# PIT Methodology


- The Point-in-time Count survey's two groups
  - Sheltered – Those in shelters and transitional housing programs
  - Unsheltered – Those living on the streets, places not meant for habitation, vehicle residency
- Federally Required
- January 22-27, 2024
- Complete census of Spokane County






# Estimated Total Persons: 2022 - 2024




# Estimated Total Persons by Category: 2022 - 2024






# Estimated Total Persons by Household Type






# Estimated Chronically Homeless Persons




# Estimated Chronically Homeless Persons By Category




# Demographics: Race of Total Persons




# Demographics: Gender of Total Persons




# Demographics – Gender Identities of Persons who Identified as Multiple Genders




# Estimated Veterans: 2022 - 2024




# Estimated Families: 2022 - 2024




# Unsheltered Location Density



# Data to Watch for 2024: System Performance Metrics

Metric 7a.1 - Change in Street Outreach exits to temporary destinations, some institutional destinations, and permanent housing destinations	2021	2022	2023
Persons who exit Street Outreach	754	510	687
Of persons above, those who exited to temporary & some institutional destinations	176	43	57
Of the persons above, those who exited to permanent housing destinations	70	107	21
Percent Successful Exits	33%	29%	11%



# Housing Inventory Count Methodology

The Housing Inventory Count (HIC) is a point-in-time inventory of projects within the Continuum of Care (CoC) that provide beds and units dedicated to serving persons who are homeless. It is intended to provide the Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) and CoCs with information about the shelter and housing capacity of homeless crisis response systems.

## **The project types included in the HIC are:**

- Emergency Shelter (ES)
- Transitional Housing (TH)
- Permanent Housing (PH)
- Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH)
- Rapid Rehousing (RRH)
- Other Permanent Housing (OPH)
  - Housing with Services
  - Housing Only


To determine which projects to include in the HIC, we reviewed the existing projects in the Community Management Information System (CMIS) and gathered aggregate bed counts for non-CMIS participating organizations. Adding any new projects that were active January 22nd, the night of the Point-in-Time (PIT) count.






# Housing Inventory by Intervention Type
