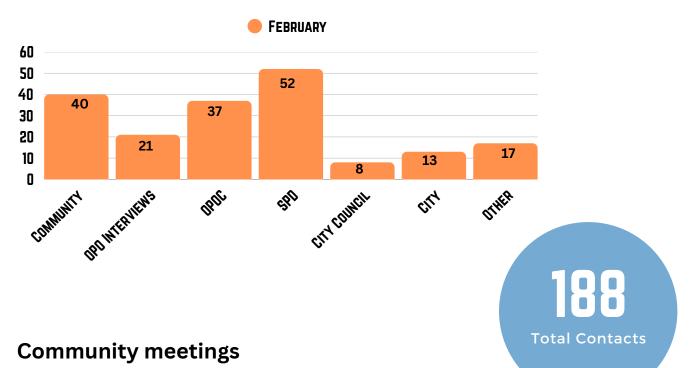

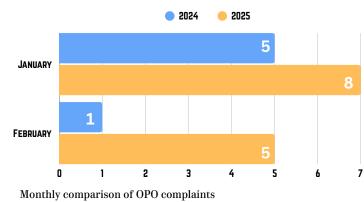

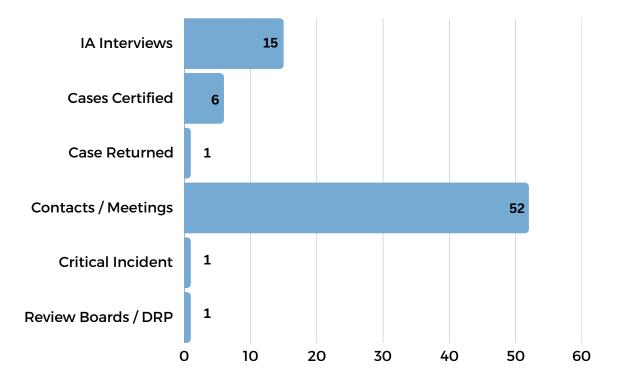

This would not have happened without your incredibly generous support. During December 2024, you acted with resounding generosity by helping many children benefit from your kindness. Because of you, two of our Lidgerwood families were given the chance to experience the joy and peace of a lovely Christmas season. Along with our grateful families, we here at Lidgerwood want to applaud your generosity and thank you with humble hearts for your help.

Dear Chief Hall, I wanted to take a moment to express my sincere gratitude to you and your officers for their swift and professional response to the weapons call at the law School yesterday. Their efficiency and composure in handling the situation made all the difference in quickly and safely clearing the call. A special note of appreciation for **Sergeant Zack Storment** - his professional demeanor and approach were instrumental in ensuring a calm and effective resolution. Their actions not only brought the situation to a safe conclusion but also reinforced the trust and reassurance that our campus community has the support of our municipal partners.

Dear **Chief Hall**, I was so heartened to read in the Spokesman today the Chief's forceful and righteous reaction to the tragic death of the 13-year-old who was killed by gun violence last weekend. Thank you for having the courage to call out the issue for what it is, and to commit to using evidence and data to address the problem and develop solutions. I am one of those in the community who is concerned about gun violence, and I am thankful for this response. Personally, this gives me a new respect for the leadership at SPD, writing a fan letter to the police department is not something I ever thought I would be doing.

I wanted to give notice and say thanks for the work of **Officer Garrett Harris** (#1487), **Officer Madie McDonald** (#1474), **Officer Jacob Collins** (#1546), and **Officer Adam Anderson** (#1394). Their work has already helped prevent \$1121.03 from being stolen at the Target on 4915 S. Regal Street. All in less than a 24-hour period. The officers listed have worked with upstanding professionalism, patience, and adaptability. Target greatly appreciates the service you are all doing for the community and making the area a safer place!

I just wanted to reach out to you and acknowledge the amazing customer service experience we had from your team yesterday on an assault incident here at Sacred Heart. SPD Officer **[Corporal] Eugene Baldwin** arrived, and conducted a thorough investigation, reviewing video footage and interviewing victims and witnesses in a professional manner. He displayed compassion and empathy and made quite an impression on our caregivers and officers alike. Please make sure to tell Officer Baldwin how much we appreciate his support in combating the extraordinary violence we are seeing in healthcare. His hard work is valued and appreciated.

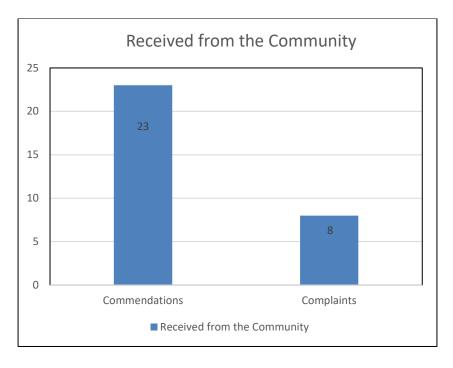

Neighborhood Resource Officers Return

SPD is excited to announce the return of Neighborhood Resource Officers (NROs). March 3, 2025, marked the return of a vital community program for residents of Spokane. Three Spokane Police officers started their new positions as Neighborhood Resource Officers (NROs). The Spokane Police Department made the extremely difficult decision to eliminate the NRO program in 2023 to provide much needed support to the patrol division. In the fall of 2024, voters passed the Community Safety Sales Tax, championed by Mayor Brown and designed specifically to revive and strengthen the NRO program. Thanks to voter approval of the Community Safety Sales Tax, SPD is pleased to bring this valuable community resource back to the City of Spokane.

Our new NRO are Officers Tyler Heiman (Northwest), Deanna Storch (Northeast), and Micah Prim (South/Downtown).

Recent News: Vigilant bank employee alerts law enforcement as robbery suspect enters location, officers quickly locate suspect after fleeing location

On March 5th, 2025, SPD responded to 3000 South Grand Boulevard after 911 received a call from a bank. Employees observed a suspicious male wearing a ski mask enter the location with his hand in his pocket. The male did not display a weapon or make any demands before quickly leaving the location. Officers were already in the area after a 911 call advised of a male possibly casing a different bank.



The bank manager provided 911 with a vehicle description (white Toyota Camry) and license plate of the car the suspect male left in. The vehicle in question was found to be recently stolen. As officers quickly responded to the area, the stolen vehicle was found abandoned a short distance away after it fled at a high rate of speed. Additional calls came into 911 advising a male was running and shedding his clothing near the area where the vehicle was found. The male also discarded a gun as he was fleeing. The weapon was later found to be a replica BB gun.

As calls continued to come into 911 about the incident, officers located the suspect in the backyard of a residence. The resistive male was taken into custody without incident. Cody L. Burgess (33) was transported to the Spokane County Jail and booked on two counts of 1st Degree Robbery, Theft of a Motor Vehicle, Resisting Arrest and 2nd Degree Criminal Trespass.

The quick arrest of the robbery suspect was the perfect collaboration of bank employees, community members and fast response of patrol officers.



The precinct also held a Coffee with a Cop at McDonald's on March 20, 2025.

David Sector (Downtown)

Recent News: Early morning stabbing sends one to the hospital, suspect in custody.

On March 3rd, 2025, at just after 7am, officers assigned to Downtown responded to a stabbing at a hotel located at 2nd and Washington. The initial complaint given to 911 was that a subject was armed with a weapon. Just prior to law enforcement arriving on scene, a stabbing took place. Officers quickly detained the suspect as he attempted to the leave the area.

The victim was transported to a local hospital after sustaining multiple injuries that were considered life threatening. Initial information indicated that the involved parties knew each other and the stabbing resulted after an argument took place. Lee G. Myers (46) was taken into custody and booked into the Spokane County Jail for Attempted 2nd Degree Murder. This incident is an isolated event and there is no current threat to the public.

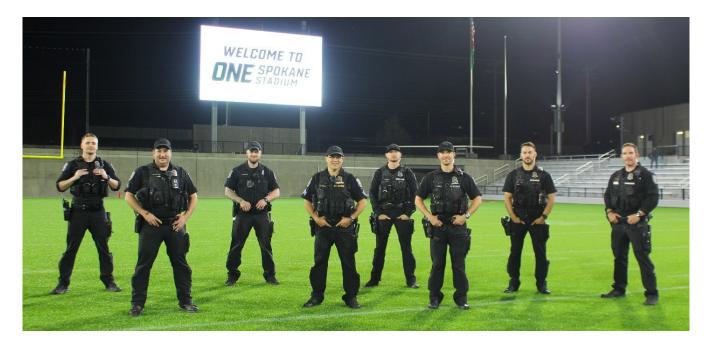

Excerpt from Team A3's nomination:

Since the markup of September 2023 through December 2024, Team A3 has consistently performed at a superior level. Thanks to the leadership of Sgt. Bryan Tafoya, Team A3 has developed a culture of problem solving, proactive enforcement and conducting superior investigations. Each team member has played a role in the success stories.

Officer Braten conducted a superior investigation into a burglary in the 3000 block of North Atlantic, leading to an arrest of the suspect for seven counts of Residential Burglary that resulted in a guilty plea and prison sentence. This investigation is one of the main reasons that there was an approximate 25% reduction in Adam Sector's residential burglaries at the end of November 2024 in the year-to-year comparison.



Officer Mike Baldwin, according to Sgt. Tafoya, is one of the best patrol investigators in the department. One of his 2024 examples involved a residential burglary in the Five Mile Area, with a loss of nearly \$4000.00 in property. His extensive canvass led to the identification of both vehicles, the suspects, and the location of the stolen property. The department located and returned the stolen property to the victim within a couple of days. Officer Justin Druitt and his recruit conducted an emergency ping on a cell phone of a suicidal mother with young children with her. Officer Corey Miller was instrumental. He determined a possible destination for the female, which led to officers locating the female.

Though these incidents identify specific team members, it is critical in this nomination to explain that the successes of Team A3 are not just that of the primary officer, but of each member of the team. Team A3 is very proactive with enforcement and addressing problems. The team has completed 123 field interviews



and authored 60 non-DUI search warrants during the markup, related to residences, vehicles, cell phones, and social media accounts. These investigations have led to the arrest of dozens of suspects and significant seizures of weapons and contraband.

