Narrative regarding the YWCA DV Shelter HMIS QPR Report for Q2 Reporting Period: July 1, 2024 - December 31, 2024

### Grant OPR-2024-0999 (Emergency Shelter - Continuous Stay):

"We are writing to provide clarification regarding the occupancy reporting system used to evaluate our shelter's performance, particularly as it relates to how we are assessed on our bed utilization. Currently, the tracking system is based on the number of primary beds occupied within our shelter. This system does not fully align with the way our program operates, specifically with regard to the allocation of rooms and beds for families. In our shelter, families are provided with private, separate rooms to ensure their privacy and dignity. For example, a family of two might occupy a room with four available beds. From a programmatic perspective, this room is considered fully occupied (100%), as it is being used by a family in need of housing. However, according to the city's rules, this would be considered only 50% occupied, as the room contains more beds than the number of family members residing in it. This discrepancy between the bed-count-based occupancy system and our operational model presents challenges in how our performance is perceived. While our shelter provides full accommodation for every family and ensures that they don't share a room, the occupancy system does not account for the actual usage of space in the way we manage it. As a result, we appear to have lower occupancy rates than we actually do, which could misrepresent our shelter's true effectiveness in providing housing. We respectfully request that this distinction be considered when evaluating our performance. Our program is focused on delivering high-quality services to survivors, and the occupancy system based solely on beds occupied does not fully reflect the impact or success of our efforts."

