<u>CONTRACT</u>

THIS CONTRACT is between the CITY OF SPOKANE, a Washington State municipal corporation, as "City", and SPOKANE REGIONAL CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, dba GREATER SPOKANE INCORPORATED, whose address is 801 West Riverside Avenue, Suite 100, Spokane, Washington 99201-2147, as "GSI".

The parties agree as follows:

1. <u>PERFORMANCE</u>. GSI shall provide (A) FEDERAL LOBBYING SERVICES, (B) BUSINESS RECRUITMENT ASSISTANCE, AND (C) INTERNATIONAL TRADE AL-LIANCE, in accordance with the following scope of work, which shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

(A) FEDERAL LOBBYING SERVICES for the City through GSI's Contract with Kirkpatrick & Lockhart, Preston, Gates, Ellis LLP (K&L Gates), Washington D.C.

- 1) City priorities will be included in the GSI agenda each year and focused on by the lobbyist.
- 2) Advise and assist the City in Washington, D.C. with regard to federal funding for programs addressing economic development, transportation, and public safety.
- 3) Advise and assist the City in Washington, D.C. on federal legislation or regulation that does now or may in the future impact the city, subject to prior mutual agreement between the City and GSI as to issues.
- 4) Work with the Washington Congressional delegation, and other state delegations, as the issues require on behalf of the City and its leadership.
- 5) Initiate regular contact with the Mayor, City Administrator and City Council to ascertain direction and report on status.
- 6) Provide the Mayor, City Administrator and City Council with a regular report of activities and developments including, but not limited to, quarterly conference calls and/or periodic reports regarding legislative developments.
- 7) Position the City to benefit from federal initiatives resulting from revisions to federal legislation, such as reauthorization of transportation bills.
- 8) Monitor and advise the City on emerging legislation related to the upcoming Congressional session that could affect the City and the region, in either a positive or negative

manner, and provide recommendations for a course of action as may be needed.

- 9) Assist the City in identifying grants and other programs that may assist the City and the region in achieving its goals and priorities.
- 10) Assist the City in developing and sustaining long-term, substantive relationships with federal elected officials, members of the Washington State Congressional delegation, their staffs, and appointed officials, both in Washington DC and in Federal Region 10. This may also include developing relationships with other western state delegations.
- 11) Advise and assist the City in identifying and developing working relationships with associations, stakeholder groups, organized coalitions and interest groups that interact in legislative and policy areas that affect issues important to the City and the region.
- 12) Monitor and report on the current federal legislative and budget process and report to the City both orally and in writing any proceedings or actions that may directly or indirectly impact the City.
- (B) BUSINESS RECRUITMENT ASSISTANCE:
- 1) All site selector visits will include options in the City of Spokane.
- 2) Business recruitment, retention, expansion and assistance activities in addition to community capacity and regional planning.
- (C) INTERNATIONAL TRADE ALLIANCE:
- 1) Develop a business plan to promote sustainability and growth of international trade in the City of Spokane and surrounding areas.

2. <u>CONTRACT TERM</u>. The Contract shall begin January 1, 2014 and shall run through December 31, 2014, unless terminated sooner.

- 3. <u>COMPENSATION</u>.
 - 1) The City shall pay GSI THIRTY SIX THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$36,000.00) per year as full compensation for FEDERAL LOBBYING SERVICES provided under this Contract.
 - 2) The City shall pay GSI FIFTY SIX THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED FORTY AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$56,440.00) per year for BUSINESS RECRUITMENT ASSIS-TANCE provided under this Contract.
 - The City shall pay GSI TWENTY FIVE THOUSAND AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$25,000.00) for one (1) year, which represents a onetime "kick start" of the pro-

gram for INTERNATIONAL TRADE ALLIANCE provided under this Contract. The City has no further obligation nor agrees to provide further financial commitment beyond this initial first (1st) year funding of this program.

This is the maximum amount to be paid under this Contract for the work described in Section 1 above, and shall not be exceeded without the prior written authorization of the City in the form of an executed amendment to this Contract.

4. <u>PAYMENT</u>. GSI shall send quarterly applications for payment (along with is performance report) to the Office of the Mayor, Seventh Floor, City Hall, 808 West Spokane Falls Boulevard, Spokane, Washington 99201. Payment will be made within thirty (30) days after receipt of GSI's application. If the City objects to all or any portion of the invoice, it shall notify GSI and reserves the right to only pay that portion of the invoice not in dispute. In that event, the parties shall immediately make every effort to settle the disputed amount.

5. <u>COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS</u>. Each party shall comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations.

6. <u>ANTI-KICKBACK</u>. No officer or employee of the City of Spokane, having the power or duty to perform an official act or action related to this Contract shall have or acquire any interest in the Contract, or have solicited, accepted or granted a present or future gift, favor, service or other thing of value from or to any person involved in this Contract.

7. <u>TERMINATION</u>. Either party may terminate this Contract, with or without cause, by ten (10) days written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, the City shall pay the Spokane Chamber for all work previously authorized and performed prior to the termination date.

8. <u>INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR</u>. The parties intend that an independent contractor – employer relationship will be created by this agreement.

9. <u>INDEMNIFICATION</u>. GSI shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City, its officers and employees, from and against all claims for damages, liability, cost and expense arising out of the negligent conduct of GSI, its officers, employees and subcontractors in connection with the performance of the Contract, except to the extent of those claims arising from the negligence of the City, its officers and employees.

10. <u>STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE</u>. The standard of performance applicable to GSI's services will be the degree of skill and diligence normally employed by professional consultants performing the same or similar services at the time the services under this Contract are performed.

11. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>. No individual shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefit of, subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in the administration of or in connection with this Contract because of age, sex, race, color, religion, creed, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation, national origin, honorably discharged

veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, or use of a service animal by a person with disabilities.

12. <u>BUSINESS REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT</u>. Section 8.01.070 of the Spokane Municipal Code states that no person may engage in business with the City without first having obtained a valid annual business registration. GSI shall be responsible for contacting the State of Washington Business License Services at <u>http://bls.dor.wa.gov</u> or 1-800-451-7985 to obtain a business registration. If GSI does not believe it is required to obtain a business registration, it may contact the City's Taxes and Licenses Division at (509) 625-6070 to request an exemption status determination.

13. <u>INSURANCE</u>. During the term of the Contract, GSI shall maintain in force at its own expense, the following insurance coverages:

- A. Worker's Compensation Insurance in compliance with RCW 51.12.020, which requires subject employers to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers; and
- B. General Liability Insurance on an occurrence basis, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. It shall include contractual liability coverage for the indemnity provided under this Contract. It shall provide that the City, its officers and employees are additional insureds but only with respect to GSI's services to be provided under this Contract; and
- C. Automobile Liability Insurance with a combined single limit, or the equivalent of not less than \$500,000 each accident for bodily injury and property damage, including coverage for owned, hired and non-owned vehicles.

There shall be no cancellation, material change, reduction of limits or intent not to renew the insurance coverage(s) without sixty (60) days written notice from GSI or its insurer(s) to the City. As evidence of the insurance coverages required by this Contract, GSI shall furnish acceptable insurance certificates to the City at the time it returns the signed Contract. The certificate shall specify all of the parties who are additional insured, include applicable policy endorsements and the deductible or retention level, as well as policy limits. Insuring companies or entities are subject to City acceptance and must have a rating of A- or higher by Best. Copies of all applicable endorsements shall be provided. GSI shall be financially responsible for all pertinent deductibles, self-insured retentions, and/or self-insurance.

- 14. <u>MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS</u>.
- A. <u>ASSIGNMENTS</u>. Neither party may assign, transfer or subcontract its interest, in whole or in part, without the other party's prior written consent. In the event of an assignment or transfer, the terms of this agreement shall continue to be in full force

and effect.

- DISPUTES. This agreement shall be performed under the laws of the State of Β. Washington. Any litigation to enforce this agreement or any of its provisions shall be brought in Spokane County, Washington.
- SEVERABILITY. In the event any provision of this agreement should become C. invalid, the rest of the agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- AMENDMENTS. This agreement may be amended at any time by mutual written D. agreement.

He continued to serve on the Commission for the previous two years without a formal reappointment. It is recommended that the Mayor appoint and the Council confirm Mike McLeod for a three year term dating back to January 1, 2012 and expiring on December 31, 2014 at which time he will be eligible for reappointment to a three year term. This reappointment term will enable the Commission membership to retain their staggered terms.

Executive Summary

AP-05 Executive Summary - 24 CFR 91.200(c), 91.220(b)

1. Introduction

The 2014 Action Plan is a component of the approved 2010 Consolidated Community Development and Housing Plan for the City of Spokane. This document is required for the City to receive various funding sources for community development and housing programs administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. These programs include the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), the HOME Investments Partnerships Program (HOME) and the Emergency Solutions Grant Program (ESG).

The Action Plan includes expected annual funding resources, the method of fund distribution to various programs and activities, and the actions the City will follow in administering HUD programs. In preparing the Plan, the CHHS Board adopted the following mission statement which serves as the guiding principles for the 2014 allocations:

"The Mission of the Community, Housing and Human Services Board is to provide leadership and encourage partnerships that support the City's investments in services, affordable housing and economic opportunities to foster the highest level of self-sufficiency and quality of life for Spokane's extremely low to moderate income households." The Action Plan is both a planning document and an application for federal funds. It incorporates citizen participation in the determination of needs and priorities, goals and objectives, and strategies for implementation of community development, affordable housing and homeless solutions activities. It serves as the City's Fair Housing Plan. In addition, the Plan provides a basis for the public, the Community, Housing, and Human Services Board (CHHS), and HUD to assess the City's program performance.

2. Summarize the objectives and outcomes identified in the Plan

The 2014 objectives and outcomes are listed in the section AP-20 - Annual Goals and Objectives. These objectives and outcomes are listed in the approved 2010 Consolidated Community Development and Housing Plan and support the Community, Housing and Human Services Board's five goals for the 2014 program year. These goals address affordable housing, homeless, non-housing and economic development needs.

3. Evaluation of past performance

As reported in the 2012 Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report, the City of Spokane has exceeded or is on track to meets its objectives in the 2010 Consolidated Plan (with two exceptions). First, during the 2011 program year, down payment assistance subrecipient SNAP shifted its efforts to assisting homeowners in foreclosure. (First-time homebuyer assistance has continued using Washington State homebuyer training and down payment assistance funding). Given severe HOME funding reductions, this duplicate City HOME funding was reallocated to other housing programs.

The second objective that has fallen short in performance was the production of rental units targeted for homeless households. To help address this need, Pioneer Park Place was completed during the 2012-13 program year. This 29-unit apartment building is the conversion of a long-vacant nursing home into permanent housing and includes 6 units for formerly homeless households.