Overview: Spokane Fire Department's Contract Extension for Ambulance Transportation Services

The Spokane Fire Department (SFD) is recommending seeking an extension of its ambulance transportation services contract to ensure continued high-quality emergency medical response amid evolving operational, financial, and staffing challenges. The extension is necessary to maintain reliable Advanced Life Support (ALS) and Basic Life Support (BLS) transport services while adapting to the growing and changing needs of the Spokane community.

The decision to **extend the existing ambulance services contract rather than issuing a full Request for Proposals (RFP)** is driven by several critical operational, financial, and strategic factors. Here's why Spokane Fire Department is pursuing an extension:

Key Reasons for Contract Extension:

1. Ensuring Continuity of EMS Services Without Disruption

- A **contract extension** allows uninterrupted emergency ambulance services, ensuring Spokane residents continue to receive timely, life-saving medical transport.
- A full RFP process could lead to a transition period where a new provider is selected, requiring months of logistical adjustments, training, and coordination potentially causing service disruptions.

2. Staffing and Economic Challenges Affecting ALS Service Models

- The nationwide paramedic shortage, combined with workforce burnout and an aging labor pool, has made sustaining an all-ALS model increasingly difficult.
- A **hybrid ALS/BLS staffing model** is becoming the industry standard, ensuring ALS units remain available for high-acuity emergencies while BLS units handle lower-priority calls. This model is currently in place in Spokane with AMR.
- A new provider entering the market through an RFP process would face the same staffing shortages and could struggle to meet service demands in the transition period.
- This approach balances efficiency, response times, and cost-effectiveness by ensuring we send the right resource to the right need, at the right time.

3. Response Time Performance and EMS System Sustainability

- Spokane EMS data aligns with national trends showing that only a small percentage (<30%) of 911 calls require life-saving ALS interventions.
- The tiered response model (used in Spokane) can continue to improve response times for time-sensitive emergencies such as heart attacks, strokes, and trauma cases by optimizing resource allocation. The current provider has been substantially compliant throughout the term of the current contract.
- Maintaining an all-ALS model may lead to increased response times and reduced service availability.

4. Financial Pressures and Rate Adjustments





JULIE O'BERG FIRE CHIEF

- The **2025 Spokane Rate Discussion** highlights the need for adjustments in ambulance transport reimbursement rates due to rising operational costs and shifting payer mix.
- Medicare and Medicaid reimbursements (a high percentage of the Spokane market payor mix) remain below cost and have failed to keep up pace with rising operational costs.
- The current provider (AMR) has already implemented competitive pay structures, scholarship programs and incentives to retain paramedics and EMTs.
- **Issuing an RFP risks higher bid prices** from potential providers due to capital outlay that would be required, in addition to increasing labor and current operational costs, making an extension a more stable financial decision (even with the projected rate increases).
- A contract extension allows the city to **stabilize costs while exploring long-term financial sustainability options**. These options could be mutually beneficial as current fees for service additionally fund SFD initiatives.

5. Regulatory and Operational Updates

- Spokane's **municipal code (SMC 10.47) proposed revisions** are modernizing emergency medical transport regulations, reinforcing patient protections, and ensuring compliance with evolving industry standards.
- The **inclusion of Nurse Navigation Services** in the contract is a forward-thinking step to reduce unnecessary ambulance transports and emergency room visits.
- A contract extension ensures continued alignment with these regulatory improvements.

6. Lessons from Past Amendments and System Improvements

- The current contract has undergone multiple strategic amendments to improve service delivery, including:
 - 1. Integration of Basic Life Support (BLS) ambulances to alleviate strain on ALS resources.
 - 2. Addition of Nurse Navigation Services, reducing unnecessary ambulance transports.
 - 3. Adjustments to response time expectations, balancing efficiency and resource allocation.
- These enhancements are continually being evaluated for effectiveness. **Issuing a full RFP now could reset these improvements**, leading to potential inefficiencies.
- The proposed extension will **build on these refinements**, ensuring Spokane's EMS remains adaptable and effective
- A contract extension allows Spokane to further assess its long-term EMS strategy before committing to a multi-year contract through an RFP.
- The **economic and staffing challenges are still evolving**, and locking into a long-term agreement via an RFP could limit Spokane's ability to adjust to changing conditions.
- The city can use the extension period to **study alternative service models**, including:

- 1. Public-private partnerships
- 2. Further expansion of BLS-tiered response
- 3. Adjustments to reimbursement models and cost-sharing agreements

7. Cost and Time Savings Compared to a Full RFP Process

- A full RFP process is a complex, multi-step procurement effort requiring:
 - 1. Development of new bid specifications
 - 2. Public solicitation of proposals
 - 3. Evaluation of (potential) multiple bidders
 - 4. Negotiation of a new contract
 - 5. Potential legal challenges or bid protests
- This process could delay potential improvements and introduce uncertainty in EMS service delivery at a critical point in time.

Conclusion:

A Strategic and Necessary Step for Spokane's EMS Future. Stability Over Risk and Uncertainty.

Renewing the contract provides Spokane with a **stable** approach to ambulance service continuity. It allows the city to **maintain service reliability while continuing to refine and evaluate improvements** before committing to a full RFP process. By refining response time strategies, and incorporating modern EMS solutions like **Nurse Navigation**, Spokane Fire will ensure a resilient and efficient emergency medical transportation system.

This memo recommends the adoption of an ordinance to update the City of Spokane's Emergency Medical Transport requirements to align with state law, Spokane County EMS & Trauma Care Council protocols, and local regulatory licensing requirements.

Executive Summary – City of Spokane Emergency Medical Transport

I. **Background**: The Spokane Fire Department is the primary responder for basic and advanced life support medical emergencies within Spokane. The City of Spokane contracts with private ambulance service companies to provide emergency medical transport within the city of Spokane. Currently, the City contracts with one company. There are approximately 43,000 emergency/non-emergency 911 transports annually.

Ambulance services are regulated statewide by Washington State Department of Health primarily through RCWs 18.73, 70.168, and WAC 246-976. Local oversight is provided by the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council, Spokane County Medical Program Director, and the Spokane Fire Department.

SMC Chapter 10.47 – Emergency Medical Transport was adopted by the City Council twentyfive years ago to provide oversight of the City's contracted private ambulance transport services. This ordinance sought to codify practices to end deceptive billing, the practice of "jumping calls" by monitoring radio frequencies, and the withholding of critical medical information from Fire Department EM first responders (Lopez, 2025).

II. Issue: SMC Chapter 10.47 - Emergency Medical Transport was drafted and adopted by the

City Council twenty-five years ago. The current code contains references to WACs and RCWs that have changed and refers to the City EMS Board that no longer exists. The current code also contains procedural differences from those adopted by the Spokane Fire Department through the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council.

III. Policy Recommendations

The Council should adopt an ordinance to update the licensing requirements for Emergency Medical Transport that reflects the correct RCW and WAC references, transport procedures and protocols, and codify patient protections required to be included in all private ambulance contracts with the City of Spokane.

- "advanced life support"
- "ambulance company"
- "basic life support"
- "emergency medical service" (EMS)
- "emergency medical technician"
- "first responder"
- "patient"
- "public safety answering point"
- "state-approved program"



Section 3. Repeals SMC 10.47.040 (City of Spokane EMS Board)

This section repeals a reference to the City of Spokane EMS Board which no longer exists.

Section 4. Amends SMC 10.47.050 - Permit

- This section changes the title from "Permit" to "Emergency Medical Transport License Requirements;
- Changes the term "permit" to "license";
- Clarifies that a private ambulance operator must have a general business license with Spokane city endorsement as well as a regulatory license;
- Removes a reference to the Spokane County EMS Council during the licensure process;
- Adds that the license applicant must show proof of licensure by the Washington State Department of Health;
- Clarifies the regulatory license is an annual license valid for one year from when the license is approved; and
- Removes the license fee because the state preempts ambulance license fees through RCW 18.73.020.

Section 5. Repeals SMC 10.47.060 (Insurance)

This section repeals SMC 10.47.060 relating to insurance requirements and replaces it with a new Insurance Requirements section – SMC 10.47.061.

Section 6. New Section SMC 10.47.061 - Insurance Requirements – Ambulance Companies

This new section establishes new insurance requirements for ambulance companies operating in the city of Spokane based on recommendations by the City of Spokane's Risk Manager (Jordan, 2025):

- worker's compensation insurance;
- minimum of ten million dollars in general comprehensive liability insurance;
- minimum of five million dollars in auto liability insurance; and
- minimum of one million dollars in professional liability insurance per person for any certified individual providing medical care.

Section 7. New Section SMC 10.47.062 – Patient Protections

This section codifies patient protection provisions required to be included in any contracts for ambulance services:

- The City can review all patient billings by the ambulance company to monitor compliance with the established rate of charges;
- The ambulance company may not charge a patient for medical supplies provided by the City to the ambulance company;
- The ambulance company cannot charge for treatment provided by City of Spokane personnel; and
- The ambulance company may not solicit payment on-site or en route.

Section 8. Amends SMC 10.47.070 – Medical Emergencies

- This section corrects the Spokane County EMS Council to the correct name: Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council; and
- Replaces references to the Spokane City/County Fire Service Dispatch (CCC) with "designated public safety answering point".

Section 9. Amends SMC 10.47.080 - Patient Care and Transfer

This section updates protocol references to the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council Protocols and clarifies the Order of Authority, Patient Care Procedures, and Selection of Hospital is governed by the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council Operating Procedures as well as the East Region EMS and Trauma Care Council procedures and the state's destination procedures for trauma, cardiac, and stroke.

Section 10. Amends SMC 10.47.090 – Communications

- This section includes the term "two-way" to indicate a "two-way communications plan" to comply with WAC 246-976-310;
- This section also changes the title of the section from "Communications" to "Dispatch and Communications Requirements"; and
- Clarifies that all dispatchers must have an Emergency Medical Dispatch certification of an equivalent from a State-approved program. The Public Safety Telecommunicators Certification Board sets public safety telecommunicator training and certification standards.¹

Section 11. Repeals SMC 10.47.120 (Telephone Numbers)

This section repeals out-of-date information regarding the display of telephone numbers on ambulances. The relevant code regarding the display of "911" on ambulances is included in a new Section 10.47.131.

