Individuals speaking during the open forum shall address their comments to the council president and shall maintain decorum as laid out in Rule 2.15 (Participation by Members of the Public in Council Meetings).

The Legislative Session also is open to the public, and public comment is taken on legislative items (except those that are adjudicatory or solely administrative in nature). Following the conclusion of the Legislative portion of the meeting, an Open Forum is held unless a majority of Council Members vote otherwise. Please see additional Open Forum information that appears at the end of the City Council agenda.

ADDRESSING THE COUNCIL

- Public participation in Council meetings is governed by Council Rules 2.15 and 2.16. A complete copy of the [council rules](https://my.spokanecity.org/citycouncil/documents/rules/) can be found on the Council's documents webpage. (<https://my.spokanecity.org/citycouncil/documents/rules/>)
- No member of the public may speak without first being recognized for that purpose by the Chair. Except for named parties to an adjudicative hearing, a person may be required to sign a sign-up sheet and provide their name and city of residence as a condition of recognition.
- Persons speaking at the podium shall verbally identify themselves by name, city of residency and, if appropriate, representative capacity.
- Speakers may be provided additional written or verbal instructions to ensure that verbal remarks are electronically recorded. Documents submitted for the record are identified and marked by the Clerk. (If you are submitting paper copies of documents to the Council Members, please provide a minimum of ten copies via the City Clerk. The City Clerk is responsible for officially filing and distributing your submittal.)
- To ensure that evidence and expressions of opinion are included in the record, and to ensure that decorum befitting a deliberative process is maintained, no modes of expression including but not limited to demonstrations, banners, signs, applause, profanity, vulgar language, or personal insults are permitted. To prevent disruption of council meetings and visual obstruction of proceedings, members of the audience shall remain seated during council meetings.
- A speaker asserting a statement of fact may be asked to document and identify the source of the factual datum being asserted.
- When addressing the Council, members of the public shall direct all remarks to the Council President, and shall confine their remarks to the matters that are specifically before the Council at that time or, if speaking during Open Forum, shall confine their remarks to affairs of the city.
- City staff may testify at Council meetings, including open forum, providing the testimony is in compliance with the City of Spokane Code of Ethics and the staff follow the steps outlined in the City Council Rules of Procedure.

SPEAKING TIME LIMITS: Each person addressing the Council is limited to two minutes of speaking time, except during hearings and items under final consideration by the Council, for which three minutes will be allowed. The chair may allow additional time if the speaker is asked to respond to questions from the Council. Public testimony and consideration of an item may be extended to a subsequent meeting by a majority vote of the Council. Note: No public testimony shall be taken on amendments to consent or legislative agenda items, or solely procedural, parliamentary, or administrative matters of the Council.

Any agreement over \$50,000 must be approved by the city council. Typically, the funding to pay for these agreements has already been approved by the city council through the annual budget ordinance, or through a separate special budget ordinance. If the contract requires a new allocation of funds, that fact usually will be indicated in the summary of the contract in the reports, contracts, and claims agenda.

Unless a council member requests that an item be considered separately, the council approves the reports, contracts, and claims agenda as a whole in a single vote. Note: The reports, contracts, and claims agenda is no longer read in full by the city clerk. The public is welcome to testify on matters listed in the reports, contracts, and claims agenda, but individual testimony is limited to three minutes for the entire reports, contracts, and claims agenda.

Agenda Wording

The Street Department is seeking approval for a Value Blanket for the purchase of emulsified asphalt (CSS-1H and CSS-1) and fog seal as needed over a 5-year period. The 5-year expenditure would not exceed \$500,000 (including tax).

Summary (Background)

This Value Blanket, awarded via bid (ITB 6498-26) to Ergon Asphalt & Emulsions, Inc. as the only bidder, will be for a 5-year period (6/1/2026-5/31/3031). Both materials are used widely across the City's roadway systems for pavement maintenance and as a way to preserve or "seal" asphalt pavement surface to extend pavement life.

ACCEPT ADDITIONAL AWARD FROM ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS

Agenda Wording

The Administrative Office of the Courts has offered additional funding for IAA26858 for City of Spokane's Therapeutic Courts via two amendments. One amendment increased wages and benefits by \$8,000 to support the increase in benefit costs. Another amendment increased funding for Recovery Support by \$26,000. This results in an additional \$34,000 to therapeutic courts.

Summary (Background)

INTERAGENCY AGREEMENT
AGREEMENT NUMBER IAA26858**

BETWEEN

**WASHINGTON STATE
ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICE OF THE COURTS
AND
SPOKANE MUNICIPAL COURT**

This second Amendment to the Agreement is made and entered into by and between the State of Washington acting by and through the Washington State Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), and Spokane Municipal Court, referred to as “Court” known collectively as the “Parties”.

RECITALS:

- A. AOC and Court (collectively the “Parties”) entered into the Agreement (“Agreement”) which will be performed from July 1, 2025, to June 30, 2026.
- B. The Parties now desire to unilaterally amend the Agreement in accordance with Section 6. Revenue Sharing, by updating language on Section 5: Compensation. AOC is redistributing and increasing funds to this Agreement in the Recovery Supports category by \$26,000.00 for a new total agreement amount of **\$464,330.00**. Cost Categories and total amount will be updated accordingly.
- C. The Parties previously amended the Agreement as follows:
 - 1. Amendment 1, effective on 10/09/2025 amended Section 8. Agreement Management by incorporating Marina Richardson as the new AOC PM and updating Attachment A. Use of Funds.
 - 2. Amendment 2, effective on 02/17/2026 amended to increase the total amount of this agreement by \$8,000 for a new total amount of \$438,330.00.
- D. The Amendment set forth herein is within the scope of the Agreement.

AGREEMENT

The parties now wish to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. Section 5. Compensation

This section will be deleted and replaced in its entirety as follows:

“The amount awarded may not exceed **\$464,330.00** for payments made during the period from July 1, 2025, through June 30, 2026, related to the purpose of this agreement.

The Court shall use these funds in the following cost categories:

- b) RECIPIENT shall complete all activities funded by this Agreement and be fully responsible for the proper management of all funds and resources made available under this Agreement.
- c) RECIPIENT agrees to take complete responsibility for all actions taken under this Agreement, including ensuring all subgrantees and contractors comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. ECOLOGY reserves the right to request proof of compliance by subgrantees and contractors.
- d) RECIPIENT's activities under this Agreement shall be subject to the review and approval by ECOLOGY for the extent and character of all work and services.

2. AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATIONS

This Agreement may be altered, amended, or waived only by a written amendment executed by both parties. No subsequent modification(s) or amendment(s) of this Agreement will be of any force or effect unless in writing and signed by authorized representatives of both parties. ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT may change their respective staff contacts and administrative information without the concurrence of either party.

3. ACCESSIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR COVERED TECHNOLOGY

The RECIPIENT must comply with the Washington State Office of the Chief Information Officer, OCIO Policy no. 188, Accessibility (<https://ocio.wa.gov/policy/accessibility>) as it relates to "covered technology." This requirement applies to all products supplied under the Agreement, providing equal access to information technology by individuals with disabilities, including and not limited to web sites/pages, web-based applications, software systems, video and audio content, and electronic documents intended for publishing on Ecology's public web site.

4. ARCHAEOLOGICAL AND CULTURAL RESOURCES

RECIPIENT shall take all reasonable action to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to archaeological and historic archaeological sites, historic buildings/structures, traditional cultural places, sacred sites, or other cultural resources, hereby referred to as Cultural Resources.

The RECIPIENT must agree to hold harmless ECOLOGY in relation to any claim related to Cultural Resources discovered, disturbed, or damaged due to the RECIPIENT's project funded under this Agreement.

 - For projects with any federal involvement, comply with the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (Section 106).

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b) If required by the ECOLOGY Program, submit an Inadvertent Discovery Plan (IDP) to ECOLOGY prior to implementing any project that involves field activities. ECOLOGY will provide the IDP form.

RECIPIENT shall:

- Keep the IDP at the project site.
 - Make the IDP readily available to anyone working at the project site.
 - Discuss the IDP with staff, volunteers, and contractors working at the project site.
 - Implement the IDP when Cultural Resources or human remains are found at the project site.
- c) If any Cultural Resources are found while conducting work under this Agreement, follow the protocol outlined in the project IDP.
- Immediately stop work and notify the ECOLOGY Program, who will notify the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation at (360) 586-3065, any affected Tribe, and the local government.
- d) If any human remains are found while conducting work under this Agreement, follow the protocol outlined in the project IDP.
- Immediately stop work and notify the local Law Enforcement Agency or Medical Examiner/Coroner's Office, the Department of Archaeology and Historic Preservation at (360) 790-1633, and then the ECOLOGY Program.
- e) Comply with RCW 27.53, RCW 27.44, and RCW 68.50.645, and all other applicable local, state, and federal laws protecting Cultural Resources and human remains.

5. ASSIGNMENT

No right or claim of the RECIPIENT arising under this Agreement shall be transferred or assigned by the RECIPIENT.

6. COMMUNICATION

RECIPIENT shall make every effort to maintain effective communications with the RECIPIENT's designees, ECOLOGY, all affected local, state, or federal jurisdictions, and any interested individuals or groups.

7. COMPENSATION

- a) Any work performed prior to effective date of this Agreement will be at the sole expense and risk of the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY must sign the Agreement before any payment requests can be submitted.
- b) Payments will be made on a reimbursable basis for approved and completed work as specified in this Agreement.
- c) RECIPIENT is responsible to determine if costs are eligible. Any questions regarding eligibility should be clarified with ECOLOGY prior to incurring costs. Costs that are conditionally eligible require approval by ECOLOGY prior to expenditure.
- d) RECIPIENT shall not invoice more than once per month unless agreed on by ECOLOGY.
- e) ECOLOGY will not process payment requests without the proper reimbursement forms, Progress Report and supporting documentation. ECOLOGY will provide instructions for submitting payment requests.
- f) ECOLOGY will pay the RECIPIENT thirty (30) days after receipt of a properly completed request for payment.
- g) RECIPIENT will receive payment through Washington State's Office of Financial Management's Statewide Payee Desk. - h) ECOLOGY may, at its sole discretion, withhold payments claimed by the RECIPIENT if the RECIPIENT fails to satisfactorily comply with any term or condition of this Agreement.
- i) Monies withheld by ECOLOGY may be paid to the RECIPIENT when the work described herein, or a portion thereof, has been completed if, at ECOLOGY's sole discretion, such payment is reasonable and approved according to this Agreement, as appropriate, or upon completion of an audit as specified herein.

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j) RECIPIENT must submit within thirty (30) days after the expiration date of this Agreement, all financial, performance, and other reports required by this Agreement. Failure to comply may result in delayed reimbursement.

8. COMPLIANCE WITH ALL LAWS

RECIPIENT agrees to comply fully with all applicable federal, state and local laws, orders, regulations, and permits related to this Agreement, including but not limited to:

- a) RECIPIENT agrees to comply with all applicable laws, regulations, and policies of the United States and the State of Washington which affect wages and job safety.
- b) RECIPIENT agrees to be bound by all applicable federal and state laws, regulations, and policies against discrimination.
- c) RECIPIENT certifies full compliance with all applicable state industrial insurance requirements.
- d) RECIPIENT agrees to secure and provide assurance to ECOLOGY that all the necessary approvals and permits required by authorities having jurisdiction over the project are obtained. RECIPIENT must include time in their project timeline for the permit and approval processes.

ECOLOGY shall have the right to immediately terminate for cause this Agreement as provided herein if the RECIPIENT fails to comply with above requirements.

If any provision of this Agreement violates any statute or rule of law of the state of Washington, it is considered modified to conform to that statute or rule of law.

9. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

RECIPIENT and ECOLOGY agree that any officer, member, agent, or employee, who exercises any function or responsibility in the review, approval, or carrying out of this Agreement, shall not have any personal or financial interest, direct or indirect, nor affect the interest of any corporation, partnership, or association in which he/she is a part, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof.

10. CONTRACTING FOR GOODS AND SERVICES

RECIPIENT may contract to buy goods or services related to its performance under this Agreement. RECIPIENT shall award all contracts for construction, purchase of goods, equipment, services, and professional architectural and engineering services through a competitive process, if required by State law. RECIPIENT is required to follow procurement procedures that ensure legal, fair, and open competition.

RECIPIENT must have a standard procurement process or follow current state procurement procedures. RECIPIENT may be required to provide written certification that they have followed their standard procurement procedures and applicable state law in awarding contracts under this Agreement.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to inspect and request copies of all procurement documentation, and review procurement practices related to this Agreement. Any costs incurred as a result of procurement practices not in compliance with state procurement law or the RECIPIENT's normal procedures may be disallowed at ECOLOGY's sole discretion.

11. DISPUTES

When there is a dispute with regard to the extent and character of the work, or any other matter related to this Agreement the determination of ECOLOGY will govern, although the RECIPIENT shall have the right to appeal decisions as provided for below:

- a) RECIPIENT notifies the funding program of an appeal request.
- b) Appeal request must be in writing and state the disputed issue(s).
- c) RECIPIENT has the opportunity to be heard and offer evidence in support of its appeal.
- d) ECOLOGY reviews the RECIPIENT's appeal.
- e) ECOLOGY sends a written answer within ten (10) business days, unless more time is needed, after concluding the

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review.

The decision of ECOLOGY from an appeal will be final and conclusive, unless within thirty (30) days from the date of such decision, the RECIPIENT furnishes to the Director of ECOLOGY a written appeal. The decision of the Director or duly authorized representative will be final and conclusive.

The parties agree that this dispute process will precede any action in a judicial or quasi-judicial tribunal.

Appeals of the Director's decision will be brought in the Superior Court of Thurston County. Review of the Director's decision will not be taken to Environmental and Land Use Hearings Office.

Pending final decision of a dispute, the RECIPIENT agrees to proceed diligently with the performance of this Agreement and in accordance with the decision rendered.

Nothing in this Agreement will be construed to limit the parties' choice of another mutually acceptable method, in addition to the dispute resolution procedure outlined above.

12. ENVIRONMENTAL DATA STANDARDS

a) RECIPIENT shall prepare a Quality Assurance Project Plan (QAPP) for a project that collects or uses environmental measurement data. RECIPIENTS unsure about whether a QAPP is required for their project shall contact the ECOLOGY Program issuing the grant or loan. If a QAPP is required, the RECIPIENT shall:

- Use ECOLOGY's QAPP Template/Checklist provided by the ECOLOGY, unless ECOLOGY Quality Assurance (QA) officer or the Program QA coordinator instructs otherwise.
- Follow ECOLOGY's Guidelines for Preparing Quality Assurance Project Plans for Environmental Studies, July 2004 (Ecology Publication No. 04-03-030).
- Submit the QAPP to ECOLOGY for review and approval before the start of the work.

b) RECIPIENT shall submit environmental data that was collected on a project to ECOLOGY using the Environmental Information Management system (EIM), unless the ECOLOGY Program instructs otherwise. The RECIPIENT must confirm with ECOLOGY that complete and correct data was successfully loaded into EIM, find instructions at: <http://www.ecy.wa.gov/eim>.

c) RECIPIENT shall follow ECOLOGY's data standards when Geographic Information System (GIS) data is collected and processed. Guidelines for Creating and Accessing GIS Data are available at: <https://ecology.wa.gov/Research-Data/Data-resources/Geographic-Information-Systems-GIS/Standards>. RECIPIENT, when requested by ECOLOGY, shall provide copies to ECOLOGY of all final GIS data layers, imagery, related tables, raw data collection files, map products, and all metadata and project documentation.

13. GOVERNING LAW

This Agreement will be governed by the laws of the State of Washington, and the venue of any action brought hereunder will be in the Superior Court of Thurston County.

14. INDEMNIFICATION

ECOLOGY will in no way be held responsible for payment of salaries, consultant's fees, and other costs related to the project described herein, except as provided in the Scope of Work.

To the extent that the Constitution and laws of the State of Washington permit, each party will indemnify and hold the other harmless from and against any liability for any or all injuries to persons or property arising from the negligent act or omission of that party or that party's agents or employees arising out of this Agreement.

15. INDEPENDENT STATUS

The employees, volunteers, or agents of each party who are engaged in the performance of this Agreement will continue to be employees, volunteers, or agents of that party and will not for any purpose be employees, volunteers, or agents of the other party.

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16. KICKBACKS

RECIPIENT is prohibited from inducing by any means any person employed or otherwise involved in this Agreement to give up any part of the compensation to which he/she is otherwise entitled to or receive any fee, commission, or gift in return for award of a subcontract hereunder.

17. MINORITY AND WOMEN'S BUSINESS ENTERPRISES (MWBE)

RECIPIENT is encouraged to solicit and recruit, to the extent possible, certified minority-owned (MBE) and women-owned (WBE) businesses in purchases and contracts initiated under this Agreement.

Contract awards or rejections cannot be made based on MWBE participation; however, the RECIPIENT is encouraged to take the following actions, when possible, in any procurement under this Agreement:

In the event of inconsistency in this Agreement, unless otherwise provided herein, the inconsistency shall be resolved by giving precedence in the following order: (a) applicable federal and state statutes and regulations; (b) The Agreement; (c) Scope of Work; (d) Special Terms and Conditions; (e) Any provisions or terms incorporated herein by reference, including the "Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants and Loans"; (f) Ecology Funding Program Guidelines; and (g) General Terms and Conditions.

19. PRESENTATION AND PROMOTIONAL MATERIALS

ECOLOGY reserves the right to approve RECIPIENT's communication documents and materials related to the fulfillment of this Agreement:

- a) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide a draft copy to ECOLOGY for review and approval ten (10) business days prior to production and distribution.
- b) RECIPIENT shall include time for ECOLOGY's review and approval process in their project timeline.
- c) If requested, RECIPIENT shall provide ECOLOGY two (2) final copies and an electronic copy of any tangible products developed.

