment, prevention and/or training.

- B. <u>Terms</u>. Members of the SOAC shall be appointed to five (5) year terms, and may be renewed for up to two (2) successive terms. No member shall serve more than three terms.
- C. <u>Compensation</u>. Members of the SOAC shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses incurred in the course of business on behalf of the SOAC, including travel expenses.
- D. <u>Frequency of Meetings</u>. The SOAC shall meet no fewer than four times in any calendar year, and shall meet more frequently as may be necessary to complete its functions under the Settlement Documents and this title.

04.39.040 Officers.

The mayor, with the approval of the city council, designates the first chair from among the members of SOAC. Thereafter, the SOAC shall determine and select the officers consistent with its adopted rules and bylaws.

04.39.050 Administration and Support

- A. <u>Annual Administrative Allocation</u>. The city council shall annually allocate a portion of the City's Opioid Funds, in an amount not to exceed ten percent (10%) of the total Opioid Funds received in a calendar year, toward the administration and annual support of the SOAC, which funds may be pooled with Opioid Funds from other Participating Local Governments as is necessary to provide those administrative functions necessary to meet their common obligations under the Settlement Documents.
- B. <u>Use of Remaining Opioid Funds</u>. The balance of Opioid Funds remaining after the allocations pursuant to subsection 04.39.050.A shall be used only toward direct support of programs for opioid treatment, prevention and/or training, as approved by the city council.
- C. <u>City Support</u>. The City's Department of Community, Housing and Human Services shall provide additional technical, personnel and administrative support as is reasonably necessary to enable the SOAC to perform its duties under this chapter

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04.39.060 Interlocal Agreements.

With city council approval, the SOAC may enter into interlocal agreements and/or memorandums of understanding regarding the subject matter of the One WA MOU or to share administrative or overhead expenses with opioid abatement councils established by Local Participating Governments, consistent with any limitations on the use of Opioid Funds set forth in the Settlement Documents.

Summary (Background) *use the Fiscal Impact box below for relevant financial information	This matter was briefed by the Interim City attorney on March 27, 2023 at PIES Committee (Item 3.5 on the agenda). For more detailed information about the Opioid Settlement terms, members of the Council are encouraged to reacquaint themselves with the March 27, 2023 briefing paper.		
	In 2022, the City (one of 125 eligible Washington local governments) and the State of Washington entered into a settlement agreement to resolve claims brought against the distributors for their alleged roles in the opioid epidemic. Roughly \$430 million will be available for distribution in Washington State, which is split 50/50 between the State of Washington and the local governments. The City's percentage of the whole is 3.087%; Payments will be made over the course of seventeen years. Due to the structure of the settlement agreement, the parties' first payment was a double payment. The City received \$494,599.90 on December 30, 2022. Future payments in connection with the distributor settlement are anticipated to be roughly half the amount received on December 30, 2022 (estimated around \$240-255,000). The second payment to the City is scheduled to take place this summer. The settlement agreements, chiefly the "One Washington MOU," dictate the manner in which settlement funds are expended. Broadly stated, the permitted uses relate to treatment, prevention and training in opioid-related medical events, As long as the monies are spent for approved purposes, local government may agree to share, pool, or collaborate in any manner they choose with other local governments through use of a regional agreement. The settlement agreement identifies seven counties in the "Spokane Region" (all of which participated in the settlement) along with the municipalities of Spokane, Spokane Valley, Liberty Lake and Cheney, and directs them to enter into a regional agreement to establish an Opioid Abatement Council (OAC). These councils are expected to oversee use of the settlement funds and ensure they are expended as provided in the settlement greements. However, nothing in the settlement agreements prevents the City from establishing its own OAC to oversee and direct spending of settlement funds received by the City of Spokane.		

	 While the One Washington MOU indicates that the OACs must be established prior to the receipt of funds, most jurisdictions, including those in the Spokane Region, have been slow to enter into the required regional agreements and to establish an OAC. Ideally the Spokane Region should have been created no later than June 1, 2023, so as to not jeopardize the receipt of future payments. Rather than place the City's settlement funds in jeopardy while waiting for execution of a regional agreement among the seven counties and four cities in the Spokane Region, and because the preferred course for the City is to create its own OAC to oversee the use of its settlement funds, an ordinance has been drafted to create the "Spokane Opioid Abatement Council" ("SOAC"). Broadly, the SOAC will identify suitable programs for funding, will be responsible for overseeing the distribution of opioid funds for approved purposes, will conduct annual review and reporting of expenditures 			
	of the City's settlement funds, and will identify opportunities for collaboration and cost-sharing with other jurisdictions in opioid abatement efforts. The ordinance allows for the SOAC to enter into regional agreements to share costs and conduct programs consistent with the settlement requirements.			
	Up to 10% of the settlement funds can be directed toward administrative costs to support the SOAC and implement programs. It is expected this percentage will be sufficient to establish the SOAC but likely the City's settlement funds will need to be pooled with funds from other jurisdictions to meet administrative needs common to all of the OACs.			
	The ordinance is not intended to replace the regional agreement required by the One Washington MOU. As the regional agreement is drafted, the City will ensure that it acknowledges the City's decision to establish a separate OAC via this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. C_____

An ordinance relating to Office of Police Ombudsman Commission; amending Section 04.32.030 of the Spokane Municipal Code concerning the Office of Police Ombudsman; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, in 2013 the citizens of Spokane overwhelmingly approved amendment of the Spokane City Charter to create the Office of Police Ombudsman (OPO) and the Office of Police Ombudsman Commission (Commission); and

WHEREAS, consistent with the Spokane City Charter Section 129 and the will of the citizens of Spokane; commencing in 2014 the Spokane City Council adopted SMC 04.32 to further define the powers, duties, and other aspects of the OPO and the Commission, which ordinances have been amended from time to time, most recently in 2019; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to SMC 04.32.030, the OPO presented initial findings to the Commission regarding certain police conduct related to a complaint initiated on October 29, 2021, by a member of the City Council, and the Commission thereafter directed the OPO to further investigate matters identified in the complaint; and

WHEREAS, on or about December 12, 2022, the OPO published its report and findings in that "Office of the Police Ombudsman Independent Closing Report, C21-070 / OPO 21-33" (the "OPO Report"); and

WHEREAS, the OPO Report identifies, among other allegations, unusual and communications involving the chief of police, as well as unusual release and dissemination of City records (including police records) by the chief of police; and

WHEREAS, under current law, complaints regarding the chief of police must be directed to the mayor and investigated by the city's human resources department, and are not within the scope of the OPO's authority; and

WHEREAS, despite the OPO Report and numerous complaints and requests for an investigation, the mayor has not initiated an investigation into the chief of police as provided under SMC 04.32.030.Q; and

WHEREAS, the current municipal code provision limiting the OPO's ability to conduct investigations into matters involving the chief of police is not consistent with the broad scope of investigative authority granted to the OPO under Section 129 the Spokane City Charter, and further creates a lack of clarity with respect to many investigations by the OPO; and

WHEREAS, the absence of mayoral action in response to the OPO Report underscores the need to amend the municipal code provisions to ensure the goals of full

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confidence and accountability in police leadership, as set forth in the City Charter, are fulfilled; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that an urgency and emergency exists such that this ordinance is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That Section 04.32.030 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended as follows:

Section 04.32.030 Functions and Duties

The functions and duties of the OPO are as follows:

- A. The OPO will actively monitor all police department OPO Involved Investigations as provided herein.
- B. The OPO may receive complaints from any complaining party, including, without limitation, citizens or employees of the police department. The OPO may conduct a preliminary investigation regarding the complaint for the purpose of determining whether to forward the complaint to IA. The preliminary investigation shall include, as appropriate, interviewing the complainant and interviewing any other person who the complainant asserts was subject to the improper use of force or improper/inappropriate interaction with an officer. If after this interview(s) the OPO is unable to determine whether the matter should be forwarded to IA, the OPO may conduct such additional interviews as are reasonably necessary to determine whether to forward the case to IA. If a complainant or witness refuses to have his or her interview recorded, he or she shall be asked to write out his or her complaint. All interviews will be conducted by the OPO. In the event the OPO is unavailable to conduct the initial interview, the complainant will be asked to prepare a written statement or taped oral narrative concerning the matter, allowing the OPO to subsequently determine whether an actual interview should be conducted. Officers will not be interviewed as part of the preliminary investigation, unless the complainant is an officer. If the complainant is an officer, the OPO may request an interview from the complainant officer as part of the preliminary investigation.