Section 12. Repeals SMC 10.47.130 (Appearance)

This section repeals SMC 10.47.130 regarding the appearance of private ambulances and combines it into a new Section SMC 10.47.131.

Section 13. New Section SMC 10.47.131 – Appearance of City-licensed Ambulances

- This section specifically limits telephone number advertisement on City of Spokanelicensed private ambulances to 911;
- Adds the language from SMC 10.47.130 prohibiting a private ambulance from having the same color schemes or uniforms of the Spokane Fire Department; and
- Adds a new subsection to prohibit the use of the City of Spokane or Spokane Fire Department logo without permission of the City Administrator or their designee.

Section 14. Repeals SMC 10.47.140 (Enforcement)

This section repeals the Enforcement section to be combined into the Penalties section, SMC 10.47.150.

Section 15. Amends SMC 10.47.150 – Penalties

- This section changes the section name from "Penalties" to "Penalties and Enforcement"; and
- Outlines that the suspension or revocation of an emergency medical transport license will follow the process and appeal procedures outlined in SMC 08.01.

Section 16. Repeals SMC 10.47.190 (Effective Date)

This section repeals SMC 10.147.190, which established the effective date of the previous ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. C36668

An ordinance relating to Emergency Medical Transport in the city of Spokane; amending Sections 10.47.010, 10.47.030, 10.47.050, 10.47.070, 10.47.080, 10.47.090, and 10.47.150; adopting new Sections 10.47.061, 10.47.062, and 10.47.131; and repealing Sections 10.47.040, 10.47.060, 10.47.120, 10.47.130, and 10.47.140 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, the Spokane Fire Department is the primary responder to basic and advanced life support medical emergencies within the City boundaries; and

WHEREAS, the City initiated paramedic services in 1976 through the Spokane Fire Department and currently has both advanced life support (ALS) and basic life support BLS first-response units; and

WHEREAS, there are approximately 43,000 emergency/non-emergency 911 transports annually; and

WHEREAS, the City of Spokane has contracted for emergency and nonemergency 9-1-1 referral transport services with a private ambulance company since 1993; and

WHEREAS, the municipal code governing the requirements for emergency medical transport has not been reviewed and updated for twenty-five years; and

WHEREAS, the City intends to update requirements, response protocols, and license procedures to reflect changes in state law and the protocols established through the county and regional EMS councils.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That Section 10.47.010 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.010 Purpose

A. The purpose of this chapter is to regulate the emergency medical treatment of injured, ill, or disabled persons and their emergency transport in ground and air ambulances.

((1. It does not apply to or regulate non-emergency patient transport.))

B. This chapter is enacted as an exercise of the police power and is to be construed for the protection of the general public health, safety, and welfare. It is intended to supplement and exceed the standards for ambulances and emergency services set forth in ((chapter 18.71 RCW and chapter 18.73 RCW)) state law to the extent possible.

Section 2. That Section 10.47.030 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.030 Definitions

A. "Ambulance" means a ground or air vehicle_designed and used to transport the ill or injured and to provide personnel, facilities, and equipment to treat patients before and during transportation.

<u>B. "Ambulance company" or "ambulance companies" means an organization licensed</u> <u>per the requirements of this chapter and state law that operates one or more</u> <u>ambulances in the city of Spokane.</u>

C. Advanced life support" means invasive emergency medical services requiring advanced medical treatment skills as defined by chapter 18.71 RCW.

D. "Basic life support" means noninvasive emergency medical services requiring basic medical treatment skills.

E. "Emergency medical service (EMS)" means medical treatment and care which may be rendered at the scene of any medical emergency or while transporting any patient in an ambulance to an appropriate medical facility, including ambulance transportation between medical facilities.

F. "Emergency medical technician" means a person who is authorized by the Washington Secretary of Health to render emergency medical care, under the responsible supervision and direction of an approved medical program director, which may include participating in an emergency services supervisory organization or a community assistance referral and education services program established under RCW 35.21.930, or providing collaborative medical care if the participation or provision of collaborative medical care does not exceed the participant's training and certification.

((B)) G<u>.</u> "Emergency transport" means an ambulance transport of a person on an emergency basis to an appropriate medical facility for immediate treatment.

H. "First responder" or "emergency medical responder" means a person authorized by the Washington Secretary of Health to render emergency medical care.

((C)) <u>I.</u> "Non-emergency transport" means planned transport of a person in a medically stable condition on a non-emergency basis.

J. "Patient" means any person injured, sick, or incapacitated, requiring medical treatment and care of emergency medical services.

K. "Public safety answering point" means the public safety location that receives and answers 911 voice and data originating in a given area.

L. <u>"State-approved training program" means a public safety telecommunicator-certified training program approved by the state certification board to meet the requirements of a state-approved public safety telecommunicator training, certification, and recertification standards.</u>

Section 3. That Section 10.47.040 (City of Spokane EMS Board) of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

Section 4. That Section 10.47.050 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.050 ((Permit)) Emergency Medical Transport License Requirements

((A. Permit Required.))

<u>A.</u> No person may operate an ambulance within the ((City)) <u>city</u> of Spokane without first obtaining ((a permit)) an annual general business license and an annual emergency medical transport regulatory license from the City ((with the endorsement of the Spokane County EMS council)).

((1. An application for a license must be submitted to Spokane County EMS council, contain documentation provided by the provisions of this chapter and be signed by the person and certified as true under penalty of perjury.))

((B. Requirements.))

<u>B.</u> No ((permit is)) license may be issued for emergency medical transport unless the applicant has:

- fulfilled all the requirements of the laws of the State of Washington applicable to ambulance services, including but not limited to chapter 18.71 RCW, chapter 18.73 RCW and ((chapter 71.168 RCW)) chapter 70.168 <u>RCW</u> and chapter 246-976 WAC ((and chapter 248-17 WAC)), and subsequent amendments or revisions thereto;
- 2. met all requirements of this chapter; ((and))

- 3. filed proof of insurance coverage as required by this chapter((-)):
- 4. filed proof of licensure by the Washington State Department of Health; and

((C. Validity.))

((A permit is valid for two years beginning July 1st, if application is made between March 1st and April 30th.))

((1. Permits issued pursuant to applications made at other times of the year will be issued within three months of the application date and be valid until the second July 1st after the date of issue.))

((D. Exemptions.))

<u>C.</u> A ((permit)) emergency medical transport regulatory license is not required for ambulance(s):

- entering the ((City)) city of Spokane for the purpose of transporting patients to or through it only; or
- 2. pressed into service for transportation of patients in major emergencies or disasters; or
- based and posted inside of the ((City)) <u>city limits</u> for the purpose of providing service to border areas or outside the ((City)) <u>city limits but not operating</u> <u>within the city limits</u>.

((E. Fee.))

((The permit fee is twenty-five dollars.))

((F. Transfer.))

<u>D.</u> ((A permit)) <u>An emergency medical transport license</u> issued under this section may not be assigned or transferred. It shall be invalid upon change of ambulance ownership.

Section 5. That Section 10.47.060 (Insurance) of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

Section 6. That there is adopted a new Section 10.47.061 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Section 10.47.061 Insurance Requirements – Ambulance Companies

A. The ambulance company shall obtain and maintain:

1. worker's compensation insurance for the benefit of its employees required to be insured by the laws of the State of Washington;

2. a minimum of ten million dollars in general comprehensive liability insurance;

3. a minimum of five million dollars in auto liability insurance; and

4. The ambulance company shall obtain and must maintain a minimum of one million dollars in professional liability insurance per person for any certified individual providing medical care.

B. The above-referenced liability insurance policies must:

1. provide for thirty days' notice to the City by the insurer in the event any policy, or portion thereof, is canceled, or the coverage under the policy is reduced, or the policy is not renewed; and

- 2. be primary and not excess or contributing.
- C. Certificate(s) evidencing such coverage(s) shall be provided to the City.

Section 7. That there is adopted a new Section 10.47.062 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Section 10.47.062 Patient Protections

- A. The City may review any patient billings of ambulance companies to monitor compliance with the schedule of charges.
- B. The City may replenish, at no charge to the ambulance company, medicines, supplies and equipment used by the licensed ambulance company and the company shall not charge the patient for the replenished items.
- C. The ambulance company shall not charge patients for Advance Life Support (ALS) or Basic Life Support (BLS) treatment provided by City of Spokane personnel.
- D. The ambulance company shall not make on-site, en-route, or upon delivery, solicitations or requests for collection of payment.

Section 8. That Section 10.47.070 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.070 Medical Emergencies

The provisions of the section are in keeping with the "tiered response" principles <u>and</u> <u>protocols</u> adopted by the ((Spokane County EMS council)) Spokane County EMS & <u>Trauma Council</u> for securing the immediate response by the appropriate emergency medical service (EMS) provider to any medical emergency incident and to assure incident management and control.

A. Primary EMS Responder.

The ((Spokane fire department)) Spokane Fire Department is designated as and will be the primary EMS responder for the City of Spokane within the city boundaries.

- B. Incident Command and Control.
 - 1. The (("primary EMS responder", as defined in subsection (A) of this section,)) Spokane Fire Department as the primary EMS responder is responsible for and will have incident command and control for all EMS incidents in its jurisdiction.
 - 2. Ambulance personnel shall operate within the incident command framework.
- C. Notice Medical Emergency to ((Fire Service)) Dispatch.

When an ambulance company receives a request for an ambulance to respond to any medical emergency from any source other than ((Spokane City/County fire service dispatch (CCC) or the Spokane fire department)) the designated public safety answering point, the ambulance company shall immediately, coincident with its response, provide ((Spokane City/County fire service dispatch (CCC))) the designated public safety answering point with all available information as to the nature and location of the emergency.

D. Ambulance Response.

An ambulance may not respond to a medical emergency incident unless called to respond by ((Spokane City/ County fire service dispatch (CCC))) the designated public safety answering point ((or direct telephone call as provided for in subsection (C) of this section)).

E. Monitoring Frequencies.

No person may monitor emergency service radio frequencies to ascertain emergency medical incident locations for the purpose of responding.