Copies include any printed materials, and all tangible products developed such as brochures, manuals, pamphlets, videos, audio tapes, CDs, curriculum, posters, media announcements, or gadgets with a message, such as a refrigerator magnet, and any online communications, such as web pages, blogs, and twitter campaigns. If it is not practical to provide a copy, then the RECIPIENT shall provide a description (photographs, drawings, printouts, etc.) that best represents the item.

Any communications intended for public distribution that uses ECOLOGY's logo shall comply with ECOLOGY's graphic requirements and any additional requirements specified in this Agreement. Before the use of ECOLOGY's logo contact ECOLOGY for guidelines.

RECIPIENT shall acknowledge in the communications that funding was provided by ECOLOGY.

20. PROGRESS REPORTING

- a) RECIPIENT must satisfactorily demonstrate the timely use of funds by submitting payment requests and progress

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reports to ECOLOGY. ECOLOGY reserves the right to amend or terminate this Agreement if the RECIPIENT does not document timely use of funds.

b) RECIPIENT must submit a progress report with each payment request. Payment requests will not be processed without a progress report. ECOLOGY will define the elements and frequency of progress reports.

c) RECIPIENT shall use ECOLOGY's provided progress report format.

d) Quarterly progress reports will cover the periods from January 1 through March 31, April 1 through June 30, July 1 through September 30, and October 1 through December 31. Reports shall be submitted within thirty (30) days after the end of the quarter being reported.

e) RECIPIENT must submit within thirty (30) days of the expiration date of the project, unless an extension has been approved by ECOLOGY, all financial, performance, and other reports required by the Agreement and funding program guidelines. RECIPIENT shall use the ECOLOGY provided closeout report format.

21. PROPERTY RIGHTS

a) Copyrights and Patents. When the RECIPIENT creates any copyrightable materials or invents any patentable property under this Agreement, the RECIPIENT may copyright or patent the same but ECOLOGY retains a royalty free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, recover, or otherwise use the material(s) or property, and to authorize others to use the same for federal, state, or local government purposes.

b) Publications. When the RECIPIENT or persons employed by the RECIPIENT use or publish ECOLOGY information; present papers, lectures, or seminars involving information supplied by ECOLOGY; or use logos, reports, maps, or other data in printed reports, signs, brochures, pamphlets, etc., appropriate credit shall be given to ECOLOGY.

c) Presentation and Promotional Materials. ECOLOGY shall have the right to use or reproduce any printed or graphic materials produced in fulfillment of this Agreement, in any manner ECOLOGY deems appropriate. ECOLOGY shall acknowledge the RECIPIENT as the sole copyright owner in every use or reproduction of the materials.

d) Tangible Property Rights. ECOLOGY's current edition of "Administrative Requirements for Recipients of Ecology Grants and Loans," shall control the use and disposition of all real and personal property purchased wholly or in part with funds furnished by ECOLOGY in the absence of state and federal statutes, regulations, or policies to the contrary, or upon specific instructions with respect thereto in this Agreement.

If said property is lost, stolen, or damaged while in the RECIPIENT's possession, then ECOLOGY shall be reimbursed in cash or by setoff by the RECIPIENT for the fair market value of such property.

f) Acquisition Projects. The following provisions shall apply if the project covered by this Agreement includes funds for the acquisition of land or facilities:

1. RECIPIENT shall establish that the cost is fair value and reasonable prior to disbursement of funds provided for in this Agreement.

2. RECIPIENT shall provide satisfactory evidence of title or ability to acquire title for each parcel prior to disbursement of funds provided by this Agreement. Such evidence may include title insurance policies, Torrens certificates, or abstracts, and attorney's opinions establishing that the land is free from any impediment, lien, or claim which would impair the uses intended by this Agreement.

g) Conversions. Regardless of the Agreement expiration date, the RECIPIENT shall not at any time convert any equipment, property, or facility acquired or developed under this Agreement to uses other than those for which assistance was originally approved without prior written approval of ECOLOGY. Such approval may be conditioned upon payment to ECOLOGY of that portion of the proceeds of the sale, lease, or other conversion or encumbrance which monies granted pursuant to this Agreement bear to the total acquisition, purchase, or construction costs of such property.

22. RECORDS, AUDITS, AND INSPECTIONS

RECIPIENT shall maintain complete program and financial records relating to this Agreement, including any engineering documentation and field inspection reports of all construction work accomplished.

All records shall:

- a) Be kept in a manner which provides an audit trail for all expenditures.
- b) Be kept in a common file to facilitate audits and inspections.
- c) Clearly indicate total receipts and expenditures related to this Agreement.
- d) Be open for audit or inspection by ECOLOGY, or by any duly authorized audit representative of the State of Washington, for a period of at least three (3) years after the final grant payment or loan repayment, or any dispute resolution hereunder.

RECIPIENT shall provide clarification and make necessary adjustments if any audits or inspections identify discrepancies in the records.

ECOLOGY reserves the right to audit, or have a designated third party audit, applicable records to ensure that the state has been properly invoiced. Any remedies and penalties allowed by law to recover monies determined owed will be enforced. Repetitive instances of incorrect invoicing or inadequate records may be considered cause for termination.

All work performed under this Agreement and any property and equipment purchased shall be made available to ECOLOGY and to any authorized state, federal or local representative for inspection at any time during the course of this Agreement and for at least three (3) years following grant or loan termination or dispute resolution hereunder.

RECIPIENT shall provide right of access to ECOLOGY, or any other authorized representative, at all reasonable times, in order to monitor and evaluate performance, compliance, and any other conditions under this Agreement.

23. RECOVERY OF FUNDS

The right of the RECIPIENT to retain monies received as reimbursement payments is contingent upon satisfactory performance of this Agreement and completion of the work described in the Scope of Work.

All payments to the RECIPIENT are subject to approval and audit by ECOLOGY, and any unauthorized expenditure(s) or unallowable cost charged to this Agreement shall be refunded to ECOLOGY by the RECIPIENT.

RECIPIENT shall refund to ECOLOGY the full amount of any erroneous payment or overpayment under this Agreement.

RECIPIENT shall refund by check payable to ECOLOGY the amount of any such reduction of payments or repayments within thirty (30) days of a written notice. Interest will accrue at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per year from the time ECOLOGY demands repayment of funds.

Any property acquired under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, may become ECOLOGY's property and the RECIPIENT's liability to repay monies will be reduced by an amount reflecting the fair value of such property.

24. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or any provision of any document incorporated by reference shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

25. STATE ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY ACT (SEPA)

RECIPIENT must demonstrate to ECOLOGY's satisfaction that compliance with the requirements of the State Environmental Policy Act (Chapter 43.21C RCW and Chapter 197-11 WAC) have been or will be met. Any reimbursements are subject to this provision.

26. SUSPENSION

When in the best interest of ECOLOGY, ECOLOGY may at any time, and without cause, suspend this Agreement or any portion thereof for a temporary period by written notice from ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT. RECIPIENT shall resume performance on the next business day following the suspension period unless another day is specified by ECOLOGY.

27. SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES

28. TERMINATION

a) For Cause

ECOLOGY may terminate for cause this Agreement with a seven (7) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, at the sole discretion of ECOLOGY, for failing to perform an Agreement requirement or for a material breach of any term or condition. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Failure to Commence Work. ECOLOGY reserves the right to terminate this Agreement if RECIPIENT fails to commence work on the project funded within four (4) months after the effective date of this Agreement, or by any date mutually agreed upon in writing for commencement of work, or the time period defined within the Scope of Work.

Non-Performance. The obligation of ECOLOGY to the RECIPIENT is contingent upon satisfactory performance by the RECIPIENT of all of its obligations under this Agreement. In the event the RECIPIENT unjustifiably fails, in the opinion of ECOLOGY, to perform any obligation required of it by this Agreement, ECOLOGY may refuse to pay any further funds, terminate in whole or in part this Agreement, and exercise any other rights under this Agreement.

Despite the above, the RECIPIENT shall not be relieved of any liability to ECOLOGY for damages sustained by ECOLOGY and the State of Washington because of any breach of this Agreement by the RECIPIENT. ECOLOGY may withhold payments for the purpose of setoff until such time as the exact amount of damages due ECOLOGY from the RECIPIENT is determined.

b) For Convenience

ECOLOGY may terminate for convenience this Agreement, in whole or in part, for any reason when it is the best interest of ECOLOGY, with a thirty (30) calendar days prior written notification to the RECIPIENT, except as noted below. If this Agreement is so terminated, the parties shall be liable only for performance rendered or costs incurred in accordance with the terms of this Agreement prior to the effective date of termination.

Non-Allocation of Funds. ECOLOGY's ability to make payments is contingent on availability of funding. In the event funding from state, federal or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date and prior to the completion or expiration date of this Agreement, ECOLOGY, at its sole discretion, may elect to terminate the Agreement, in whole or part, or renegotiate the Agreement, subject to new funding limitations or conditions.

ECOLOGY may also elect to suspend performance of the Agreement until ECOLOGY determines the funding insufficiency is resolved. ECOLOGY may exercise any of these options with no notification or restrictions, although ECOLOGY will make a reasonable attempt to provide notice.

In the event of termination or suspension, ECOLOGY will reimburse eligible costs incurred by the RECIPIENT through the effective date of termination or suspension. Reimbursed costs must be agreed to by ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT. In no event shall ECOLOGY's reimbursement exceed ECOLOGY's total responsibility under the Agreement and any amendments.

c) By Mutual Agreement

ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT may terminate this Agreement, in whole or in part, at any time, by mutual written agreement.

d) In Event of Termination

All finished or unfinished documents, data studies, surveys, drawings, maps, models, photographs, reports or other materials prepared by the RECIPIENT under this Agreement, at the option of ECOLOGY, will become property of ECOLOGY and the RECIPIENT shall be entitled to receive just and equitable compensation for any satisfactory work completed on such documents and other materials.

Nothing contained herein shall preclude ECOLOGY from demanding repayment of all funds paid to the RECIPIENT in accordance with Recovery of Funds, identified herein.

29. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARY

RECIPIENT shall ensure that in all subcontracts entered into by the RECIPIENT pursuant to this Agreement, the state of Washington is named as an express third party beneficiary of such subcontracts with full rights as such.

30. WAIVER

Waiver of a default or breach of any provision of this Agreement is not a waiver of any subsequent default or breach, and will not be construed as a modification of the terms of this Agreement unless stated as such in writing by the authorized representative of ECOLOGY.

Agenda Wording

Installation of a previously purchased generator at the Spokane Central Service Center by Colvico, Inc. (Spokane, WA) -- \$148,600, plus applicable taxes.

Summary (Background)

Solid Waste Collection purchased a Generac SG350 generator to allow the department to continue essential operations in the event of a catastrophic power failure. It will power one compressed natural gas (CNG) compressor during an outage. This means that when the department's fleet reaches 99 CNG vehicles in 2028, this generator will have the capability to fuel 62% of the fleet. PW ITB #6520-26 was issued that included a pre-bid mandatory meeting. Eight companies had representatives attend. Two bids were received from those companies; Colvico, Inc. was the lowest responsive bidder and awarded the contract.

What impacts would the proposal have on historically excluded communities?

No impacts identified. Public works services and projects are designed to serve all citizens and businesses. We strive to offer a consistent level of service to all, to distribute public investment throughout the community and to respond to gaps in services as identified. We recognize the need to maintain affordability and predictability for all solid waste customers and are committed to being financially and environmentally responsible.

How will data be collected, analyzed, and reported concerning the effect of the program/policy by racial, ethnic, gender identity, national origin, income level, disability, sexual orientation, or other existing disparities?

This project is designed to manage costs and continue the delivery of solid waste services in support of all rate payers. It will not impact race, gender identity, national origin, income level, disability, sexual orientation or other existing disparities.

How will data be collected regarding the effectiveness of this program, policy, or product to ensure it is the right solution?

Public Works follows the City's established procurement regulations and policies. Solid Waste Collection monitors equipment cost data for current and future purchases.

Describe how this proposal aligns with current City Policies, including the Comprehensive Plan, Sustainability Action Plan, Capital Improvement Program, Neighborhood Master Plans, Council Resolutions, and others?

This project is consistent with the City's requirement to help align city policies regarding rates to ensure that we are covering the cost of providing solid waste services. Having a backup generator meets the goals of the Comprehensive Plan CFU 1.1 Level of Service and CFU 1.2 Operational Efficiency by working to offer excellent and effective service while maintaining fiscal responsibility. It also ensures that customers receive uninterrupted solid waste services as required by Spokane Municipal Code 13.02.0200 Universal Service by the City and 13.02.0202 Compulsory Service.

PUBLIC WORKS AGREEMENT
Title: GENERAC GENERATOR INSTALLATION

This Agreement is made and entered into by and between the **CITY OF SPOKANE** as ("City"), a Washington municipal corporation, and **COLVICO, INC.**, whose address is 2812 North Pittsburg Street, Spokane, Washington 99207 as ("Contractor"), individually hereafter referenced as a "Party", and together as the "Parties".

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Agreement is to perform Installation Services of the Generac Generator; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor was selected from PW ITB 6520-26.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants and performance of the Scope of Work contained herein, the City and Contractor mutually agree as follows:

1. TERM OF AGREEMENT.

The term of this Agreement begins on April 27, 2026, and ends on October 31, 2026, unless amended by written agreement or terminated earlier under the provisions.

2. TIME OF BEGINNING AND COMPLETION.

The Contractor shall begin the work outlined in the "Scope of Work" ("Work") on the beginning date, above. The City will acknowledge in writing when the Work is complete. Time limits established under this Agreement shall not be extended because of delays for which the Contractor is responsible, but may be extended by the City, in writing, for the City's convenience or conditions beyond the Contractor's control.

3. SCOPE OF WORK.

The Contractor's General Scope of Work for this Agreement is described in Contractor's Response to PW ITB 6520-26, which is attached as Exhibit B and made a part of this Agreement. In the event of a conflict or discrepancy in the Agreement documents, this City Agreement controls.

The Work is subject to City review and approval. The Contractor shall confer with the City periodically, and prepare and present information and materials (e.g. detailed outline of completed Work) requested by the City to determine the adequacy of the Work or Contractor's progress.

4. COMPENSATION / PAYMENT.

Total compensation for Contractor's services under this Agreement shall be a maximum amount not to exceed **ONE HUNDRED FORTY-EIGHT THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$148,600.00)**, not including sales tax if applicable, unless modified by a written amendment to this Agreement. This is the maximum amount to be paid under this Agreement for the work described in Section 3 above, and shall not be exceeded without the prior written authorization of the City in the form of an executed amendment to this Agreement.

The Company shall submit its applications for payment to the Spokane Solid Waste Collection, Administration Office, 915 North Nelson Street, Spokane, Washington 99207 (or via Email – Attn Rachel Schoonover at rschoonover@spokanecity.org). All invoices should include the City Clerk's File No. "OPR XXXX-XXXX" and an approved L & I Intent to Pay Prevailing Wage number. The final invoice should include an approved Affidavit of Wages Paid number. Payment will not be made without this documentation included on the invoice. **Payment will be made via direct deposit/ACH** within thirty (30) days after receipt of the Company's application except as provided by state law. If the City objects to all or any portion of the invoice, it shall notify the Company and reserves the right to only pay that portion of the invoice not in dispute. In that event, the parties shall immediately make every effort to settle the disputed amount.

5. TAXES, FEES AND LICENSES.

- A. Contractor shall pay and maintain in current status, all necessary licenses, fees, assessments, permit charges, etc. necessary to conduct the work included under this Agreement. It is the Contractor's sole responsibility to monitor and determine changes or the enactment of any subsequent requirements for said fees, assessments, or changes and to immediately comply.
- B. The cost of any permits, licenses, fees, etc. arising as a result of the projects included in this Agreement shall be included in the project budgets.

6. STATEMENT OF INTENT TO PAY PREVAILING WAGES TO BE POSTED.

The Contractor and each subcontractor required to pay the prevailing rate of wages shall post in a location readily visible at the job site: (1) a copy of a "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" approved by the industrial statistician of the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries (L & I); and (2) the address and telephone number of the industrial statistician of the Department of Labor and Industries where a complaint or inquiry concerning prevailing wages may be made.

7. STATE PREVAILING WAGES.

The Contractor and all subcontractors will submit a "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" certified by the industrial statistician of the Department of Labor and Industries, prior to any payments. The "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" shall include: (1) the Contractor's registration number; and (2) the prevailing wages under RCW 39.12.020 and the number of workers in each classification. Each voucher claim submitted by the Contractor for payment on a project estimate shall state that the prevailing wages have been paid in accordance with the "Statement(s) of Intent to Pay

Prevailing Wages” on file with the City. Prior to the payment of funds held under RCW 60.28, the Contractor and subcontractors must submit an "Affidavit of Wages Paid" certified by the industrial statistician.

8. RETAINAGE IN LIEU OF BOND.

The Contractor may not commence work until it obtains all insurance, permits and bonds required by the contract documents and applicable law. In lieu of a one hundred percent (100%) payment/performance bond, in accord with RCW 39.08.010, the City shall retain ten percent (10%) of the contract sum for thirty (30) days after date of final acceptance or until receipt of required releases and settlement of any liens filed under Chapter 60.28 RCW, whichever is later.

9. PUBLIC WORKS REQUIREMENTS.

The Contractor and each subcontractor are required to fulfill the Department of Labor and Industries Public Works and Prevailing Wage Training Requirement under RCW 39.04.350. The contractor must verify responsibility criteria for each first tier subcontractor, and a subcontractor of any tier that hires other subcontractors must verify the responsibility criteria listed in RCW 39.04.350(1) for each of its subcontractors. Verification shall include that each subcontractor, at the time of subcontract execution, meets the responsibility criteria. This verification requirement, as well as responsibility criteria, must be included in every public works contract and subcontract of every tier.