If the OPO determines that the complaint should not be forwarded to IA, the OPO may publish a closing report, which states the allegations of the complaint and the basis for the OPO's determination that the complaint did not need to be forwarded to IA. Neither this closing report nor the preliminary investigation shall be used for discipline; the closing report and any part of the preliminary investigation that is released shall not reveal the names of the officers involved. For each complaint where the OPO determines that the complaint does not need to be forwarded to

IA, the OPO shall forward to IA its determination as well as the name of any complainant and/or witnesses and the details of the alleged complaint.

If the OPO determines that the complaint should be forwarded to IA, the OPO will forward the complaint and any preliminary investigation to IA within three business days for processing and, when appropriate, investigation. The OPO will not act upon complaints concerning events that occurred more than one year prior to the filing of a complaint. The OPO will not conduct separate disciplinary investigations, but may participate in all OPO Involved Investigation interviews and request that further investigation be conducted by IA as provided herein.

- C. In addition to complaints received by the OPO, IA will provide copies of all other OPO Involved Investigation complaints to the OPO within three business days. Once the case is closed, the OPO will return all case file materials to IA for retention consistent with the police department's record retention policy but will have subsequent access to closed cases.
- D. The OPO will have the opportunity to make a recommendation for mediation to the chief of police prior to investigation. In the event the department, the complainant, and the officer all agree to mediation, that process will be utilized rather than sending the matter on for investigation. Assuming the officer participates in good faith during the mediation process, the officer will not be subject to discipline, and no disciplinary finding will be entered against the officer. Good faith means that the officer listens to all information presented and considers the issues raised by the complainant, and acts and responds appropriately. Agreement with either the agreement to mediate is reached and the complainant thereafter refuses to participate, the officer will be considered to have participated in good faith.
- E. Once any complaint is received by IA, including those forwarded to IA from the OPO, it shall be submitted to the chain of command for review per existing police department policy. When either the chief or his or her designee determines that the allegations warrant investigation, such investigation shall be approved, and IA will initiate the investigative process. The OPO will participate in that investigation process for OPO Involved Investigations as follows:
 - Internal affairs will notify the OPO of all administrative interviews on all OPO Involved Investigations. The OPO may attend and observe interviews in person or by telephone and will be given the opportunity to ask questions during the interview and after the completion of questioning by the department. The OPO will not participate in criminal investigations of department employees, but will be notified when the criminal investigation is concluded.
 - 2. Upon completion of OPO Involved Investigations, IA will forward a complete copy of the case file to the OPO for review. The OPO will review the case file and determine whether the investigation was timely, thorough and objective.

F. As a part of the review process, the OPO may conclude that further investigation is needed on issues deemed material to the outcome. The OPO will notify IA of the suggested further investigation. The OPO's suggestions and rationale for further investigation will be provided to IA in writing. The OPO and assigned investigator(s) will discuss the suggested further investigation and attempt to reach an agreement. If there is no agreement between the assigned investigator(s) and the OPO regarding the necessity, practicality, or materiality of the requested further investigation, the OPO will notify the chief (or designee) in writing of the OPO's suggestions and rational for further investigation. The chief (or designee) will determine whether further investigation will be undertaken by IA. The chief (or designee) will provide his or her determination to the OPO in writing.

If the OPO is not satisfied with the determination of the chief, the OPO's request for further investigation may be presented to the commission, whose decision will be final. The decision of the commission will be based upon the OPO's written request and the chief's (or designee's) written response. Once the matter has been referred to and resolved by the commission, the IA investigation will be completed consistent with the determination by the commission on the OPO's request. After providing IA a reasonable opportunity to complete the further investigation, if the commission determines and specifically describes in writing how the IA investigation was not completed consistent with the commission's decision, the commission may again direct IA to complete the further investigation in the OPO's request, or the commission may publish a report stating what further investigation in the OPO's request the commission believes was not completed by IA. If the OPO has not yet made a certification decision, a certification decision shall be made by the OPO. In addition to its report, the commission may direct the OPO or a third-party investigator to complete the further investigation requested by the OPO; however, no such investigation may commence until the Chief has made a final, written discipline determination in the matter. If the commission contracts for a third-party investigation, it shall be conducted by someone with knowledge and experience in conducting a fair and objective law-enforcement investigation and who has no conflict of interest. The OPO or third-party investigator may request, but not require, participation by police officers in the investigation. Once the OPO or third-party investigator has completed the OPO requested investigation, the Commission may publish a report of the results of the investigation of the OPO or third-party investigation, so long as the report does not identify specific members of the department and does not in any way comment on officer discipline (or lack thereof). The further investigation and/or the commission's report may not be used by the City as a basis to open or re-open complaints against any bargaining unit employees, including those assigned to IA, or to reconsider any decision(s) previously made concerning discipline. No discipline of bargaining unit employees may result from the OPO or third-party investigation.

After completion of the further investigation by IA, or the conclusion, by IA or the commission, that no further investigation by IA will be undertaken, the OPO will then certify whether or not, in the opinion of the OPO, the internal investigation was timely, thorough and objective. This determination will be made within five

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business days. Once the certification determination is made, the OPO will not be involved further in the disciplinary process in that case.

- G. The OPO will be notified if the Chief or designee determines that any complaint that meets the definition of an OPO Involved Investigation will not be investigated by IA. If the OPO believes that an investigation should be completed, the OPO shall notify the Chief or designee in writing. The OPO and Chief or designee will discuss the OPO's request for investigation and attempt to reach an agreement. The Chief will provide a written response to the OPO's request within fourteen days. If there is no agreement between the Chief or designee and the OPO regarding the investigation, the commission will decide whether the investigation requested by the OPO will be undertaken by IA, as provided in section (E). The decision of the commission will be based upon the OPO's written request and the Chief's (or designee's) written response. After providing IA a reasonable opportunity to undertake the investigation, if the commission determines and specifically describes in writing how IA failed to undertake an investigation consistent with the commission's decision, the commission may again direct IA to undertake an investigation, or the commission may direct the OPO to conduct an independent investigation into the complaint that meets the definition of an OPO Involved Investigation that the Chief determined would not be investigated by IA. The OPO may request, but not require, participation by police officers in the investigation. The OPO may publish a report of the results of the investigation, so long as the report does not identify specific members of the department and does not in any way comment on officer discipline (or lack thereof). Any released investigation will not identify specific members of the department. The OPO's investigation and/or report may not be used by the City as a basis to open complaints against any bargaining unit employee(s), including those assigned to IA, or to reconsider any decision(s) previously made concerning discipline. No discipline of bargaining unit employees may result from the OPO investigation.
- H. All disciplinary decisions will be made by the chief (or designee). The OPO shall not have a role in any disciplinary matter.
- The OPO will be provided a copy of any letter or other notification to an officer informing the officer of actual discipline imposed as a result of an internal affairs investigation, or any notice of finding in the event that the complaint is not sustained.
- J. The OPO will be notified by IA within five business days of case closure of all OPO Involved Investigations. The OPO, in addition to the department's written notice of finding letter to the complainant, may send a closing letter to the complainant. The letter may summarize the case findings.
- K. Any complaining party who is not satisfied with the findings of the department concerning their complaint may contact the office of police ombudsman to discuss the matter further. However, unless persuasive and probative new information is provided, the investigation will remain closed. In accordance with established arbitral case law, employees may not be disciplined twice for the same incident. In the event the investigation is re-opened and discipline imposed, the appropriate

burden of establishing compliance with this section rests with the City in any subsequent challenge to the discipline.