Section 9. That Section 10.47.080 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.080 Patient Care and Transfer

The procedure for patient care at an incident and for the transfer of care of such person(s) ((is as follows)) shall follow the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council Protocols:

- A. Medical Command at the Scene.
 - 1. Fire Personnel on Scene First.
 - a. Upon arrival on the scene of a medical emergency where patient care is being provided by ((fire protection district)) Spokane Fire Department personnel, the ambulance crew seeks out the officer or paramedic in command of the incident.
 - b. Fire personnel remain in charge of the incident in accordance with state law.
 - c. Fire personnel remain in charge of patient care until it is specifically relinquished to the ambulance personnel.
 - 2. Ambulance Crew Scene First.
 - a. Where the ambulance company has arrived first on the scene of a medical emergency, the officer in charge of the subsequently arriving ((Spokane fire department)) Spokane Fire Department unit seeks out the ambulance attendant in charge for a report on the condition of the patient, any treatment that may have been provided, and any other necessary information.
 - b. Following this transfer of information, the fire officer ((may assume command of the incident)) will follow the adopted Spokane County EMS Protocols for On Scene Medical Authority and Assistance and utilize fire resources to assist patient care to the extent possible.
 - 3. Order of Authority.

Patient care at an incident is subject to the following ascending order of authority <u>as</u> <u>described by the Spokane County EMS & Trauma Care Council Protocol</u>:

- a. First responder
- b. Emergency medical technician (first arriving, either fire or private).
- c. Paramedic or flight nurse (first arriving, either fire or private).

- d. Physician <u>with acceptance of 'Thank You For Your Offer of</u> <u>Assistance' card</u>.
- e. ((ALS (Advanced Life Support))) EMS supervising physician.
- f. ((Medical program director)) <u>Spokane County Medical Program</u> <u>Director.</u>
- B. Patient Care Procedures and Protocols.
 - 1. Patient care procedures and protocols shall comply with the Spokane County pre-hospital patient care procedures and protocols established by the ((Spokane County EMS & council, East Region Trauma Council,)) Spokane County EMS & Trauma Care Council, East Region EMS & Trauma Care Council, and Spokane County ((medical program director)) Medical Program Director.
 - 2. Concerns about patient care procedures, including compliance, should be referred to the ((Spokane County EMS council)) Spokane County EMS & Trauma Care Council.
- C. Patient Transfer.
 - 1. Loading of patients into the ambulance is under the direction of ambulance company personnel.
 - 2. The ambulance company assumes responsibility for patient care from fire personnel in accordance with subsection (A)(1) of this section, except that a ((advance)) advanced life support (ALS) patient care may remain the responsibility of the ((advance)) advanced life support personnel providing the patient care if such ALS provider accompany the patient during transport.
 - 3. Should the condition of a patient or the number of patients necessitate more than the ambulance company's personnel in the patient compartment to appropriately treat the patient(s), the ambulance company and the fire officer shall mutually determine if the ((Spokane fire department)) Spokane Fire Department will provide additional personnel to assist with patient care en route to the hospital.
- D. Selection of Hospital.

((The order of priority in transporting patients to hospitals shall be consistent with patient care procedures as established by the Spokane County EMS council)) The order of priority in transporting patients to hospitals shall be consistent with Spokane County EMS & Trauma Council Operating Procedures, East Region EMS and Trauma Care Council

Patient Care Procedures, and Washington state trauma, cardiac, and stroke destination procedures.

Section 10. That Section 10.47.090 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.090 ((Communications)) <u>Dispatch and Communications</u>) <u>Requirements</u>

- A. Dispatch Center Requirements.
 - 1. An ambulance company must provide staffed dispatch twenty-four hours per day.
 - 2. Staffing may be accomplished by the ambulance company or by contract with another agency.
 - 3. All dispatchers must be trained and certified in "Emergency Medical Dispatch" or a ((Washington state DOH-approved equivalent)) <u>or equivalent</u> <u>State-approved training program</u>.
 - 4. Ambulance service dispatch centers must have speed-dial telephone lines to all level 3 or higher designated trauma centers in Spokane County.
 - 5. Direct-connect telephone lines to ((fire and law enforcement emergency)) dispatch centers are to be provided at no cost to the City.
- B. Radio Communications.
 - 1. An ambulance company must have, and provide with its permit application, a <u>two-way</u> radio communications plan meeting all FCC permit and licensing requirements <u>and requirements of WAC 246-976-310</u>.
 - 2. All ambulance company radio frequencies and permission to access them must be provided to the ((Spokane fire department)) <u>City of Spokane</u>.
- C. Recordings.
 - 1. An ambulance company shall record all of its dispatch telephone and radio traffic with a recorder providing a simultaneous date and time track.
 - 2. All recordings shall be retained for a minimum period of ninety days.
 - 3. Recordings shall be made available to the City ((of Spokane EMS board)) upon request.

Section 11. That Section 10.47.120 (Telephone Numbers) of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

Section 12. That Section 10.47.130 (Appearance) of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

Section 13. That there is adopted a new Section 10.47.131 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Section 10.47.131 Appearance of City-licensed Ambulances

- A. "911" is the public telephone number for all emergencies, including medical emergencies of all types, in the city of Spokane. "911" shall be the only telephone number displayed on an ambulance licensed by the City of Spokane.
- B. ((Neither)) <u>Private</u> ambulance color schemes ((nor)) <u>and</u> uniforms may <u>not</u> represent or resemble those of the ((Spokane fire department)) <u>Spokane Fire</u> <u>Department</u>.

<u>C. Private ambulances shall not use the logo of City of Spokane or the Spokane Fire</u> Department without approval by the City Administrator or their designee.

Section 14. That Section 10.47.140 (Enforcement) of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

Section 15. That Section 10.47.150 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.47.150 Penalties and Enforcement

A. Any person who ((violates any provisions of this chapter)) operates a private ambulance without an emergency medical transport license is guilty of a misdemeanor. ((and upon conviction shall be punished by:)) All other violations of this chapter are Class 1 Civil Infractions.

((1.imprisonment in the City/County jail for a maximum term fixed by the court of not more than ninety days, or

- 2. by a fine in an amount fixed by the court of not more than one thousand dollars, or
- 3. both such imprisonment and fine.))
- B. Each day that a violation is permitted to exist constitutes a separate offense.
- C. As an alternative to the enforcement provisions in this section, the City may suspend or revoke the emergency medical transport license issued under this chapter for noncompliance or violation of any requirement of this chapter. The suspension or revocation of the emergency medical transport license shall follow the process and appeal procedures described in SMC 08.01.

Section 16. That Section 10.47.190 (Effective Date_ of the Spokane Municipal Code is repealed.

This Contract Extension is made and entered into by and between the **CITY OF SPOKANE POLICE DEPARTMENT** as ("City"), a Washington municipal corporation, and **EVERGREEN STATE TOWING, LLC**, whose address is PO Box 48285, Spokane, Washington 99228 as ("Company"), individually hereafter referenced as a "party", and together as the "parties".

WHEREAS, the parties entered into a Contract wherein the Company agreed to provide IMPOUND AND ABANDONED RV DISPOSAL SERVICES; and

WHEREAS, additional time is required and, thus, the Contract time for performance needs to be formally extended by this written document.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of these terms, the parties mutually agree as follows:

1. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.

The Contract, dated March 4, 2021, any previous amendments, addendums and / or extensions / renewals thereto, are incorporated by reference into this document as though written in full and shall remain in full force and effect except as provided herein.

2. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Contract Extension shall become effective on January 1, 2025 and shall run through September 30, 2025.

3. Performance/Scope of Work.

In addition to RV's, boats and utility trailers are to be towed and disposed of under this contract, however the State will not reimburse boats and utility trailers under the Abandoned RV Disposal Reimbursement Program. The rates invoiced to the City for the towing and disposal of these items are defined in the tables below. For the purpose of this contract, Boats are defined as boat on or off of trailer, excluding small vessels such as kayaks, row boats and canoes. Utility trailers are defined as open-air trailers, typically 16' or less in length with low to medium height sidewalls designed to be towed by a standard vehicle.

4. COMPENSATION.

The City shall pay an amount not to exceed **ONE HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$125,000.00)**, and applicable sales tax, for everything furnished and done under this Contract Extension, provided that appropriate receipts and documentation are provided.

Prior to invoicing the City, the company shall seek state cost reimbursements for items from RV's that cannot be disposed of in the City provided dumpster, making best efforts to comply with the DOL's Abandoned RV Cost Reimbursement Program requirements. Disposal costs associated with items from utility trailers and boats that cannot be disposed of in the City provided dumpster may be invoiced directly to the City, as these

vehicles do not qualify for state reimbursement. Invoices must be submitted with disposal cost receipts.

ORDINANCE NO C36671

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. C36626, PASSED BY THE CITY COUNCIL ON DECEMBER 9, 2024, AND ENTITLED IN PART "AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A BIENNIAL BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF SPOKANE", MAKING APPROPORIATION ADJUSTMENTS FOR YEAR 2025, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, subsequent to the adoption of the biennial budget Ordinance No. C36626, as above entitled in part, and which passed the City Council December 9, 2024, it is necessary to make changes in the appropriations of the Management Information Systems (IT) Fund, which changes could not have been anticipated or known at the time of making such budget ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance has been on file in the City Clerk's Office for five days;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That in the budget of the Management Information Systems (IT) Fund, and the budget annexed thereto with reference to the Fund, the following changes be made:

- 1) Increase revenue by \$100,983.
- A) Of the increased revenue, \$100,983 is provided solely for receipt of award from State and Local Cybersecurity Grant Program.
- 2) Increase appropriation by \$100,983.
- A) Of the increased appropriation, \$12,000 is provided solely for contractual services.
- B) Of the increased appropriation, \$88,983 is provided solely for capitalized computers and microprocessing equipment.

Section 2. It is, therefore, by the City Council declared that an urgency and emergency exists for making the changes set forth herein, such urgency and emergency arising from the need to take receipt of the State and Local Cybersecurity Grant award and execute the award as intended, and because of such need, an urgency and emergency exists for the passage of this ordinance, and also, because the same makes an appropriation, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage.

Agenda Wording

An Ordinance relating to regular adjustments of fees, charges and other assessments collected by the City of Spokane to ensure they reflect the actual cost of service delivery; and amending Section 04.02.010 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

<u>Summary (Background)</u>

This Ordinance seeks to consistently achieve cost recovery. This ordinance will require an assessment of fees, charges, and other assessments at a minimum frequency of every two years. The fee increase will be based on the consumer price index except as provided by RCW.