10. CITY OF SPOKANE BUSINESS LICENSE.

Section 8.01.070 of the Spokane Municipal Code states that no person may engage in business with the City without first having obtained a valid annual business registration. The Contractor shall be responsible for contacting the State of Washington Business License Services at www.dor.wa.gov or 360-705-6741 to obtain a business registration. If the Contractor does not believe it is required to obtain a business registration, it may contact the City’s Taxes and Licenses Division at (509) 625-6070 to request an exemption status determination.

11. SOCIAL EQUITY REQUIREMENTS / NON-DISCRIMINATION.

No individual shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefit of, subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in the administration of or in connection with this Agreement because of age, sex, race, color, religion, creed, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation including gender expression or gender identity, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, or use of a service animal by a person with disabilities. The Contractor agrees to comply with, and to require that all subcontractors comply with, federal, state and local nondiscrimination laws, including but not limited to: the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, and the American’s With Disabilities Act, to the extent those laws are applicable.

12. INDEMNIFICATION.

The Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its officers and employees harmless from all claims, demands, or suits at law or equity-asserted by third parties for bodily injury (including death) and/or property damage which arise from the Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct under this Agreement, including attorneys' fees and litigation costs; provided that nothing herein shall require a Contractor to indemnify the City against and hold harmless the City from claims, demands or suits based solely upon the negligence of the City, its agents, officers, and employees. If a claim or suit is caused by or results from the concurrent negligence of the Contractor's agents or employees and the City, its agents, officers and employees, this indemnity provision shall be valid and enforceable to the extent of the negligence of the Contractor, its agents or employees. The Contractor specifically assumes liability and agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold the City harmless for actions brought by the Contractor's own employees against the City and, solely for the purpose of this indemnification and defense, the Contractor specifically waives any immunity under the Washington State industrial insurance law, or Title 51 RCW. The Contractor recognizes that this waiver was specifically entered into pursuant to the provisions of RCW 4.24.115 and was the subject of mutual negotiation. The indemnity and agreement to defend and hold the City harmless provided for in this section shall survive any termination or expiration of this agreement.

13. INSURANCE.

During the period of the Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain in force at its own expense, each insurance noted below with companies or through sources approved by the State Insurance Commissioner pursuant to Title 48 RCW:

- A. **Worker's Compensation Insurance** in compliance with RCW 51, which requires subject employers to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers and Employer's Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- B. **General Liability Insurance** on an occurrence basis, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. It shall include contractual liability coverage for the indemnity provided under this Agreement. It shall provide that the City, its officers and employees are additional insureds but only with respect to the Contractor's services to be provided under this Agreement;
 - i. Acceptable **supplementary Umbrella insurance** coverage combined with Company's General Liability insurance policy must be a minimum of \$2,000,000, in order to meet the insurance coverage limits required in this Agreement; and
- C. **Automobile Liability Insurance** with a combined single limit, or the equivalent of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident for bodily injury and property damage, including coverage for owned, hired and non-owned vehicles; and

- D. **Pollution Liability Insurance** with a minimum coverage for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$3,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate for the duration of the contract. When required coverage may need to be in place for up to six (6) years after completion of the project per RCW 4.16.310. Pollution Liability covers sums the Operator is legally obligated to pay as a result of emission, discharge, release, or escape of any contaminants, irritants, or pollutants in or on land, the atmosphere, or any water course or body of water, resulting in environmental damage.

There shall be no cancellation, material change, reduction of limits or intent not to renew the insurance coverage(s) without thirty (30) days written notice from the Contractor or its insurer(s) to the City. As evidence of the insurance coverages required by this Agreement, the Contractor shall furnish a current and acceptable Certificate of Insurance (COI). The certificate shall specify all of the parties who are additional insureds, and include applicable policy endorsements, the thirty (30) day cancellation clause, and the deduction or retention level. The Contractor shall be financially responsible for all pertinent deductibles, self-insured retentions, and/or self-insurance.

14. SUBCONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITY.

The Contractor must verify responsibility criteria for each first-tier subcontractor, and a subcontractor of any tier that hires other subcontractors must verify responsibility criteria for each of its subcontractors. Verification shall include that each subcontractor, at the time of subcontract execution, meets the responsibility criteria listed in RCW 39.04.350(1) and possesses an electrical contractor license, if required by chapter 19.28 RCW, or an elevator contractor license, if required by chapter 70.87 RCW.

15. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

The Contractor is an independent Contractor. This Agreement does not intend the Contractor to act as a City employee. The City has neither direct nor immediate control over the Contractor nor the right to control the manner or means by which the Contractor works. Neither the Contractor nor any Contractor employee shall be an employee of the City. This Agreement prohibits the Contractor to act as an agent or legal representative of the City. The Contractor is not granted express or implied rights or authority to assume or create any obligation or responsibility for or in the name of the City, or to bind the City. The City is not liable for or obligated to pay sick leave, vacation pay, or any other benefit of employment, nor to pay social security or other tax that may arise from employment. The Contractor shall pay all income and other taxes as due.

16. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING.

The Contractor shall not assign or subcontract its obligations under this Agreement without the City's written consent, which may be granted or withheld in the City's sole discretion. Any subcontract made by the Contractor shall incorporate by reference this Agreement, except as otherwise provided. The Contractor shall ensure that all subcontractors comply with the obligations and requirements of the subcontract. The

City's consent to any assignment or subcontract does not release the Contractor from liability or any obligation within this Agreement, whether before or after City consent, assignment or subcontract.

17. TERMINATION.

Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, by ten (10) days written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, the City shall pay the Contractor for all work previously authorized and performed prior to the termination date.

18. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE.

The standard of performance applicable to Contractor's services will be the degree of skill and diligence normally employed by professional contractors in the region performing the same or similar Contracting services at the time the work under this Agreement are performed.

19. ANTI KICK-BACK.

No officer or employee of the City of Spokane, having the power or duty to perform an official act or action related to this Agreement shall have or acquire any interest in the Agreement, or have solicited, accepted or granted a present or future gift, favor, service or other thing of value from or to any person involved in this Agreement.

20. CONSTRUAL.

The Contractor acknowledges receipt of a copy of the Agreement documents and agrees to comply with them. The silence or omission in the Agreement documents concerning any detail required for the proper execution and completion of the work means that only the best general practice is to prevail and that only material and workmanship of the best quality are to be used. This Contract shall be construed neither in favor of nor against either party.

21. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION.

The Contractor has provided its certification that it is in compliance with and shall not contract with individuals or organizations which are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible from participation in Federal Assistance Programs under Executive Order 12549 and "Debarment and Suspension", codified at 29 CFR part 98.

22. CONTRACTOR'S ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND WARRANTY.

The Contractor acknowledges that it has visited the site of the work, has examined it, and is qualified to perform the work required by this Agreement.

The Contractor guarantees and warranties all work, labor and materials under this Agreement for two (2) years following final acceptance. If any unsatisfactory condition or defect develops within that time, the Contractor will immediately place the work in a condition satisfactory to the City and repair all damage caused by the condition or defect. The Contractor will repair or restore to the City's satisfaction, in accordance with the contract documents and at its expense, all property damaged by his performance under

this Agreement. This warranty is in addition to any manufacturers' or other warranty in the Agreement documents.

23. REMEDIES.

In the event of a breach by either party, of any of their obligations under this Agreement, each party, in addition to being entitled to exercise all rights granted by law and under this Agreement, including recovery of damages, will be entitled to seek specific performance of its rights under this Agreement. The parties agree that monetary damages would not provide adequate compensation for any losses incurred by reason of a breach of any of the provisions of this Agreement and hereby further agree that, in the event of any action for specific performance in respect of such breach, it shall waive the defense that a remedy at law would be adequate.

24. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- A. **Amendments/Modifications:** The City may modify this Agreement and order changes in the work whenever necessary or advisable. The Contractor may accept modifications when ordered in writing by the City, and the Agreement time and compensation will be adjusted accordingly.
- B. The Contractor, at no expense to the City, shall comply with all laws of the United States and Washington, the Charter and ordinances of the City of Spokane; and rules, regulations, orders and directives of their administrative agencies and officers.
- C. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of Washington. The venue of any action brought shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction, located in Spokane County, Washington.
- D. **Captions:** The titles of sections or subsections are for convenience only and do not define or limit the contents.
- E. **Severability:** If any term or provision is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected, and each term and provision shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- F. **Waiver:** No covenant, term or condition or the breach shall be deemed waived, except by written consent of the party against whom the waiver is claimed, and any waiver of the breach of any covenant, term or condition shall not be deemed a waiver of any preceding or succeeding breach of the same or any other covenant, term of condition. Neither the acceptance by the City of any performance by the Contractor after the time the same shall have become due nor payment to the Contractor for any portion of the Work shall constitute a waiver by the City of the breach or default of any covenant, term or condition unless otherwise expressly agreed to by the City in writing.
- G. **Entire Agreement:** This document along with any exhibits and all attachments, and subsequently issued addenda, comprises the entire agreement between the City and the Contractor. If conflict occurs between Agreement documents and applicable laws, codes, ordinances or regulations, the most stringent or legally binding requirement shall govern and be considered a part of this Agreement to afford the City the maximum benefits.

- H. **No personal liability:** No officer, agent or authorized employee of the City shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under this Agreement, whether expressed or implied, nor for any statement or representation made or in any connection with this Agreement.
- I. Under Washington State Law (reference RCW Chapter 42.56, the *Public Records Act* [PRA]) all materials received or created by the City of Spokane are **public records** and are available to the public for viewing via the City Clerk's Records (online) or a valid Public Records Request (PRR).

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, in consideration of the terms, conditions and covenants contained, or attached and incorporated and made a part, the parties have executed this Agreement by having legally-binding representatives affix their signatures below.

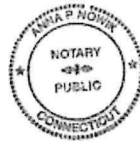

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the terms, conditions, covenants and performance of the Scope of Work contained herein, the City and Contractor mutually agree as follows:

1. TERM OF AGREEMENT.

The term of this Agreement begins on June 1, 2026, and ends on November 30, 2026, unless amended by written agreement or terminated earlier under the provisions.

2. TIME OF BEGINNING AND COMPLETION.

The Contractor shall begin the work outlined in the “Scope of Work” (“Work”) on the beginning date, above. The City will acknowledge in writing when the Work is complete. Time limits established under this Agreement shall not be extended because of delays for which the Contractor is responsible, but may be extended by the City, in writing, for the City’s convenience or conditions beyond the Contractor’s control.

3. SCOPE OF WORK.

The Contractor’s General Scope of Work for this Agreement is described in Contractor’s Proposal dated April 6, 2026, which is attached as Exhibit B and made a part of this Agreement. In the event of a conflict or discrepancy in the Agreement documents, this City Agreement controls.

The Work is subject to City review and approval. The Contractor shall confer with the City periodically, and prepare and present information and materials (e.g. detailed outline of

completed Work) requested by the City to determine the adequacy of the Work or Contractor's progress.

4. COMPENSATION / PAYMENT.

Total compensation for Contractor's services under this Agreement shall be a maximum amount not to exceed **ONE HUNDRED FORTY-ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED TWENTY-FIVE AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$141,825.00)**, including applicable sales tax, excluding tariffs, if required, unless modified by a written amendment to this Agreement. This is the maximum amount to be paid under this Agreement for the work described in Section 3 above, and shall not be exceeded without the prior written authorization of the City in the form of an executed amendment to this Agreement.

The Company shall submit its applications for payment to the City of Spokane Streets Department, Administration Office, 901 North Nelson Street, Spokane, Washington 99202. All invoices should include the City Clerk's File No. "OPR XXXX-XXXX" and an approved L & I Intent to Pay Prevailing Wage number. The final invoice should include an approved Affidavit of Wages Paid number. Payment will not be made without this documentation included on the invoice. **Payment will be made via direct deposit/ACH** within thirty (30) days after receipt of the Company's application except as provided by state law. If the City objects to all or any portion of the invoice, it shall notify the Company and reserves the right to only pay that portion of the invoice not in dispute. In that event, the parties shall immediately make every effort to settle the disputed amount.

5. TAXES, FEES AND LICENSES.

- A. Contractor shall pay and maintain in current status, all necessary licenses, fees, assessments, permit charges, etc. necessary to conduct the work included under this Agreement. It is the Contractor's sole responsibility to monitor and determine changes or the enactment of any subsequent requirements for said fees, assessments, or changes and to immediately comply.
- B. The cost of any permits, licenses, fees, etc. arising as a result of the projects included in this Agreement shall be included in the project budgets.

6. STATEMENT OF INTENT TO PAY PREVAILING WAGES TO BE POSTED.

The Contractor and each subcontractor required to pay the prevailing rate of wages shall post in a location readily visible at the job site: (1) a copy of a "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" approved by the industrial statistician of the Washington State Department of Labor and Industries (L & I); and (2) the address and telephone number of the industrial statistician of the Department of Labor and Industries where a complaint or inquiry concerning prevailing wages may be made.

7. STATE PREVAILING WAGES.

The Contractor and all subcontractors will submit a "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" certified by the industrial statistician of the Department of Labor and Industries, prior to any payments. The "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" shall include: (1) the Contractor's registration number; and (2) the prevailing wages under RCW 39.12.020 and the number of workers in each classification. Each voucher

claim submitted by the Contractor for payment on a project estimate shall state that the prevailing wages have been paid in accordance with the "Statement(s) of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" on file with the City. Prior to the payment of funds held under RCW 60.28, the Contractor and subcontractors must submit an "Affidavit of Wages Paid" certified by the industrial statistician.

8. RETAINAGE IN LIEU OF BOND.

The Contractor may not commence work until it obtains all insurance, permits and bonds required by the contract documents and applicable law. In lieu of a one hundred percent (100%) payment/performance bond, in accord with RCW 39.08.010, the City shall retain ten percent (10%) of the contract sum for thirty (30) days after date of final acceptance or until receipt of required releases and settlement of any liens filed under Chapter 60.28 RCW, whichever is later.

9. PUBLIC WORKS REQUIREMENTS.

The Contractor and each subcontractor are required to fulfill the Department of Labor and Industries Public Works and Prevailing Wage Training Requirement under RCW 39.04.350. The contractor must verify responsibility criteria for each first tier subcontractor, and a subcontractor of any tier that hires other subcontractors must verify the responsibility criteria listed in RCW 39.04.350(1) for each of its subcontractors. Verification shall include that each subcontractor, at the time of subcontract execution, meets the responsibility criteria. This verification requirement, as well as responsibility criteria, must be included in every public works contract and subcontract of every tier.

10. CITY OF SPOKANE BUSINESS LICENSE.

Section 8.01.070 of the Spokane Municipal Code states that no person may engage in business with the City without first having obtained a valid annual business registration. The Contractor shall be responsible for contacting the State of Washington Business License Services at www.dor.wa.gov or 360-705-6741 to obtain a business registration. If the Contractor does not believe it is required to obtain a business registration, it may contact the City's Taxes and Licenses Division at (509) 625-6070 to request an exemption status determination.

11. SOCIAL EQUITY REQUIREMENTS / NON-DISCRIMINATION.

No individual shall be excluded from participation in, denied the benefit of, subjected to discrimination under, or denied employment in the administration of or in connection with this Agreement because of age, sex, race, color, religion, creed, marital status, familial status, sexual orientation including gender expression or gender identity, national origin, honorably discharged veteran or military status, the presence of any sensory, mental or physical disability, or use of a service animal by a person with disabilities. The Contractor agrees to comply with, and to require that all subcontractors comply with, federal, state and local nondiscrimination laws, including but not limited to: the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, the Age Discrimination in Employment Act, and the American's With Disabilities Act, to the extent those laws are applicable.

12. INDEMNIFICATION.

The Contractor shall defend, indemnify, and hold the City and its officers and employees harmless from all claims, demands, or suits at law or equity-asserted by third parties for bodily injury (including death) and/or property damage which arise from the Contractor's negligence or willful misconduct under this Agreement, including attorneys' fees and litigation costs; provided that nothing herein shall require a Contractor to indemnify the City against and hold harmless the City from claims, demands or suits based solely upon the negligence of the City, its agents, officers, and employees. If a claim or suit is caused by or results from the concurrent negligence of the Contractor's agents or employees and the City, its agents, officers and employees, this indemnity provision shall be valid and enforceable to the extent of the negligence of the Contractor, its agents or employees. The Contractor specifically assumes liability and agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold the City harmless for actions brought by the Contractor's own employees against the City and, solely for the purpose of this indemnification and defense, the Contractor specifically waives any immunity under the Washington State industrial insurance law, or Title 51 RCW. The Contractor recognizes that this waiver was specifically entered into pursuant to the provisions of RCW 4.24.115 and was the subject of mutual negotiation. The indemnity and agreement to defend and hold the City harmless provided for in this section shall survive any termination or expiration of this agreement.

13. INSURANCE.

During the period of the Agreement, the Contractor shall maintain in force at its own expense, each insurance noted below with companies or through sources approved by the State Insurance Commissioner pursuant to Title 48 RCW:

- A. **Worker's Compensation Insurance** in compliance with RCW 51, which requires subject employers to provide workers' compensation coverage for all their subject workers and Employer's Liability Insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000.
- B. **General Liability Insurance** on an occurrence basis, with a combined single limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence for bodily injury and property damage. It shall include contractual liability coverage for the indemnity provided under this Agreement. It shall provide that the City, its officers and employees are additional insureds but only with respect to the Contractor's services to be provided under this Agreement;
 - i. Acceptable **supplementary Umbrella insurance** coverage combined with Company's General Liability insurance policy must be a minimum of \$2,000,000, in order to meet the insurance coverage limits required in this Agreement; and
- C. **Automobile Liability Insurance** with a combined single limit, or the equivalent of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident for bodily injury and property damage, including coverage for owned, hired and non-owned vehicles; and

- D. **Pollution Liability Insurance** with a minimum coverage for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$3,000,000 per occurrence and \$3,000,000 aggregate for the duration of the contract. When required coverage may need to be in place for up to six (6) years after completion of the project per RCW 4.16.310. Pollution Liability covers sums the Operator is legally obligated to pay as a result of emission, discharge, release, or escape of any contaminants, irritants, or pollutants in or on land, the atmosphere, or any water course or body of water, resulting in environmental damage.