Significant accomplishments and program performance for the 2012 program year were presented at the September 10, 2013 Public Hearing. The CHHS Department and CHHS Board subcommittees are currently reviewing the performance of various projects and programs funded with CDBG, HOME and ESG funds while preparing an update to the City's 2015 Consolidated Plan and Homeless Plan as well as funding priorities for the 2015 Annual Action Plan.

4. Summary of Citizen Participation Process and consultation process

A description of the Citizen Participation Process is listed under the AP-12 - Participation Section of this Plan. To summarize, citizen input and consultation consisted of testimony provided at public meetings, public hearing, and input from community volunteers and Board members. The City's Citizen Participation process spanned a 10 month period beginning in June 2013 and ending with the Spokane City Council's adoption of the 2014 Annual Action Plan on April 28, 2014.

1. Introduction

The Spokane Regional Continuum of Care (CoC) has played an integral role in the planning, coordination and use of ESG funds to achieve the core strategies outlined in the City's Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness. The following narratives provide an overview of the planning process and implementation of strategies to align with the objectives outlined in the Consolidated Plan.

Provide a concise summary of the jurisdiction's activities to enhance coordination between public and assisted housing providers and private and governmental health, mental health and service agencies (91.215(I))

All programs funded to provide prevention and Rapid Re-Housing services with ESG funds will coordinate through the Implementation of a Learning Community convened by the lead agency. This learning community will meet at least quarterly to review program progress or propose any modifications to the policies and procedures. In addition to program management staff, this Learning Community will include case managers who will also share information on case management and housing stabilization challenges and strategies.

The CHHS Board's Continuum of Care Advisory Committee participates in the evaluation of the Homeless Families Coordinated Assessment Program (HFCA). The committee evaluates the effectiveness of the program and recommends program adaptations to the CHHS board. The Advisory Committee has also reviewed and recommended the scope of work and program design of a Coordinated Assessment program for single homeless individuals which will be implemented in the later part of 2014.

The HFCA learning community and the planning committee for the single homeless coordinated assessment program bring together program managers and direct service staff which supports connections between housing and services.

HFCA staff coordinates with participating shelters and transitional housing on a daily basis as they determine housing availability and placement of households into interim housing. HFCA staff has strong coordination and referral relationships to other service providers either co-located on site or nearby that offer support services including employment training and placement, food pantry, health care and other services. All participating homeless providers in the county are connected through the HMIS system, which allows providers to see the service connections clients have, and to follow up on referrals.

The CoC supports a pilot project that brings together housing providers and the public medical providers in an effort to identify homeless high utilizers of the emergency department and in-patient services. This program adds a housing component to the discharge planning to ensure that those with the highest medical need are not discharged to homelessness. The partnership between housing and health care is being enhanced by Washington State's implementation of the Affordable Care Act. Part of the implementation allows for the availability of In-Person Assistors who can support these individuals and connect them with services. These wrap around services have provided greater stability for the clients as well as reduced utilization of high cost systems in the community.

Describe coordination with the Continuum of Care and efforts to address the needs of homeless persons (particularly chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans, and unaccompanied youth) and persons at risk of homelessness.

Locally, both the City of Spokane and Spokane County receive and administer ESG funds. As the CoC lead, the City of Spokane works through the CHHS Board and its Continuum of Care Advisory Committee to determine priorities for homeless funding. Spokane County staff sits on both the Continuum of Care Advisory Committee and the CHHS Board and is an integral part in determining how all homeless funds, including ESG funds, are allocated in the community.

During the application process for homeless funding, the CHHS RFP Evaluation and Review subcommittee reviews applications and makes funding recommendations. Representatives from both ESG jurisdictions (City and County) participate in this process. The CoC subcommittee provides feedback on priority populations and processes of administrating prevention and rapid re-housing assistance funded through ESG.

Performance goals are provided in all applications for Consolidated Homeless Housing Grant Program (CHHGP), which includes ESG funds. The CHHS Board considers proposed outcomes along with additional evaluation criteria in the award of grant funds. Goals and outcomes are finalized with subgrantees during the contracting period. Performance measures and criteria are included in the subgrantees contracts. Quarterly program progress reports are generated by the CHHS Department's Homeless Management Information Systems (HMIS) per the contract schedule. The City, at its discretion, may generate project performance evaluations on a more frequently. For those projects not meeting projected outcomes, the City may institute the following actions: 1st quarter: Communicate progress of projected outcomes with Agency; 2nd quarter: Plan of action submitted to the CHHS Department outlining what steps the Agency is taking to improve progress toward objectives.; 3rd quarter: Revised performance outcomes, possible reduction of funding payment and/or termination of contract.

CHHS staff work with sub-grantees throughout the contracting period to ensure performance goals are met. CHHS staff provides quarterly performance reports to sub-grantees under contract, the CHHS RFP Evaluation and Review Committee and system performance data to the CHHS Continuum of Care Advisory Committee. The CHHS Evaluation and RFP Review Committee's purpose is to advise the board on funding priorities, allocation of funds, and alignment of resources and to ensure transparent and objective analysis of funding requests. This purpose is met through the following activities: Oversee RFP process; review requests for funding and make recommendations to the board; review performance reports including items such as meeting program objectives/outcomes and utilization of funds; provide regular reports on funded program performance and effectiveness to the CHHS board. The City of Spokane serves as the HMIS lead for our regional CoC. The CoC Advisory Committee oversees HMIS. As required by ESG, HMIS is used to collect data and report demographic information on households served. The City has developed specific policies and procedures for administering the regional HMIS which have been approved by the CoC Advisory Committee. These policies and procedures cover a range of relevant topics outlined in the 2010 HMIS Data Standards.

1. Summary of citizen participation process/Efforts made to broaden citizen participation/Summarize citizen participation process and how it impacted goal-setting

The CHHS Board prepared a Citizen Participation Plan for the 2014 program year which was adopted on August 20, 2013 after a 30-day public review and comment period.

The Board sought input from citizens, Community Development Neighborhood Steering Committees, community volunteer organizations and non-profit agencies during the 2013 program year. Two public hearings were conducted on September 10, 2013 and March 5, 2014 in addition to two meetings in January 2014 with CDBG neighborhood steering committees. These meetings were held to collect information and receive feedback on needs and priorities as well as the 2014 entitlement allocations (including contingencies). In addition, the CHHS Department published meeting and allocation notices in the local newspaper and on the City's website.

At the September 10, 2013 public hearing, 56 individuals representing non-profit organizations, private citizens and neighborhood steering committees attended. Many of those who attended provided comments concerning the consolidation of the Community Development and Human Services Departments, the newly implemented Coordinated Grant Process, and changes to neighborhood allocations. Comments were generally positive with some individuals requesting that additional opportunities be provided for technical assistance (grant applications specifically) and citizen input.

In response to testimony received, the CHHS Department provided three grant application workshops and met individually with approximately 14 potential applicants (including City Departments and non-profit organizations) to provide technical assistance. Workshop notices and followup information were posted on the CHHS Department website following each workshop session. The City has also taken steps to develop a CHHS Department Communication Plan, with support from the Mayor's office, to solicit input from the community on needs and priorities for the upcoming 2015 Consolidated Plan update.

At the March 5, 2014 public hearing, approximately 25 individuals attended representing non-profit organizations and neighborhood steering committees. 10 individuals representing non-profit organizations provided testimony thanking the CHHS Board for their allocations and support. The CHHS Board assured the audience that the input received during the program year helped to determine the following Board priorities for 2014: maintaining and increasing housing options for low to moderate income households, supporting neighborhood improvements and infrastructure, rethinking solutions to reduce homelessness and supporting the community's safety-net. The CHHS Board's

Strategic Planning Committee has incorporated these priorities into goal statements and funding priorities for the 2015 Annual Action Plan (to be approved by the CHHS Board in June 2015).

A public notice was published in the Spokesman Review on February 22, 2014 announcing the March 5, 2014 public hearing and a 30 day comment period (February 23 to March 25, 2014) for the proposed 2014 CDBG, HOME and ESG allocations. No comments were received.

Annual Action Plan 2014

Explain how federal funds will leverage those additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements will be satisfied

The City of Spokane will accrue match related to the CHG, HOME, and ESG programs. The City will use Consolidated Homeless Grant Funds through the Washington State Department of Commerce and City of Spokane Homeless Housing Assistance Act grant funds to match the ESG 2014 allocation. HOME match is required for tenant-based rental assistance, single family rehabilitation, and the development of affordable rental units. Match is generated when affordable rental unit development leverages other funds. Some sources of leverage and match have declined recently, such as below-market-rate bank loans, State housing trust fund allocations, and grants. Local real estate tax reductions are available to affordable housing projects, which adds to eligible match. Fortunately, HOME match from prior years will be carried over and local developers may also obtain match-eligible contributions. The City currently has over \$11 million in carryover match which easily fulfills the estimated 2013-14 HOME match obligation of under \$500,000.

If appropriate, describe publically owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that may be used to address the needs identified in the plan

The City of Spokane owns several residential properties as a result of default/forfeiture action on houses which had received single family housing rehabilitation loans. Several houses have been completely renovated by the Spokane Service Team AmeriCorps and Youth Build construction training programs. A few vacant lots and three houses requiring extensive repairs are also owned. The City is currently assessing each of these properties to determine an appropriate re-use plan to benefit the community and neighborhood(s) with the goal of accomplishing this during the 2014 program year.

Estimate the number of extremely low-income, low-income, and moderate-income families to whom the jurisdiction will provide affordable housing as defined by HOME 91.215(b):

Over the next year, Spokane estimates that our HOME funds will provide 3 low-income homeowners with single-family home rehabilitation, 20 homeless and extremely low-income renters with tenant-based rent assistance, and 10 units of affordable rental housing for low-income renters. Each program typically serves extremely low-income (30% AMI) and very low-income (50% AMI) households.

AP-35 Projects – 91.220(d) Introduction

The following table lists the 2014 projects and activities that have been recommended for funding in the 2014 Annual Action Plan. The City of Spokane intends to spend 41% of its CDBG allocation for public facility improvements (parks, neighborhood facility improvements, streets and sidewalks), 25% on housing rehabilitation, 14% on public services and 18% for program planning and administration.

HOME activities are funded as follows: 43% for non-profit/for profit rental housing projects, 18% for Tenant Based Rental Assistance, 15% for CHDO rental housing projects, 11% for single family rehabilitation, 10% for program administration and 3% for CHDO operating assistance.

For ESG activities, 63% has been allocated to rapid re-housing programs, 23% for emergency shelter operations, 6% for HMIS and 8% for program administration (City and agency combined).

Describe the reasons for allocation priorities and any obstacles to addressing underserved needs

The continuing, long-term reduction of federal, state and local financial resources continues to be the greatest impediment to meeting under-served needs for Spokane's most vulnerable citizens.