What impacts would the proposal have on historically excluded communities?

It will ease the sticker shock of inflation by gradually stepping up fees rather than having huge fees increased infrequently. It will provide an opportunity to decrease fees if the service becomes less expensive to the City.

How will data be collected, analyzed, and reported concerning the effect of the program/policy by racial, ethnic, gender identity, national origin, income level, disability, sexual orientation, or other existing disparities?

Routine updates to our fees help to ensure that customers/residents/ratepayers receiving a specific service cover the cost of that service. This approach protects low-income residents and ratepayers by making sure that their dollars are spent appropriately on the services they expect rather than on individual benefits to others.

How will data be collected regarding the effectiveness of this program, policy, or product to ensure it is the right solution?

After a departmental review, each department will report the status and outcome to the Mayor and the City Council to show that the City is recovering the actual cost of delivering services.

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ORDINANCE NO. <u>C36670</u>

An Ordinance relating to regular adjustments of fees, charges and other assessments collected by the City of Spokane to ensure they reflect the actual cost of service delivery; and amending Section 04.02.010 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, the City lawfully assesses certain fees, charges and other assessments for services rendered, such as processing applications, reviewing documents and issuing permits, and delivering essential services; and

WHEREAS, because many fee schedules fail to keep pace with the actual cost of delivery of services due to the significant time, resources and expenses associated with evaluating whether fees, charges and other assessments suffice to cover costs; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to encourage regular evaluation of available technologies and software that would allow for reduction or other adjustments of City fees, charges, and assessments; and

WHEREAS, the City Council wishes to establish a policy that would ensure regular review of fees, charges and other assessments to ensure they both reflect the actual cost of services rendered, coupled with efforts to reduce the costs of collection;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. That Article I, Section 04.02.010 of the Spokane Municipal Code is amended as follows:

Article I. In General

Section 04.02.010 Policy to Collect Accounts

- <u>A.</u> It is the policy of the City to promptly identify and collect all duly payable moneys related to services rendered, damage to City property, or any other source.
- B. It is the policy of the City to regularly review and, as necessary, adjust schedules for fees, charges, and other assessments to ensure the City recovers at least the actual cost of delivering said services. Accordingly, during the even year of each biennium, all city departments shall review as appropriate their schedules for fees, charges, and other assessments to ensure there is adequate cost recovery for the services rendered, and shall then report the status and outcome of such review to

the Mayor and City Council. The biennial review and adjustment shall be governed by the following specific criteria:

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, fees, charges and assessments shall be adjusted by reference to the Consumer Price Index published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics, (All City Average (CPI-U and CPI-W)) or such other applicable index or formula appropriate for the service rendered.
- 2. <u>General facilities charges shall be updated and maintained pursuant to</u> <u>Chapters 13.03 and 13.04 of the Spokane Municipal Code.</u>
- 3. <u>Transportation impact fees shall be updated and maintained pursuant to</u> <u>Chapter 17D.075 of the Spokane Municipal Code.</u>
- 4. <u>This section shall not apply to criminal and civil penalties fees, which shall</u> <u>be adjusted consistent with state law and any penalty schedule</u> <u>established separately under the Spokane Municipal Code.</u>
- 5. In reviewing fees, charges, and other assessments each biennium, each City department shall systematically and resolutely pursue opportunities to maximize operational efficiency, eliminate waste, streamline processes, and minimize administrative costs to ensure the lowest possible financial burden on payers. This includes exploring innovative solutions that enhance effectiveness and reduce expenses. In conjunction with the Information Technology Division, departments shall also evaluate and implement apt software and platforms that automate workflows, improve accuracy, and reduce the costs associated with calculating and billing fees, charges, and other assessments.
- 6. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit review and adjustment of fees more frequently than every biennium.

Section 2. <u>Severability</u>. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

Section 3. <u>Clerical Errors.</u> Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's

errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Agenda Wording

An ordinance relating to the prohibition of sitting and laying on public sidewalks, and amending Section 10.60.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

Summary (Background)

Current Spokane Municipal Code 10.60.020 limits the geographic scope of certain "sit and lie" prohibitions to the downtown core, in part because of past legal limitations on enforcement. This ordinance amends SMC 10.60.020 so that all of its provisions apply city-wide, there are no legal limitations on hours of enforcement, and there is no longer a shelter bed availability requirement.

What impacts would the proposal have on historically excluded communities?

Illegal sit and lie activities, while primarily a problem in the downtown core, affect citizens and businesses throughout the city, in all neighborhoods and business districts. Enacting this ordinance ensures that all neighborhoods, including those in historically excluded communities, benefit from the same protective ordinance that now only benefits the downtown core.

How will data be collected, analyzed, and reported concerning the effect of the program/policy by racial, ethnic, gender identity, national origin, income level, disability, sexual orientation, or other existing disparities?

Unclear at his time, but some data should be available as part of the regular reporting of code enforcement activities.

Unclear at his time, but some data should be available as part of the regular reporting of code enforcement activities.

ORDINANCE NO. C36674

An ordinance relating to the prohibition of sitting and laying on public sidewalks, and amending Section 10.60.020 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, the safety and well-being of Spokane citizens, as well as the viability of local businesses, are threatened by the continued unlawful occupation and use of public sidewalks and adjacent building entrances and parking areas; and

WHEREAS, the Spokane Municipal Code section 10.60.020, the so-called "sit-and-lie" ordinance, regulates the unlawful occupation of sidewalks and pedestrian avenues, all to promote the safe and responsible use of public spaces; and

WHEREAS, Spokane voters overwhelmingly approved Proposition 1 in 2023, demonstrating broad public support for the expansion and enforcement of local laws prohibiting unauthorized camping and sit-and-lie violations; and

WHEREAS, on June 26, 2024, the Supreme Court of the United States issued its ruling in *City of Grants Pass v. Johnson*, holding that local government ordinances with civil and criminal penalties for camping on public land do not constitute cruel and unusual punishment; and

WHEREAS, the effect of the *Grants Pass* holding is to remove the legal impediment to full and effective enforcement of SMC 10.60.020, the sit-and-lie ordinance, and to create a much clearer legal framework for enforcing anti-camping and sit-and-lie ordinances, potentially allowing municipalities greater authority in managing public spaces; and

WHEREAS, the *Grants Pass* decision also removes any legal impediment to expansion of the existing sit-and-lie ordinance to all public spaces within the City limits;

NOW THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That Section 10.060.020 of Spokane Municipal Code is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.60.020 Sitting, Lying on Sidewalk ((in a Designated Zone)) Within City Limits

A. Prohibition. Within city limits, it shall at all times be unlawful for any person to:

- 1. ((No person may sit)) <u>Sit</u> or lie down upon a public sidewalk, or upon a blanket, chair, stool, or any other object placed upon a public sidewalk ((, during the hours between six a.m. and midnight in the zone designated in this section)).
- 2. ((At all times it is unlawful to sit)) <u>Sit</u> or lie on any drinking fountain, trash container, planter, bicycle rack, or any other sidewalk fixture not designed primarily for the purpose of sitting.

- 3. ((At all times it is unlawful to sit)) <u>Sit</u> or lie in any entrance to or exit from any building or parking lot, or on any loading dock.
- B. Exceptions.

The prohibition in subsection (A) of this section does not apply to any person:

- 1. sitting or lying down due to a medical emergency or due to a sensory, mental, or physical disability;
- 2. who, as the result of a sensory, mental, or physical disability, utilizes a wheelchair, walker, or similar device to move about the public sidewalk;
- 3. operating or patronizing a business with permission to occupy the sidewalk;
- 4. participating in or attending a parade, festival, performance, rally, demonstration, meeting, or similar event conducted on the public sidewalk pursuant to a special event or other applicable permit;
- 5. sitting on a chair or bench supplied by a public agency or by the abutting private property owner pursuant to the appropriate permit or license; or
- 6. sitting within a bus stop zone while waiting for public or private transportation;
- 7. sitting on privately-owned sidewalk fixture with the permission of the owner;
- 8. engaging in constitutionally protected expressive activities which would otherwise be restricted by the limitations in subsection (A) of this section.
- ((9. who is homeless during a time frame when shelter space is unavailable.))
- C. No person shall be subject to enforcement under this section unless the person engages in conduct prohibited by this section ((within the entirety of the zone designated in this section)) after having been notified by a law enforcement officer that the conduct violates this section and has been given a reasonable amount of time to comply or has refused to comply. If the individual fails to comply in a reasonable time or engages in prohibited conduct in another location within the ((designated zone)) city limits, a law enforcement officer may than enforce this section.
- ((D. The zone where such conduct is prohibited is established in the map set forth in <u>Attachment A</u> (PDF 1.2MB).))

((\in)) <u>D</u>. This section does not permit any conduct which is prohibited by SMC 10.60.010 regarding interference with pedestrian or vehicular traffic.

((G)) <u>E</u>. A violation of SMC 10.60.020 is a misdemeanor.

((H. The provisions of this section are declared to be separate and severable. The invalidity of any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, or portion of this section, or the invalidity of the application thereof to any person or circumstance does not affect the validity of the remainder of this section, or the validity of its application to other persons or circumstances)).

Section 2. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of

this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance, or the validity of its application to other persons or circumstances.

Section 3. Clerical Errors. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Amending appropriations previously passed by Council to conform grant funding allocations to various amended grant award letters from the Administrative Office of the Court (AOC).

Summary (Background)

Council had previously approved and accepted multiple grant awards for various Therapeutic Court programs within the Spokane Municipal Court. Based on continuing administrative delays associated with City hiring and procurement processes, Municipal Court was unable to expend the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) grant funds in a timely manner. Based on the Courts inability to expend the funds in a timely manner, AOC withdrew a portion of each of the grants with the intention to reallocate them to other Courts who are able to spend down the funds by the end of the States fiscal year. This SBO transfers the grant funding between various previously authorized budget lines to align the remaining AOC grant funds with the needs of the Therapeutic Court programs and the appropriate City funds.

Will reduce services the Court's Therapeutic Court programs were anticipated to provide to this population.