There shall be no cancellation, material change, reduction of limits or intent not to renew the insurance coverage(s) without thirty (30) days written notice from the Contractor or its insurer(s) to the City. As evidence of the insurance coverages required by this Agreement, the Contractor shall furnish a current and acceptable Certificate of Insurance (COI). The certificate shall specify all of the parties who are additional insureds, and include applicable policy endorsements, the thirty (30) day cancellation clause, and the deduction or retention level. The Contractor shall be financially responsible for all pertinent deductibles, self-insured retentions, and/or self-insurance.

14. SUBCONTRACTOR RESPONSIBILITY.

The Contractor must verify responsibility criteria for each first-tier subcontractor, and a subcontractor of any tier that hires other subcontractors must verify responsibility criteria for each of its subcontractors. Verification shall include that each subcontractor, at the time of subcontract execution, meets the responsibility criteria listed in RCW 39.04.350(1) and possesses an electrical contractor license, if required by chapter 19.28 RCW, or an elevator contractor license, if required by chapter 70.87 RCW.

15. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR.

The Contractor is an independent Contractor. This Agreement does not intend the Contractor to act as a City employee. The City has neither direct nor immediate control over the Contractor nor the right to control the manner or means by which the Contractor works. Neither the Contractor nor any Contractor employee shall be an employee of the City. This Agreement prohibits the Contractor to act as an agent or legal representative of the City. The Contractor is not granted express or implied rights or authority to assume or create any obligation or responsibility for or in the name of the City, or to bind the City. The City is not liable for or obligated to pay sick leave, vacation pay, or any other benefit of employment, nor to pay social security or other tax that may arise from employment. The Contractor shall pay all income and other taxes as due.

16. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING.

The Contractor shall not assign or subcontract its obligations under this Agreement without the City's written consent, which may be granted or withheld in the City's sole discretion. Any subcontract made by the Contractor shall incorporate by reference this Agreement, except as otherwise provided. The Contractor shall ensure that all subcontractors comply with the obligations and requirements of the subcontract. The

City's consent to any assignment or subcontract does not release the Contractor from liability or any obligation within this Agreement, whether before or after City consent, assignment or subcontract.

17. TERMINATION.

Either party may terminate this Agreement, with or without cause, by ten (10) days written notice to the other party. In the event of such termination, the City shall pay the Contractor for all work previously authorized and performed prior to the termination date.

18. STANDARD OF PERFORMANCE.

The standard of performance applicable to Contractor's services will be the degree of skill and diligence normally employed by professional contractors in the region performing the same or similar Contracting services at the time the work under this Agreement are performed.

19. ANTI KICK-BACK.

No officer or employee of the City of Spokane, having the power or duty to perform an official act or action related to this Agreement shall have or acquire any interest in the Agreement, or have solicited, accepted or granted a present or future gift, favor, service or other thing of value from or to any person involved in this Agreement.

20. CONSTRUAL.

The Contractor acknowledges receipt of a copy of the Agreement documents and agrees to comply with them. The silence or omission in the Agreement documents concerning any detail required for the proper execution and completion of the work means that only the best general practice is to prevail and that only material and workmanship of the best quality are to be used. This Contract shall be construed neither in favor of nor against either party.

21. DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION.

The Contractor has provided its certification that it is in compliance with and shall not contract with individuals or organizations which are debarred, suspended, or otherwise excluded from or ineligible from participation in Federal Assistance Programs under Executive Order 12549 and "Debarment and Suspension", codified at 29 CFR part 98.

22. CONTRACTOR'S ACKNOWLEDGEMENT AND WARRANTY.

The Contractor acknowledges that it has visited the site of the work, has examined it, and is qualified to perform the work required by this Agreement.

The Contractor guarantees and warranties all work, labor and materials under this Agreement for two (2) years following final acceptance. If any unsatisfactory condition or defect develops within that time, the Contractor will immediately place the work in a condition satisfactory to the City and repair all damage caused by the condition or defect. The Contractor will repair or restore to the City's satisfaction, in accordance with the contract documents and at its expense, all property damaged by his performance under

this Agreement. This warranty is in addition to any manufacturers' or other warranty in the Agreement documents.

23. REMEDIES.

In the event of a breach by either party, of any of their obligations under this Agreement, each party, in addition to being entitled to exercise all rights granted by law and under this Agreement, including recovery of damages, will be entitled to seek specific performance of its rights under this Agreement. The parties agree that monetary damages would not provide adequate compensation for any losses incurred by reason of a breach of any of the provisions of this Agreement and hereby further agree that, in the event of any action for specific performance in respect of such breach, it shall waive the defense that a remedy at law would be adequate.

24. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

- A. **Amendments/Modifications:** The City may modify this Agreement and order changes in the work whenever necessary or advisable. The Contractor may accept modifications when ordered in writing by the City, and the Agreement time and compensation will be adjusted accordingly.
- B. The Contractor, at no expense to the City, shall comply with all laws of the United States and Washington, the Charter and ordinances of the City of Spokane; and rules, regulations, orders and directives of their administrative agencies and officers.
- C. This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of Washington. The venue of any action brought shall be in a court of competent jurisdiction, located in Spokane County, Washington.
- D. **Captions:** The titles of sections or subsections are for convenience only and do not define or limit the contents.
- E. **Severability:** If any term or provision is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected, and each term and provision shall be valid and enforceable to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- F. **Waiver:** No covenant, term or condition or the breach shall be deemed waived, except by written consent of the party against whom the waiver is claimed, and any waiver of the breach of any covenant, term or condition shall not be deemed a waiver of any preceding or succeeding breach of the same or any other covenant, term of condition. Neither the acceptance by the City of any performance by the Contractor after the time the same shall have become due nor payment to the Contractor for any portion of the Work shall constitute a waiver by the City of the breach or default of any covenant, term or condition unless otherwise expressly agreed to by the City in writing.
- G. **Entire Agreement:** This document along with any exhibits and all attachments, and subsequently issued addenda, comprises the entire agreement between the City and the Contractor. If conflict occurs between Agreement documents and applicable laws, codes, ordinances or regulations, the most stringent or legally binding requirement shall govern and be considered a part of this Agreement to afford the City the maximum benefits.

- H. **No personal liability:** No officer, agent or authorized employee of the City shall be personally responsible for any liability arising under this Agreement, whether expressed or implied, nor for any statement or representation made or in any connection with this Agreement.
- I. Under Washington State Law (reference RCW Chapter 42.56, the *Public Records Act* [PRA]) all materials received or created by the City of Spokane are **public records** and are available to the public for viewing via the City Clerk’s Records (online) or a valid Public Records Request (PRR).

No such subsidiary is an insured for "bodily injury" or "property damage" that occurred, or "personal and advertising injury" caused by an offense committed:

- a. Before you maintained an ownership interest of more than 50% in such subsidiary; or
- b. After the date, if any, during the policy period that you no longer maintain an ownership interest of more than 50% in such subsidiary.

For purposes of Paragraph 1. of Section II – Who Is An Insured, each such subsidiary will be deemed to be designated in the Declarations as:

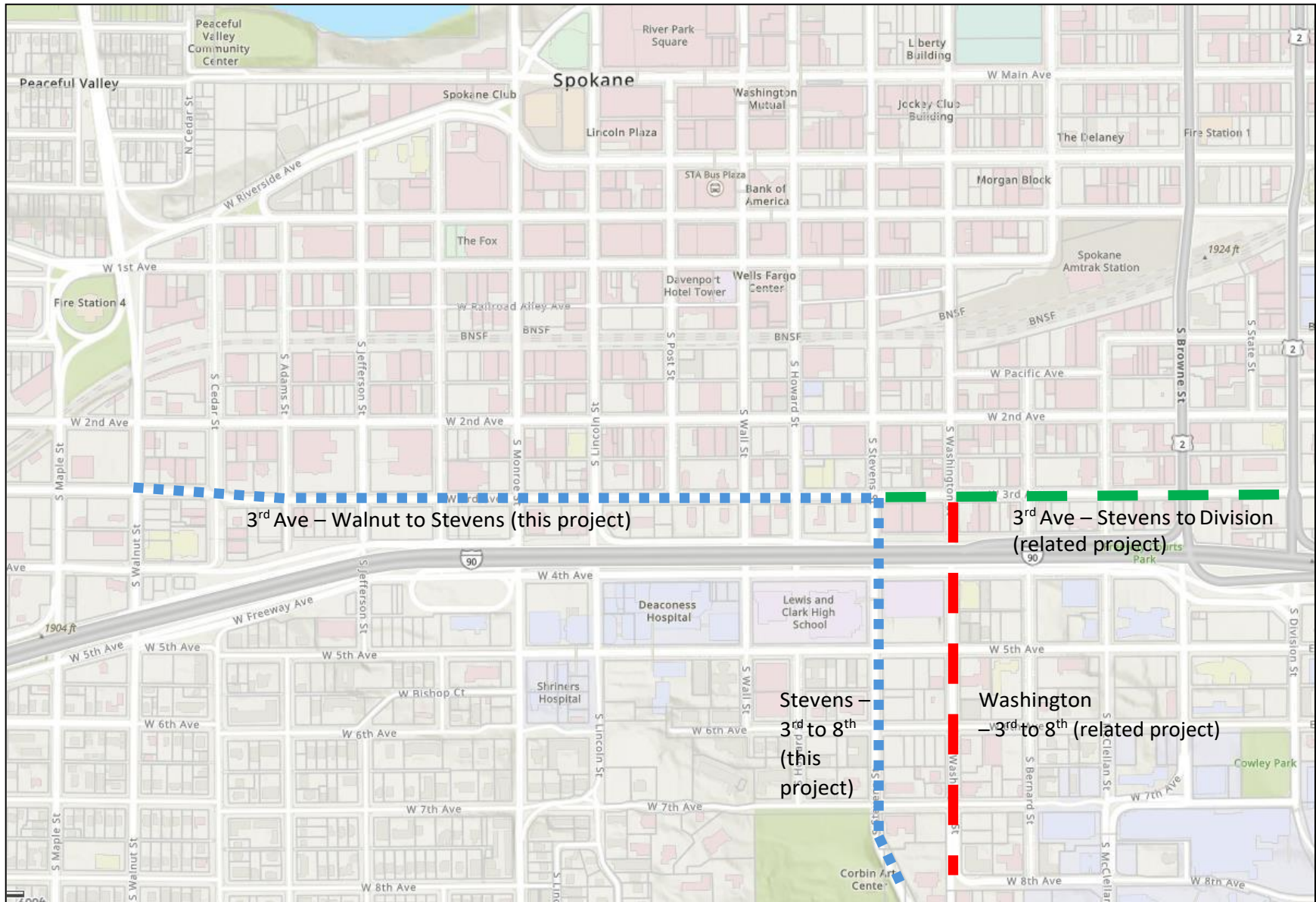

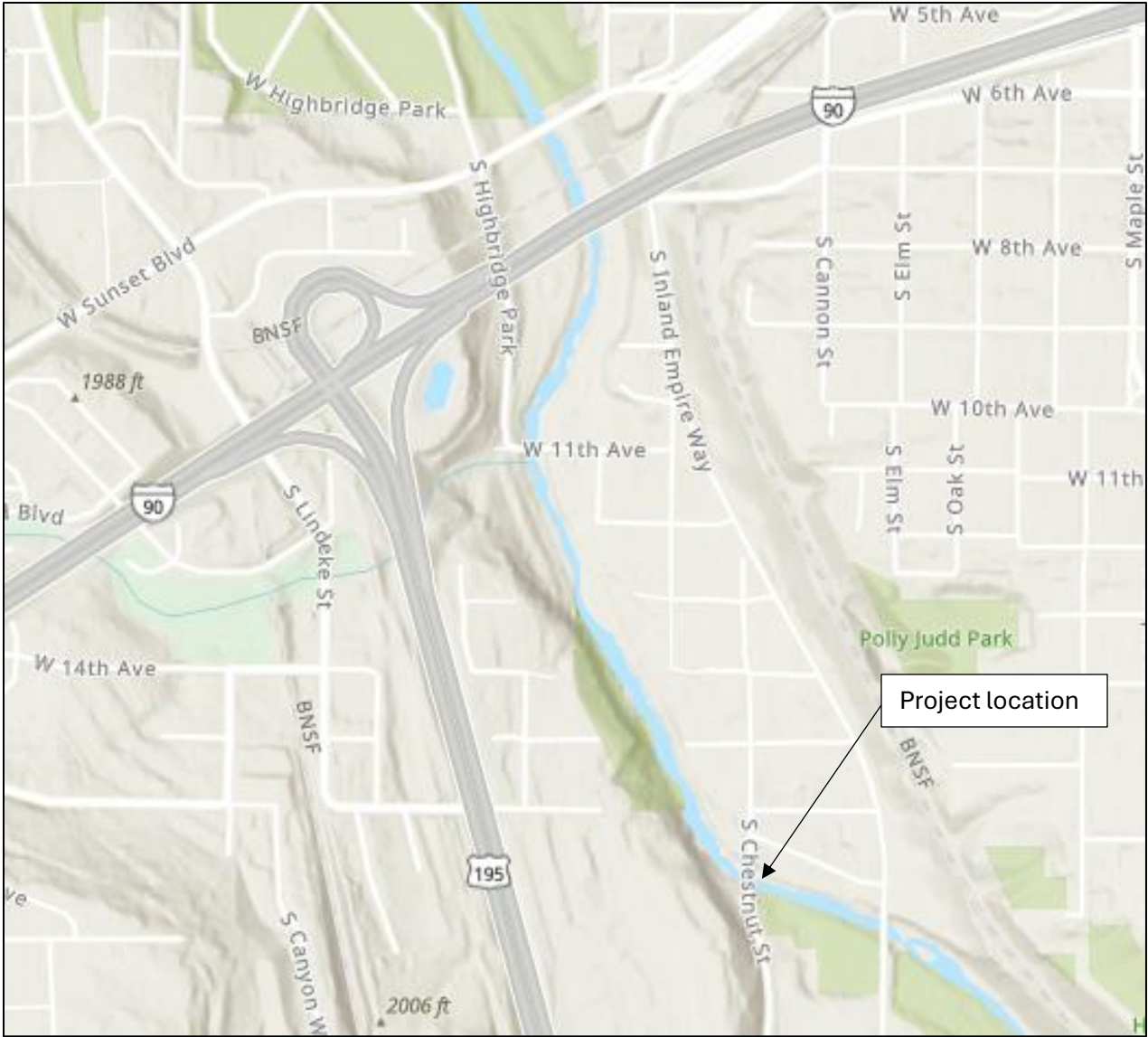

PURCHASE AGREEMENT

This Purchase Agreement (together with all attachments referenced herein, the “Agreement”), made and entered into by and between Hughes Fire Equipment Inc. (“Company”), and City of Spokane, a Municipality (“Customer”) is effective as of the date specified in Section 3 hereof.

1. Definitions.

- a. **“Product”** means the fire apparatus and any associated equipment manufactured or furnished for the Customer by Company pursuant to the Specifications.
- b. **“Specifications”** means the general specifications, technical specifications, training, and testing requirements for the Product contained in the Company Proposal for the Product prepared in response to the Customer’s request for proposal.
- c. **“Company Proposal”** means the proposal provided by Company attached as Exhibit C prepared in response to the Customer’s request for proposal.
- d. **“Delivery”** means the date Company is prepared to make physical possession of the Product available to the Customer.
- e. **“Acceptance”** The Customer shall have the opportunity, as described in Section 8(b) below, to inspect the Product for substantial conformance with the material Specifications; unless Company receives a Notice of Defect within the time frame described in Section 8(b), the Product will be deemed to be in conformance with the Specifications and accepted by the Customer.

2. Purpose. This Agreement sets forth the terms and conditions of Company’s sale of the Product to the Customer.

3. Term of Agreement. This Agreement will become effective on the date it is signed and approved by both Customer and Company (“Effective Date”) and, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, it will terminate upon the Customer’s Acceptance and payment in full of the Purchase Price.

4. Purchase and Payment. The Customer agrees to purchase the Product specified on Exhibit A for the total purchase price of \$2,586,517.94 (“Purchase Price”). Prices are in U.S. funds. A credit card convenience fee will be added to the purchase price if the Customer elects to make purchase of the Product in whole, or in part, using a credit card. The cost of the convenience fee will be determined prior to processing credit card.

5. Future Changes. Various state or federal regulatory agencies (e.g. NFPA, DOT, EPA) may require changes to the Specifications and/or the Product and in any such event any resulting cost increases incurred to comply therewith will be added to the Purchase Price to be paid by the Customer. In addition, any future drive train upgrades (engine, transmission, axles, etc.), or any other specification changes have not been calculated into our annual increases and will be provided at additional cost. To the extent practicable, Company will document and itemize any such price increases for the Customer.

6. Agreement Changes. The Customer may request that Company incorporate a change to the Products or the Specifications for the Products by delivering a change order to Company; provided, however, that any such change order must be in writing and include a description of the proposed change sufficient to permit Company to evaluate the feasibility of such change (“Change Order”). Within [seven (7) business days] of receipt of a Change Order, Company will inform the Customer in writing of the feasibility of the Change Order, the earliest possible implementation date for the Change Order, of any increase or decrease in the Purchase Price resulting from such Change Order, and of any effect on production scheduling or Delivery resulting from such Change Order. Pricing for option changes that result in a deduction will be based on the option price at the time of order placement. Pricing for additions will be based on the pricing level at the time of the change request. Company shall not be liable to the Customer for any delay in performance or Delivery arising from any such Change Order. A Change Order is only effective when counter-signed by Company’s authorized representative.