In an effort to maximize the City's use of scarce grant resources, the two Departments that administered HUD funding were consolidated in 2012 (Community Development and Human Services). During the 2013 program year, a Coordinated RFP was issued which replaced 6 separate RFPs. The CHHS Department is exploring the use of online grant application software in an effort to further increase administrative efficiencies and reduce paperwork burden for potential applicants. The CHHS Board continues to assign funding priority to projects which demonstrate collaboration, innovation, leverage and enhanced coordination.

Rationale for the priorities for allocating investments geographically

In the City's approved 2010 Consolidated Plan, the strategic plan component states that resources will be distributed to the community in ways that have the "greatest long-term, sustained impact." The method determined to be the most productive and consistent with the adopted guiding policies was a long-term re-investment strategy. This method involed sustained efforts to improve the Community Development neighborhoods, which comprise approximately one-half of the City of Spokane. 2014 neighborhood funds are distributed by a formula comprised of data from the most recent decennial census (that included income data). The Community Development neighborhood allocations are attached in Table 1.

Affordable Housing

Introduction

The City of Spokane's strategy to address affordable housing needs, as identified in the approved 2010 Consolidated Plan, has five primary components:

1. Efficient and effective usage of available resources.

2. Creation of new resources.

3. Deregulation of the private housing market (to the extent feasible) to allow the production of housing appropriate to the income level of each citizen of Spokane.

4. Addressing the needs of portions of the population which are underserved by the market, and

5. Collaborative work between jurisdictions in the region.

During the 2014 program year, the following goals for affordable housing production have been identified. The City will continue its efforts to efficiently allocate its available resources while, at the same time, puruse additional funding sources and jurisdictional collaborations.

The City anticipates primarily assisting homeless households with McKinney, Emergency Shelter Grant and HOME's TBRA funds with leverage from NSP and HOME affordable rental housing units. Nonhomeless households will receive assistance from HOME's, Multifamily, and Single Family Rehab programs.

AP-60 Public Housing – 91.220(h) Introduction

Spokane Housing Authority (SHA) began in 1972 as the Housing Authority of the City of Spokane is now a multi-jurisdictional agency serving many cities and five counties in Eastern Washington. The partnership between SHA and the City of Spokane continues to provide affordable housing for thousands of households. SHA is governed by a six member Board of Commissioners to include a resident commissioner appointed by the Mayors of the cities of Spokane and Spokane Valley, and the Chairperson of the Spokane County Commissioners. Each member serves a five-year term of office, with terms rotating in such a manner that one appointment is made each year. The Board has full authority in the establishment of SHA policies, long-term direction, and oversight of programs that accomplish the Agency's mission.

Actions planned during the next year to address the needs to public housing

SHA's Public Housing Program (50 units of elderly/disabled housing at the Parson's Apartments and 75 scattered-site houses and duplexes) receives United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funds in the form of Operating Subsidy and Capital Funds to ensure long-term affordable and sustainable housing. In 2013, SHA submitted a public housing portfolio application to participate in HUD's Rental Assistance Demonstration (RAD) Program and has been placed on a waiting list for the program. If selected for participation, the RAD program will provide SHA an avenue to convert its public housing units to housing voucher assistance and recapitalize the Parson's Apartments. SHA's RAD Plan includes the sale of its 75 scattered-site houses and duplexes; shifting the resulting rental assistance to other units within SHA's portfolio and utilizing the net sale proceeds to leverage additional unit development.

In the interim, SHA is vigilant at keeping occupancy rates above 95%. With available capital needs funding the continued maintenance of units are met. SHA prepares a 5 year capital improvement plan based on projected annual funding.

Actions to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership

To encourage the residents to become more involved with management, the PHA Annual Plan is available for review at the Public Housing leasing office during its public review time period. SHA does not currently have a program for public housing residents to participate in homeownership; however, it will be considering options in 2014 for how public housing participants might be able to access the Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program. AP-65 Homeless and Other Special Needs Activities – 91.220(i) Introduction

Spokane's Regional Ten-Year Plan to End Homelessness emphasizes the need for homeless outreach activities. These activities include outreach with landlords and business leaders to help house and sustain economic stability for vulnerable populations at risk of becoming or experiencing homelessness.

Describe the jurisdictions one-year goals and actions for reducing and ending homelessness including reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The Spokane Regional CoC has established performance goals and actions specifically designed to reach out to homeless individuals in an effort to reduce the total homelessness. These goals include: increase progress towards ending chronic homelessness ; increase housing stability by increasing the percentage of participants remaining in CoC funded permanent housing projects at the end of the operating year and exiting from all CoC-funded PSH project to a different permanent housing destination to 88% of more; increase project participant's income from employment during program enrollment to 12% and increase the percentage of participants who increase their income from sources other than employment during program enrollment to 20%; using rapid re-housing as a method to reduce family homelessness; increase the number of participants obtaining mainstream benefits to 86%; and the CoC will continue to monitor the length of time participants remain homeless and participants return to the homeless system after exit.

Action Steps to meet these goals include: prioritizing the chronic homeless for our PSH through our regional Single Homeless Coordinated Assessment program which will assess client's vulnerability and prioritize those with the highest needs for PSH units; researching efforts that will increase support services and low barrier housing options for participants with high barriers; implementation of housing first strategies will lead to increased housing stability of our highest need participants; lower barrier participants will increase their income through increased connections with CoC Housing Providers and DSHS /Work Source; support employment programs, through local mental health providers, that will provide higher barrier participants being served in CoC PSH program opportunities to increase their income; prioritization of rapid re-housing funding through region-wide rapid re-housing programs funded by the CoC, Spokane County and the supportive services for Veterans Families programs with 440 homeless families to be re-housed in 2014.

The CoC is funding a local initiative to provide outreach activities at hospitals to rapidly re-house high utilizers of emergency rooms to meet basic housing needs. This project uses a common assessment tool focused on the client's medical vulnerability and housing needs. The CoC implemented a Single Homeless Outreach Project in May 2013 that increased outreach and assessment services to homeless individuals assessing day center programs. These efforts have provided connections to housing and services resources not available prior to this project. The outreach component of this project will fold into the Single Homeless Coordinated Assessment program when it is implemented in late 2014. The

Spokane Homeless Coalition's Interagency Outreach Committee collaborate their efforts to provide outreach to unsheltered homeless individuals through the community. Membership of the Interagency Outreach Committee includes outreach staff who serve all homeless populations. The City of Spokane's CHHS Department and Code Enforcement Department work in conjunction with the Interagency Outreach committee to provide outreach to individuals occupying homeless encampments. This enables the opportunity for housing and support services to this chronically homeless unsheltered population.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

The CoC identifies the need to provide an emergent response to families and individuals who are homeless and recognizes the continued need for shelter beds that are available when a person is unsheltered. Although the CoC is moving towards providing permanent housing options rather than temporary options there are certain special populations, such as youth and domestic violence victims, who continue to benefit from a supportive temporary housing program.

The CoC continues to look at the housing needs of families and individuals as they enter the homeless system and consider these needs when recommending programmatic changes. The Homeless Families Coordinated Assessment system, which has been in place since October 2012, has shown a lower need for long term temporary housing programs and an increased need for short term temporary housing. With the increase in families who only need a short intervention to get back into housing through rapid re-housing the need for a short term emergency stay is needed as the family is connected with the rapid re-housing program staff and housing is identified. As a result of this identified need, programs serving families with children have adapted their program models to serve any family who needs housing no matter what their needs are. This interim housing model has allowed for maximum use of our homeless housing inventory and reduction in the time families are homeless.

Homeless individuals have immediate access to emergency shelter beds in the community but there continues to be an increase in the need for this emergency response. Strategies to reduce the need for emergency shelter beds for homeless individuals include greater outreach and engagement to individuals accessing the emergency shelter system. Greater outreach with housing opportunities for this population will be available with the implementation of the Single Homeless Coordinated Assessment program which will begin in 2014. This program will target individuals with the greatest need, who are utilizing emergency shelter beds and those that are currently unsheltered, and prioritize them for PSH units. In the 2013 HUD application, the CoC reallocated 13 transitional housing units serving chronically homeless individuals into permanent supportive housing units that will serve chronically homeless individuals in a housing first model.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals

and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

In 2013, ESG is funding rapid re-housing and emergency shelter operations.

One of the outcomes with the Coordinated Assessment efforts is to identify homeless families, assess their housing need and place them into the appropriate homeless housing program immediately. Over 80% of families presenting as homeless only need a short term intervention to end their homelessness. As a result, much of the CoC efforts to serve homeless families are focused on rapid re-housing. Families who present as chronically homeless with very high barrier are placed directly into available PSH units. These efforts shorten the time families are homeless and increase stability. Targeted prevention strategies are used for families who identify as at-risk of losing their housing. In an effort to maximize the use of homeless funding, an assessment tool is used to help determine that the family, without the prevention assistance, would enter the homeless system. In addition, CoC funded rapid re-housing program use a progressive engagement model that allows for additional assistance for RRH families and individuals to keep them losing housing stability and entering the homeless system again.

The infusion of the Supportive Services for Veteran Families program into the community has provided an essential resource for Veterans and their families who are homeless or at risk. This program provides intensive outreach, housing search and placement and continued case management for this population. For Veterans who need more intensive housing services The Spokane Housing Authority, (SHA), has a successful partnership with the Veterans Administration to provide VASH vouchers to homeless veterans. All referrals are made through the VA, who also provides complete wrap-around supportive services.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

The Health Homeless Housing Program (H3) is working with the following housing and health care partners on the implementation of the H3 program: City of Spokane Community, Housing and Human Services Department, Empire Health Foundation, Providence Health Care, Community Health Association of Spokane, and Volunteers of America. The program strives to ensure eligible homeless clients are not discharged from in-patient hospital care or emergency room visit into homelessness.

The Roads to Community Living Program coordinates with group homes, assisted living program and private landlords to ensure that long term Medicare eligible clients discharging from hospitals, nursing homes and mental health facilities are not being discharged into homelessness.

The Eastern Washington Regional Support Network (RSN) is responsible for all community-based mental health services for inpatient and outpatient care services. Eastern State Hospital works in conjunction with Frontier Behavioral Health Outreach Team, Spokane County Supportive Living Program and Behavioral Health Options. These programs work with the clients and the outpatient mental health provider to create a plan for housing and continued services.