WHEREAS, subsequent to the adoption of the biennial budget Ordinance No. C36626, as above entitled in part, and which passed the City Council December 9, 2024, it is necessary to make changes in the appropriations of the Miscellaneous Grants Fund, which changes could not have been anticipated or known at the time of making such budget ordinance; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance has been on file in the City Clerk's Office for five days;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That in the budget of the Miscellaneous Grants Fund, and the budget annexed thereto with reference to the Fund, the following changes be made:

- 1) Decrease appropriation by \$145,620.00.
- A) Of the decreased appropriation, \$37,000.00 is reduced solely from Personnel Salaries and Benefits for Community Court Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) grant.
- B) Of the decreased appropriation, \$28,620.00 is reduced solely from Personnel Salaries and Benefits for Domestic Violence Intervention Therapeutic Court (DVITC) AOC grant.
- C) Of the decreased appropriation, \$45,000.00 is reduced solely from Personnel Salaries and Benefits for Drug Court AOC grant.
- D) Of the decreased appropriation, \$30,000.00 is reduced solely from Personnel Salaries and Benefits for DUI Court AOC grant.
- E) Of the decreased appropriation, \$5,000.00 is reduced solely from Professional Services for Veterans Court AOC grant.
- 2) Increase appropriation by \$26,825.50.

- 3) Decrease revenue by \$118,794.50.
- A) Of the decreased revenue, \$29,000.00 is reduced solely from Other Judicial Agencies AOC Community Court grant.
- B) Of the decreased revenue, \$9,794.50 is reduced solely from Other Judicial Agencies AOC DVITC grant.
- C) Of the decreased revenue, \$45,000.00 is reduced solely from Other Judicial Agencies AOC Drug Court grant.
- D) Of the decreased revenue, \$30,000.00 is reduced solely from Other Judicial Agencies AOC DUI Court grant.
- E) Of the decreased revenue, \$5,000.00 is reduced solely from Other Judicial Agencies AOC Veterans Court grant.

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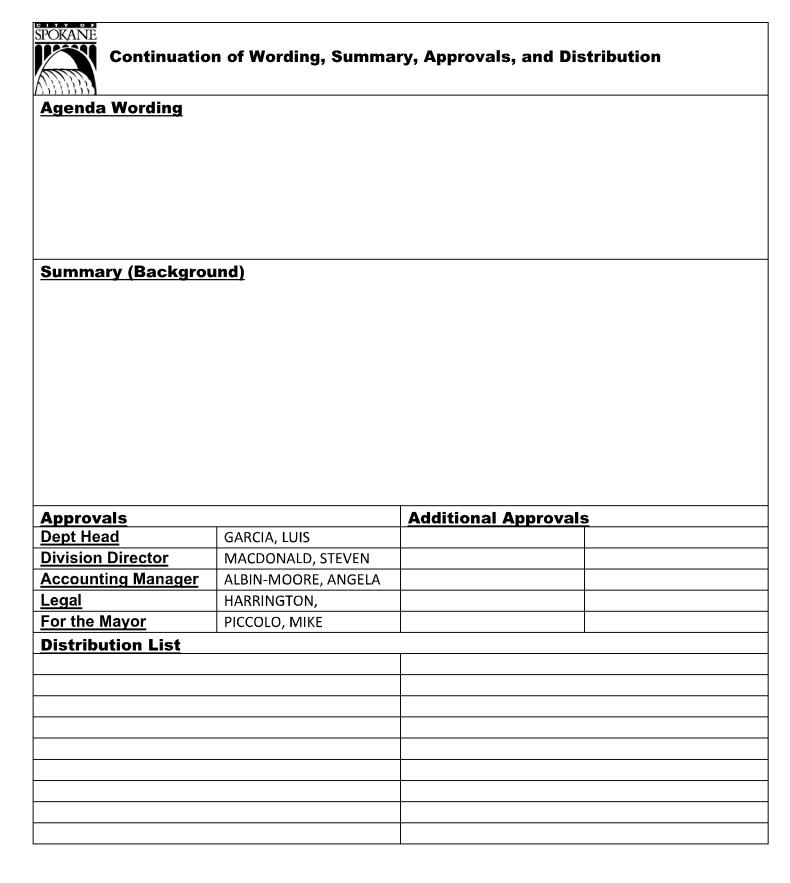

The agreement is in compliance with a clean and safe Spokane, which includes properties owned by state agencies.

Interlocal Agreement Between Washington State Department of Transportation (GCB 4001) And City of Spokane

This Agreement is between the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) and City of Spokane (City); hereinafter individually referred to as the "Party" and collectively referred to as the "Parties."

Recitals

- A. ESHB1125 effective May 16, 2023, provides the Transportation Budget.
- В. Section 216 (4)(a) Exhibit A provides state appropriation solely for the department to address the risks to safety and public health associated with homeless encampments on department owned rights-of-way. The department must coordinate and work with local government officials and social service organizations who provide services and direct people to housing alternatives that are not in highway rights-of-way to help prevent future encampments from forming on highway rights-of-way and may reimburse the organizations doing this outreach assistance who transition people into treatment or housing or for debris clean up on highway rights-of-way. A minimum of \$2,000,000 of this appropriation must be used to deliver more frequent removal of litter on the highway rights-of-way that is generated by unsheltered people and may be used to hire crews specializing in collecting and disposing of garbage, clearing debris or hazardous material, and implementing safety improvements where hazards exist to the traveling public and department employees. The department may use these funds to either reimburse local law enforcement costs or the Washington state patrol if they are providing enhanced safety to department staff during debris cleanup or during efforts to prevent future encampments from forming on highway rights-of-way
- C. Section 216 (5) (EXHIBIT A) provides that \$1,000,000 of the motor vehicle account—state appropriation is provided solely for a partnership program between the department and the city of Spokane, to be administered in conjunction with subsection (4) of this section. The program must address the safety and public health problems created by homeless encampments on the department's property along state highways within the city limits. \$555,000 of the motor vehicle account—state appropriation is for dedicated department maintenance staff and associated clean-up costs. The department and the city of Spokane shall enter into a reimbursable agreement to cover up to \$445,000 of the city's expenses for clean-up crews and landfill costs.
- D. WSDOT has also secured additional funding in the amount of \$400,000 that will go along with Exhibit A.
- E. WSDOT and the City desire to enter into an agreement to address homeless encampments on WSDOT (ROW) by providing local, targeted cleanup and outreach services and supporting safety improvements where hazards exist to the traveling public and department employees.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to chapter 39.34 RCW, the above recitals that are incorporated herein as if fully set forth below, and in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants, and performances contained herein, and the attached Exhibits by this referenced incorporated and made a part hereof, IT IS MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS:

1. General

- 1.1 WSDOT routes inside the City subject to this Agreement shall include the following: US2, 190, US395, NSC (including the Children of the Sun Trail), SR290, and SR291 corridors located within city limits.
- 1.2 The City will follow adopted City policies and procedures for employee safety and personal protective equipment when completing this encampment cleanup work as shown in exhibit B.
- 1.3 The City will provide employees, tools and equipment to remove materials and repair sites inside or adjacent to WSDOT ROW damaged by homeless encampments. The materials to be removed and the repair of sites may include removal of litter, trash, costs associated with the removal and storage of vehicles including recreational vehicles, debris, hazardous materials, tree limbs, mowing, fence repair and installation and similar work performed to create open sites to help with enforcement and safety.
- 1.4 The City will enforce trespass laws pursuant to RCW on properties with appropriate No Trespass signage.
- 1.5 No Camping City will enforce chapter 12.02 Obstruction, Encroachment of Public Ways as shown in exhibit C.
- 1.6 The City will notify WSDOT of vehicles parked/stored on WSDOT property covered by this agreement. WSDOT will issue trespass orders to vehicles being parked/ stored on WSDOT property and will remove said vehicles from WSDOT property. Vehicles on City streets and right of way directly adjacent to WSDOT properties will continue to be addressed by City staff in accordance with current City policies and procedures.
- 1.7 WSDOT will post and maintain "No Trespass" signs on WSDOT owned properties. The sign locations will be agreed upon by both parties and pursuant to WSDOT's Guidelines to Address Illegal Camping within State Right of Way. If requested by WSDOT, SPD will be present during the posting of signage.
- 1.8 WSDOT will maintain all existing barrier infrastructure and other Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) elements including, but not limited to:
 - Fencing
 - Vegetation (unless agreed to alter by both parties).
 - Hard infrastructure not listed as City responsibility below.
- 1.9 WSDOT shall coordinate the appropriate traffic control to ensure safety of laborers and the traveling public as needed for cleanup work adjacent to active traffic on State Routes.
- 1.10 While on WSDOT premises, the City, its agents, employees, or subcontractors shall comply with WSDOT safety and security policies and regulations. Including requirements for the prevention of transmission of communicable diseases (such as Covid).

- 1.11 The City may provide outreach services for the purpose of connecting at-risk populations inside WSDOT right-of-way with critical wrap-around social services and resources that can aid and improve the circumstances of homeless persons ability to leave the ROW.
- 1.12 In conjunction with WSDOT, the City will monitor and clean WSDOT ROW based on existing maintenance routes to help ensure homeless encampments do not form or return. The City will prioritize cleanup sites and efforts based on staffing capacity, time, and equipment availability.
- 1.13 At the request of the City, WSDOT will participate in meetings and develop reclamation plans for any identified WSDOT ROW site. During these meetings, WSDOT and the City will agree on work to be performed to reduce accessibility and use of WSDOT ROW.
- 1.14 The effective date of this agreement is the date this agreement is signed by both Parties with a termination date of June 30, 2025, or before if available funding is fully expended.

2. Payment

- 2.1 WSDOT in consideration of the faithful performance of the work to be done by the City, in accordance with this Agreement will reimburse the City for the actual direct and related indirect cost of the work in an amount not to exceed Eight Hundred Forty Five Thousand Dollars (\$845,000).
- 2.2 Partial payments shall be made by WSDOT, upon request of the City, to cover costs incurred. These payments are not to be more frequent than one (1) per month. It is agreed that any such partial payment will not constitute agreement as to the appropriateness of any item and that, at the time of the final audit, all required adjustments will be made and reflected in a final payment.
- 2.3 The City agrees to submit a final bill to WSDOT within ninety (90) days after completion of Work and no more often than once per month.