- L. Once the OPO has made a certification decision and the chief has made a final determination on the case, the OPO shall publish a closing report that summarizes the complaint, the OPO Involved Investigation, and the findings. The closing report will not disclose the names of officers or witnesses. The OPO's closing report shall not be used in disciplinary proceedings of bargaining unit employees.
- M. In addition to the investigative process, the OPO will have unimpeded access to all complaint and investigative files from OPO Involved Investigations for auditing and reporting purposes. The OPO shall not retain investigative files beyond one year and will return the same to Internal Affairs for safekeeping. At all times and including, without limitation, issuing written reports, the OPO will not release the name(s) of employees or other individuals involved in incidents or investigations nor any other personally identifying information. The OPO may make statistical observations regarding the disciplinary results of sustained internal investigations, but shall not take issue with discipline imposed by the chief of police in specific cases.
- N. The OPO may recommend policies and procedures for the review and/or audit of the complaint resolution process and review and recommend changes in departmental policies to improve the quality of police investigations and practices, including the IA investigation process. The OPO may independently investigate any non-disciplinary matter necessary to enable the OPO to issue policy and procedure recommendations. The OPO may publish a policy and procedure report that identifies the OPO's recommended policy and procedure changes. The OPO's recommendations will be related to departmental procedure, policies, training, or related issues. The OPO will not make recommendations concerning discipline for specific cases or officers. If required by law, the City will engage in collective bargaining prior to adopting any such recommendations.
- O. The OPO shall not have access to legally privileged documents held by the city attorney or attorney-client communications held by the city attorney's clients. The OPO shall not disclose confidential records and shall be subject to the same penalties as the legal custodian of the records for any unlawful or unauthorized disclosure.
- P. The police ombudsman may propose rules and procedures required for the discharge of the police ombudsman's duties, including policies and procedures for receiving and processing complaints, monitoring investigations, and reporting findings, conclusions and recommendations to the commission. The OPO's rules and procedures must be consistent with state law and the collective bargaining agreement between the city and police guild. The OPO may not levy any fees for the handling of complaints or any other duties identified in this chapter.
- Q. ((Complaints regarding the chief of police shall be directed to the mayor and investigated by the city's human resources department.)) Complaints against the

ombudsman shall be directed to and investigated by the commission, with the assistance of the City's human resources department.

Section 2. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk or the code reviser are authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Section 3. Emergency Clause. Summary (Background) *use the Fiscal Impact box below for relevant financial information	The Office of Police Ombudsman (OPO) was created by the citizens of Spokane in 2013 and codified under Section 129 of the Charter. Section 129 lists several purposes behind the OPO, among them to ensure that investigation of complaints against police officers are fair, objective and thorough, and to provide visible and independent civilian oversight of police officers. The Charter states the OPO is to independently investigate <i>any matter</i> necessary to fulfill its duties consistent with Washington law and existing collective bargaining agreements. This ordinance is prompted in part by the information uncovered by the OPO and set forth in that "Office of the Police Ombudsman Independent Closing Report, C21-070 / OPO 21-33" (the "OPO Report"). The OPO Report identifies, among other allegations, unusual and concerning communications between Spokane Chief of Police Craig Meidl and members of the Spokane business community, as well as unusual release and dissemination of City records (including police records) by the Chief, police personnel and City employees. However, SMC 04.32.030.Q currently does not allow the OPO to investigate the chief of police. That authority is reserved for the Mayor and the Human Resources department. The Mayor has declined to initiate any formal investigation of Chief Meidl. Section 129 of the Charter defines a broad scope of investigation areas for the OPO. In other words, the Charter says nothing about confining the OPO to matters other than the chief of police. This ordinance harmonizes SMC 04.32.030 with Charter Section 129 by eliminating the provision that narrows the otherwise broad scope of investigative areas of the OPO with respect to the chief of police.

The OPO Report identifies a pattern of conduct indicating favoritism in access to city records and communications between the police department and other city employees, on one hand, with affluent business members on the other, which favoritism may be at the expense of marginalized members of the community. Permitting the OPO to investigate any police matter, including those involving the chief of police, will clarify the scope of the OPO and ensure complete oversight of the police, as intended by the Charter provisions.

Summary (Background) *use the Fiscal Impact box below for relevant financial information	Title 05A of the SMC, adopted in 2008, established Spokane's municipal courts, outlined the jurisdiction, procedures and other operational issues for the courts. A later ordinance in 2019 established the therapeutic courts. With the recent push to provide for alternative sentencing options for defendants charged with violation of drug use and possession laws, it is necessary to expand on the provisions establishing the municipal court to ensure they are consistent with alternatives for sentencing.
	This ordinance has three major parts. First, it amends SMC 05A.01.010 by adding to the establishment language and additional statement of purpose that the court is to balance providing services to defendants with the need to protect the community from repeated criminal activity.
	Second, it amends SMC 05A.09.010 relating to transfer of matters within the municipal court to allow the presiding judge to remove a defendant from alternative treatment and sentencing if the court finds the defendant has not complied with court direction for treatment.
	Third, the ordinance amends SMC 05A.18.020 relating to therapeutic courts in several ways. It expands on the stated purpose of therapeutic courts to include a general consent by the City of Spokane to alternative sentencing options for defendants charged with open drug use and possession consistent with the new provisions in the state's <i>Blake</i> legislation. Under that legislation alternative sentencing options must be approved by the county prosecutor; since Spokane's prosecutors are appointed, not elected, the consent is necessary to give direction to the municipal court and city prosecutors, and leaves the decision on alternative disposition to the discretion of the court. SMC 05A.18.020 also includes a housekeeping change so that SMC conforms to the current operations of the domestic violence and misdemeanor drug courts.
	Effective Date . The ordinance has an emergency clause and would go into effect immediately with 5 affirmative votes.

ORDINANCE NO. C

An ordinance relating to Spokane Municipal Court, and amending Sections 05A.01.010, 05A.09.010, and 05A.18.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City of Spokane is preparing for enforcement of state law regarding public use and possession of illegal drugs and seeks to ensure that the legislature's goal that treatment and rehabilitation for drug users is accomplished; and

WHEREAS, statewide laws relating to the public use and possession of controlled substances have undergone rapid and significant changes including, among other provisions, elevation of some violations of related state and local laws to misdemeanor and gross misdemeanor charges, and encouraging prosecutors to consider diversion and treatment options in lieu of immediate jail sentences; and

WHEREAS, drug courts and other therapeutic courts offer a pathway to recovery that focuses on a treatment model which could ultimately reduce recidivism and rehabilitate individuals; and

WHEREAS, the City has an important governmental interest in protecting the health, safety and lives of its residents and in reducing the community impact of drug possession and drug use; and that under its Article XI section 11 police powers, the City is authorized to act in the interest of public safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Court has an urgent need to quickly establish a Misdemeanor Drug Court in order to manage the new drug possession and public use laws established by the Legislature; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that an urgency and emergency exists such that this ordinance is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. Section 05A.01.010 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended as follows:

Section 05A.01.010 Court Established Pursuant to Chapter 3.50 RCW

The municipal court of the City of Spokane ("municipal court") is hereby created, and shall have jurisdiction and exercise all powers vested in the municipal court by chapter 3.50 RCW, together with such other powers and jurisdiction generally conferred on such courts in Washington, either by common law or statute. <u>One purpose of the municipal court is to protect community members from criminal recidivism from those charged</u>

with crimes by providing accountability and services to defendants informed by their criminogenic needs, responsivity and threats consistent with due process and overall goals of rehabilitation and crime reduction. The municipal court shall commence operation on January 1, 2009.