The CoC has ensured that its members have written procedures to address discharge planning of youth exiting foster care. The Division of Children and Families procedures provide for Independent Living Services and require an Independent Living Plan to assist the youth toward a successful transition to adulthood. Local DSFS Social Workers and other community stakeholders work with youth as they near 18 to establish an ILP to guide the services and housing assistance until they are 21. Locally DSHS contracts with Volunteers of America who provide an Independent Living Program for 110 foster youth annually. The ILP used the Casey Family Partners Life Skills curriculum which covers the nine life skills domains, including housing and money management. The ILP provides housing assistance in the form of rent, deposit, furnishing, housing search and placement. Youth exiting foster care are referred to the 10 transitional units at VOA's IYHP program and if no units are available, case managers place them in non-McKinney-Vento subsidized units, adult group homes and other affordable housing.

Spokane County has taken the lead in housing individuals as they exit from correctional institutions. In the past year, through their partnership with SNAP, they have assessed 1,300 individuals and provided permanent housing through a short term rental assistance program to persons exiting corrections.

Airway Heights Corrections facility and the local jail works with Pioneer Human Services who operates a 55 bed work release facility for women and a 80 bed work release facility for men. A formalized discharge plan, in which housing is a requirement, is created for each client as they discharge from these facilities.

Spokane County funds and operates the RE-Entry Initiative (REI) Program, a community re-entry program dedicated to transitioning people who were homeless and in institutional settings into productive citizens, working and living in homes with limited to no subsidy. Funding for the REI Program is from HHAA. REI allows for people who will exit homeless to apply for housing assistance before they leave or shortly after release from corrections facilities. The Program will increase the number of courts and agencies participating as it gains momentum and partners with the goal of preventing homelessness, through diversion from the traditional shelter system.

AP-75 Barriers to affordable housing – 91.220(j)

Introduction

The City of Spokane will identify and, where appropriate, remove or mitigate barriers to affordable housing resulting from zoning, subdivision, land use requirements, licensing, permits and utility extensions.

Actions it planned to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment

Efforts to be undertaken during the 2014 program year will include:

- Continue to develop Development Services Center (DSC) policies and public information resources through coordinated departmental action. The Permit Center allows the consolidation of all permit functions in one location to better coordinate the permit activities of Planning, Building, Fire and Engineering. These efforts expedite permitting processing and reduce permitting times providing cost savings for affordable housing development.
- Continue to use a pre-application process to provide project applications with an opportunity to discuss and understand the various codes and regulations that apply. The ability to review projects early expedites project design, thereby shortening the permitting process.
- Continue with the work that began in 2013 to review and update the City's Comprehensive Plan, including the Land Use and Housing Chapters. This may include reviewing population growth forecasts, land supply information and affordable housing needs, resources, goals and policies.
- Continue to improve the City's zoning rules and development standards through the code maintenance process. This may assist in reducing barriers to affordable housing.
- Continue to implement the Centers and Corridors land use strategy as proposed in the Comprehensive Plan. The Comprehensive Plan proposes establishing a number of centers and corridors throughout the community as part of an overall strategy to accommodate growth through infill development. Ultimately, these centers and corridors will accommodate mixed uses with residential development at higher densities, including affordable housing developments.

Discussion (Fair Housing Plan)

The City will continue to fund fair housing educational, and other, activities that support fair housing in a positive, solution-oriented manner. Potential activities may include sponsoring a regional Fair Housing Conference, assisting the Spokane Association of Realtors (and the real estate industry in general, including the mortgage lending industry) with training related to fair housing. If the City becomes aware of clear violations of the Fair Housing Act, it will work with its community partners to identify potential resolutions. In addition, the CHHS Board is currently in the process of updating the City's 2008 Analysis of Impediments with release expected in early 2015.

AP-85 Other Actions – 91.220(k)

Introduction

The following narratives speak to actions the City of Spokane will undertake during the 2014 program year to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs, foster and maintain affordable housing, evaluate and reduce lead based paint hazards, reduce the number of poverty-level families, develop institutional structure, and enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies.

Actions planned to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs

As detailed in the sections below, the City of Spokane is taking steps to more efficiently coordinate and implement its affordable housing and human services resources through consolidation of existing policy Boards and two City Departments. During this process, the City will reassess any obstacles to meeting underserved needs.

Actions planned to foster and maintain affordable housing

Given the high demand for affordable housing and funding in ever decreasing supply, the City recognizes the importance of fostering affordable housing development and maintaining existing affordable housing stock. The City also provides Tenant Based Rental Assistance to low-income families to create affordable housing options at market rate rental housing located across the City. The City fosters relationships with both for profit and nonprofit (including CHDO) housing developers when soliciting HOME Multifamily Housing Program funding proposals. The City encourages developers to leverage limited City HOME funding with Low-Income Housing Tax Credit and Washington State Housing Trust Fund dollars. Typically, City HOME funds account for only a fraction of the total cost but deliver large projects providing a large number of long-term affordable rental housing units.

The City maintains our HOME investment in affordable housing by monitoring rental housing occupancy and physical condition over HUD's minimum compliance periods required by 92.254. The City imposes an additional 10-year compliance period to retain these rental units as affordable housing available to low-income households. The City also loans HOME funds to repair low-income owner-occupied homes enabling existing homeowners to enjoy a safe and healthy home that they can afford to operate and maintain.

Similarly, the Lead Safe Spokane program creates lead-safe rental housing opportunities. These assisted rental properties must provide a rental preference for low-income families with small children for at least 3 years. These rental property owners must also commit to maintaining the lead-based paint improvements for at least 3 years.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

In-home lead-based paint (LBP) hazards can cause significant and permanent harm to occupants. Lead is toxic and there is no safe level of lead in the blood stream. Eighty-two percent of Spokane's housing Annual Action Plan

stock was built before 1978 and 34% of Spokane homes were built before 1940 – an era of extensive LBP usage. The City's Single Family Rehab and Lead Safe Spokane programs have found hazardous lead paint in 90% of all homes tested which suggest that over 27,000 Spokane homes could contain LBP hazards. Also, an Analysis of Impediments determined that some landlords discriminate against small-child families due to LBP poisoning concerns.

Spokane families deserve the opportunity to live in a safe and healthy home. To reduce LBP hazards, Spokane has fully integrated HUD Title X and EPA Renovator (RRP) requirements into its Single-Family Rehabilitation, Roofs Only, Rental Rehabilitation, Multifamily Housing, and Lead Safe Spokane programs. These programs offer visual assessment trained HQS inspection; XRF Lead Inspection and Risk Assessment; temporary relocation; copies of the "Renovate Right" pre-renovation pamphlet; copies of the "Protect Your Family" pre-housing-contract pamphlet; blood lead testing for certain child occupants; lead-safe renovation from RRP Renovator and Abatement Supervisor certified contractors; and Clearance testing of leaded surfaces disturbed during rehabilitation.

Spokane's housing programs will increase lead hazard awareness, promote child blood lead testing, affirmatively market lead-safe rentals, promote Fair Housing, create new lead-safe housing, and repair LBP hazards in eligible owner and renter housing. Activities are centered on the Lead Safe Spokane program funded by HUD's Office of Healthy Homes and CDBG funds. Lead Safe Spokane targets low-income households with an elevated blood lead child; properties receiving affordable housing funds; eligible multifamily rentals; in-home daycare; nonprofit owned housing; pre-1978 rentals that failed HQS inspection due to LBP; and properties built before 1940 or having substantial LBP hazards.

Over 2014 program year, Lead Safe Spokane plans to deliver lead-safe renovation including: 45 Risk Assessments; 40 units of lead-safe housing; 15 Outreach Events; and 30 trained Contractors. Lead hazard control begins with a combined XRF Lead Inspection and Risk Assessment with inspection results guiding the scope of work. C contractors certified as Abatement Supervisor and EPA Renovator competitively bid these projects that typically include wet scraping, replacing windows, eliminating friction/impact surfaces, mulching bare soil, and cleaning to Clearance. Spokane will also provide education and outreach events to raise awareness of LBP hazards, increase compliance with federal and state LBP laws, and prevent childhood blood lead poisoning. Our programs will increase the capacity of local contractors, maintenance workers, landlords, and property managers to safely perform LBP repairs. We will provide low/no-cost Abatement Supervisor and RRP Renovator training courses. The program will continue coordinating with the Washington State Lead-Based Paint program for certifications and RRP enforcement.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City's anti-poverty strategies include funding direct services as well as facilitating coordination among social programs, especially those that provide outcome driven, client centered services that lead to improved housing stability and economic security for low income families.

Annually, the City funds close to \$900,000 in human services programs through its general fund grant program, many of which provide direct services to low-income families. One of the key funding principles the board considered when evaluating the most recent round of proposals was how well each proposal articulated how their services incorporate efforts to move clients toward improved economic self-sufficiency and security.

Additionally, the City is currently leading a couple of targeted initiatives focused on low income families with multiple barriers to family stability and economic security. Specific examples include the Strong Families Initiative; which is a partnership between the City, the Housing Authority, the Child Welfare System and non-profit service providers. The program serves high-risk, homeless families whose children have been, or are at-risk of, being placed in out-of-home care through the child welfare system. Community-linked services are provided to selected families through the implementation of supportive housing services. In the first 10 months of this project 34 families have been served. As the project continues we expect to see a reduction in child welfare system contacts, reduction in child maltreatment and child removals, and reduced foster care placements. The partnership works closely with community housing providers and other critical service providers to bring a holistic approach to affordable housing and services to support independence and family cohesion.

In addition to the Strong Families Initiative, the City is leading the regional Coordinated Intake and Assessment Program for familes. This coordinated system is designed to serve families with children who are experiencing homelessness or residential instability and are at high risk of homelessness. The system provides a more effective way for households to navigate the complex range of services and allows each household to be assessed and placed in appropriate services, rather than being placed in a program based solely on availability. The goal of this system is to reduce the number of families in Spokane who may become homeless by offering diversion services and lessen the length of time a household is homeless by placing them with appropriate services at first contact. The program is funded by the City's Homeless Housing Assistance Act funds.

The Community, Housing and Human Services Board has expressed explicit interest in looking at best practice, innovative strategies to increase our efforts to support job-growth, economic development and other anti-poverty strategies. The board is currently undertaking a needs analysis to determine what the community needs are, what the opportunities are, as well as what other communities have implemented that have had positive results. It's anticipated that the outcome of this analysis will be provided to the City Council for consideration as they adopt the funding priorities for the City's 2015 human services grant program.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

The City of Spokane recognizes that a vibrant, well-defined civic infrastructure is vital to the successful implementation of the City's Consolidated Plan and our Regional 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness. As such, the city administration convened a citizen taskforce during the 2012 CDBG program year to develop recommendations to the administration on how to align the city's resources that strive to improve the lives of low to moderate income citizens. As a result, the city has combined the human

services and community development departments into one department, as well as three separate governance structures into one governing body, the Community, Housing and Human Services (CHHS) Department and Board respectively.

The combined department integrates staff responsible for managing the city's investments in services and housing and overseeing the City's Consolidated Plan and the Regional 10 Year Homeless Plan. Prior to this consolidation, the staff functions were mostly carried out independently.