2.4 Invoices and Payment

The City shall submit invoices that include detailed backup information including but not limited to timesheet reports. Each invoice shall include the following items:

- Agreement number and title.
- Invoice number.
- Period covered by the invoice (specific beginning and ending calendar days).
- Total amount expended to-date against the City's preliminary estimate, which WSDOT has agreed to as the total dollar amount for this agreement.
- A brief narrative progress report that addresses progress of the work performed by the City.

- 2.5 State Fiscal Year End Closure Requirements (chapter 43.88 RCW): Any invoices for work performed between July 1 and June 30 of any given year must be submitted to WSDOT no later than July 6th (or the first business day after the July 4th holiday) of the same calendar year. If the City is unable to provide an invoice for such work by this date, an estimate of all remaining payable costs owed by WSDOT for work performed by the City prior to July 1 must be submitted to the WSDOT no later than July 19th of the same year in order for WSDOT to accrue the amount necessary for payment. The City will thereafter submit any remaining invoices to WSDOT for such work as soon as possible. Failure to comply with these requirements may result in delayed payment. WSDOT shall not be required to pay to the City late payment fees, interest, or incidental costs incurred by the City or any other costs related to a delayed payment if the City fails to comply with the invoice requirements of this Section.
- 2.6 WSDOT will review invoices, and associated attachments, and will notify the City of any unallowable/disapproved costs. WSDOT will specify the reason for any unallowable/disapproved costs on the invoiced amounts it believes it is not responsible for and/or may request justification from the City for the unallowable/disapproved costs. If the City provides the justification and WSDOT approves the cost, the City may resubmit the unallowable/disapproved costs in a subsequent invoice, noted as a resubmittal and within 60-days' notice of WSDOT's notification to the City of the initial unallowable/ disapproved cost.

Otherwise, the Parties may enter into the dispute resolution process (all unallowable/disapproved costs shall be subject to the dispute resolution process unless otherwise agreed to by the Parties) as noted in Section 3.

3. Dispute Resolution

- 3.1 The Parties shall make good faith efforts to quickly and collaboratively resolve any dispute arising under or in connection with this Agreement. The dispute resolution process outlined in this Section applies to dispute arising under or in connection with the terms of this Agreement.
- 3.2 Informal Resolution. The informal resolution process begins at the staff level and is raised to the higher organizational levels, if necessary. The levels of resolution are described below:
 - 3.2.1 Upon receipt of a written notice of request for dispute resolution, the WSDOT and the City Project Managers shall meet within ten (10) Business Days and attempt to resolve the dispute. Any resolution of the dispute requires the agreement of all Designated Representative attending the meeting who requested to attend the meeting.
 - 3.2.2 If unresolved, the WSDOT and City's project manager listed in section 8.1 shall jointly cooperate to informally resolve any dispute as quickly and efficiently as possible.
 - 3.2.3 If the Parties have not resolved the dispute within five (5) Business Days after the second level meeting, at any time thereafter either Party may seek relive under this Agreement in a court of law. The Parties agree that they have no right to relief in a court of law until they have completed the dispute resolution process outlined in this section.

4. Modification

4.1 This Agreement may be amended or modified only by the mutual agreement of the Parties. Such amendments or modifications shall not be binding unless they are in writing and signed by persons authorized to bind each of the Parties.

5. Indemnification and Insurance

- 5.1 To the extent permitted by law, WSDOT and the City shall protect, defend, indemnify, and save harmless each other, their respective officers, officials, employees, and agents, while acting within the scope of their employment as such, from any and all costs, claims, judgment, and/or awards of damages, arising out of, or in any way resulting from, Indemnifying Party's negligent acts or omissions. Neither WSDOT nor the City will be required to indemnify, defend, or save harmless each other if the claim, suit, or action for injuries, death, or damages is caused by the sole negligence of the other Party. Where such claims, suits, or actions result from concurrent negligence of WSDOT and the City, the indemnity provisions provided herein shall be valid and enforceable only to the extent of WSDOT's or the City's own negligence. WSDOT and the City agree that their respective obligations under this subsection extend to any claim, demand, and/or cause of action brought by, or on behalf of, any of its employees or agents. For this purpose, WSDOT and the City, by mutual negotiation, hereby waive, with respect to the other Party only, any immunity that would otherwise be available against such claims under the industrial insurance provisions of Title 51 RCW. In the event that WSDOT or the City incurs any judgment, award, and/or cost arising therefrom, including attorneys' fees, to enforce the provisions of this section, all such fees, expenses, and costs shall be recoverable by the prevailing Party. This indemnification shall survive the termination of this Agreement.
- 5.2 The City warrants that it is self-insured pursuant to a self-insurance "risk pool" duly authorized by the State of Washington and agrees to provide acceptable evidence of its self-insured status to WSDOT. The City self-insurance risk pool insurance policy must provide liability coverage for its operations under this Agreement, including (i) general liability coverage for bodily injury. property damage, and personal injury of not less than Two Million and no/100 Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) combined single limit per occurrence, with a general aggregate amount of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00) per policy period; coverage under policies shall be triggered on an "occurrence basis," not on a "claims made" basis; and (ii) commercial automobile liability coverage providing bodily injury and property damage liability coverage for all owned and non-owned vehicles assigned to or used in the performance of the operations under this Agreement, with a combined single limit of not less than One Million \$1,000,000 per occurrence. WSDOT shall be named as an additional insured by endorsement of the commercial general liability coverage provided under the "risk pool" coverage, utilizing ISO Form 2026 (Additional Insured - Designated Person or Organization) or its equivalent without modification. Coverage obtained by County in compliance with the Section shall not be deemed as having relieved County of any liability in excess of such coverage.

In the event the City is not a party to a state approved self-insurance "risk pool", it shall secure insurance coverage in conformance with the required of this Section 5.2 and promptly provide a certificate of insurance from an insurer licensed to conduct business in the State of Washington, evidencing the procurement of the required insurance coverages. WSDOT shall be named as an additional insured by endorsement of the liability policy required, utilizing ISO Form 2026 (Additional Insured – Designated Person or Organization) or its equivalent without modification on any such general liability policies.

6. Governing Law and Venue

6.1 This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the state of Washington. In the event that either Party deems it necessary to institute legal action or proceedings to enforce any right or obligation under this Agreement, the Parties hereto agree that any such action or proceedings shall be brought in Thurston/Spokane XXXX Superior Court. Further, the Parties agree that each will be solely responsible for payment of their own attorneys' fees, witness fees, and costs.

7. Independent capacity

7.1 The employees or agents of each Party who are engaged in the performance of this Agreement shall continue to be employees or agents of that Party and shall not be considered for any purpose to be employees or agents of the other Party.

8. Contacts and Notices

9. Severability

9.1 Should any clause, phrase, sentence or paragraph of this Agreement or its application be declared invalid or void by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions of this Agreement or its applications of those provisions not so declared shall remain in full force and effect.

10. Termination

10.1 Neither WSDOT nor the City may terminate this Agreement without the concurrence of the other Party. Termination shall be in writing and signed by both Parties. If this Agreement is so terminated prior to the fulfillment of the terms stated herein, the City shall be reimbursed for actual direct and related indirect expenses and costs incurred up to the date of termination, as well as the costs of non-cancelable obligations.

11. No Third-Party Beneficiaries

11.1 This Agreement is executed for the sole and exclusive benefit of the signatory Parties. Nothing in this Agreement, whether expressed or implied, is intended to confer any right, remedy or other entitlement upon any person other than the Parties hereto, nor is anything in this Agreement intended to relieve or discharge the obligation or liability of any third-party, nor shall any provision herein give any third-party any right of action against any Party hereto.

12. Audits/Records

12.1 All records for the PROJECT in support of all costs incurred shall be maintained by the Parties for a period of six (6) years. The Parties shall have full access to and right to examine said records, during normal business hours and as often as it deems necessary. The Parties agree

that the work performed herein is subject to audit by either or both Parties and/or their designated representatives, and/or the federal/state government.

- 12.2 If any litigation, claim, or audit is started before the expiration of the six (6) year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims, or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.
- 12.3 Records and other documents, in any medium, furnished by one Party to this Agreement to the other Party, will remain the property of the furnishing Party, unless otherwise agreed. The Parties understand that such records and documents related to this Agreement are subject to public release through state public disclosure requests. The receiving Party will not disclose or make available this material to any third parties without first giving notice to the furnishing Party and giving it a reasonable opportunity to respond. Each Party will utilize reasonable security procedures and protections to assure that records and documents provided by the other Party are not erroneously disclosed to third parties.

13. Working Days

13.1 Working days for this Agreement are defined as Monday through Friday, excluding Washington State furlough days or state holidays pursuant to RCW 1.16.050.

14. Counterparts

14.1 This Agreement may be executed in counterparts or in duplicate originals. Each counterpart or each duplicate shall be deemed an original copy of this Agreement signed by each party, for all purposes. Electronic signatures or signatures transmitted via e-mail in a "PDF" may be used in place of original signatures on this Agreement. Each party intends to be bound by its electronic or "PDF" signature on this Agreement and is aware that the other parties are relying on its electronic or "PDF" signature.

1.0 GENERAL

1.1 PURPOSE AND INTENT

The purpose of this policy is to establish criteria and outline procedures for the removal and cleanup of encampments.

The intent of this policy is to promote the interests of public health and safety while also respecting the rights of unsheltered individuals and connecting them with available shelter services. The public health and safety concerns related to encampments have generated innumerable citizen complaints and have prompted city departments to send crews of personnel to clean up garbage and solid waste. The City's efforts have not only been costly, but have brought to light far more than a problem of mere unwanted litter.

Behaviors associated with encampments have resulted in a variety of problems that include, but are not limited to, uncontained fires, damage to trees and landscaping, contaminated hypodermic needles left out on open lands, biohazards such as exposed human waste, damage to critical infrastructure such as bridges and streets, and significant interference with the intended uses of public facilities. Additionally, there have been threats to the health and safety of the campers themselves and to the community.

The City of Spokane intends to address these issues by establishing this Encampment Removal and Cleanup Policy.

2.0 DEPARTMENTS/DIVISIONS AFFECTED

This policy shall apply to the Spokane Police Department, Parks and Recreation and Neighborhood and Business Services.