7. Cancellation/Termination. In the event this Agreement is cancelled or terminated by a party before completion, Company may charge a cancellation fee. The following charge schedule based on costs incurred may be applied: (a) 10% of the Purchase Price after order is accepted and entered by Company; (b) 20% of the Purchase Price after completion of approval drawings, and; (c) 30% of the Purchase Price upon any material requisition. The cancellation fee will increase accordingly as costs are incurred as the order progresses through engineering and into manufacturing. Company endeavors to mitigate any such costs through the sale of such Product to another purchaser; however, Customer shall remain liable for the difference between the Purchase Price and, if applicable, the sale price obtained by Company upon sale of the Product to another purchaser, plus any costs incurred by Company to conduct any such sale.

8. Delivery, Inspection and Acceptance. (a) Delivery. Delivery of the Product is scheduled to be within 44 to 49 months of the Effective Date of this Agreement, F.O.B. Customer’s facility in Spokane, WA. Risk of loss shall pass to Customer upon Delivery.

Delivery of Product is subject to change pending manufacture's delivery schedule at time of order placement. Notification of change will be sent to Customer's address specified in Section 9 hereof. (b) Inspection and Acceptance. Upon Delivery, Customer shall have fifteen (15) days within which to inspect the Product for substantial conformance to the material Specifications, and in the event of substantial non-conformance to the material Specifications to furnish Company with written notice sufficient to permit Company to evaluate such non-conformance ("Notice of Defect"). Any Product not in substantial conformance to material Specifications shall be remedied by Company within thirty (30) days from the Notice of Defect. In the event Company does not receive a Notice of Defect within fifteen (15) days of Delivery, Product will be deemed to be in conformance with Specifications and accepted by Customer.

9. Notice. Any required or permitted notices hereunder must be given in writing at the address of each party set forth below, or to such other address as either party may substitute by written notice to the other in the manner contemplated herein, by one of the following methods: hand delivery; registered, express, or certified mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid; or nationally-recognized private express courier:

If the Producer Price Index of Components for Manufacturing [www.bls.gov Series ID: WPUID6112] ("PPI") has increased at a compounded annual growth rate of 5.0% or more between the month Pierce accepts our order ("Order Month") and 14 months prior to the then predicted Ready For Pickup date ("Evaluation Month"), then pricing may be updated in an amount equal to the increase in PPI over 5.0% for each year or fractional year between the Order Month and the Evaluation Month. The seller will document any such updated price for the customer's approval before proceeding and provide an option to cancel the order.

12. Force Majeure. CONTRACT AMENDMENT TO ADD FUNDS FOR COMPASSIONATE ADDICTION

Agenda Wording

Amendment to add an additional \$286,722.50 of Commerce funds to support emergency shelter beds at CAT's Recovery Options Center scattered site for the full 18-month contract period.

Summary (Background)

On October 6, 2025, HHS posted a Request for Proposals (RFP) to solicit applications for Scattered Site shelter operators for performance period 1/1/26 - 6/30/27 with \$6,246,373 of funding available through a combination of state (Dept of Commerce Consolidated Homeless Grant) and local dollars. Of the applications received and reviewed, Compassionate Addiction Treatment (CAT) was one of three agencies recommended for the scattered site model, offering 24 beds for single adults. City Council approved the recommendation to fund these three agencies on 12/1/25 under RES 2025-0111. \$573,445 was awarded to CAT under OPR 2026-0158, using State (CHG) and Local dollars (1590 Heart & HSG/General Fund). However, this amount is only enough to support shelter operations for 12 months, despite the contract term being 18 months. In March 2026, the Department of Commerce amended their contract with the City (OPR 2025-0528) to award an additional \$5,190,207 in CHG Grant funds. Of this additional \$5,190,207, \$63,445 will be used to swap out the \$63,445 of local (HSG/General fund) dollars originally awarded to support CAT's contract and an additional \$286,722.50 will be allotted to CAT to support shelter operations for the full 18-month contract period ending 6/30/27. With this amendment, CAT's new total contract budget under OPR 2026-0158 will amount to \$860,167.50 using the following funding sources: SFY2026 (1/1/26 - 6/30/26) - 6 months • CHG - EHF (SFY26): \$60,000 • State DRF (SFY26): \$34,318.50 • CHG - Standard: \$92,404 • 1590 Heart Funds: \$100,000 • TOTAL: \$286,722.50 SFY2027 (7/1/26 - 6/30/27) - 12 months • CHG - EHF (SFY27): \$350,000 • State DRF (SFY27): \$99,625 • CHG - Standard: \$123,820 • TOTAL: \$573,445

These funds will be used to support households in their exit from unsheltered homelessness. The funds will be used to serve households in need of emergency shelter.

All data will be entered into HMIS and quarterly reports will be given by HMIS to Council on program outcomes.

WHEREAS, the SUBRECIPIENT has identified a need for additional resources to sustain Scattered Site Emergency Shelter operations through June 30, 2027, and the CITY therefore seeks to allocate additional to the existing contract to ensure the continued delivery of services through the end of the contract term; and

-- NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of these terms, the PARTIES mutually agree as follows:

1. CONTRACT DOCUMENTS.

The original CONTRACT, any previous amendments, addendums and/or extensions/renewals thereto, are incorporated by reference into this document as though written in full and shall remain in full force and effect except as provided herein.

2. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This CONTRACT AMENDMENT shall become effective on January 1, 2026.

3. AMENDMENT.

The PARTIES agree to amend the Contract Face Sheet to reflect the revised funding sources and associated funding allocation. All references to funding sources in the Contract Face Sheet shall be updated accordingly and incorporated into this Amendment.

4. AMENDMENT.

SECTION 3.1: COMPENSATION & BUDGET.

The total amount CITY shall pay SUBRECIPIENT for Year 1 is increased by **SIXTY-THREE**

THOUSAND TWO HUNDRED SEVENTY-SEVEN AND 50/100 DOLLARS (\$63,277.50) and Year 2) is increased by **TWO HUNDRED TWENTY-THREE THOUSAND FOUR HUNDRED FORTY-FIVE AND NO/100 DOLLARS (\$223,445.00)** which equates to a new total CONTRACT amount not to exceed **EIGHT HUNDRED SIXTY THOUSAND ONE HUNDRED SIXTY-SEVEN AND 50/100 DOLLARS (\$860,167.50)** for everything furnished and done under the original CONTRACT and this AMENDMENT. This is the maximum amount to be paid under this AMENDMENT and original CONTRACT and shall not be exceeded without the prior written authorization of the CITY, memorialized with the same formality as the original CONTRACT and this AMENDMENT document.

The Subrecipient shall comply with all applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations, requirements and program guidance identified or referenced in this Agreement and the informational documents published by DHS/FEMA applicable to the FY 2026 FWCGP grant program, including, but not limited to, all criteria, restrictions, and requirements of "The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) Fiscal Year 2026 FIFA World Cup Grant Program" (hereafter "the NOFO"), the Preparedness Grants Manual FM 207-23-0001 August 2025 (hereafter "the Manual"), the DHS Award Letter for the Grant, and the federal regulations commonly applicable to DHS/FEMA grants, all of which are incorporated herein by reference. The DHS Award Letter is incorporated in this Agreement as Attachment C.

The Subrecipient acknowledges that since this Agreement involves federal award funding, the period of performance may begin prior to the availability of appropriated federal funds. The Subrecipient agrees that it will not hold the Organization, the state of Washington, or the United States liable for any damages, claim for reimbursement, or any type of payment whatsoever for services performed under this Agreement prior to distribution of appropriated federal funds.

A. STATE AND FEDERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR DHS/FEMA PREPAREDNESS GRANTS

The following requirements apply to all DHS/FEMA Preparedness Grants.

1. SUBAWARDS & CONTRACTS BY SUBRECIPIENTS

a. The Subrecipient must make a case-by-case determination whether each agreement it makes for the disbursement of FY 2026 FWCGP funds received under this Agreement casts the party receiving the funds in the role of a subrecipient or contractor in accordance with 2 CFR 200.331.

b. If the Subrecipient becomes a pass-through entity by making a subaward to a subrecipient:

i. The Subrecipient must comply with all federal laws and regulations applicable to pass-through entities of FY 2026 FWCGP funds, including, but not limited to, those contained in 2 CFR 200.

ii. The Subrecipient shall require its subrecipient(s) to comply with all applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations, requirements and program guidance identified or referenced in this Agreement and the informational documents published by DHS/FEMA applicable to the FY 2026 FWCGP grant program, including, but not limited to, all criteria, restrictions, and requirements of the NOFO, the Manual, the Grant, and the federal regulations commonly applicable to DHS/FEMA grants.

iii. The Subrecipient shall be responsible to the Organization for ensuring that all FY 2026 FWCGP federal award funds provided to its subrecipients are used in accordance with applicable federal and state statutes and regulations, and the terms and conditions of the federal award set forth in this Agreement.

iv. The Subrecipient must follow their own policies and procedures to eliminate or reduce the impact of conflicts of interest when making subawards, adhering to any applicable federal or state statutes or regulations. Any real or potential conflicts of interest must be reported to the Organization in writing upon discovery.

2. BUDGET, REIMBURSEMENT, AND TIMELINE

a. Within the total Grant Agreement Amount, travel, subcontracts, salaries, benefits, printing, equipment, and other goods and services or other budget categories will be reimbursed on an actual cost basis upon completion unless otherwise provided in this Agreement.

b. The maximum amount of all reimbursement requests permitted to be submitted under this Agreement, including the final reimbursement request, is limited to and shall not exceed the total Grant Agreement Amount.

c. If the Subrecipient chooses to include indirect costs within the Budget (Attachment F), additional documentation is required based on the applicable situation, as described in 2 CFR 200.414 and Appendix VII to 2 CFR 200:

i. If the Subrecipient receives direct funding from any Federal agency(ies): (A) More than \$35 million, the approved indirect cost rate agreement negotiated with its federal cognizant agency; (B) Less than \$35 million, the indirect cost proposal developed in accordance with Appendix VII of 2 CFR 200 requirements.

ii. If the Subrecipient does not receive direct federal funds (i.e., only receives funds as a subrecipient), the Subrecipient must either elect to charge a de minimis rate of fifteen percent (15%) of modified total direct costs or choose to negotiate a higher rate with the Organization.

iii. Indirect costs must be expressly identified in the Budget using a single, consistent methodology and shall not be adjusted or modified without prior written approval from the Organization.

d. For travel costs, the Subrecipient shall comply with 2 CFR 200.475 and should consult their internal policies, state rates set pursuant to RCW 43.03.050 and RCW 43.03.060, and federal maximum rates set forth at <https://www.gsa.gov>, and follow the most restrictive. All international travel requires prior FEMA approval.

e. Reimbursement requests will include a properly completed Reimbursement Spreadsheet detailing the expenditures for which reimbursement is sought. Reimbursement requests must be submitted to FWCGP@sea2026.org no later than the due dates listed within the Timeline (Attachment E).

f. Receipts and/or backup documentation for any approved items must be maintained by the Subrecipient consistent with record retention requirements and be made available upon request.

g. The Subrecipient must request prior written approval from Organization Key Personnel to waive or extend a due date in the Timeline (Attachment E).

h. All work under this Agreement must end on or before the Grant Agreement End Date, and the final reimbursement request must be submitted before the date notated in the Timeline (Attachment E).

i. All costs for equipment and supplies must be incurred, and items received before the Grant Agreement End Date.

j. Failure to submit timely, accurate, and complete reports and reimbursement requests will prohibit the Subrecipient from being reimbursed until such reports are submitted and reviewed.

- k. Final reimbursement requests will not be approved for payment until the Subrecipient is current with all reporting requirements.
- l. A written amendment will be required if the Subrecipient expects cumulative transfers among solution area totals to exceed ten percent (10%) of the Grant Agreement Amount.
- m. Subrecipients shall only use federal award funds under this Agreement to supplement existing funds and will not use them to replace (supplant) non-federal funds.

3. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

- a. With each reimbursement request, the Subrecipient shall report how the expenditures relate to the Work Plan (Attachment D) activities in the format provided by the Organization.
- b. With the final reimbursement request, the Subrecipient shall submit a final report to FWCGP@sea2026.org describing all completed activities under this Agreement.
- c. The Subrecipient shall comply with the Federal Funding Accountability and Transparency Act (FFATA) and related OMB Guidance consistent with Public Law 109-282 as amended and complete and return to the Organization an Audit Certification/FFATA Form.

4. EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLY MANAGEMENT

- a. The Subrecipient and any subrecipient to which the Subrecipient makes a subaward shall comply with 2 CFR 200.317 through 200.327, and all Washington State procurement statutes, when procuring any equipment or supplies under this Agreement.
- b. All equipment and supplies purchased through this Agreement will be recorded and maintained in the Subrecipient's inventory system. Inventory records shall include: description, serial/model number, Federal Award Identification Number (FAIN), Assistance Listings Number, title holder, acquisition date, cost and federal participation percentage, location/use/condition, and disposition data.
- c. The Subrecipient shall take a physical inventory of equipment and reconcile with property records at least once every two years.
- d. Records for equipment shall be retained for a period of six (6) years from the date of the disposition, replacement, or transfer.
- e. Effective August 13, 2020, FEMA recipients and subrecipients may not obligate or expend any FEMA award funds to procure equipment, systems, or services that use covered telecommunications equipment or services as defined in section 889 of the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2019 (FY 2019 NDAA), Pub. L. No. 115-232 (2018). Covered entities include Huawei Technologies Company, ZTE Corporation, Hytera Communications Corporation, Hangzhou Hikvision Digital Technology Company, and Dahua Technology Company, or any subsidiary or affiliate of such entities.

5. ENVIRONMENTAL AND HISTORICAL PRESERVATION

- a. The Subrecipient shall ensure full compliance with the DHS/FEMA Environmental Planning and Historic Preservation (EHP) Program. EHP program information can be found at <https://www.fema.gov/grants/guidance-tools/environmental-historic>.
- b. Projects that have historical impacts or the potential to impact the natural or built environment must participate in the DHS/FEMA EHP review process prior to project initiation. The EHP review process must be completed, and FEMA approval must be received by the Subrecipient before any work is started for which reimbursement will be later requested.

6. PROCUREMENT

- The Subrecipient shall comply with all procurement requirements of 2 CFR 200.317 through 200.327.
- a. For all contracts expected to exceed the simplified acquisition threshold, the Subrecipient must notify the Organization. The Organization may request pre-procurement documents such as requests for proposals, invitations for bids, and independent cost estimates.
 - b. For all sole source contracts expected to exceed the micro-purchase threshold per 2 CFR 200.1, the Subrecipient must submit justification to the Organization

c. The Subrecipient as well as its contractors and subcontractors must comply with the Build America, Buy America Act (BABAA), which was enacted as a part of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act §§ 70901-70297, Pub. L. No. 117-58 (2021), requiring that infrastructure projects use iron, steel, and manufactured products produced in the United States. The Build America, Buy America Act Self-Certification form is included herein as Attachment G.

7. SUBRECIPIENT MONITORING

a. The Organization will monitor the activities of the Subrecipient from award to closeout. The goal of the Organizations monitoring activities will be to ensure that subrecipients receiving federal pass-through funds are in compliance with this Agreement, federal and state audit requirements, federal grant guidance, and applicable federal and state financial regulations, as well as 2 CFR Part 200 Subpart F.

b. Monitoring activities may include but are not limited to: review of financial and performance reports; monitoring and documenting completion of Agreement deliverables; documentation of phone calls, meetings, emails and correspondence; review of reimbursement requests; observation of Agreement-related activities such as exercises, training, events, and equipment demonstrations; and on-site visits to review equipment records and inventories.

8. LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY (CIVIL RIGHTS ACT OF 1964 TITLE VI)

a. The Subrecipient must comply with the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibition against discrimination on the basis of national origin, which requires that subrecipients of federal financial assistance take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to persons with limited English proficiency (LEP) to their programs and services.

b. Subrecipients are encouraged to perform and document their analysis of the most appropriate language assistance services. The analysis should consider: the number or proportion of LEP individuals eligible to be served; the frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with the program; the nature and importance of the program to people's lives; and the resources available to the program and costs.

B. FWC SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

The objectives of the FWC are to enhance security and preparedness for the 2026 FIFA World Cup events in the United States.

1. The Subrecipient shall use the federal funds authorized under this Agreement only to perform tasks as described in the Work Plan (Attachment D) and the Subrecipient's approved application for funding, incorporated into this Agreement.

2. Funding may not be used to replace or supplant non-federal funding of emergency management programs.

3. The Subrecipient shall report on the following performance measures and targets per the NOFO:

- Number of FWCGP-funded operational overtime hours tracked and reported by the recipient in support of security and public safety operations for FIFA World Cup-related planning and event execution.
- Number of DHS/FEMA-sponsored and approved Training Sessions completed for law enforcement, emergency responders, and security personnel using FWCGP funds.
- Number of Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP)-compliant Exercises completed for law enforcement, emergency responders, and security personnel using FWCGP funds.
- Number of FWCGP-funded Emergency Response Teams deployed to FIFA venues, hotels, and transportation hubs.
- The number of security incidents successfully managed or mitigated during the World Cup events.
- Collect feedback from international visitors, FIFA officials, and local stakeholders on the overall security and preparedness of the events.

C. DHS TERMS AND CONDITIONS

As a Subrecipient of FY 2026 FWCGP funding, the Subrecipient shall comply with all applicable DHS terms and conditions of the Award Letter and its incorporated documents for the Grant, which are incorporated and made a part of this Agreement as Attachment C.

ATTACHMENT B

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

SeattleFWC26 | DHS/FEMA Grants

Department of Homeland Security (DHS) / Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

1. DEFINITIONS

As used throughout this Agreement, the terms will have the same meaning as defined in 2 CFR 200 Subpart A (which is incorporated herein by reference), except as otherwise set forth below:

- a. "Agreement" means this Grant Agreement.
- b. "Organization" means SeattleFWC26, a private not for profit organization that serves as the Local Organizing Committee hosting and staging the FIFA World Cup 2026 games in Seattle, Washington, or any of the officers or other officials lawfully representing that Organization. The Organization is a sub-recipient of a federal award from a federal awarding agency and is the pass-through entity making a subaward to a Subrecipient under this Agreement.
- c. "Monitoring Activities" means all administrative, financial, or other review activities that are conducted to ensure compliance with all state and federal laws, rules, regulations, authorities and policies.
- d. "Subrecipient" when capitalized is primarily used throughout this Agreement in reference to the non-federal entity identified on the Face Sheet of this Agreement that has received a subaward from the Organization.