The newly formed board includes representation from private industry, nonprofit organizations, community and faith-based organizations, K-6 and higher education, local government and Community Development neighborhoods. The purpose of the board is to act in an advisory role to City administration and City Council in regards to community development, housing and human services programs. Per City Ordinance, the board is responsible for providing policy guidance in preparing the City's Consolidated Community Development and Housing Plan and Annual Action Plan, the Citizen Participation Plan, and the 10 Year Homeless Plan. Additionally, the board acts as the local Continuum of Care as defined by the HEARTH Act, makes recommendations regarding funding priorities for housing programs and projects and social services investments, provides policy guidance and recommendations for community development, human services, homeless and special purpose grant programs. The Board has adopted their Vision and Mission Statement and is currently in the process of developing its subcommittee structure to assist the board in meeting its Mission.

- Increase our efficiency; so that the department and our grantees can focus on providing services and less on undue administrative work.
- Align our plans, strategies and investments; so that our investments are leveraged with other local, state and federal investment and lead to stronger projects with improved outcomes.
- Foster innovative efforts; so that we are investing in effective strategies that improve the quality of life low to moderate income households.
- Strengthen our operational policies and procedures; so that we operate within scope of the rules and regulations we are accountable to, and that our interactions with our customers are transparent and equitable.
- Strengthen our communications with our primary customers; so that we work collectively to strengthen extremely low to moderate income households.

Actions planned to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies

The City has established a number of cooperative partnerships and collaborations with public and supportive housing providers, private and government health, local government, mental health and social service agencies to address our priority needs and will continue to do so. Examples include:

Multi-family Housing: the City works closely with Spokane County and the WA State Department of Commerce to coordinate the funding and development of multi-family housing units funded through our HOME program.

Tenant Based Rental Assistance: the City partners with the local housing authority to manage our HOME tenant based rental assistance program. The TBRA program has been prioritized for high needs households and individuals. Referrals to the TBRA program via the community Coordinated Assessment program. Support Services are provided for all TBRA households through CoC Program and local Homeless Housing Assistance Act funded programs.

Fair Housing: the City partners with our local HUD office, Spokane County and the NW Fair Housing Alliance to fund, plan and host an annual Fair Housing Conference.

Homeless/Housing/Health, i.e. H3: a City-lead partnership between the City, the two largest local hospital emergency departments, local funders and non-profit housing and services providers to improve the health and housing stability of the most vulnerable homeless individuals touching these systems on a frequent basis.

Strong Families Initiative: a City-led partnership between the City, the Spokane Housing Authority, Child Protective Services and non-profit housing and services providers to improve the lives and housing stability of families engaged with child welfare.

The City is the convener and the Collaborative Applicant for the City/County Continuum of Care. The City coordinates a number of homelessness reduction system-wide strategies involving both public and private agencies such as Coordinated Assessment, Housing First and Rapid Rehousing through the Continuum of Care.

Prior to the creation of the Community, Housing and Human Services Board, the City's efforts to address economic development needs focused on investing in technical and financial assistance to microenterprise programs as well as Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs). SNAP's Financial Access Program (funded with CDBG) has been especially successful. The Board is now exploring options to supplement current economic development activities. As such, the Board has asked staff to research and present to the Board best practices, strategies and opportunities to enhance our coordination with private industry, businesses, developers and social service agencies.

The Spokane Regional CoC has set the following targets to reduce the total number of chronic homeless (CH) individuals to 63 by the year 2015.

Discussion

In addition, the Spokane Housing Authority helps to provide housing for members of our community who cannot find affordable housing through other means. The plan is to continue efforts to strengthen partnerships, while always being open to new community partnerships. These efforts include serving very low-income households through Family Unification Housing Choice Vouchers and a partnership

with Child Protective Services. Other programs include: Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS; set-aside Mainstream Housing Choice Vouchers for Persons with Disabilities; City HOME Rental Assistance Program for special needs, homeless and disabled; set-aside program in SHA owned housing through various partners providing units for supportive housing for homeless households; and project-based Housing Choice Vouchers which provide rental assistance to assigned units. Community partners in these efforts include Catholic Charities, Veteran's Administration, SNAP, Spokane Housing Ventures, Dept. of Corrections, Salem Arms and Transitions. In addition, SHA also administers, in partnership with the Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Spokane, 188 Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) Vouchers for homeless veterans and 32 VASH Project Based Vouchers.

SHA will use all reasonable efforts to provide safe, decent, and affordable housing to extremely lowincome, and very low-income residents of Spokane, Stevens, Whitman, Pend Oreille, and Lincoln counties. Actions SHA is working on include:

Reposition its existing portfolio to ensure long-term affordability and sustainability.

Provide opportunities for homeownership through the Housing Choice Voucher Homeownership Program.

Continue to seek opportunities to collaborate with for-profit and non-profit developers.

Continue to expand the tenant-based Housing Choice Voucher Program.

Continue to expand the VASH program, HEN, and other new DSHS Voucher initiatives.

SHA is committed to addressing housing for persons with special needs using Project Based Vouchers where client services are provided.

In addition to providing ongoing rental assistance to 4,859 Housing Choice Voucher households, SHA will continue to assist additional households under several grant-based programs.

Households seeking housing assistance whom we cannot immediately assist are referred to a number of other community service organizations to help maximize individual success.

Collaborate with community partners to provide programs and promote self-sufficiency to break the cycle of poverty.

Periodically SHA publishes Request for Proposals for Project Based Voucher (PBV) Program that allows property owners who qualify to submit an application for Project Based Voucher assistance. Future RFP's for additional Project Based Voucher assistance will be based on identified local needs and funding availability.

HOME regulation 92.254 describes qualifications of homeownership activities as affordable housing. City of Spokane has not budgeted HOME funds for homeownership activities. The City retains written agreements used in a previous homeownership program. These agreements include a recapture provision triggered if a borrower sells, transfers, refinances, or changes the use of the property during the HOME period of affordability. This loan provision limits recaptured funds to net proceeds available from the sale rather than the entire HOME investment. These same loan recapture provisions are used in the LHRD-funded Lead Safe Spokane and CDBG-funded Single Family Rehabilitation programs and also limit any recaptured funds to net proceeds of a sale. Consequently, the City is not required to repay HUD should any sale, short sale, foreclosure, or other involuntary sale of a program-assisted home provide insufficient funds to fully repay HUD funding provided.

3. A description of the guidelines for resale or recapture that ensures the affordability of units acquired with HOME funds? See 24 CFR 92.254(a)(4) are as follows:

HOME regulation 92.254(a)(4) describes the minimum HOME period of affordability based upon the amount of HOME homeownership assistance. The City of Spokane has not budgeted HOME funds for homeownership activities. The City previously limited the maximum amount of HOME assistance for each homebuyer transaction and that maximum amount triggered a 10-year HOME period of affordability. Loan documents for previous homeownership activities provided some debt forgiveness over the 10-year HOME affordability period. Past homeownership activities used City written agreements that included recapture provisions. These recapture provisions were triggered if a borrower sells, transfers, refinances, or changes the use of the property during the HOME period of affordability. This loan provision limits recaptured funds to net proceeds available from the sale rather than the entire HOME investment. Should a homebuyer fail to comply with primary residence requirements then the City could recapture the available portion of the City's loan. Similarly, HOME-funded affordable rental housing projects include acquisition, new construction, and/or renovation trigger minimum periods of affordability period. Acquisition and/or

rehab projects commonly receive over \$40,000 of HOME assistance per unit and are subject to the regulation's 15-year affordability period. The City chooses to independently extend the periods of affordability beyond the minimum required by HUD regulation. These City-imposed extended periods of affordability follow expiration of HUD-required minimum affordability periods for a 10 year period. These City-imposed affordability periods are described further in the HOME Multifamily Housing Program Description and agreements.

In 2012, our CoC developed and funded a Coordinated Assessment Program for homeless and at-risk families. All CoC funded family homeless programs are required to participate with the HFCA program and accept all housing placements through the system. All families are screened and assessed with a tool that determines client eligibility and assesses client's needs for services. The FCA program also screens for rapid re-housing and prevention. The assessment identifies and prioritizes families for these interventions. A system specific to single homeless individuals with a similar structure will be implemented in 2014.

Individuals and families may access the program through one of three entry points:

1. By calling the Homeless Families Coordinated Assessment (HFCA) lead agency seeking shelter

where they will receive an initial eligibility screening and appointment with the HFCA program; 2. By walking into an HFCA seeking services; or 3. Through targeted outreach and screening in a partnering service provider. At whichever point a household with children contacts the program and the program has openings, they will receive an initial screening to determine potential eligibility and, if preliminarily determined eligible, a more in-depth assessment to both confirm eligibility and begin to develop a housing stabilization plan. Households without children will not be screened but will be provided with referrals to resources that will meet their needs. The initial screening for all services funded by ESG will determine: 1. if the combined household income is below 30% AMI 2. if the household has financial resources that exceed the programs limit; 3. if the household's living situation qualifies as either literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness; and 4. for those reporting to be imminently at risk, if the household has one or more additional risk factors established which make shelter entry more likely if not assisted. These factors include households who have previously been in a shelter or transitional housing program and households who have experienced homelessness in the past 18 months.

The initial screening through HFCA also collects certain basic demographic information on the household (HMIS universal data elements) and is used to help qualify the household for other services if appropriate. The initial screening also is used to gather information on those seeking assistance for analysis and program refinement. Households determined initially eligible will receive a full assessment of housing barriers and household resources. Households may be screened out at this point if 1) the household appears to have other resources/housing opportunities that it can access to avoid homelessness or become re-housed without assistance, or 2) the household has very high or multiple barriers to re-housing and another more appropriate placement or referral can be made.

3. Identify the process for making sub-awards and describe how the ESG allocation available to private nonprofit organizations (including community and faith-based organizations).

Locally, the City of Spokane and Spokane County receive and administer ESG funds. As the CoC lead the City of Spokane works, through the Continuum of Care Advisory Committee and Community Housing and Human Services Board (CHHS), to determine priorities for homeless funding. Spokane County staff sits on both the Continuum of Care Advisory Committee and CHHS Board and is an integral part in determining how all homeless funds, including ESG funds, are allocated in the community. During the application process for homeless funding a subcommittee of the CHHS reviews applications and makes funding recommendation. A representative from both ESG jurisdictions participates in this process.

Applicants eligible to apply for ESG funds include:

- City or County governments Public and private nonprofit organizations (501(c)(3)
- Private for profit organizations or individuals may implement certain economic development,
low-income housing rehabilitation and microenterprise activities.