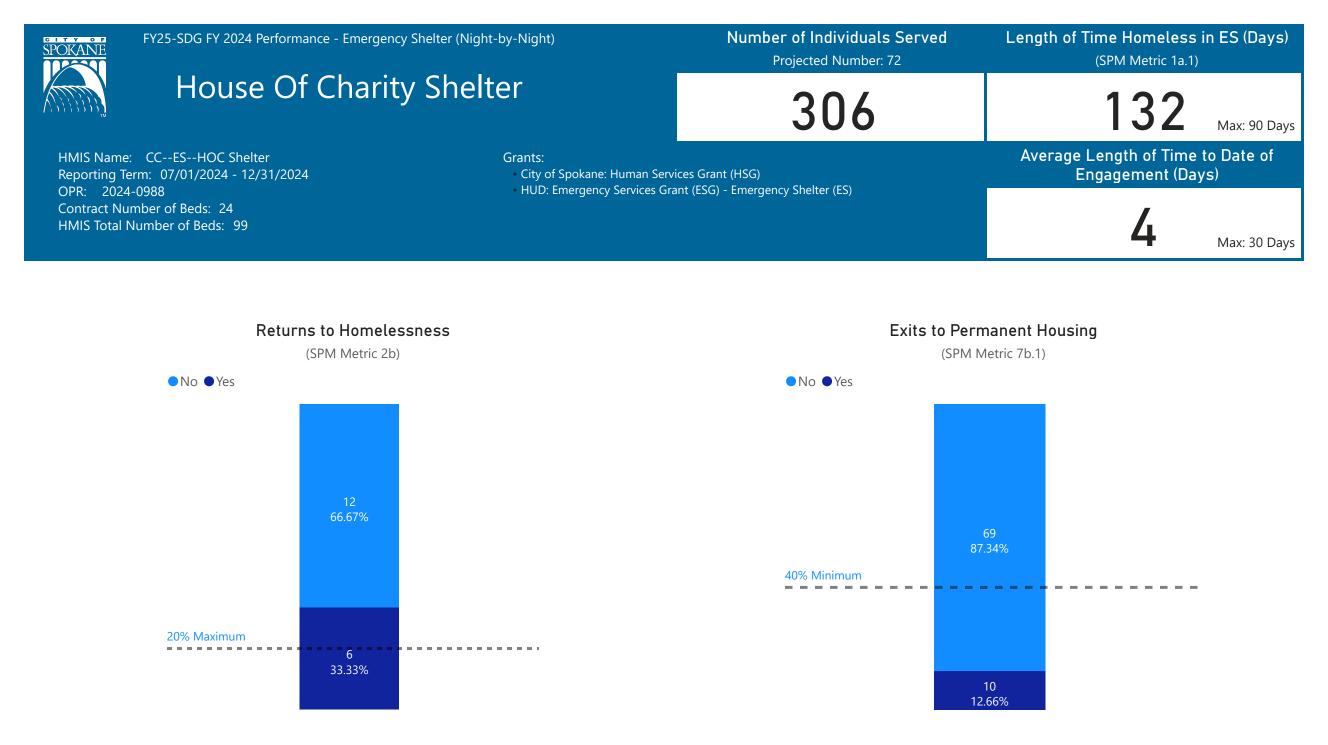

### Grant OPR-2024-0988 (Emergency Shelter - Night-by-Night):

• "Individuals Served: We served a significantly higher number of clients in our emergency shelter program than our contracted 72 beds—we served 306 with City HHOS funding.

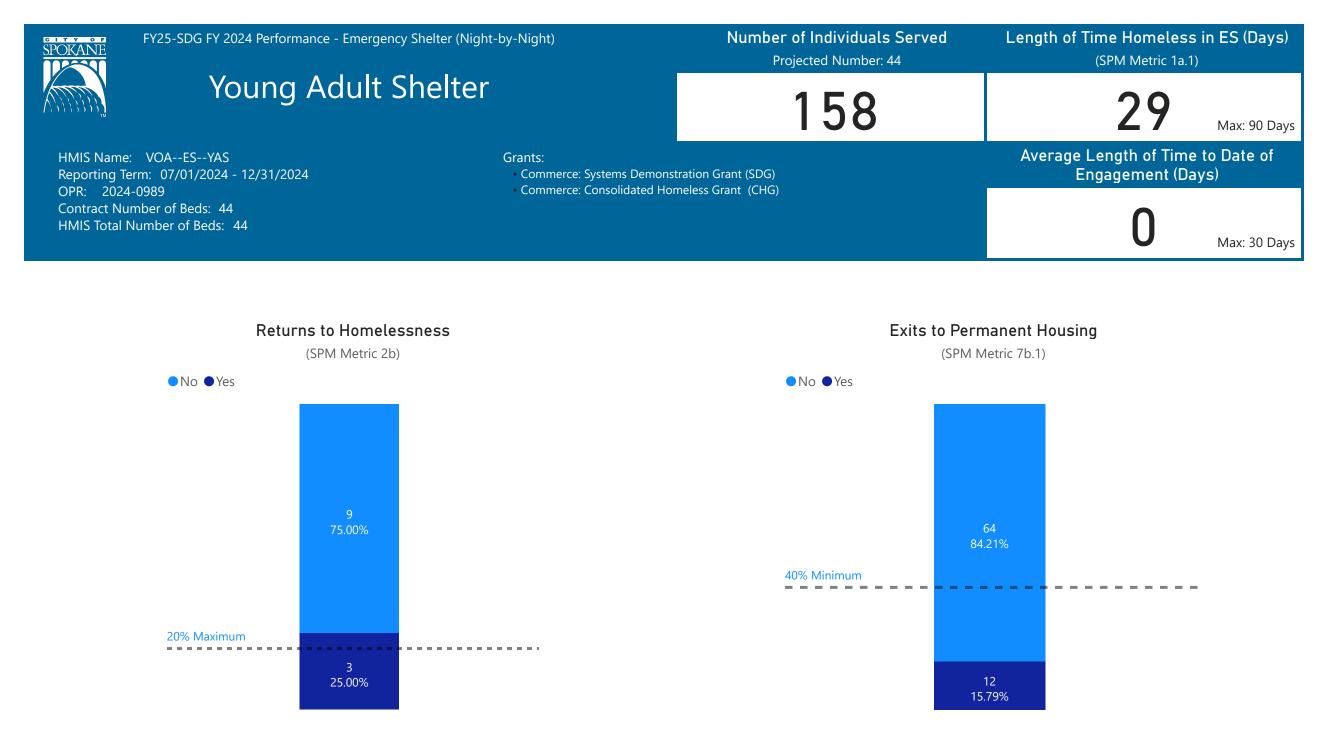
• Length of time homeless: Clients are staying longer in our emergency shelter due to low vacancy rates, lack of affordable housing, and other significant rental challenges making our average length of time in shelter above the 90-day mark at <u>132 days</u>.