2. ADVANCE PAYMENTS PROHIBITED

The Organization shall make no payments in advance or in anticipation of goods or services to be provided under this Agreement. The Subrecipient shall not invoice the Organization in advance of delivery and invoicing of such goods or services.

3. AMENDMENTS AND MODIFICATIONS

The Subrecipient or the Organization may request, in writing, an amendment or modification of this Agreement. However, such amendment or modification shall not be binding, take effect or be incorporated herein until made in writing and signed by the authorized representatives of the Organization and the Subrecipient. No other understandings or agreements, written or oral, shall be binding on the parties.

The Agreement performance period shall only be extended by (1) written notification of DHS/FEMA approval of the Award performance period, followed up with a mutually agreed written amendment, or (2) written notification from the Organization to the Subrecipient to provide additional time for completion of the Subrecipient's project(s).

4. AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) OF 1990

Except as provided herein, the Subrecipient must comply with the ADA (Public Law 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq., 28 CFR Part 35), which provides comprehensive civil rights protection to individuals with disabilities in the areas of employment, public accommodations, state and local government services, and telecommunication.

5. ASSURANCES

The Organization and Subrecipient agree that all activity pursuant to this Agreement will be in accordance with all the applicable current federal, state and local laws, rules, and regulations.

6. CERTIFICATION REGARDING DEBARMENT, SUSPENSION, OR INELIGIBILITY

As federal funds are a basis for this Agreement, the Subrecipient certifies that the Subrecipient is not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participating in this Agreement by any federal department or agency. The Subrecipient shall complete, sign, and return a Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility, and Voluntary Exclusion form. 12. DISPUTES

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, when a bona fide dispute arises between the parties and it cannot be resolved through discussion and negotiation over a 30-day period, either party may request a dispute resolution board to resolve the dispute. The board shall consist of a representative appointed by the Organization, a representative appointed by the Subrecipient, and a third party mutually agreed upon by both parties. The determination of the dispute resolution board shall be final and binding on the parties. The laws of the state of Washington and all applicable federal laws shall apply to all disputes hereunder. The venue to resolve all such disputes shall be Seattle, Washington.

13. LEGAL RELATIONS

It is understood and agreed that this Agreement is solely for the benefit of the parties to the Agreement and gives no right to any other party. No joint venture or partnership is formed as a result of this Agreement.

To the extent allowed by law, the Subrecipient, its successors or assigns, will protect, save and hold harmless the Organization, the state of Washington, and the United States Government and their authorized agents and employees, from all claims, actions, costs, damages or expenses of any nature whatsoever by reason of the acts or omissions of the Subrecipient, its subcontractors, subrecipients, assigns, agents, contractors, consultants, licensees, invitees, employees or any person whomsoever arising out of or in connection with any acts or activities authorized by this Agreement.

44 CFR 206.9 Non-liability: The Federal government shall not be liable for any claim based upon the exercise or performance of, or the failure to exercise or perform a discretionary function or duty on the part of a federal agency or an employee of the Federal government in carrying out the provisions of the Stafford Act.

14. LIMITATION OF AUTHORITY – AUTHORIZED SIGNATURE

The signatories to this Agreement represent that they have the authority to bind their respective organizations to this Agreement. Only the Organization's Authorized Signature representative and the Authorized Signature representative of the Subrecipient shall have the express, implied, or apparent authority to alter, amend, modify, or waive any clause or condition of this Agreement.

15. LOSS OR REDUCTION OF FUNDING

In the event funding from state, federal, or other sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of this Agreement and prior to normal completion or end date, the Organization may unilaterally reduce the work plan and budget or unilaterally terminate all or part of the Agreement as a "Termination for Cause" without providing the Subrecipient an opportunity to cure.

16. NONASSIGNABILITY

Neither this Agreement, nor any claim arising under this Agreement, shall be transferred or assigned by the Subrecipient.

17. NONDISCRIMINATION

During the performance of this agreement, the Subrecipient shall comply with all federal and state nondiscrimination statutes and regulations. The Subrecipient shall not discriminate against any employee or

applicant for employment because of race, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, national origin, creed, marital status, age, Vietnam era or disabled veteran status, or the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical handicap.

18. NOTICES

The Subrecipient shall comply with all public notices or notices to individuals required by applicable local, state and federal laws and regulations and shall maintain a record of this compliance.

The Subrecipient represents and warrants that its workplace does now or will meet all applicable federal and state safety and health regulations that are in effect during the Subrecipient's performance under this Agreement.

20. OWNERSHIP OF PROJECT/CAPITAL FACILITIES

The Organization makes no claim to any capital facilities or real property improved or constructed with funds under this Agreement, and by this subaward of funds does not and will not acquire any ownership interest or title to such property of the Subrecipient. The Subrecipient shall assume all liabilities and responsibilities arising from the ownership and operation of the project.

21. POLITICAL ACTIVITY

No portion of the funds provided herein shall be used for any partisan political activity or to further the election or defeat of any candidate for public office or influence the approval or defeat of any ballot issue.

22. PROHIBITION AGAINST PAYMENT OF BONUS OR COMMISSION

The assistance provided under this Agreement shall not be used in payment of any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining approval of the application for such assistance or any other approval or concurrence under this Agreement.

23. PUBLICITY

The Subrecipient agrees to submit to the Organization prior to issuance all advertising and publicity matters relating to this Agreement wherein the Organization's name is mentioned or implied. The Subrecipient may copyright original work it develops in the course of or under this Agreement; however, pursuant to 2 CFR Part 200.315, FEMA reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use the work for government purposes.

24. RECAPTURE PROVISION

In the event the Subrecipient fails to expend funds under this Agreement in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, and/or the provisions of the Agreement, the Organization reserves the right to recapture funds in an amount equivalent to the extent of noncompliance. Such right of recapture shall exist for the life of the project following Agreement termination. Repayment by the Subrecipient of funds under this recapture provision shall occur within 30 days of demand.

25. RECORDS

- a. The Subrecipient agrees to maintain all books, records, documents, receipts, invoices and all other electronic or written records necessary to sufficiently and properly reflect the Subrecipient's contracts, subawards, grant administration, and payments.

Unless otherwise provided in this Agreement, the Subrecipient shall be responsible for, pay and maintain in current status all taxes, unemployment contributions, fees, licenses, assessments, permit charges and expenses of any other kind for the Subrecipient or its staff required by statute or regulation that are applicable to Agreement performance.

31. TERMINATION FOR CONVENIENCE

Notwithstanding any provisions of this Agreement, the Subrecipient may terminate this Agreement by providing written notice of such termination to the Organization Key Personnel identified in the Agreement, specifying the effective date thereof, at least thirty (30) days prior to such date.

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, the Organization, in its sole discretion and in the best interests of the state of Washington, may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part ten (10) business days after emailing notice to the Subrecipient.

32. TERMINATION OR SUSPENSION FOR LOSS OF FUNDING

The Organization may unilaterally terminate or suspend all or part of this Grant Agreement, or may reduce its scope of work and budget, if there is a reduction in funds by the source of those funds. The Organization will email the Subrecipient ten (10) business days prior to termination.

33. TERMINATION OR SUSPENSION FOR CAUSE

any laws or regulations, or has violated any of the covenants, agreements or stipulations of this Agreement, the Organization has the right to immediately suspend or terminate this Agreement in whole or in part.

34. TERMINATION PROCEDURES

In addition to the procedures set forth below, if the Organization terminates this Agreement, the Subrecipient shall follow any procedures specified in the termination notice. Upon termination of this Agreement, the Organization may require the Subrecipient to deliver to the Organization any property specifically produced or acquired for the performance of such part of this Agreement as has been terminated.

After receipt of a notice of termination, and except as otherwise directed by the Organization in writing, the Subrecipient shall: stop work under the Agreement; place no further orders or contracts for materials or services; assign rights to the Organization; settle all outstanding liabilities; transfer title to the Organization; complete performance of such part of the work not terminated; and take action for the protection and preservation of the property related to this Agreement.

Except as provided otherwise herein, venue for any dispute between the parties arising out of this Agreement shall be in King County, Washington.

37. WAIVERS

No conditions or provisions of this Agreement can be waived unless approved in advance by the Organization in writing. The Organization's failure to insist upon strict performance of any provision of the Agreement or to exercise any right based upon a breach thereof shall not constitute a waiver of any right under this Agreement.

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Article 8**CHIPS and Science Act of 2022, Public Law 117-167 CHIPS**

(1) Recipients of DHS research and development (R&D) awards must report to the DHS Component research program office any finding or determination of sex based and sexual harassment and/or an administrative or disciplinary action taken against principal investigators or co-investigators to be completed by an authorized organizational representative (AOR) at the recipient institution. (2) Notification. An AOR must disclose the following information to agencies within 10 days of the date/the finding is made, or 10 days from when a recipient imposes an administrative action on the reported individual, whichever is sooner. Reports should include: (a) Award number, (b) Name of PI or Co-PI being reported, (c) Awardee name, (d) Awardee address, (e) AOR name, title, phone, and email address, (f) Indication of the report type: (i) Finding or determination has been made that the reported individual violated awardee policies or codes of conduct, statutes, or regulations related to sexual harassment, sexual assault, or other forms of harassment, including the date that the finding was made. (ii) Imposition of an administrative or disciplinary action by the recipient on the reporting individual related to a finding/determination or an investigation of an alleged violation of recipient policy or codes of conduct, statutes, or regulations, or other forms of harassment. (iii) The date and nature of the administrative/disciplinary action, including a basic explanation or description of the event, which should not disclose personally identifiable information regarding any complaints or individuals involved. Any description provided must be consistent with the Family Educational Rights in Privacy Act. (3) Definitions. (a) An "authorized organizational representative (AOR)" is an administrative official who, on behalf of the proposing institution, is empowered to make certifications and representations and can commit the institution to the conduct of a project that an agency is being asked to support as well as adhere to various agency policies and award requirements. (b) "Principal investigators and co-principal investigators" are award personnel supported by a grant, cooperative agreement, or contract under Federal law. (c) A "reported individual" refers to recipient personnel who have been reported to a federal agency for potential sexual harassment violations. (d) "Sex based harassment" means a form of sex discrimination and includes harassment based on sex, sex stereotypes, sex characteristics, pregnancy or related conditions, sexual orientation, and gender identity. (e) "Sexual harassment" means unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when this conduct explicitly or implicitly affects an individual's employment, unreasonably interferes with an individual's work performance, or creates an intimidating, hostile, or offensive work environment, whether such activity is carried out by a supervisor or by a co-worker, volunteer, or contractor.

Article 9 **Civil Rights Act of 1964 – Title VI**
Recipients must comply with the requirements of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, Pub. L. No. 88-352 (codified as amended at 42 U.S.C. § 2000d et seq.), which provides that no person in the United States will, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance. DHS implementing regulations for the Act are found at 6 C.F.R. Part 21. Recipients of a federal award from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) must also comply with FEMA's implementing regulations at 44 C.F.R. Part 7.

Article 10 **Civil Rights Act of 1968**

Additionally, 8 U.S.C. § 1373 prohibits any person or agency from prohibiting, or in any way restricting, a Federal, State, or local government entity from doing any of the following with respect to information regarding the immigration status of any individual: 1) sending such information to, or requesting or receiving such information from, Federal immigration officials; 2) maintaining such information; or 3) exchanging such information with any other Federal, State, or local government entity; (b) They must comply with other relevant laws related to immigration, including prohibitions on encouraging or inducing an alien to come to, enter, or reside in the United States in violation of law, 8 U.S.C. § 1324(a)(1)(A)(iv), prohibitions on transporting or moving illegal aliens, 8 U.S.C. § 1324(a)(1)(A)(ii), prohibitions on harboring, concealing, or shielding from detection illegal aliens, 8 U.S.C. § 1324(a)(1)(A)(iii), and any applicable conspiracy, aiding or abetting, or attempt liability regarding these statutes; (c) That they will honor requests for cooperation, such as participation in joint operations, sharing of information, or requests for short term detention of an alien pursuant to a valid detainer. A jurisdiction does not fail to comply with this requirement merely because it lacks the necessary resources to assist in a particular instance; (d) That they will provide access to detainees, such as when an immigration officer seeks to interview a person who might be a removable alien; and (e) That they will not leak or otherwise publicize the existence of an immigration enforcement operation. (2) The recipient must certify under penalty of perjury pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1746 and using a form that is acceptable to DHS, that it will comply with the requirements of this term. Additionally, the recipient agrees that it will require any subrecipients or contractors to certify in the same manner that they will comply with this term prior to providing them with any funding under this award. (3) The recipient agrees that compliance with this term is material to the Government's decision to make or continue with this award and that the Department of Homeland Security may terminate this grant, or take any other allowable enforcement action, if the recipient fails to comply with this term.

Article 12**Copyright**

Recipients must affix the applicable copyright notices of 17 U.S.C. §§ 401 or 402 to any work first produced under federal awards and also include an acknowledgement that the work was produced under a federal award (including the federal award number and federal awarding agency). As detailed in 2 C.F.R. § 200.315, a federal awarding agency reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the work for federal purposes and to authorize others to do so.

(2) The Buy America preference only applies to articles, materials, and supplies that are consumed in, incorporated into, or affixed to an infrastructure project. As such, it does not apply to tools, equipment, and supplies, such as temporary scaffolding, brought to the construction site and removed at or before the completion of the infrastructure project. Nor does a Buy America preference apply to equipment and furnishings, such as movable chairs, desks, and portable computer equipment, that are used at or within the finished infrastructure project but are not an integral part of the structure or permanently affixed to the infrastructure project. (3) Waivers When necessary, recipients may apply for, and the agency may grant, a waiver from these requirements. The agency should notify the recipient for information on the process for requesting a waiver from these requirements. (4) Definitions. The definitions applicable to this term are set forth at 2 C.F.R. § 184.3, the full text of which is incorporated by reference.

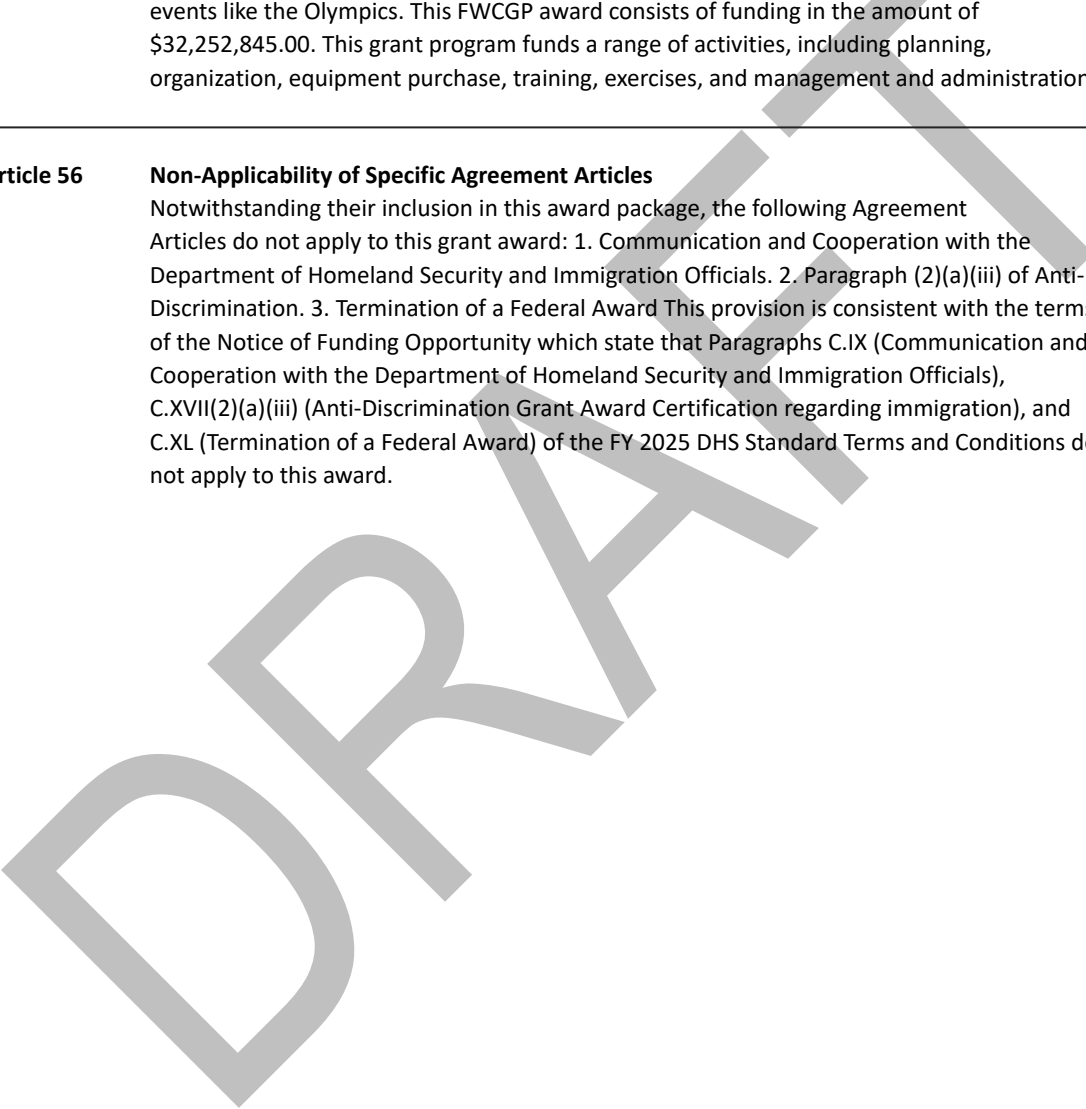

FY 2026 FIFA World Cup Grant Program

The purpose of this attachment is to identify the activities planned by the Subrecipient under this Grant Agreement.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

PURPOSE and NEED: Explain the overall goal of the project and the specific public safety and security need it addresses. Why is the project needed?