4.0 DEFINITIONS

4.1 Encampment means a site where one or more individuals or groups of persons temporarily reside outdoors.

5.0 POLICY

5.1 It is the policy of the City of Spokane to remove and clean up encampments on public property while respecting the personal property rights of campers.

6.0 PROCEDURE

- 6.1 REMOVAL AND CLEANUP CRITERIA
 - A. Any encampment on public property may be designated for removal and cleanup consistent with this policy.
 - B. The City will prioritize removal if any of the following conditions is observed or reasonably suspected in connection with an encampment:
 - 1. physical threats or violence;
 - criminal activity not inherent in the act of unauthorized camping (e.g., drug use or sales, theft, sex trafficking, malicious mischief);
 - 3. a condition that significantly increases the likelihood of disease or the spread of disease (e.g., rodents, exposed meat, human waste);

- 4. a condition that presents a significant risk of bodily injury or death (e.g., discarded needles, vehicular traffic, weapons);
- 5. any other substantial threat to public health or safety;
- 6. damage (including potential or foreseeable damage) to the natural environment of environmentally critical areas;
- 7. significant amounts of trash;
- significant disruption to a primary intended use of public property (e.g., blocking a doorway, on a sports field or court; obstructing a large portion of a sidewalk);
- 9. occupation of an area in which the public is not allowed to be present during the times camping is occurring.
- C. Any of the factors enumerated in the above section that are observed at an encampment that is the subject of removal should be documented with a specific description, which may include a police report, and available photographic or videographic evidence including footage from body worn cameras.
- D. In addition to documentation with regard to the aforementioned conditions, the police officer or other person responsible for documentation should include a statement whether such conditions place the public at risk and how removal of the encampment is related to preservation of public health or safety.

6.2 REMOVAL AND CLEANUP PROCEDURES

A. Unoccupied Encampments – Written Notice Required Prior to Removal

For unoccupied encampments, written notice of removal will be posted on each tent and/or in any other distinct areas of the encampment. Reasonable efforts should be made to ensure that campers who are known to have difficulties understanding a written notice (whether because they are non-English speakers or impaired in some other way) receive the notice in a manner that is clear.

1. Contents of Notice

The written notice will provide at least the following notifications:

- a. Campers must remove all their belongings from the site within 48 hours.
- b. Campers should not leave behind any items they want to keep.
- c. Campers unable to remove their belongings in time due to disability or an equivalent hindrance may call 311 or visit MySpokane at Spokane City Hall (808 W. Spokane Falls Blvd), to make a request for special assistance. The request will be evaluated for reasonableness, and if reasonable, accommodated to the extent practicable. Campers should not assume that a request for assistance will be approved or that the City will be able to accommodate the request.
- d. Campers may call 311 or visit MySpokane at Spokane City Hall (808 W. Spokane Falls Blvd) to inquire about whether items that were left at an encampment have been stored. Campers may retrieve their belongings without fear of arrest solely on the basis that they are retrieving their belongings.
- e. Campers wishing to minimize the risk of losing valued possessions in removals should always keep such items, to the extent possible, in visible, sanitary, and safely accessible bags or bins.
- f. If the City does not clean up the site within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed five business days from expiration of the 48-hour period, the notice will be disregarded, and a new notice may then be posted.
- g. Basic contact information for campers seeking shelters or social services.
- 2. Cleanup After 48 hours, the City will clean up the site within a reasonable period of time.
 - a. Any campers who are present at that time will be directed to remove their belongings from the site.

- i. Items that a camper leaves behind will be deemed abandoned.
- ii. Requests for additional time or assistance to remove items will be evaluated for reasonableness, and if reasonable, accommodated to the extent practicable.
- b. City staff, as designated by the Director of Code Enforcement, will conduct an inspection for any remaining, unclaimed items, to the extent this can be done safely. An inspection may be narrowed or terminated for one or more of the following reasons that render further inspection unsafe:
 - presence of one or more hypodermic needles (especially if uncapped);
 - ii. strong odor or visual indication of unsanitary condition (e.g., biological waste) permeating a tent or space;
 - iii. a tent or space that is soaked in liquid or mud;
 - iv. any other similar indication that further inspection or manipulation would be unsafe.
- c. Unclaimed items found in an inspection will be initially eligible for storage if and only if:
 - circumstances indicate that the item belongs to a person;
 - ii. the item has apparent utility in its current condition and circumstances; and
 - iii. the item can be safely retrieved from the site.

Examples of potentially storable items include: identification, medication stored in medication bottles with identifying information, art, art supplies, musical instruments, and items that reasonably appear to have sentimental value in their current condition. An item need not be in new or perfect condition to have apparent utility.

- d. An eligible item found in an inspection will be put into storage, unless it is determined to meet one of the following disqualifying conditions:
 - i. hazardous (e.g., items contaminated with human waste, explosives, moldy items);
 - ii. likely to become hazardous in storage (e.g., perishables, wet materials that might become moldy, items covered in mud);
 - iii. practically un-storable, due to large size, weight, or other similar characteristic;
 - iv. contraband or stolen;
 - v. is on the City's current list (as published on the City's website) of common types of items that, in the experience of City staff, campers regularly abandon during encampment removals, and there is no contrary indication as to the specific item.
- e. Any items taken into storage will be kept in storage for up to 60 days. In addition to information already available on the notice, information about how stored items can be retrieved shall be available on the City of Spokane's website.
- If the City does not clean up the site within a reasonable period of time, not to exceed five business days from expiration of the 48-hour period, the notice will be disregarded, and a new notice may then be posted.
- 4. Stored items may be retrieved from storage based on a description with sufficient specificity to demonstrate ownership.
- B. Occupied Encampments

For occupied encampments, when shelter is available in the City, the City will provide campers with shelter and service information while expediting cleanup and removal of the site.

1. Campers will be directed to remove their belongings from the site.

- a. Items that a camper leaves behind will be deemed abandoned.
- b. Requests for additional time or assistance to remove items will be evaluated for reasonableness and, if reasonable, accommodated to the extent practicable.
- 2. A separate and unclaimed portion of an otherwise occupied encampment will be treated as an unoccupied encampment per Section A above.
- C. Other Expedited Removals
 - 1. The following types of encampments are subject to expedited removal even if the encampment is unoccupied:
 - a. An encampment in an area the public is not allowed to access at the time of removal, with clear signage to that effect.
 - b. An encampment in an area that has been clearly signed as specially off-limits to camping and subject to expedited removal.
 - c. An encampment that significantly disrupts a primary intended use of public property (e.g., blocking a doorway, on a sports field or court, or obstructing a large portion of a sidewalk).
 - d. An encampment that poses a significant risk of bodily injury (e.g., directly adjacent to vehicular traffic, requires walking across highway traffic to access).
 - e. An encampment that appears to have been entirely abandoned (e.g., no persons present and no indication anyone is likely to return for remaining items).
 - 2. In an expedited removal, the notice specified in Section (A)(1) is not required. The City will otherwise follow the same clean-up procedures specified in this policy.

- 6.3 No part of this Encampment Removal and Cleanup Policy is intended to create any private or other cause of action.
- 7.0 RESPONSIBILITIES
 - 7.1 Departments are required to coordinate efforts to comply with this policy.

City of Spokane Camp Removals – Property Storage Commonly Encountered Items

In the course of responding to reports of illegal camping on public land in the City of Spokane, items are encountered and determinations must be made on site whether to discard or store items. This list is not intended to be all-inclusive and determinations will be made in accordance with the City's Encampment Policy, in good faith and in the interest of the safety of city employees, the personal property rights of campers, and the general health and welfare of the public and its infrastructure. For more information, see the City's Encampment Removal and Cleanup Policy.

Items commonly encountered that <u>will be stored</u> unless in a disqualifying condition (broken, not safely accessible, unsanitary, impractical to store, contraband, or clearly abandoned):

- Items of obvious value (such as intact personal electronics, jewelry, debit/credit cards)
- Legal documents and identification cards
- Intact medical equipment (including prosthetics, wheelchairs, canes, eye glasses)
- Suitcases, backpacks, and other personal bags
- Clothing and bedding
- Tents
- Intact and undamaged bicycles, scooters, and other personal transportation implements
- Tools and cooking equipment

Items encountered that, in the City's experience, commonly are abandoned and presumptively will not be stored:

- Scrap materials, such as lumber, pallets, tarps, plastic, and tires
- Parts of physical structures
- Couches and mattresses

- b. Within three blocks of any congregate shelter provided that signs are posted prohibiting camping that are clearly visible to pedestrians.
- c. In public within one thousand (1,000) feet of the perimeter of the grounds of a park (SMC Section 12.06A.030(B&D)), a day care center or child care facility (RCW 35.63.170(3-4)), or a public or private school (RCW 28A.150.010 and RCW 28A.195.010).

B. Penalty

A violation of this section is a misdemeanor. Unless otherwise subject to custodial arrest on a warrant or probable cause for another crime, individuals subject to enforcement under this section shall be cited and released rather than being booked into jail. With the exception of those who do not meet the criteria for acceptance into community court, individuals subject to enforcement under this chapter shall be referred to community court by officer citation.

- C. Enforcement
 - 1. Law enforcement officers shall not issue a criminal citation to enforce unauthorized camping in violation of section 12.02.1010 (A)(1) when an individual is on public property at a time when there is no available overnight shelter. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the enforcement of section 12.02.1003 at all times, regardless of the availability of shelter, when a person is causing harm to the Spokane River or Latah Creek or to the banks and natural areas that buffer these waterways; nor shall this section be construed to prevent the expedited removal of an encampment on any public property pursuant to section 12.02.1012 (C).
 - a. Prior to issuing a citation to a homeless person who is sleeping, lying, sitting, or camping outdoors, the police officer must first confirm that a 24/7 low-barrier shelter had available space during the previous twenty-four hours that could have been utilized by that individual.
 - b. Confirmation of overnight shelter availability may come from data provided through a City-approved data system or through direct contact with regional low-barrier shelters, and shall consist of the following:
 - i. whether a shelter has available space for sleeping,
 - ii. the number of available spaces, and
 - iii. the guests each shelter will accept (i.e. men, women, families with children, etc.).
 - 2. Sections 12.02.1010 (A)(2) and (A)(3) are enforceable at all times regardless of shelter availability,