Section 2. Section 05A.18.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended as follows:

Section 05A.18.020 Therapeutic Courts Established

<u>1.</u> Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a Community Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the community court core team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation.

<u>2.</u> Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a Veterans Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the Veterans Court Core Team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation.

<u>3.</u> Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a DUI Court as a program within the Municipal Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the DUI Court core team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Washington Traffic Safety Commission.

4. Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Court's previous establishment of a Domestic Violence Intervention Treatment Court is hereby codified as presently constituted, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the DVIT Team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation.

5. Pursuant to, and as authorized by, RCW 2.30.030, the Municipal Court is authorized to administer a Misdemeanor Drug Court, including a docket separate from other criminal matters, operating in accordance with the policies and procedures established by the Misdemeanor Drug Court Core Team as defined by associated Court's Polices and Procedure Manual and endorsed by the Center for Court Innovation.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

Section 4. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Section 5. Emergency Clause. The City Council declares that an urgency and emergency exists and this ordinance is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions, and that because of such need, this ordinance shall be effective immediately under Section 19 of the City Charter, upon the affirmative vote of one more than a majority of the City Council.

Both versions are prompted by an increase in unfavorable after-hour activities in city parks, including incidents of crime, violence, and drug use. Both versions raise the penalty for violation of park hours from a civil infraction to a misdemeanor. Like the Stratton/Cathcart version, this version amends SMC 12.06A relating to park rules, but otherwise differs in three significant respects: Trespass. First, in the Stratton/Cathcart version, mere presence in a city park after hours constitutes criminal trespass, a misdemeanor. In this version, criminal trespass arises only when an individual disobeys an order to leave a city park issued by police or park personnel: "Any person who refuses a lawful order by an authorized City employee directing them to leave a City park during the hours of closure or is found in a park during the hours of closure or is found in a park during the hours of closure or is found in a park during the nours of closure within thirty days of receiving a lawful order to leave commits unlawful trespass on City park property, which is punishable as a misdemeanor." This ordinance applies to all members of the public. The current law prohibits subjects from gathering at parks after hours and increases the penalty to a misdemeanor. There is a danger the increased classification might be enforced unevenly on people of color and marginalized members of the community.

The police department tracks race, gender, and age demographics on any arrest. It will be important to follow up with SPD to evaluate how the new ordinance, as applied, impacts people of color and marginalized communities.

ORDINANCE NO. C_____

An ordinance relating to the regulation of illegal activities in public spaces, amending 12.06A.040 of the Spokane Municipal Code, and repealing Chapter 10.76 of the Spokane Municipal Code, and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS, there has been a significant increase in after-hour incidents in city parks, which incidents have frequently escalated into altercations, felony assaults, and shootings, and which incidents often involve the unlawful use of drugs; and

WHEREAS, the current punishment for violation of the park hours rules is a nontraffic civil infraction, and state law does not permit officers to compel a detention for nontraffic civil infractions; and

WHEREAS, increasing the increasing the punishment for unlawful presence in a city park after hours to a misdemeanor offense allows law enforcement officers to investigate and, if necessary, compel detentions for this violation, in compliance with current state law; and

WHEREAS, requiring law enforcement or park personnel to order persons unlawfully present in a city park before citing such persons for trespassing prevents pretextual and uneven enforcement of park rules against persons not otherwise engaged in violent or dangerous behavior in a city park; and

WHEREAS, current state illicit drug possession laws that expire on June 30, 2023 set penalties as a misdemeanor and preempt the City's authority to impose a more severe penalty until that time; and

WHEREAS, seeking to close any gaps in current public use of illicit drug laws and establish enforcement from July 1, 2023 onwards with a penalty of gross misdemeanor unless and until the Washington State Legislature state enacted statewide drug possession laws, the city council adopted Ordinance C36386 on May 8, 2023, which established a new title 10.76 in the Spokane Municipal Code regulating the use and possession of illicit drugs in public places in the City of Spokane; and

WHEREAS, on May 16, 2023 the Washington State Legislature adopted SB 5536, a comprehensive bill that, among other provisions, revised state law with respect to possession and public use of illegal drugs, and preempting local law with respect to drug paraphernalia, and which becomes effective on July 1, 2023; and

WHEREAS, upon the effective date of SB 5536, the City's newly adopted ordinance C36386 will be inconsistent with state law relating to the public use and possession of illicit drugs; and

WHEREAS, related park rules concerning possession and use of drugs and alcohol likewise will be outdated and inconsistent with state laws relating to use of illegal drugs and substances in public spaces; and

WHEREAS, the City seeks to amend its ordinances regarding public use and possession of illegal drugs, including regulations embedded in park rules, to align with state law; and

WHEREAS, the City also seeks to enhance the enforcement options for law enforcement personnel with respect to illegal and after-hour activity in city parks; and

WHEREAS, the City has an important governmental interest in protecting the health, safety and lives of its residents and in reducing the community impact of drug possession and drug use; and that under its Article XI section 11 police powers, the City is authorized to act in the interest of public safety and welfare; and

WHEREAS, The City Council finds that an urgency and emergency exists such that this ordinance is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does hereby ordain as follows:

NOW, **THEREFORE**, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That Section 12.06A.040 SMC is amended to read as follows:

Section 12.06A.040 Rules and Regulations

The Park Board has established rules governing behavior on park property, and such rules may be enforced consistent with this ordinance.

Except when done in places designated and in the manner prescribed by rule, regulation or special permission of the park board or department:

- A. Park Grounds and Maintenance
 - 1. No person may cut, trim, tag or in any way tamper with the trees or landscaping, or dig, stake, pierce or penetrate the ground of any park.
- B. Vehicles and Watercraft
 - 1. No person may ride or drive any motor vehicle in Riverfront Park without express permission from the director of the parks department or his or her designee. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting the use of

electric scooters, electric bicycles or other personal electric mobility devices in Riverfront Park.

- 2. No person may drive or ride any vehicle or animal on the grass or in any areas of the park other than designated drives, ways, boulevards or paths. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting a person from riding a mountain bike on established paths and trails in natural/conservation/undeveloped areas.
- 3. No person may park outside designated parking areas. Cars parked in turf areas, parked overnight or left for multiple days in parking lots may be deemed unauthorized pursuant to SMC 16A.07.060 and impounded by a registered tow truck operator at the direction of a law enforcement officer or other public official with jurisdiction.
- 4. No person may operate or drive any vehicle, including bicycles, skateboards and roller skates, in a manner which is likely to endanger persons and/or property.
- 5. No person may intentionally enter, swim, dive or float, with or without a boat, raft, craft or other flotation device, in or upon any pond in a park or the Spokane River at any point between the west line of the Division Street Bridge and the west line of the Monroe Street Bridge.
- C. Speed
 - 1. No person may ride or drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of five miles per hour in Riverfront Park.
 - 2. At all parks other than Riverfront Park, no person may ride or drive a vehicle at a speed in excess of fifteen miles per hour unless otherwise posted.
- D. Games and Athletics
 - No person may engage in, conduct, or hold any trials or competitions for speed, endurance, or hill climbing involving any vehicle, boat, aircraft, or animal in any park, except by permission of the director of the parks department or his or her designee.
 - 2. No person may play or practice any game that involves the running or the throwing or hitting of a ball or other projectile such as golf, archery, hockey, tennis or baseball, when and where such activity is likely to be dangerous.
 - 3. No person may operate remote controlled vehicles, unmanned air systems or other hobby craft in a manner that is dangerous to persons or property.