• Length of time to Engagement: Our team works extremely hard to quickly engage clients as they enter our shelter, so our length of time to engagement is incredibly quick, at <u>4</u> <u>days</u>.

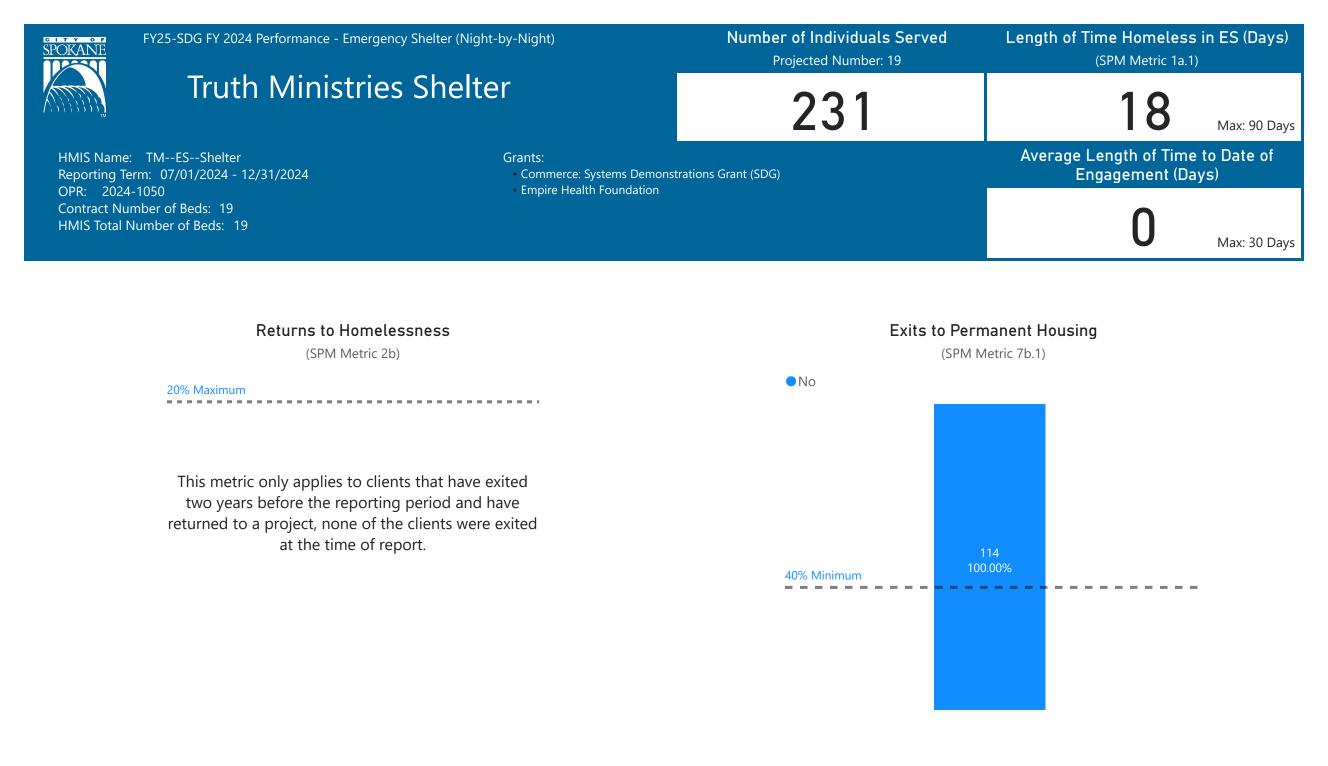
• **Exits to Permanent housing** are below the 40% standard, coming in at **12.66%**. As mentioned above, we are serving a significantly higher number of clients than our contracted amount—each client with significant challenges in obtaining permanent housing which our team of skilled staff are diligently working to overcome in partnership with our clients.

• **<u>Returns to homelessness</u>** are slightly above the benchmark of 20% at <u>33.3%</u>. Our team works incredibly hard to help increase the stabilization factors for our clients as they leave our program into permanent housing and will continue to do so."