As the City of Spokane prepares for the 2026 World Cup, we are planning for multiple large scale programs and in preparation as a potential FIFA team basecamp site. Planners for the upcoming FIFA World Cup have indicated that the Gonzaga University grounds are the practice facility location, in the event Spokane is chosen as a team base camp. The US Pavilion in Riverfront Park is the designated location for FIFA Fan Festival activities. Large crowds of World Cup enthusiasts are expected to gather at the US Pavilion for viewing parties on multiple dates.

The World Cup is an international phenomenon, bringing spectators from across the globe. As a potential basecamp and because of Spokane's proximity to Seattle and Vancouver, we expect a massive increase in tourism and visitors to our city during Summer 2026. While we are excited for these additional visitors, this also increases our staffing, equipment, and preparation needs to ensure we have a vibrant and secure city. The majority of our funds serve the increase in staff overtime that prepares us for high traffic and emergency events. Additional equipment makes real-time surveillance and public safety programs possible. Preparing for the 2026 FIFA World Cup is an monumental task, and the City of Spokane is eager to celebrate safely, securely, and responsibly with our community and fans.

PLANNED WORK: Describe the activities, services, and/or equipment purchases included.

We are preparing for two Fan Zone programs and as a potential 2026 Basecamp site. Our Events include two planned Fan Zone watch parties (6/19 and 7/19). Preparation for the fan zone events include increased staffing and security needs for one-day programs. As a potential 2026 basecamp site, our emergency response departments will require substantial increases in staffing for prolonged team and tourist safety.

Key work areas include:

- Staffing (Event and Overtime) Increase Spokane Fire Department and Spokane Police department staffing. This includes additional emergency responders, hazmat preparation, and drone pilots. Due to the anticipated increase in tourist traffic, our overtime costs for additional police officers and firefighters represent a large, but essential, cost for the city. Additional costs for incident command, keeps operating units in clear communication with one another during these events.
- Contracting (Security Staffing) Planning and contracting for additional security at Fan Zone events.
- Equipment (Surveillance, Hazmat, and Crowd Management): Purchasing equipment so we can meet increased needs. This includes additional drone equipment, transportation barriers, hazmat monitors, weapons detection, and command station equipment.
- Drone Training sessions for drone operation, practice, and management.

OUTCOME

Explain how the project will improve your organization's ability to respond to threats related to the FIFA World Cup 2026 games. Include expected performance improvements, coverage expansion, and/or operational enhancements.

The proposed project will improve the City of Spokane's ability to respond to threats related to the 2026 FIFA World Cup by enhancing operational coverage, coordination, and response capabilities for large-scale, unsecured public gathering events.

The deployment of contracted security personnel and law enforcement surge staffing will expand on-site coverage during peak attendance periods, improving the City's ability to monitor crowd conditions, detect suspicious behavior, and respond quickly to emerging incidents. Increased staffing enhances situational awareness across the event footprint, including pedestrian corridors and ingress and egress routes.

The use of temporary physical security infrastructure, including barriers, cones, and directional signage, will improve crowd flow and access control, reduce congestion, and protect emergency access routes, improving responder access and overall event safety.

I. INTRODUCTION

The Washington Military Department (WMD) herein known as “the DEPARTMENT”, through the Emergency Management Division, passes through funding facilitating activities in preparation of the 2026 World Cup. The DEPARTMENT is authorized to enter into agreements with political subdivisions to reimburse GRANTEES for eligible expenses related to public safety and security for 2026 World Cup events.

II. KEY PERSONNEL

The individuals listed below shall be considered Key Personnel for point of contact under this Agreement. Any substitution of key personnel shall be made by written notification to the current key personnel.

III. ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS

- A. The parties shall use the following to determine allowable cost principles: Washington State Office of Financial Management (OFM) Regulations-State Administrative and Accounting Manual (SAAM) and the Local Government Budget and Accounting Reporting System (BARS).
- B. If the GRANTEE uses grant funds to acquire goods and services from a non-government entity performing services as a Contractor under this Agreement, the GRANTEE must make a case-by-case determination whether each contract it makes for the disbursement of funds received under this Agreement casts the party receiving the funds in the role of contractor in accordance with the OFM state grant audit and monitoring guidelines.
- C. A Contractor performing services under this Agreement must comply with all federal and state laws and regulations applicable to the state World Cup grant, WMD policies, and this Agreement.
- D. The GRANTEE shall require its Contractor(s) to comply with all applicable state and federal laws, rules, regulations, requirements and program guidance identified or referenced in this Agreement and the informational documents published by the Department applicable to the state World Cup funding including, but not limited to, all criteria, restrictions, and requirements of the Engrossed

Substitute Senate Bill 5167 Sec. 131 (10) (2026), and the federal and state regulations commonly applicable to state grants.

- E. The GRANTEE and its Contractor shall be responsible for ensuring that all state FIFA World Cup grant funds are used in accordance with applicable state statutes and regulations, and the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- F. If a grant audit or monitoring performed by the DEPARTMENT under this Agreement results in any findings, the GRANTEE shall submit a "Corrective Action Plan" in response to the grant audit or monitoring results no later than 10 business days after receiving the DEPARTMENT's report.

IV. ELIGIBLE EXPENSES AND PRIORITIES ESTABLISHED BY LEGISLATURE

Priorities for expenditure of state FIFA World Cup grant funds have been established by both the state legislature and the DEPARTMENT:

- A. Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 5167 Sec. 131 (10) provides that funds should be "provided solely for a contract with a public or private entity for the purpose of public safety and security activities related to the 2026 World Cup event. Funding may be provided for law enforcement and fire department resources, emergency management, traffic control, and security at official event venues, including fields and fan activation areas."

V. INELIGIBLE COSTS

Costs not identified as allowable and included within the Statement of Work under this Agreement are considered ineligible for reimbursement, in addition to the following:

- A. *Bad Debts* - any losses arising from uncollectible accounts and other claims and related costs.
- B. *Contributions to a contingency reserve* - any funds set aside by the GRANTEE to reimburse unanticipated expenses. Such reserves are not eligible for reimbursement.
- C. *Depreciation* - of facilities or equipment.
- D. *Entertainment* - amusements, social activities, and any related incidental costs, including meals, beverages, lodging, rentals, transportation, and gratuities.
- E. *Fines and penalties* - costs resulting from violations of, or failure to comply with, federal, state, or local laws.
- F. *General expenses, beyond the statement of work, required to carry out overall government responsibilities* - including the salaries and expenses of the chief executive and their staff. Governments include state, local, and federally recognized Indian tribal governments.
- G. *Illegal costs* - costs incurred as a result of procurement practices not in compliance with state or federal procurement laws may be ineligible and not reimbursed at the sole discretion of the Department.
- H. *Interest and other financial costs* - interest on debt, bond discounts, cost of financing and refinancing operations, and legal and professional fees are ineligible, except when authorized by state law.
- I. *Late / past due fees* - incurred by failing to pay vendor invoices, permit fees, or to return items in a timely manner.
- J. *Legal expenses* - related to claims against the DEPARTMENT, and legal services furnished by the chief legal officer of the state, local, or Native American tribal government (or his/her staff) solely for the purpose of discharging his/her general responsibilities as legal officer.
- K. *Legislative expenses* - salaries and other expenses of members of the state Legislature or similar local governmental bodies (e.g., county boards), if incurred in the members' official capacity.
- L. *Lobbying* - expenses related to lobbying activities.

- M. *Personal injury compensation* - or damages arising from administering FIFA World Cup activities, whether determined by adjudication, arbitration, negotiation, or otherwise.

VI. BUDGET, REIMBURSEMENT, AND TIMELINE

- A. Within the total Grant Agreement Amount, travel, contracts, salaries, benefits, printing, equipment, and other goods and services or other budget categories will be reimbursed on an actual cost basis upon completion unless otherwise provided in this Agreement.
- B. The maximum amount of all reimbursement requests permitted to be submitted under this Agreement, including the final reimbursement request, is limited to and shall not exceed the total Grant Agreement Amount.
- C. If the GRANTEE chooses to include indirect costs within the Budget (Attachment D), additional documentation is required based on the applicable situation and additional approval may be needed.
- D. If reimbursement of travel or subsistence expenses are included as part of this Agreement, they shall be paid in accordance with rates set pursuant to RCW 43.03.050 and RCW 43.03.060 as now existing or amended.
- E. Reimbursement requests will include a properly completed State A-19 Invoice Form and Reimbursement Spreadsheet (in the format provided by the DEPARTMENT) detailing the expenditures for which reimbursement is sought. Reimbursement requests must be submitted to reimbursements@mil.wa.gov, no later than the due dates listed within the Timeline (Attachment E).
Reimbursement request totals should be commensurate with the time spent processing by the GRANTEE and the DEPARTMENT.
- F. Receipts and/or backup documentation for any approved items that are authorized under this Agreement must be maintained by the GRANTEE consistent with record retention requirements of this Agreement and be made available upon request by the DEPARTMENT and auditors.
- G. The GRANTEE must request prior written approval from DEPARTMENT Key Personnel to waive or extend a due date in the Timeline (Attachment E). For waived or extended reimbursements due dates, all allowable costs should be submitted on the next scheduled reimbursement due date contained in the Timeline. Waiving or missing deadlines serves as an indicator for assessing an agency's level of risk of noncompliance with the regulations, requirements, and the terms and conditions of the Agreement and may increase required monitoring activities. Any request for a waiver or extension of a due date in the Timeline must be submitted to the DEPARTMENT sufficiently in advance of the due date to provide adequate time for DEPARTMENT review and consideration and may be granted or denied within the DEPARTMENT's sole discretion.
- H. All work under this Agreement must end on or before the Grant Agreement End Date, and the final reimbursement request must be submitted to the Department within fifteen (15) days after the Grant Agreement End Date, except as otherwise authorized by either (1) written amendment of this Agreement or (2) written notification from the DEPARTMENT to the GRANTEE providing additional time. If funds are not required, the Subrecipient shall notify the Department Key Personnel.
- I. Payment by the DEPARTMENT to the GRANTEE shall only be made as reimbursement for eligible expenses approved by the DEPARTMENT within the set Eligibility Period of Costs Incurred in this Agreement. Work started prior to and/or not completed by the Eligibility Period of Costs Incurred, will be considered outside the performance period and therefore not eligible for reimbursement. The GRANTEE shall not request payment in anticipation of expenditures not yet incurred.
- J. All costs for equipment and supplies must be incurred, and received, before the Grant Agreement End Date.

- K. Failure to submit timely, accurate, and complete reports and reimbursement requests as required by this Agreement (including, but not limited to, the reports in the Timeline [Attachment E]), will prohibit the GRANTEE from being reimbursed until such reports are submitted and the DEPARTMENT has had reasonable time to conduct its review.
- L. Final reimbursement requests will not be approved for payment until the GRANTEE is current with all reporting requirements contained in this Agreement.
- M. A written amendment will be required is the GRANTEE expects cumulative transfers among solution area totals, as identified in the Budget (Attachment D), to exceed ten percent (10%) of the Grant Agreement Amount.

VII. THE MILITARY DEPARTMENT AGREES TO:

- A. Within thirty (30) days of receipt and approval of signed, dated invoice vouchers (Form A-19), and upon satisfactory completion of tasks and documentation of costs, as required under this Agreement, the DEPARTMENT will reimburse the GRANTEE up to the maximum allowable grant amount, or actual cost, whichever is lower as authorized by this Agreement.
- B. If a question arises about the requested reimbursement, the GRANTEE will be notified via e-mail and/or telephone call and will have five (5) working days to provide the requested information. If information satisfactory to the DEPARTMENT has not been provided within that time, the expense in question will be subtracted and the balance of approved eligible incurred expenses will be processed for reimbursement.

GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

1) DEFINITIONS

As used throughout this Agreement the following terms shall have the meanings set forth below:

- A. "DEPARTMENT" shall mean the Washington Military Department (WMD).
- B. "GRANTEE" shall mean the named county, city, tribe, or other political subdivision performing activities under this Agreement. It shall include any contractor retained by the GRANTEE as permitted under the terms of this Agreement.
- C. "Contractor" shall mean one, not in the employment of the GRANTEE, who is performing all or part of those services under this Agreement under a separate contract with the GRANTEE.
- D. "Monitoring Activities" means all administrative, financial, or other review activities that are conducted to ensure compliance with all state and federal laws, rules, regulations, authorities, and policies.
- E. "WAC" is defined and used herein to mean the Washington Administrative Code.
- F. "RCW" is defined and used herein to mean the Revised Code of Washington.

2) ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS

- A. The Parties acknowledge that the DEPARTMENT is subject to the Public Records Act, Chapter 42.56 RCW, and that records prepared, owned, used, or retained by the DEPARTMENT relating to the conduct of government or the performance of any governmental or proprietary function are available for public inspection or copying, except as exempt under RCW 42.56 or other statute which exempts or prohibits disclosure of specific information or records.
- B. The GRANTEE shall provide access to data generated under this Agreement to the DEPARTMENT and the State Auditor at no additional cost. This includes access to all information that supports the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the GRANTEE's reports, including computer models and methodology for those models.
- C. Access to Data - State law prohibits state agencies from entering into agreements when the contractor could charge additional costs to the agency, the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee, or the Office of the State Auditor for access to data generated under the Agreement. Therefore, all such data will be provided at no additional expense. For the purposes of this requirement, "data" includes all information that supports the findings, conclusions, and recommendations of the contractor's reports, including computer models and methodology for those models.

3) ADVANCE PAYMENTS PROHIBITED

No payments in advance or in anticipation of services or supplies to be provided under this Agreement shall be made by the DEPARTMENT.

4) AMERICANS WITH DISABILITIES ACT (ADA) OF 1990, PUBLIC LAW 101-336, 42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq. (also referred to as the "ADA") and its implementing regulations at 28 CFR Part 35.

The GRANTEE must comply with the ADA, which provides comprehensive civil rights protection to individuals with disabilities in the areas of employment, public accommodations, state and local government services, and telecommunication.

5) ATTORNEY'S FEES

Except as provided in the section entitled "Recapture Provisions", in the event of litigation or other action brought to enforce the terms of this Agreement or alternate dispute resolution process, each party agrees to bear its own attorney's fees and costs.

6) COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE STATUTES, RULES, AND DEPARTMENT POLICIES

The GRANTEE shall comply with, and the DEPARTMENT is not responsible for determining compliance with any and all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations, executive orders, and/or policies. This obligation includes, but is not limited to, nondiscrimination laws and/or policies; the ADA; ethics in laws and policies; Public Disclosure (RCW 42.56); and safety and health regulations. In the event of the GRANTEE's noncompliance or refusal to comply with any applicable law, regulation, executive order, or policy, the DEPARTMENT may rescind, cancel, or terminate the Agreement in whole or in part in its sole discretion. The GRANTEE is responsible for all costs or liability arising from its failure to comply with applicable law, regulation, executive order, or policy.

7) AGREEMENT MODIFICATIONS

The Parties may request changes to the AGREEMENT. All mutually agreed changes shall be incorporated by written amendment. No alteration or variation of the terms of this AGREEMENT shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties, and any oral understanding or agreements shall not be binding.

8) GRANTEE'S EMPLOYEES NOT EMPLOYEES OF DEPARTMENT

The GRANTEE and/or employees, contractors, or agents performing under this Agreement, are not employees or agents of the DEPARTMENT in any manner whatsoever. The GRANTEE will not be presented as nor claim to be an officer or employee of the DEPARTMENT or of the State of Washington for any reason, nor will the GRANTEE make any claim, demand, or application to or for any right, privilege, or benefit applicable to an officer or employee of the DEPARTMENT or of the State of Washington, including, but not limited to, Workers' Compensation coverage, unemployment insurance benefits, social security benefits, retirement membership or credit, or privilege, or benefit which would accrue to a civil service employee under RCW 41.06. It is understood that if the GRANTEE is another state agency, the officers and employees are employed by the State of Washington in their own right.

9) DISCLOSURE

The use or disclosure by any party of any information concerning the DEPARTMENT for any purpose not directly connected with the administration of the DEPARTMENT's or the GRANTEE's responsibilities with respect to services provided under this Agreement is prohibited except by prior written consent of the DEPARTMENT or as required to comply with RCW 42.56, the Public Records Act, or court order.

10) DISPUTES

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, when a bona fide dispute arises between the parties and it cannot be resolved through discussion and negotiation, either party may request a dispute hearing. The parties shall select a dispute resolution team to resolve the dispute. The team shall consist of a representative appointed by the DEPARTMENT, a representative appointed by the GRANTEE, and a third party mutually agreed upon by both parties. The team shall, by majority vote, resolve the dispute. The parties agree that this dispute process shall be final and there will be no appeal of the decision.

11) GOVERNING LAW AND VENUE

This Agreement shall be governed by the laws of the State of Washington. In the event of a lawsuit involving this Agreement, venue shall be proper only in Thurston County. The GRANTEE, by execution of this Agreement, acknowledges the jurisdiction of the courts of Washington in this matter.

12) HOLD HARMLESS

The GRANTEE agrees to defend, hold harmless, and indemnify the State of Washington and the DEPARTMENT, their officers, agents, employees, and assigns against any and all damages or claims from damages resulting or allegedly resulting from the GRANTEE's performance or activities hereunder, including the performance of any contractor(s).

13) INSURANCE, INDUSTRIAL COVERAGE

Prior to performing work under this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall provide industrial insurance coverage for the GRANTEE's employees, as may be required by Title 51 RCW. The DEPARTMENT will not be responsible for payment of industrial insurance premiums or for any other claim or benefit for a consultant or any subcontractor or employee of the GRANTEE, which may arise during the performance of services under this Agreement.