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- 4. Swimming pools, wading pools, golf courses, softball diamonds and basketball courts may be used only during hours designated by the director of the parks department or his or her designee.
- E. Animals
 - 1. No person may allow any animal to run at large in any park or enter any pond, pool, fountain or stream thereof except within a designated off-leash area. A violation of this section is a class 4 civil infraction.
 - 2. All persons bringing pets to a park must provide for the disposal of animal waste from their pets. Failure to do so is a class 4 infraction.
 - 3. No person may tease, annoy, disturb, attack, catch, injure, or kill, throw stones or any object at, or strike with any stick or weapon, any animal, bird, fowl or other wildlife in any park.
 - 4. Fishing shall be allowed in rivers and creeks adjacent to parks, but shall not be allowed in the ponds of any park.
 - 5. No person may feed any wildlife in any park. A violation of this section is a class 4 civil infraction.
- F. Drugs and Alcohol

All persons using city parks and park property are held to state law regulations restricting the possession and use of alcohol and cannabis in public places as well as the prohibition on the possession and use of controlled substances, counterfeit substances and legend drugs in public places. Except as specifically authorized by the director of the parks department or his or her designee, these restrictions will be enforced in City parks. In addition to penalties provided in state or local law, violators shall be subject to exclusion from one or more city parks for one year.

- 1. Except as specifically authorized by the director of the parks department or his or her designee, no person shall open the package containing liquor or consume liquor in a public park. A violation of this section is a class 3 civil infraction.
- 2. As provided in RCW 69.50.445, it is unlawful to open a package containing marijuana, useable marijuana, marijuana-infused products, or marijuana concentrates, or consume marijuana, useable marijuana, marijuana-infused products, or marijuana concentrates, in any park. A violation of this section is a class 3 civil infraction.

- 3. For the safety and protection of all park users, the use and distribution of drug paraphernalia is prohibited in city parks. In addition to penalties provided in state or local law, violators shall be subject to exclusion from one or more city parks for one year.
- G. Weapons and Projectiles

No person may shoot, fire, throw or explode any fireworks, explosive, bow and arrow, slingshot or other weapon, toy or real, which discharges a pellet or other object with harmful force.

- H. Food
 - 1. Except as provided in SMC 10.51.040(A), no person may sell food inside or adjacent to a park without first obtaining the following:
 - a. Written authorization from the director of the parks department, or his or her designee, to vend at a particular location or locations, as required by SMC 10.51.070 and SMC 17C.390.030; and
 - b. A valid a mobile food vendor's permit as required by SMC 10.51.010.
- I. Events
 - 1. Special events held in a city park require a park reservation and must also be authorized by a special event permit issued by the director of the parks department under the procedures and requirements for special events as provided in Chapter 10.39 SMC.
 - 2. Regardless of whether an event requires a special event permit, park reservations are required to reserve park space and to serve or distribute food for groups of over fifteen people. There is no cost to submit reservation application for events that do not include the use of a shelter, but the application requires the submission of a clean-up plan and may be subject to cost recovery for the actual costs of clean-up by park employees.
 - J. Other Uses of Parks and Park Property and Facilities
 - 1. No person may use or occupy park property to sleep, store property or for any other purpose when done in a manner that obstructs or prevents others from its use and enjoyment.
 - 2. No person may build a fire in a park during official burn bans or where fire restrictions are otherwise imposed. All fires must be contained to designated fireplaces and park-supplied barbecue pits.

- 3. Where the park board has provided for the collection of fees, rents or charges for the use of park facilities, including municipal golf courses, no person may enter upon or use such park facilities without paying such required fees, rents or charges.
- 4. No person may be in a City park <u>or on park property</u> during the hours of closure without the express permission of the director of the parks department or his or her designee. All City parks shall be closed from ten p.m. to six a.m., except Riverfront Park, which shall be closed from midnight to six a.m. throughout the year.
- 5. No person may sell or barter any goods or services without prior permission of the director of the parks department or his or her designee.
- 6. Any person who refuses a lawful order by an authorized City employee directing them to leave a City park during the hours of closure or is found in a park during the hours of closure within thirty days of receiving a lawful order to leave commits unlawful trespass on City park property, which is punishable as a misdemeanor.
- K. No person may violate such rules and regulations as may from time to time be promulgated by the park board or the director of parks and recreation pursuant to and in supplementation of the City Charter and this code.

Section 2. Chapter 10.76 of the Spokane Municipal Code is hereby repealed effective July 1, 2023.

Section 3. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

Section 4. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Section 5. Emergency Clause. The City Council declares that an urgency and emergency exists as to this ordinance such that it is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, and/or for the immediate support of City government and its existing public institutions, and that because of such need, Section 1 of this ordinance shall be effective immediately under Section 19 of the City Charter, upon the affirmative vote of one more than a majority of the City Council. Pursuant to Section 19 of the City Charter, upon the affirmative vote of one more than

a majority of the City Council, Section 2 of this ordinance shall take effect immediately but the repeal of SMC 10.76 shall be suspended until July 1, 2023.

ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE relating to parking municipal codes amending SMC sections 08.02.083, 16A.04.100, 16A.05.060, 16A.05.220, 16A.05.280, 16A.05.310, 16A.05.460, 16A.07.040, 16A.07.080; and adding new section 16A.05.155 to chapter 16A.05 of the Spokane Municipal Code and setting an effective date.

WHEREAS, the City is adding the fee for an annual golf cart registration decal which was repealed in 2021, and;

WHEREAS, the Spokane Parking Fee Schedule is being updated for 2023, and;

WHEREAS, definitions related to Electric Vehicle Charging Stations are being added and the other definitions are being updated, and;

WHEREAS, the time to respond to a notice of violation has increased at the state level and must be changed at our local level, and;

WHEREAS, Washington state and Gov Jay Inslee are making EV charging stations and the transition to new Zero Emission Vehicles a priority as well as being carbon neutral by 2050, and;

WHEREAS, state code related to Electric Vehicle Charging Stations needs added to our municipal code, --- Now, Therefore,

The City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That SMC section 08.02.083 is amended to read as follows:

Section 08.02.083 Fees & Charges

A. Fees for services related to parking provided through the City of Spokane's ((Development Services Center,)) Code Enforcement and Parking Services Department, and penalties for traffic infractions provided by schedules adopted by court rule, or as specifically provided in Title 16A SMC or state statute shall be posted under the City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule as established by City Council resolution. The City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule shall be posted on the City's website.

B. The Parking Manager shall review and update the City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule and bring it to City Council for approval on an annual basis.

C. Paid Parking Zone Rates.

1. It is the intent of the City Council to establish a target occupancy rate of eightyfive percent for all Paid Parking Zone spaces within the City of Spokane. Occupancy rate refers to the percentage of Paid Parking Zone spaces that are occupied by vehicles. The establishment of the target occupancy rate of at least eighty-five percent is based on well-accepted planning studies as well as the example of other municipalities. The City Council finds that the establishment of the target occupancy rate of eighty-five percent is an effective strategy for managing on-street parking and congestion.