- Faith based organizations
- 4. If the jurisdiction is unable to meet the homeless participation requirement in 24 CFR 576.405(a), the jurisdiction must specify its plan for reaching out to and consulting with homeless or formerly homeless individuals in considering policies and funding decisions regarding facilities and services funded under ESG.

Our jurisdiction currently meets the homeless participation requirement detailed in 24 CFR 576.405(1) through formerly homeless individuals membership on the Community, Housing and Human Services Board subcommittees; Continuum of Care Advisory Committee and the CHHS RFP Evaluation and Review Committee. These committees are responsible for recommending policies and funding decisions.

5. Describe performance standards for evaluating ESG.

All programs funded through ESG are evaluated for performance quarterly. Data for these evaluations is pulled from our Homeless Management Information System. In addition, all ESG funded programs are required to ensure HMIS data quality by the 5th of each month.

Program's funded for rapid re-housing are measured by the number of households exiting to permanent housing, the average term of homelessness, the number of households with increased income at exit, and the number of households connected with mainstream services at exit.

Program's funded for emergency shelter operations are required to enter universal data into the HMIS system and record entry and exit dates. In addition, these programs are measured by the number of households who exit from the emergency shelter into permanent housing, the number of households exiting with increased income and connection to mainstream resources

Discussion (Monitoring Procedures)

The City has recently adopted Grant Management and Financial Assistance Policies and Procedures that became effective 4/1/14. These procedures were developed to address federal, State and City statutory and regulatory requirements in addition to providing City staff with a system of ensuring project compliance and accomplishment.

The City will report annually on the progress it has made in carrying out the strategic plan and action plan. This performance report will comply with HUD's requirements and format and will be submitted by the date specified by HUD.

The City has four monitoring tools to ensure compliance with statutory and regulatory requirements. These are (a) policies and procedures, (b) contract requirements, (c) desk-top monitoring, and (d) onsite monitoring. The City's Community, Housing and Human Services Board establishes policies that guide the application and allocation process for entitlement funded programs and activities. All

applications are evaluated to determine if they are (1) program eligible (2) consistent with local, state and federal regulations and (3) viable as submitted.

Projects funded through CDBG, HOME or ESG will be managed directly, through another City Department, by a vendor selected by an RFP process (e.g. Single Family Housing Rehabilitation Program) or by a subrecipient under contract with the City. In addition to the scope of work, duration and projected accomplishments, each contract contains federal, state and local program requirements, deliverables and/or performance measurements.

Construction projects that require compliance with federal labor standards have an additional layer of review that frequently includes a pre-construction conference with the Contract Compliance Officer, project manager, subrecipient and the project's architect or general contractor. Additional requirements may include MWE and Section 3 outreach.

Site visits are typically scheduled with new subrecipients prior to contracting to provide technical assistance and to review the organization's financial and administrative systems. During the 2014 program year, the City may conduct workshops for subrecipients on administrative systems as well as application assistance.

During the program year, the City schedules monitoring visits with subrecipients in accordance with an approved monitoring plan and risk assessment.

The City has standardized procedures to ensure that all fiscal information is correct and complete before it is submitted to HUD for reimbursement with CDBG, HOME and ESG funds. Once our letter of credit is approved and the funds become available, separate project account numbers are established in the City's Financial Management System.

HUD-approved projects are linked to accounts via the City's Financial Management System. A continuing balance for each project is maintained electronically and can be acessed on a daily basis. Departmental records are balanced to the City's records monthly. Also, City records are balanced to HUD's cash and management information system (IDIS).

When subrecipients request reimbursement, they are required to submit a voucher reimbursement request with backup documentation. Project managers and accounting staff review both. Reimbursement requests are reviewed for eligibility and appropriateness under contracted provisions. If an inappropriate or ineligible cost is incurred, or if performance falls below projections, the City will not reimburse the subrecipient and will work towards rectifying the deficiency.

Emergency Solutions Grant Written Standards

The Emergency Solutions Grant funds, in conjunction with additional funding sources, are currently funding Coordinated Assessment Initiatives through rapid re-housing, and shelter activities.

The following program standards have been developed with community feedback, based on the feedback from CoC programs administering these funded activities. The standards continue to take into account the smaller resources and even greater targeting needed for ESG. These standards are included in program specific guidelines for all ESG funded programs.

a. Standard policies and procedures for evaluating individuals' and families' eligibility for assistance under Emergency Solutions Grant.

Our local Homeless Families Coordinated Assessment Program, which began in October 2012, coordinates all family homeless service programs to provide prevention and rapid re-housing assistance in addition to placement in interim and permanent supportive housing, if applicable.

The program utilizes common assessment tools and policies. This system is an integral part of the current system of care and is intended to be simple for clients to access and provide common outcome data and measurable results. Given that the resources provided under ESG are a fraction of that available under HPRP, the system targets resources for households at shelter door, focusing on rapid rehousing and shelter diversion, and coordination with existing homeless provider resources.

Through our HFCA program a network of service providers in coordination with the lead agency provide rapid re-housing and targeted prevention / diversion services in a coordinated manner, using standard, shared policies for evaluating eligibility.

Individuals and families may access the program through one of three entry points:

- 1. By calling the HFCA lead agency seeking shelter where they will receive an initial eligibility screening and appointment with the HFCA program;
- 2. By walking into an HFCA seeking services; or
- 3. Through targeted outreach and screening in a partnering service provider.

At whichever point a household with children contacts the program and the program has openings, they will receive an initial screening to determine potential eligibility and, if preliminarily determined eligible, a more in-depth assessment to both confirm eligibility and begin to develop a housing stabilization plan. Households without children will not be screened but will be provided with referrals to resources that will meet their needs. A community Coordinated Assessment program for homeless and at risk individuals will be implemented in mid 2014.

The initial screening for rapid re-housing services funded by ESG will determine:

- 1. If the combined household income is below 30% AMI
- 2. If the household has financial resources that exceed the programs limit; and
- 3. If the household's living situation qualifies as literally homeless.

The initial screening through HFCA also collects certain basic demographic information on the household (HMIS universal data elements) and is used to help qualify the household for other services if appropriate and to gather information on those seeking assistance for analysis and program refinement.

Households determined initially eligible will receive a full assessment of housing barriers and household resources. Households may be screened out at this point if 1) the household appears to have other resources/housing opportunities that it can access to avoid homelessness or become re-housed without assistance, or 2) the household has very high or multiple barriers to re-housing and another more appropriate placement or referral can be made.

b. Policies and procedures for coordination among providers.

Providers receiving ESG funds coordinate at several levels:

All programs funded to provide Rapid Re-Housing services with ESG funds will coordinate through the Implementation of a Learning Community convened by the lead agency. This learning community will meet at least quarterly to review the program progress and review any modifications to the policies and procedures. Case managers will participate in the learning communities which will be a forum to discuss information on case management and housing stabilization challenges and strategies.

HFCA staff will coordinate with participating shelters, transitional housing and permanent supportive housing providers, on a daily basis as they determine housing availability and placement of households into interim housing.

HFCA staff has strong coordination and referral relationships to other service providers either co-located on site or nearby that offer support services including employment training and placement, food pantry, health care and other services.

All participating homeless providers in the county are connected through the HMIS system, which allows providers to see the service connections clients have, and to follow up on referrals. Both the monthly HFCA learning community and the Spokane Homeless Coalition meeting provides an opportunity for all homeless providers to coordinate services..

c. Policies and procedures for which families will receive prevention and which will receive rapid rehousing

Eligible households that are literally homeless at the time of contacting the program and are living in shelter or in a place not meant for human habitation will receive rapid re-housing services.

Households that contact HFCA seeking shelter entry will qualify for prevention assistance if they meet the definition of "at risk of homelessness" and if their prior experience indicates they are most likely to

lead to a shelter entry –prior stay in shelter or transitional housing program and/or experienced homelessness in the past 18 months. Prevention assistance is not funded through ESG at this time.

Diversion households may receive support to maintain their current housing if that situation is safe and sustainable. Support for these households comes in the form of landlord mediation, case management and connection to resources.

d. Standards for determining share of rent and utilities each program participant will be provided and how that assistance will be adjusted over time.

The philosophy adopted by programs providing ESG funding is based in providing "the least amount of assistance for the least amount of time" while providing the appropriate level of service and support to be reasonably sure that the housing will stick. To accomplish this providers administering rapid rehousing are using a progressive engagement model of financial assistance and services.

Any household moving to new housing will receive up to 100% of deposit and one month's rent based on the households need. Households man pay up to 30% of gross income towards their deposit and rent. Households will be assessed monthly for continuing financial and support need. Households will continue to qualify for assistance, based on an identified need, for up to 90 days. Extensions can be permitted with prior approval when a household is identified with higher barriers. Households identified with barriers that will qualify them for PSH will be reassessed through the HFCA assessment process. If the household qualifies for PSH rental assistance can be provided as a PSH unit is obtained. Utility assistance will be referred to other programs, such as the LIHEAP program and other local utility assistance programs.

e. Standards for determining how long a program participant is assisted and whether and how the amount of that assistance will be adjusted over time.

The philosophy adopted by programs providing ESG funds is designed on a "progressive engagement" model, intended to provide the appropriate level of service and support to divert or re-house households quickly and reserve resources as much as possible for other households, while leaving the door open for increased assistance if needed.

As described above, households will be assessed monthly for continuing financial and support need. Households will continue to qualify for assistance, based on an identified need, for up to 90 days. Extensions can be permitted with prior approval. Monthly assessments allow for household's to receive services based on their need or to be moved to another housing program if higher need warrant more intensive supports.

f. Standards for the type, amount and duration of stabilization services.

The "progressive engagement" model is intended to provide the appropriate level of service and support needed to divert or re-house households quickly and reserve resources as much as possible for other households, while leaving the door open for increased assistance if needed. All households with children will receive an initial assessment and referrals to appropriate community- based services through the HFCA. Money management/budgeting training will be provided for any household receiving

assistance. ESG funded program staff is expected to work with households to obtain benefits, including income and health coverage, or make referrals to agencies that can assist with this. Households in need of housing search assistance will receive help identifying units and making referrals to landlords and assist with applications, as needed.

Through the Learning Community process the type and duration of stabilization services is consistently addressed. Eligible households will receive housing and income-focused support services, focused on ensuring that the household has the support needed to make progress on the housing stabilization plan and that the landlord is satisfied that the household is receiving support for housing related needs. When households are determined over income, rent assistance can be extended for up to an additional 3 months and case management can continue for up to an additional 6 months to support households transition to self-sufficiency.

ORDINANCE NO. C-35094

An ordinance relating to gender identity and non-discrimination in the city of Spokane; amending SMC sections 1.06.010, 1.06.020, 1.06.030 and 10.18.010.