2. The City Council establishes a range of time limits from fifteen minutes to eleven hours. The parking manger shall set the time limit of each parking zone, consistent with achieving the at least eighty-five percent target utilization rate, based upon parking occupancy data and community input.

3. Parking rates to be charged at parking payment devices, for parking in city rights-of-way and other city-controlled parking areas under the jurisdiction of the City of Spokane shall be within rate limits established by this section. Rates may vary according to location, time of day, length of stay, maximum parking time allowed, the capabilities of available parking payment devices, and any other factors the Parking Manager determines are pertinent.

4. The Parking Manager is authorized to set parking rates up to the "Maximum Hourly Rate" of \$3.00 per hour as set forth on the City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule. When parking rates are in effect, parking rates shall be set no lower than the "Minimum Hourly Rate" of \$0.50 per hour as set forth on the City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule.

5. The Parking Manager shall establish on-street parking rates and shall adjust parking rates higher (up to the maximum hourly rate) or lower (as low as the minimum hourly rate) in established paid parking zones based on the established target occupancy rate of at least eighty-five percent.

6. The Parking Manager may adjust the parking fee by increments no larger than fifty cents per hour.

7. Parking rates may be adjusted no more frequently than twice per fiscal year.

8. Current parking rates shall be posted to the City's website.

D. Golf Cart Registration Decal.

The fee for an annual golf cart registration decal is fifty dollars.

Section 3. That SMC section 16A.04.100 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.04.100 Definitions

A. Alley.

A public highway not designed for general travel and used primarily as a means of access to the rear of residences and business establishments. (RCW 46.04.020)

B. Block Face.

One side of a street, inclusive of the public right-of-way between two consecutive features intersecting that street. The features can be other streets or boundaries of standard geographic areas.

C. Charging Session.

An event starting when a user or a vehicle initiates a refueling event and stops when a user or a vehicle ends a refueling event (RCW 19.94.010)

((C.)) <u>D.</u> City Street or Street.

Every public highway, or part thereof located within the limits of cities and towns, except alleys. (RCW 46.04.120)

((D.)) <u>E.</u> Commercial Vehicle.

Any vehicle the principal use of which is the transportation of commodities, merchandise, produce, freight, animals, or passengers for hire. (RCW 46.04.140)

((E.)) <u>F.</u> Congested District.

The area established within the Paid Parking Zone bounded and identified on the Paid Parking Zone Map.

((F.)) <u>G.</u> Definitions Generally.

Words and phrases, wherever used in this subtitle shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this Chapter except where otherwise defined, and unless where used the context thereof shall clearly indicate to the contrary. (RCW 46.04.010)

H. Electric Vehicle.

Any vehicle that operates, either partially or exclusively, on electrical energy from (the grid or) an off-board source, that is stored on-board for motive purpose. Includes any one of the following: 1. A "battery electric vehicle," any vehicle that operates exclusively on electrical energy from an off-board source that is stored in the vehicle's batteries and produces zero tailpipe emissions or pollution when stationary or operating.

2. A "plug-in hybrid electric vehicle (PHEV)," an electric vehicle that a) contains an internal combustion engine and also allows power to be delivered to drive wheels by an electric motor; b) charges its battery primarily by connecting to the grid or other off-board electrical source; c) may additionally be able to sustain battery charge using an on-board internal-combustion-driven generator; and 4) has the ability to travel powered by electricity

3. A "neighborhood electric vehicle," a self-propelled, electrically powered fourwheeled motor vehicle whose speed attainable in one mile is more than 20 miles per hour and not more than 25 miles per hour and conforms to federal regulations set forth in 49 C.F.R Sec. 571.500.

4. A "medium-speed electric vehicle," a self-propelled, electrically powered fourwheeled motor vehicle, equipped with a roll cage or crush-proof body design, whose speed attainable in one mile is more than 25 miles per hour but not more than 35 miles per hour and otherwise meets or exceeds the federal regulations set forth in 49 C.F.R. Sec. 571.500.

I. Electric Vehicle Parking Space.

Any signed parking space that identifies the use to be exclusively for the parking of an electric vehicle.

J. Electric Vehicle Service Provider.

The entity responsible for operating one or more networked or nonnetworked electric vehicle supply equipment. Operating includes but is not limited to: Sending commands or messages to a networked electric vehicle supply equipment; receiving commands or messages from a networked electric vehicle supply equipment; or providing billing, maintenance, reservations, or other services to a nonnetworked or networked electric vehicle supply equipment; or providing billing, maintenance, reservations, or other services to a nonnetworked or networked electric vehicle supply equipment. An electric vehicle service provider may designate another entity to act as the electric vehicle service provider for purposes of this chapter. A state agency, an electric utility as defined in RCW 19.405.020, or a municipal corporation as defined in RCW 39.69.010 is considered an electric vehicle service provider when responsible for operating one or more publicly available electric vehicle supply equipment. (RCW 19.94.010)

K. Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment.

The unit controlling the power supply to one or more vehicles during a charging session (including, but not limited to, level 2 electric vehicle supply equipment and direct current fast chargers). (RCW 19.94.010)

((G.)) L. Entertainment Parking District (EPD).

The area established within the Paid Parking Zone for the purpose of meeting the specific operational and parking needs of the entertainment venues contained within the EPD as bounded and identified on the Paid Parking Zone Map.

((H.)) <u>M.</u> Fire Lane.

An area on public or private property reserved for providing Fire Department access to structures, firefighting fixtures, or equipment.

((I.)) <u>N.</u> Highway.

The entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the public for purposes of vehicular travel. (RCW 46.04.197)

((J.)) <u>O.</u> Non-passenger Vehicle (NPV).

Any vehicle which does not meet the definition of a passenger vehicle (SMC 16A.04.100(R)) (SMC 16A.04.100) which includes but is not limited to: any vehicle requiring a commercial safety fee, limousine, any vehicle with over a one ton (thirty-five hundred) rating, vehicle requiring a commercial driver's license (CDL) to operate, farm vehicle, motor home, trailer of any type, camper, watercraft, or snowmobile.

((K.)) <u>P.</u> Paid Parking Zone.

Portions of streets which the parking of vehicles shall be controlled, regulated and inspected with the aid of devices, herein referred to as parking payment devices. The Paid Parking Zone is bounded and identified on the Paid Parking Zone Map.

((L.)) <u>Q.</u> Park or Parking.

The standing of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in loading or unloading property or passengers. (RCW 46.04.381)

((M.)) R. Parking Holidays.

Except for ((metered)) parking spaces at Spokane International Airport and Felts Field as authorized by SMC 12.03.0600 and SMC 12.03.0602, or where otherwise indicated by signposting in the area or for individual spaces, parking spaces regulated

by a parking payment device may be used without charge during all hours on: Sundays, New Year's Day, Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Birthday, President's Day – Third Monday in February, Memorial Day, Juneteenth, Independence Day – July 4th, Labor Day, Indigenous Peoples' Day – Second Monday in October, Veteran's Day – November 11th, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day. Where a foregoing holiday falls on a Sunday, the immediately following Monday is observed. On days designated in the foregoing, vehicles shall adhere to posted time limit regulations.

((N.)) S. Parking Manager.

The Director of ((Development Services Center,)) Code Enforcement and Parking Services or their designee.

((O.)) <u>T.</u> Parking Payment Device.

Any device used to accept payment for parking, such as parking meters, pay station kiosks, mobile devices, or other methods approved by the Parking Manager.

((P.)) <u>U.</u> Parking Permit.

A privilege that allows its holder to access certain parking spaces and locations, which form includes, but is not limited to, a printed pass, decal, or electronic privilege associated with a specific vehicle license plate.

((Q.)) <u>V.</u> Parking Space.

The area on or adjacent to the roadway in which to stop, stand, or park a vehicle that is controlled by a parking payment device designated by lines, curb paint, posted sign, meter decal, or other markings.

((R.)) <u>W.</u> Passenger Vehicle.

Every motor vehicle, except motorcycles and motor-driven cycles, designed for carrying ten (10) passengers or less and used for the transportation of persons.

((S.)) <u>X.</u> Public Right-of-Way

A right-of-way that is dedicated or deeded to the public for public use and under the control of a public agency.

((T.)) <u>Y.</u> Residential Parking Permit Definitions

For the purposes of SMC 16A.06.070 only, the terms in this section have the following meanings:

- 1. "Downtown residential parking district" or "DRPD" means a portion of the street commonly used for vehicular parking where vehicles properly displaying a parking permit or other city-approved authorization are exempt from the payment required pursuant to SMC 16A.05.280.
- 2. "Downtown residential parking district permit" or "DRPD permit" means a printed pass, decal, electronic privilege associated with a specific vehicle license plate, or other identification issued to an eligible person to be displayed in or on the vehicle, as directed by the City, that enables it to park in a downtown residential parking district.
- 3. "Resident" means any person residing in a household unit that is located within downtown residential parking district.
- 4. "Household Unit" means any self-contained house, apartment, condominium, town house, detached or attached accessory dwelling unit, or group home that contains living, sleeping and cooking quarters and is used by of any number of related persons or up to six unrelated individuals. Each unit of a multiple-unit residential dwelling is considered a separate household unit.
- ((U.)) <u>Z.</u> Retail Zone of the Congested District.

The area established within the Paid Parking Zone bounded and identified on the Paid Parking Zone Map.

((V.))<u>AA.</u> Roadway.

Portion of a highway improved, designed, or ordinarily used for vehicular travel, exclusive of the sidewalk or shoulder even though such sidewalk or shoulder is used by persons riding bicycles. In the event a highway includes two or more separated roadways, the term "roadway" shall refer to any such roadway separately but shall not refer to all such roadways collectively. (RCW 46.04.500)

((W.)) <u>AB.</u> Safety Zone.

The area or space officially set apart within a roadway for the exclusive use of pedestrians and which is protected or is marked or indicated by painted marks, signs, buttons, standards, or otherwise, so as to be plainly discernible. (RCW 46.04.510)

((X.)) AC. Stand or Standing.

The halting of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, otherwise than temporarily for the purpose of and while actually engaged in receiving or discharging passengers. (RCW 46.04.555)

((Y.)) <u>AD.</u> Stop or Stopping.

Any halting even momentarily of a vehicle, whether occupied or not, except when necessary to avoid conflict with other traffic or in compliance with the directions of a police officer or traffic control sign or signal. (RCW 46.04.566)

((Z.)) <u>AE.</u> Taxicab, Cab, or Taxi

A for-hire vehicle held out to the public as providing transportation for passengers and/or articles for compensation and:

- 1. where the route traveled or destination is controlled by the customer;
- 2. that carries signs or indicia of a "taxi," "taxicab," or "cab" and is equipped as described in SMC 10.34A.090;
- 3. where the fare is based on an amount recorded and indicated on a taximeter or by a special contract rate; and
- 4. where the vehicle is dispatched by radio or cell phone, or the ride is obtained by the use of a street hail.

((AA.))AF. Temporary No Parking Zone

- A. <u>1.</u> A parking space where an approved temporary no parking zone has been established and designated by temporary sign(s), barricade(s), ((meter bag(s))) meter cover(s) or other devices approved by the Parking Manager.
- B. 2. A temporary no parking zone will only become valid and enforceable if the zone has been established with signage for at least 24 hours giving notice that a vehicle will be removed if illegally parked in the zone and where such vehicle is interfering with the proper and intended use of such zones.

((AB.))AG. Vehicle.

A device capable of being moved upon a street or alley and in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a public highway. "Vehicle" excludes, except where specifically referenced:

- 1. A power wheelchair or device other than a bicycle moved by human or animal power or used exclusively upon stationary rails or tracks;
- 2. A bicycle and a motorized foot scooter;
- 3. An electric personal assistive mobility device and a motorized foot scooter; and,
- 4. A golf cart.

Section 4. That SMC Section16A.05.060 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.060 Commercial Loading Zones

A. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle except an authorized commercial vehicle as defined in $((\frac{16A.04.100(D)}{D}))$ <u>SMC 16A.04.100</u> or other noncommercial vehicles as authorized by the Parking Manager during the hours indicated on the signs marking the zones.

B. No person shall stop, stand, or park an authorized commercial vehicle as defined in ((16A.04.100(D))) <u>SMC 16A.04.100</u> or other noncommercial vehicles as authorized by the Parking Manager in a signed commercial loading zone for any purpose or length of time other than active and expeditious loading and unloading. In no case shall the stopping, standing, or parking exceed thirty minutes.

Section 5. That SMC Section16A.05.220 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.220 Junk Vehicle

No person shall park a junk vehicle, as defined in ((SMC 10.16.010(F))) SMC 10.66.010, upon any public right-of-way.

Section 6. That SMC Section16A.05.280 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.280 Paid Parking Zone – Payment Required

- A. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle in a parking space regulated by a parking payment device, up to the maximum legal parking time, unless:
 - 1. Valid payment has been made at a parking payment device;
 - 2. Required information has been correctly provided, such as zone number, parking space or meter number, or vehicle information including license plate number and state; and,
 - 3. Payment is made immediately.
 - a. The prohibitions of this Section shall not apply to:
 - i. The act of parking; and,

- ii. The necessary time required to activate the time on a parking payment device.
- B. The restrictions of this Section shall not apply on legal parking holidays as defined in ((SMC 16A.04.100(M))) SMC 16A.04.100 except where otherwise indicated on the parking payment device or posted signage on the block face, or portions thereof, or for individual parking spaces.

Section 7. That SMC Section16A.05.310 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.310 Parking Time Limited

- A. No person shall stop, stand, or park a passenger vehicle, as defined in ((SMC 16A.04.100(R))) SMC 16A.04.100, for a continuous seventy-two (72) hour period on any one block face upon any public right-of-way in this City located within any area not inclusive of the Paid Parking Zone (((SMC 16A.04.100(K)))) (SMC 16A.04.100), unless a City-approved posted sign provides a shorter period of time.
- B. No person shall stop, stand, or park any non-passenger vehicle (NPV), as defined in ((<u>SMC 16A.04.100(J)</u>)) <u>SMC 16A.04.100</u>, for longer than twenty-four (24) continuous hours for loading or unloading on any one block face upon any public right-of-way in this City located within any area not inclusive of the Paid Parking Zone (((<u>SMC 16A.04.100(K)</u>))) (<u>SMC 16A.04.100</u>), unless a City-approved posted sign provides a shorter period of time.
- C. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle for a continuous twenty-four (24) hour period on any one block face upon any public street or highway in this City located within the Paid Parking Zone as identified in ((<u>SMC 16A.04.100(K)</u>)) <u>SMC 16A.04.100</u>, unless a City-approved posted sign or parking payment device indication provides a shorter period of time.
- D. Where parking time is limited as indicated on a parking payment device or by posted signage, no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle beyond the maximum time allowed, irrespective of any payment made.
 - 1. Where the parking time limit is greater than 30 minutes, no person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle on the same block face beyond the maximum time allowed, irrespective of any payment made, and are required to move off of the block face until the next calendar day.
- Section 8. That SMC Section16A.05.460 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.460 Temporary No Parking Zone

No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle in a parking space where an approved temporary no parking zone has been established as defined in ((16A.04.100(AA))) <u>SMC 16A.04.100</u>.