The City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That SMC section 1.06.010 is amended to read as follows:

1.06.010 Findings

The City of Spokane finds that discrimination based on race, religion, <u>creed</u>, color, sex, national origin, marital status, familial status, age, sexual orientation, <u>gender identity</u>, <u>honorably discharged veteran or military status</u>, or <u>the presence of any sensory</u>, <u>mental</u> <u>or physical</u> disability <u>as defined by the American with Disability Act and/or the</u> <u>Washington State Law Against Disability</u>, <u>Chapter 49.60 RCW</u>, poses a substantial threat to the health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of Spokane. The City deems it necessary and proper to enact a local ordinance to address these issues.

Section 2. That SMC section 1.06.020 is amended to read as follows:

1.06.020 Purpose

Α. The City values the dignity and worth of all human beings and is committed to promoting justice, equity and an inclusive environment by respecting cultural and individual diversity and fostering mutual understanding among all people regardless of race, religion, creed, color, sex, national origin, marital status, familial status, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, honorably discharged veteran or military status, or the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability as defined by the American with Disability Act and/or the Washington State Law Against Disability, Chapter 49.60 RCW. It is the intent of the City that all people have an equal opportunity to participate fully in the life of the City and that discriminatory barriers to equal participation in employment, housing and public accommodations be removed. The City has a compelling interest in eradicating and preventing such discrimination and in ensuring equal opportunity in employment, housing and public accommodations. SMC 1.06.010 through SMC 1.06.090 represent the least restrictive means of achieving the City's objectives. In furtherance of this policy, those sections are to be broadly construed consistent with their remedial purpose and the intent expressed in this paragraph. These sections are not intended to establish or require affirmative action or quotas of any kind, or to infringe upon the authority vested in the civil service commission and City departments pursuant to the City Charter.

- B. Nothing contained in this chapter is intended to be nor shall be construed to create or form the basis for any liability on the part of the City, or its officers, employees or agents for any injury or damage resulting from or by reason of any act or omission in connection with the implementation or enforcement of this chapter on the part of the City by its officers, employees or agents.
- C. Nothing in this chapter shall constitute a cause of action under state law or form a basis for relief in the state courts. It is the intent of this chapter that all causes of action for violations of the chapter shall lie within the City of Spokane municipal court.
- D. Nothing in this chapter shall be deemed to deny any person the right to institute any action or to pursue any civil or criminal remedy for the violation of such person's civil rights.

Section 3. That SMC section 01.06.030 is amended to read as follows:

1.06.030. Definitions

- A. "Commission" means the human rights commission established in chapter 4.10 SMC.
- B. Disability.
 - 1. "Disability" means the presence of a sensory, mental, or physical impairment that:
 - a. is medically cognizable or diagnosable; or
 - b. exists as a record or history; or
 - c. is perceived to exist whether or not it exists in fact.

A disability exists whether it is temporary or permanent, common or uncommon, mitigated or unmitigated, or whether or not it limits the ability to work generally or work at a particular job or whether or not it limits any other activity within the scope of chapter 1.06 SMC.

- 2. For purposes of this definition, "impairment" includes, but is not limited to any:
 - a. physiological disorder, or condition, cosmetic disfigurement, or anatomical loss affecting one or more of the following body systems: Neurological, musculoskeletal, special sense organs, respiratory, including speech organs, cardiovascular, reproductive, digestive, genitor-urinary, hemic and lymphatic, skin and endocrine; or
 - mental, developmental, traumatic, or psychological disorder, including but not limited to cognitive limitation, organic brain syndrome, emotional or mental illness, and specific learning disabilities.

- 3. Only for the purposes of qualifying for reasonable accommodation in employment, an impairment must be known or shown through an interactive process to exist in fact and the:
 - a. impairment must have a substantially limiting effect upon the individual's ability to perform his or her job, the individual's ability to apply or be considered for a job, or the individual's access to equal benefits, privileges, or terms or conditions or employment; or
 - b. employee must have put the employer on notice of the existence of an impairment, and medical documentation must establish a reasonable likelihood that engaging in job functions without an accommodation would aggravate the impairment to the extent that it would create a substantially limiting effect.

For purposes of this subsection, a limitation is not substantial if it has only a trivial effect.

- C. Discrimination, Discriminate.
 - 1. "Discrimination" means different or unequal treatment because of race, religion, color, sex, national origin, marital status, familial status, age, sexual orientation or disability.
 - 2. "Discriminate" means to treat differently or unequally because of race, religion, <u>creed</u>, color, sex, national origin, marital status, familial status, age, sexual orientation, <u>gender identity</u>, <u>honorably discharged veteran or</u> <u>military status</u>, or <u>the presence of any sensory</u>, <u>mental or physical</u> disability <u>as defined by the American with Disability Act and/or the</u> <u>Washington State Law Against Disability</u>, <u>Chapter 49.60 RCW</u>.
- D. "Employee" means an individual who works for wages, salary or commission, or a combination thereof, in the service of an employer, but does not include a person employed by a parent, grandparent, brother, sister, spouse or child. The term includes an individual who is seeking or applying for employment.
- E. Employer.
 - 1. "Employer" means any person acting in the interest of an employer, directly or indirectly, who employs employees within the City, or who solicits individuals within the City to apply for employment within the City.
 - 2. The term means one who employs:
 - a. twenty-five or more employees in 1999;
 - b. fifteen or more employees in 2000; and
 - c. eight or more employees as of January 1, 2001, and thereafter.
- The term includes the City itself, its boards, commissions and authorities.
 F. "Familial status" means the relationship between two or more individuals, at least one of whom:
 - 1. has not attained eighteen years of age and is domiciled with:
 - a. a parent or person having legal custody; or

- b. the designee, with written permission of a parent or person having legal custody; or
- 2. is pregnant; or
- 3. is in the process of securing legal custody of an individual who has not attained eighteen years of age.
- G. <u>"Gender Identity" means having or being perceived as having a gender identity, self-image, appearance, behavior, or expression, whether or not that gender identity, self-image, appearance, behavior, or expression is different from that traditionally associated with the sex assigned to that person at birth.</u>
- H. G. "Labor organization" means an organization which is constituted for the purpose, in whole or in part, of collective bargaining or for dealing with an employer concerning grievances, terms or conditions of employment, or for other mutual aid or protection in connection with an employer.
- I. H. "Marital status" means the status of being married, single, separated, divorced or widowed.
- J. I. "National origin" includes ancestry.
- K. J. "Person" includes:
 - 1. one or more individuals, partnerships, associations, organizations, corporations, cooperatives, legal representatives, trustees and receivers, or any group of persons;
 - 2. any owner, lessee, proprietor, manager, agent or employee, whether one or more natural persons; and
 - 3. any political or civil subdivisions of the City and any agency or instrumentality of the City or of any political or civil subdivision thereof.
- K. "Place of public resort, accommodation, assemblage or amusement" includes, L. but is not limited to, any place, licensed or unlicensed, kept for gain, hire or reward, or where charges are made for admission, service, occupancy, or use of any property or facilities, whether conducted for the entertainment, housing, or lodging of transient guests, or for the benefit, use, or accommodation of those seeking health, recreation, or rest, or for the burial or other disposition of human remains, or for the sale of goods, merchandise, services, or personal property, or for the rendering of personal services, or for public conveyance or transportation on land, water or in the air, including the stations and terminals thereof and the garaging of vehicles, or where food or beverages of any kind are sold for consumption on the premises, or where public amusement, entertainment, sports, or recreation of any kind is offered with or without charge, or where medical service or care is made available, or where the public gathers, congregates, or assembles for amusement, recreation, or public purposes, or public halls, public elevators, and public washrooms of buildings and structures occupied by two or more tenants, or by the owner and one or more tenants, or any public library or educational institution, or schools of special instruction, or nursery schools, or day care centers or children's camps, provided that nothing contained in this definition shall be construed to include or apply to any institute, bona fide club, or place of accommodation, which is by its nature distinctly private, including fraternal organizations, though where public use is permitted

that use shall be covered by this section; nor shall anything contained in this definition apply to any educational facility, columbarium, crematory, mausoleum, or cemetery operated or maintained by a bona fide religious or sectarian institution.

- M. L. "Sex" means gender.
- N. M. "Sexual orientation" means heterosexuality, homosexuality and bisexuality. and gender expression or identity. As used in this definition, "gender expression or identity" means having or being perceived as having a gender identity, selfimage, appearance, behavior, or expression, whether or not that gender identity, self-image, appearance, behavior, or expression is different from that traditionally associated with the sex assigned to that person at birth.

Section 4. That SMC section 01.06.090 is amended to read as follows:

1.06.090 Nondiscrimination

- A. Housing Practices
 - 1. It is a violation of this chapter for any person to discriminate by:
 - a. refusing to sell, lease, rent or otherwise make available any offered real property;
 - b. expelling a purchaser, lessee or renter from any real property;
 - c. altering the price, terms, conditions or privileges relating to the sale, rental, lease or occupancy of real property, or in the furnishing of any facilities or services in connection with real property;
 - d. attempting to discourage the sale, rental or lease of any real property to a purchaser, lessee or renter;
 - e. publishing, circulating, issuing or displaying, or causing to be published, circulated, issued or displayed, any communication, notice, advertisement or sign of any kind relating to the sale, rental or lease of real property which indicates any preference, limitation or specification with respect thereto;
 - f. assisting, inducing, compelling or coercing another person to commit an act or engage in a practice that violates this subsection;
 - g. coercing, intimidating, threatening or interfering with any person in the exercise or enjoyment of, or on account of having aided or encouraged any other person in the exercise of, any right granted or protected by this subsection.
 - 2. Nothing in this subsection shall apply to:
 - a. a single-family house rented or leased by the owner if the owner does not own or have an interest in the proceeds of the rental or lease of more than three such single-family houses at one time, the rental or lease occurred without the use of a real estate broker or sales person, and the rental or lease occurred without the

publication, posting or mailing of any advertisement, sign or statement in violation of subsection (A)(1)(e) of this section; or

- b. rooms or units in dwellings containing living quarters occupied or intended to be occupied by no more than four families living independently of each other if the owner maintains and occupies one of the rooms or units as his residence.
- 3. No person whose business includes engaging in residential real estate related transactions may discriminate in making available or in the terms and conditions of such a transaction. "Residential real estate related transaction" means the making or purchasing of loans or providing other financial assistance for purchasing, construction, improving, repairing or maintaining a dwelling or securing residential real estate, or the selling, brokering or appraising of residential real property.
- 4. No real estate licensee may accept or retain a listing of real property for sale, lease or rental with an understanding that a purchaser may be discriminated against with respect to the sale, rental or lease.
- 5. No person may for profit induce or attempt to induce any other person to sell or rent any dwelling by representations regarding entry or prospective entry into the neighborhood of a person or person of a particular race, religion, <u>creed</u>, color, sex, national origin, marital status, familial status, age, sexual orientation, <u>gender identity</u>, <u>honorably discharged veteran or</u> <u>military status</u>, or <u>the presence of any sensory</u>, <u>mental or physical</u> disability <u>as defined by the American with Disability Act and/or the</u> <u>Washington State Law Against Disability</u>, <u>Chapter 49.60 RCW</u>.