Section 9. That SMC section 16A.07.040 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.07.040 Failure to Comply with Notice of Violation

((If no response or payment is made within fifteen calendar days of the date of the issuance of the notice of infraction, the)) A failure to respond or pay the notice of infraction by the day the response is due will result in Spokane Municipal Court ((will attach)) assessing additional penalties to the infraction as established in the City of Spokane Parking Fee Schedule (SMC 08.02.083(A)), including a notice to Washington State ((department)) Department of ((licensing)) Licensing as provided in RCW 46.16A.120(3), and ((may pursue)) pursuing any other remedies as provided by law.

Section 10. That SMC Section 16A.07.080 is amended to read as follows:

Section 16A.07.080 When a Vehicle May Be Impounded After Notice

A vehicle not subject to impoundment under SMC 16A.07.070 may be impounded after notice of such proposed impoundment has been securely attached to and conspicuously displayed on the vehicle for a period of twenty-four (24) hours prior to such impoundment, for the following reasons:

- A. When the vehicle has been parked for a continuous twenty-four (24) hour period on any one block face within any Paid Parking Zone. (SMC 16A.05.310(C))
- B. When the vehicle has been parked for a continuous seventy-two (72) hour period on any one block face within any area not inclusive of the Paid Parking Zone. (SMC 16A.05.310(A))
- C. When the non-passenger vehicle has been parked for a continuous twenty-four (24) hour period on any one block face not inclusive of the Paid Parking Zone. (SMC 16A.05.310(B))
- D. When the vehicle is a "junk vehicle" as defined in ((SMC 10.16.010(F))) SMC 10.66.010 and is parked on a street, alley, or way open to the public, or on City or other public property. (SMC 16A.05.220)

Section 11. That there is adopted a new section 16A.05.155 to Chapter 16A.05 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Section 16A.05.155 Electric Vehicle Charging Stations

A. No person shall stop, stand, or park a vehicle other than an electric vehicle as defined in SMC 16A.100, within any space marked or signed as reserved for "electric vehicle parking while charging only."

B. No person shall stop, stand or park a vehicle in a parking space served by publicly available electric vehicle supply equipment if the vehicle is not connected to the charging equipment (RCW 46.08.185 (2))

The Drug Court team is anticipated to be newer to therapeutic courts with no recent RISE attendance. Total for Training is \$37,500.

Housing

We would like funding to assist with housing. All sober living homes have move in costs and charge monthly rates. We would like to assist with the first 3 months of transitional living for participants engaged in treatment services to allow them to focus on rebuilding their lives without the burden of seeking immediate employment to cover housing costs. This removes the barrier of placing employment over their treatment program and helps with long-term success. Total for Housing is \$300,000

Transportation

We would like funding to support transportation services such as bus passes, Uber rides, and taxicab vouchers. Removing the barrier of lack of transportation to treatment, court, testing, and other court requirements will lead to long-term success. The total for Transportation is \$30,000.

Prosocial Activities

We would like to partner with local gyms to provide gym memberships on a sponsorship basis at a reduced cost to the participant/court. As part of a treatment court, participants are required to complete prosocial activities each week. Often funding prohibits participants from seeking activities that have a financial component. The total for Prosocial Activities is \$10,000

Computer Software

We would like to have a designated IT staff person fulltime for up to 5 months to work through our new software to create the modules and reports needed for Drug Court. This will significantly increase our ability to track and provide data. Total for IT Support \$25,000.

Municipal Court will additionally submit an application for financial support to the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Once awards are received, the Municipal Court will bring the SBO to council.

Individuals will undergo an in-person clinical assessment by a counselor who is licensed or certified to make a DVIT recommendation. Pursuant to the assessment, the counselor who completes the assessment shall submit a report and recommendation to the court concerning the length and type of treatment required for the individual. Depending on the individual's treatment needs the court may order levels of care from Domestic Violence Intervention Treatment in Levels I, II, or III. The cost per individual treated will range from \$150-\$3,500 based on level of care and duration. Spokane Municipal Court sets out to serve an initial cohort of 250 individuals.

Both proposed new nominations would help to address that deficiency. Furthermore, the East Central Community Center has been a beacon of hope and resilience for one of Spokane's historically excluded communities (East Central) and it is deserving of recognition of its historical significance.

The Spokane Historic Landmarks Commission has analyzed the Spokane Register of Historic Places and has recognized that the register does not reflect the full diversity and experience of Spokane's history. Specifically, it fails to fully tell the story of women, the LGBTQ community, cultural and racial			

minorities, and others. The Historic Preservation Department has conducted surveys (including the ongoing East Central Historic and Cultural Context study) and extensive historic property research to help identify historic properties that could be nominated to help to fill that gap. Both properties proposed for listing have been extensively researched.

The Spokane Historic Landmarks Commission has only listed two properties for cultural significance under Category E since the Spokane City Council adopted the new category in 2018 (the German American Hall, and Highland Park United Methodist Church), and we have zero properties listed on the Spokane Register of Historic Places explicitly for their association with the Black community or a significant Black individual. This project will help the Historic Preservation Department to begin the task of addressing the disparity in representation on Spokane's historic register. A member of the East Central Community wrote a letter to Spokane City Hall encouraging the nomination of the community center, a city owned property; and the owners of the Abele House have long expressed an interest in listing their house on the register, but the cost and complexity of contracting with a consultant has deterred them from pursuing the nomination.

How will data be collected regarding the effectiveness of this program, policy or product to ensure it is the right solution?

This project's objectives are:

-To better reflect the diversity of Spokane's past and increase awareness and recognition of the Black community by listing two properties associated their history which is not currently represented on the register in a meaningful way

-To diversify the Spokane Register of Historic Places by listing the youngest property on the register (currently, the most recently constructed property listed is 1972)

-To increase the geographic diversity of the Spokane Register by listing a property in a neighborhood that has among the lowest number of listed properties for a neighborhood with extensive historic building stock

We will now the proposal was effective if we can add one or both properties to the Spokane Register of Historic Places to better reflect Spokane's history.

Describe how this proposal aligns with current City Policies, including the Comprehensive Plan, Sustainability Action Plan, Capital Improvement Program, Neighborhood Master Plans, Council Resolutions, and others?

Nominating these two properties will further important goals and objectives of the Spokane City/County Historic Landmarks Commission (SHLC). The Spokane Municipal Code and Spokane County Code instructs that it is the purpose of the SHLC "to recognize, protect, enhance and preserve those buildings, districts, objects, sites and structures which serve as visible reminders of the historical, archaeological, architectural, educational and cultural heritage of the City and County."

Additionally, DP 3.4 of the Spokane Comprehensive Plan is titled Reflect Spokane's Diversity with the objective to "encourage awareness and recognition of the many cultures that are an important and integral aspect of Spokane's heritage." The discussion for this objective states that "historic preservation must reflect the diversity of Spokane's past. The city must be proactive in including the many cultures and traditions of Spokane's heritage in historic preservation planning and activities." The SHLC has been endeavoring to diversify the Spokane Register of Historic Places to better reflect the reality of Spokane's history and this project makes clear proactive steps forward on these goals and objectives that were identified as part of thoughtful planning processes.