Section 5. That SMC section 10.18.010 is amended to read as follows:

10.18.010 Declaration – Policy

The City of Spokane declares:

- A. It is the policy of the City of Spokane to encourage and enable people with disabilities to participate fully in the social and economic life of the City, and to engage in remunerative employment.
- B. As citizens, people with disabilities have the same rights as persons without disabilities to purchase any service, commodity or article of personal property offered or sold on, or by, any establishment to the public, and the admission of any person to accommodations, advantages, facilities, or privileges of any place of public resort, accommodation, assemblage or amusement, without acts directly or indirectly causing persons of any particular race, creed, color, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, honorably discharged veteran or military status national origin or the presence of ((with)) any sensory, mental or physical disability as defined by the American With Disability Act and/or the Washington State Law Against Disability, Chapter 49.60 RCW, or the use of a

trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability, to be treated as not welcome, accepted, desired or solicited.

C. People with disabilities are entitled to full and equal accommodations, advantages, facilities and privileges on common carriers, airplanes, motor vehicles, railroad trains, motor buses, street cars, boats and all other public conveyances, as well as in hotels, lodging places, places of public resort, accommodation, assemblage or amusement, and all other places to which the general public is invited, subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all persons.

VETO MESSAGE ON ORDINANCE NO. C-35079 Relating to sewer and water services outside of the city limits; amending SMC sections 13.03.0802 and 13.04.1922

To the City Clerk, Honorable President and Members, Spokane City Council

I am returning herewith, with my veto, Ordinance No. C-35079.

Today, I signed a joint development agreement with the Spokane County Commissioners to work together with the City Council to improve the process of bringing new jobs and opportunity to Spokane while maintaining our quality of life. A copy of the joint development agreement is attached to this veto message.

I am vetoing this measure because it would introduce too much uncertainty into our area's economic growth and planning and would expose the City to the risks associated with defending the Ordinance in litigation. But, I do so reluctantly because the City and County of Spokane must find a way to coordinate growth in a better manner.

The joint development agreement, which has been signed by all three Spokane County Commissioners, is a plan to work cooperatively to develop and implement a model for smart growth that delivers mutually beneficial outcomes for each jurisdiction and the citizens they serve.

The City and County have successfully taken on several tough issues over the past couple years. Representatives of both entities meet weekly and have recently reached regional agreements that improve how we deliver solid waste, animal control and stormwater services. Both also recently completed an assessment of the regional criminal justice system and are currently working together on an implementation plan and timeline.

The joint development agreement looks at smart growth that delivers mutually beneficial outcomes to individual jurisdictions. Doing this well requires a citizen engagement process and thoughtful discussion that leads to a comprehensive solution.

Agenda Background for Ord Re Water & Service in the UGA

Previous expansions of the urban growth area (UGA) has resulted in the vesting of development projects before the expiration of the time period to file a petition for review with the growth management hearings board resulting in vested development projects in areas where the expanded UGA is later determined to be in violation of the Growth Management Act. The vested development projects end up being located in areas outside of the UGA requiring urban services. This ordinance will prohibit the expansion of water or sewer services to areas added to the urban growth area until the time period to file a petition for review to the growth management hearings board (board), as provided in RCW 36.70A.290 (2), has expired or, if a petition for review was filed, upon the issuance by the board of its final order finding that the action taken to expand the urban growth area is in compliance with statutory regulations of the growth management act, Chapter 3670A RCW, or, if the board issued a final order finding that the expansion of the urban growth area did not comply with the statutory requirements of the growth management act, a subsequent determination that the expansion of the urban growth area did comply with the growth management act, whichever occurs latest in time. This prohibition shall not apply if the city has a pre-existing obligation to serve either by agreement or other statutory obligations.

ORDINANCE NO. C - 35079

AN ORDINANCE relating to sewer and water services outside of the city limits; amending SMC sections 13.03.0802 and 13.04.1922.

WHEREAS, in response to Spokane County's update of the Urban Growth Area (UGA), the City of Spokane Plan Commission, after a public hearing and public deliberation, adopted findings of fact and conclusions dated December 14, 2011 in determining and recommending that adding additional areas to the UGA was not necessary to accommodate population growth and not consistent with the Growth Management Act and the City's Comprehensive Plan; and

WHEREAS, December 19, 2011, the Spokane City Council adopted Resolution No. 2011-0101 stating the City of Spokane's preference on the ten-year review of the UGA for Spokane County whereby the Council adopted the Plan Commission's Findings, Conclusions and Recommendations and proposed that the UGA not be expanded to include specific areas under consideration; and

WHEREAS, at the May 2, 2012 meeting of the Growth Management Steering Committee of Elected Officials, Council Member Mike Allen, one of the City of Spokane representative to the Committee, voted in opposition to a motion to include the South Glenrose Study Area in the UGA; and

WHEREAS, on February 27, 2013, Mayor David Condon, Council President Ben Stuckart and council members Amber Waldref and Jon Snyder sent a letter to the Spokane County Board of County Commissioners expressing their concern about the expansion of the UGA and the lasting impacts on the ability of the City and the County to provide services based in part on the unsupported and excessive population projection and encouraged the Commissioners to not expand the UGA as specified in the letter; and

WHEREAS, on April 11, 2013, the City Council approved a letter urging the Commissioners to delay the effective date of the UGA expansion until the appeal process has been completed in order to avoid the vesting of building permits only to have an appeal filed and end up creating a confusing patchwork of developed land; and

WHEREAS, in November of 2013, the expanded UGA was invalidated by the Growth Management Hearings Board; and

WHEREAS, property included in the expansion of the urban growth area that is determined to be out of compliance with the growth management act unnecessarily

disrupts and burdens the City's water and sewer systems and can result in allocation or use of resources which do not benefit the system or rate payers; -- Now, Therefore;

The City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. That SMC section 13.03.0802 is amended to read as follows:

13.03.0802 Connections Authorized

- A. City sewer utility service is initially intended to provide for the needs of the ((residents)) customers of the City of Spokane. The City reserves the right to decline to serve any area outside the City's service area, or to condition ((such)) service outside of the City's boundaries upon entry into a written contract, upon such additional terms and conditions as may be determined at the time service is requested or thereafter, as municipal needs may require, in accord with ordinances established by the city council, considering additional expenses imposed or burdens created by outside the City sewer service.
- B. Pursuant to authority granted by RCW 35.67.310, the director of ((wastewater management)) utilities is authorized to enter into agreements for and on behalf of the City with owners of property beyond the city limits permitting connection of such property with the City's sewers upon the terms and conditions and subject to the payments prescribed in this Article when, in his judgment, such connection will not overload or imperil the City's sewer system, including collection and transmission capacity as well as treatment and discharge capabilities for current or future City customer needs, and as further subject to any other applicable laws or restrictions. Any agreement to extend sewer service by the director of utilities shall comply with all sewer service policies and procedures approved by the city council and subsection D.
- C. In the event all aspects of service are not specifically addressed by contract or otherwise specifically provided, in addition to the provisions of SMC 13.03.0804, any other portions of this chapter or chapter 13.01 SMC may be applied by the director of ((wastewater management)) <u>utilities</u> where deemed necessary, as terms and conditions of service to outside the City customers.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 13.03 SMC, the City shall not initiate construction to extend sewer service to areas added to the urban growth area or enter into written contracts for the extension of sewer service until the time period to file a petition for review to the growth management hearings board has expired and no petitions were filed or, if a petition was filed, upon the issuance by the board of its final order finding that the action taken to expand the urban growth area is in compliance with statutory regulations of the growth management act, chapter 36.70A RCW, or, if the board issued a final order finding that the expansion of the urban growth area did not comply with the statutory

requirements of the growth management act, a subsequent judicial determination that the expansion of the urban growth area did comply with the growth management act, whichever occurs latest in time. Upon resolution of the appeal procedures set forth above, the City may enter into sewer service contracts, including applicable terms and conditions, pursuant to this Article, the City's Comprehensive Plan and Six-Year Comprehensive Sewer Program and state law for property determined to be in a properly designated urban growth areas. For property located outside of the urban growth area, sewer service extension shall be provided consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan and Six-Year Comprehensive Plan and Six-Year and state law.

Section 2. That SMC section 13.04.1922 is amended to read as follows:

13.04.1922 Outside the City Water Service

- A. City water utility service is initially intended to provide for the needs of the ((residents)) customers of the City of Spokane. The City reserves the right to decline to serve any area outside the City's service area, or to condition ((such)) service outside the City's boundaries upon entry into a written contract, upon such additional terms and conditions as may be determined at the time service is requested or thereafter, as municipal needs may require, considering additional expenses imposed or burdens created by outside the City service.
- B. Pursuant to authority granted by RCW 35.92. ((020)) 200, the director of utilities is authorized to enter into agreements for and on behalf of the City with owners of property beyond the City limits permitting connection of such property to the City's water utility service upon the terms and conditions and subject to the payments prescribed in this Article when, in his judgment, such connection will not overload or imperil the City's water system, including domestic and fireflow pressure, supply resources and municipal water rights, all as may be needed by current or future city customer needs, and as further subject to any other applicable laws or restrictions. Any agreement to extend water service by the director of utilities shall comply with all water service polices or procedures approved by the city council and subsection D.
- C. In the event all aspects of service are not specifically addressed by contract or otherwise specifically provided any other portions of this chapter or chapter 13.01 SMC may be applied by the director <u>of utilities</u>, where deemed necessary, as terms and conditions of service to outside the City customers.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of chapter 13.04 SMC, the City shall not initiate construction to extend water service to areas added to the urban growth area or enter into written contracts for the extension of water service until the time period to file a petition for review to the growth management hearings board has expired and no petitions were filed or, if a petition was filed, upon the issuance by the board of its final order finding that the action taken to expand the urban growth

area is in compliance with statutory regulations of the growth management act, chapter 36.70A RCW, or, if the board issued a final order finding that the expansion of the urban growth area did not comply with the statutory requirements of the growth management act, a subsequent judicial determination that the expansion of the urban growth area did comply with the growth management act, whichever occurs latest in time. Upon resolution of the appeal procedures set forth above, the City may enter into water service contracts, including applicable terms and conditions, pursuant to this Article, the City's Comprehensive Plan and Six-Year Comprehensive Water Program and state law for property determined to be in a properly designated urban growth areas. For property located outside of the urban growth area, sewer service extension shall be provided consistent with the City's Comprehensive Plan and Six-Year Comprehensiv