14) INSURANCE, GENERAL COVERAGE

The DEPARTMENT and its officers, employees, and agents, while acting in good faith within the scope of their official duties, are covered by the State of Washington Self-Insurance Program and the Tort Claims Act (RCW 4.92.060 et seq.), and successful claims against the DEPARTMENT and its employees, officers, and agents in the performance of their official duties in good faith under this Agreement will be paid from the tort claims liability account as provided in RCW 4.92.130. The GRANTEE hereby notifies the DEPARTMENT that as a Federally Recognized Tribe, Washington State Agency, or Local Government of the State of Washington and in accordance with Washington law, the GRANTEE has full loss coverage for itself, its officers, employees, and agents, through self-insurance and/or the purchase of insurance. Upon the DEPARTMENT's request, the GRANTEE will provide the DEPARTMENT with details of its self-insured retention, proof of its additional insurance, and all loss coverage. This program of self-insurance and/or purchased insurance includes general liability, automobile liability, workers compensation, and employers' liability.

15) LIABILITY

To the extent permitted by applicable law, each party to this Agreement shall be responsible for injury or death to persons and damage to property resulting from negligence on the part of itself, its employees, agents, officers, contractors, or subcontractors. Neither party assumes any responsibility to the other party for the consequences of any act or omission of any third party.

16) LIMITATION OF AUTHORITY

Only the assigned Authorized Signature for the DEPARTMENT or an assigned delegate by writing (delegation to be made prior to action) shall have the express, implied, or apparent authority to alter, amend, modify, or waive any clause or condition of this Agreement. Furthermore, any alteration, amendment, modification, or waiver of any clause or condition of this Agreement is not effective or binding unless made in writing and signed by the authorized person.

17) LOSS OF FUNDING

In the event funding from state sources is withdrawn, reduced, or limited in any way after the effective date of the Agreement, the DEPARTMENT may suspend or terminate, or renegotiate the Agreement, without cause under the "Termination" clause and without the thirty (30) day notice requirement.

18) NONASSIGNABILITY

Neither this Agreement, nor any claim arising under this Agreement, nor the work to be provided under this Agreement, and any claim arising thereunder, shall be assigned or delegated by either party, in whole or in part, without the express prior written consent of the other party, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

19) NONDISCRIMINATION

During the performance of this Agreement, the GRANTEE shall comply with all federal and state nondiscrimination statutes and regulations. These requirements include, but are not limited to:

- A. Nondiscrimination in Employment: The GRANTEE shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, creed, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, family with children, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, age, honorably discharged veteran or military status, or the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability or the use of trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability. This requirement does not apply, however, to a religious corporation, association, educational institution, or society with

respect to the employment of individuals of a particular religion to perform work connected with the carrying on by such corporation, association, educational institution, or society of its activities.

- B. The GRANTEE shall take action to ensure that employees are employed and treated during employment without discrimination because of their race, creed, color, national origin, citizenship or immigration status, family with children, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, age, honorably discharged veteran or military status, or the presence of any sensory, mental, or physical disability or the use of trained dog guide or service animal by a person with a disability. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment, or recruitment selection for training, including apprenticeships and volunteers.

20) RECAPTURE PROVISION

In the event the GRANTEE fails to expend funds under this Agreement in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local laws and/or the provisions of the Agreement, the DEPARTMENT reserves the right to recapture funds in an amount equivalent to the extent of noncompliance. Such right of recapture shall exist for the life of the project following Agreement termination. Repayment by the Agreement of funds under this recapture provision shall occur within thirty (30) days of demand.

In the event the DEPARTMENT is required to institute legal proceedings to enforce the recapture provision, the DEPARTMENT shall be entitled to its costs thereof, including attorney fees, from the GRANTEE.

21) RECORDS, MONITORING, AND AUDIT ACCESS

- A. The GRANTEE shall perform under the terms of the Agreement and the DEPARTMENT may conduct reasonable and necessary monitoring of the GRANTEE's performance.
- B. To permit such monitoring, the GRANTEE shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence, and accounting procedures and practices that sufficiently and properly reflect all direct and indirect costs of any nature expended in the performance of this Agreement. These records shall be subject at all reasonable times to inspection, review, or audit by personnel duly authorized by the DEPARTMENT, the Office of the State Auditor, and federal officials so authorized by law, rule, regulation, or agreement.
- C. The GRANTEE will retain all books, records, documents, and other materials relevant to this Agreement for six (6) years from the date final payment is made hereunder and make them available for inspection by persons authorized under this provision.
- D. The DEPARTMENT or the State Auditor or any of their representatives and federal officials so authorized by law, rule, regulation, or agreement shall have full access to and the right to examine during normal business hours and as often as the DEPARTMENT or the State Auditor may deem necessary, all of the GRANTEE's records with respect to all matters covered in this Agreement. Such rights last for six (6) years from the date final payment is made hereunder.
- E. The GRANTEE shall cooperate with and freely participate in any monitoring, audit or evaluation activities conducted by the DEPARTMENT that are pertinent to the intent of this Agreement.

22) SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement or any provision of any document incorporated by reference shall be held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are declared to be severable.

23) CONTRACTING

The GRANTEE shall comply with all applicable procurement laws, rules, and requirements. This will include the use of a competitive procurement process in the award of any contracts with its contractors and sub-contractors that are entered into under this Agreement. All contracting and sub-contracting agreements entered into pursuant to this Agreement shall incorporate this Agreement by reference.

24) TERMINATION

- A. If, through any cause, the GRANTEE or its contractors or sub-contractors fails to fulfill in a timely and proper manner its obligations under this Agreement or if the GRANTEE or its contractors or sub-contractors violates any of its covenants, agreements, or stipulations of this Agreement, the DEPARTMENT shall thereupon have the right to terminate this Agreement and withhold the remaining allocation if such default or violation is not corrected within thirty (30) days after submitting written notice to the GRANTEE describing such default or violation.
- B. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Agreement, either party may terminate this Agreement without cause by providing written notice of such termination, specifying the effective date thereof, at least thirty (30) days prior to such date. If this Agreement is so terminated, the DEPARTMENT shall be liable only for payment required under the terms of this Agreement for services rendered or goods delivered prior to the effective date of termination. Upon notice of such termination, the DEPARTMENT reserves the right to suspend all or part of the Agreement, withhold further payments, and prohibit the GRANTEE from incurring additional obligations of funds.
- C. Reimbursement for eligible expenses incurred by the GRANTEE prior to the effective date of such termination shall be as the DEPARTMENT reasonably determines.
- D. The DEPARTMENT may unilaterally terminate or suspend all or part of this Agreement without cause, or may reduce its statement of work and budget, if there is a reduction in funds by the source of those funds, and if such funds are the basis for this Agreement.

25) TRAVEL AND SUBSISTENCE REIMBURSEMENT

If reimbursement of travel or subsistence expenses are included as part of this Agreement, they shall be paid in accordance with rates set pursuant to RCW 43.03.050 and RCW 43.03.060 as now existing or amended. The GRANTEE is required to provide to the DEPARTMENT copies of receipts for any travel related expenses other than meals and mileage that are authorized under this Agreement.

26) TREATMENT OF ASSETS

Upon successful completion of the terms of this Agreement, all assets, including equipment, purchased through this Agreement will be owned by the GRANTEE unless otherwise specified by the funding source. The GRANTEE shall be responsible for any and all operation and maintenance expenses and for the safe operation of said equipment including all questions of liability.

27) WAIVER OF DEFAULT

Waiver of any default shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent default. Waiver of breach of any provision of the Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other or subsequent breach and shall not be construed to be a modification of the terms of the Agreement unless stated to be such in writing, signed by the Director or Contracts Administrator and attached to the original Agreement.

PROJECT TITLE *FIFA World Cup Grant Program- Passthrough*

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

PURPOSE and NEED: The overall goal of the project and the specific public safety and security need it addresses.

Seattle will host six matches at Lumen Field between mid-June and early July 2026, including a USA group stage match and knockout round games, drawing sustained high attendance over nearly a month. Local estimates project 750,000 visitors across the tournament period, not only at the stadium but also at fan activations, waterfront activations, and viewing events in downtown and surrounding neighborhoods. The event footprint extends from Lumen Field and Pioneer Square to the state of Washington. This includes hotels, transit hubs, public gathering spaces, and unofficial watch parties, significantly increasing the area that must be secured and actively managed. As high-profile international targets, FIFA World Cup events bring risks that include terrorism, violent crime, crowd surges, cyber and communications disruptions, drone incursions, and disinformation, while Seattle’s dense, transit reliant urban environment creates additional vulnerabilities at station platforms, pedestrian choke points, and last mile routes.

PLANNED WORK: The activities, services, and/or equipment purchases included.

The purchase or rental of the following equipment: Hazmat Remote Particulate Monitors, EOC Computers, EOC Monitors and Screens, Video Conferencing Camera and Microphones, TV Screens for CP live stream.

OUTCOME

How the project will improve the regions ability to prevent, protect, mitigate, respond and recover to terrorism threats related to the FIFA World Cup.

The anticipated outcome of this project is enhanced emergency coordination, hazardous materials monitoring, and situational awareness capabilities for City of Spokane during FIFA World Cup 2026 and other large-scale emergencies. Investments in hazardous materials remote particulate monitors will improve the ability to detect and assess potential airborne threats, while upgrades to Emergency Operations Center computers, monitors, video conferencing equipment, and live-stream display capabilities will strengthen multi-agency coordination, information sharing, operational visibility, and real-time decision-making during complex incidents affecting public safety and critical infrastructure.

IMPACT

Anticipated impact of the project on public safety and critical infrastructure protection and how the project will contribute to long-term security and resilience.

The work will strengthen public safety and critical infrastructure protection by improving coordination, increasing visible security measures, and enhancing real-time threat detection and response. Multi-agency planning and validated CONOPS will enable faster, unified decision-making, while increased staffing and security presence at high-risk venues and transportation hubs will deter and reduce vulnerabilities to attacks. Enhanced intelligence sharing, interoperable communications, and deployment of specialized equipment will improve situational awareness and response capabilities, ultimately reducing risk, protecting key assets, and ensuring continuity of operations during World Cup events.

Agenda Wording

Special Budget Ordinance to establish the budget for the purchase of a transformer at Upriver Dam.

Summary (Background)

The transformer at Upriver Dam supplies power to the largest water wells in the City and has shown imminent failure through multiple oil analysis tests. The transformer will need to be replaced as soon as possible to avoid negatively affecting the water distribution system. Failure of this transformer would be detrimental to system reliability and operations. This project was included in the future years of the Water Department's Capital Improvement Program (CIP); however, due to 2-3 year lead times for delivery, an order must be placed now to ensure timely receipt and scheduled completion. While the majority of funding is planned for FY2027/FY2028, this Special Budget Ordinance (SBO) allows for procurement to begin in advance.

ORDINANCE NO. C36881

AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. C36794, ENTITLED IN PART, "AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A MID-BIENNIAL MODIFICATION BUDGET FOR THE CITY OF SPOKANE", AND AMENDING IT TO PURCHASE A TRANSFORMER FOR UPRIVER DAM, AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, subsequent to the adoption of the mid-biennium modification Ordinance No. C36794, as above entitled in part, and which passed the City Council November 24, 2025, it is necessary to make changes in the appropriations of the Water – Wastewater Fund, which changes could not have been anticipated or known at the time of making such budget ordinance; and

- A) Of the increased appropriation, \$2,200,000 is provided solely for construction of fixed assets in the Water Capital program.

Section 2. It is, therefore, by the City Council declared that an urgency and emergency exists for making the changes set forth herein, such urgency and emergency arising from the need to purchase a transformer for Upriver Dam, and because of such need, an urgency and emergency exists for the passage of this ordinance, and also, because the same makes an appropriation, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage.

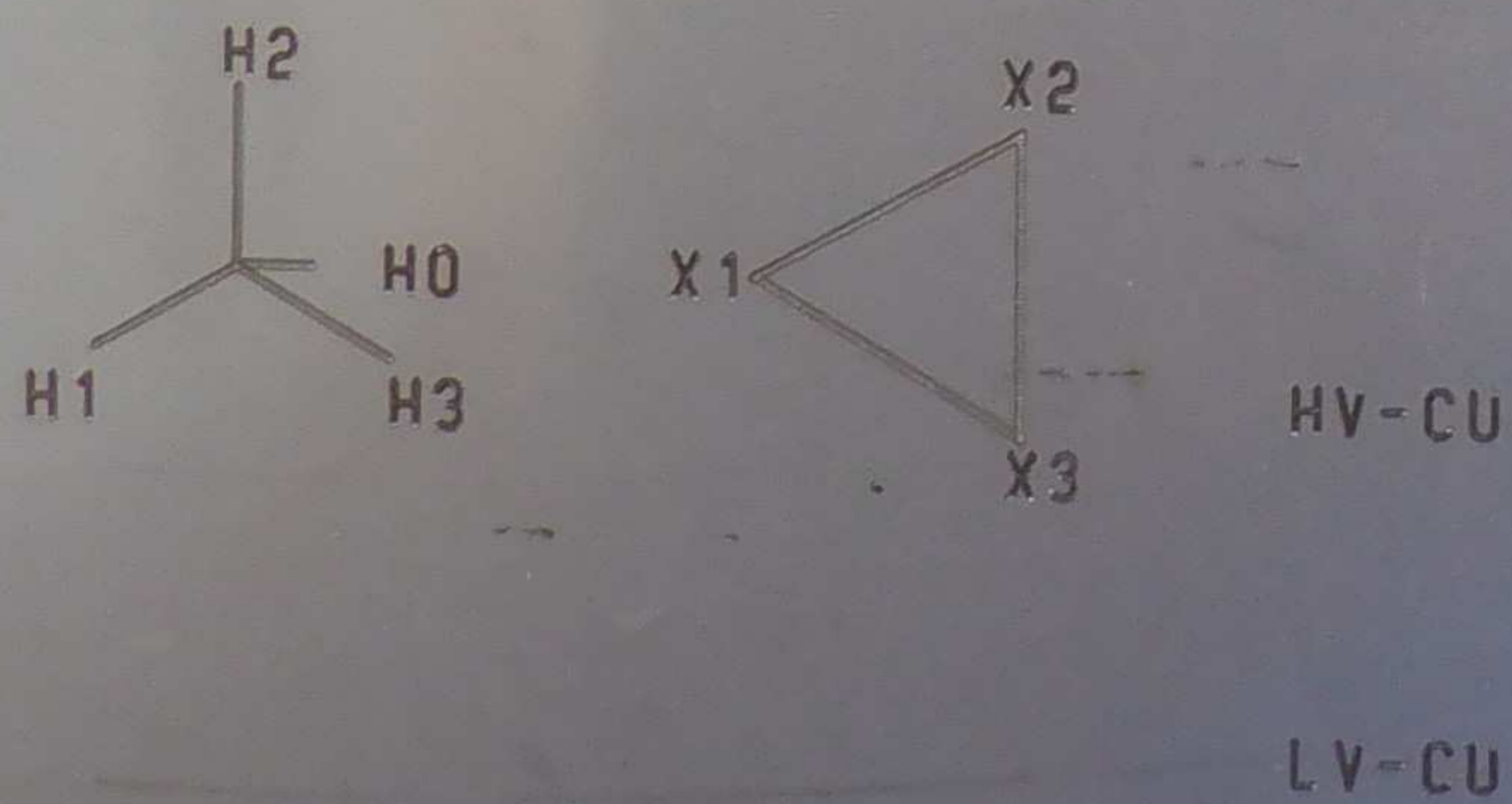

WHEREAS, the City’s Grants Management Office is requesting that the Council approve the allocation of \$54,770.00 in one-time grant funds for programmatic support allocated from the total awarded grant amount; and

ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING RIGHT TO COOLING

Agenda Wording

An Ordinance creating a condition of habitability for residential tenants and requiring that cooling be provided by January 1, 2031; amending section 10.57.140, enacting a new section 10.57.175 of Chapter 10.57 and repealing Section 10.57.170 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

Summary (Background)

Cooling devices are becoming an essential element of habitability. This ordinance is to ensure that renters have access to cooling devices, and requires that all rentals have adequate cooling by the year 2031. According to the memorandum "Spokane Climate Impacts and Climate Justice," average annual temperatures in Spokane have increased by 2°F since 1950 and peak August temperatures have risen 3.5°F since 1979, and summer temperatures are projected to increase by another 3.6°F by 2049. According to the 2023 report "In the Hot Seat" by the University of Washington Climate Impacts Group, Washington state is expected to see an increase in extreme heat days, a projected average of 20-30 extreme heat days annually by the 2050s compared to the average of three extreme heat days per year between 1971 and 2021. Extreme heat can cause illness and death. The 2021 Northwest Heat Dome resulted in at least 19 heat-related deaths and over 300 people seeking medical treatment for heat related illness in Spokane County. Extreme heat is the number one weather-related cause of death in the U.S., killing more people most years than hurricanes, floods, and tornadoes combined. According to Spokane's "Climate Risk and Vulnerability Assessment" the elderly and youth are particularly vulnerable to health impacts resulting from extreme heat. In addition, poor outdoor air quality due to wildfire smoke often prevents residents from safely opening windows for cooling, making indoor cooling essential to maintaining the health and safety of Spokane residents. This ordinance is intended to establishing performance-based cooling requirements to ensure that all landlords operate under fair and consistent habitability standards. Currently state law requires a residential landlord to "keep the premises fit for human habitation," and also requires a residential landlord to "provide facilities adequate to supply heat and water and hot water as reasonably required by the tenant." Just as heating is an essential service to maintain habitability in the winter months, our changing climate now requires that cooling similarly

be treated as an essential service to maintain habitability in the summer months. This ordinance amends the current provisions requiring landlords to allow cooling devices in certain instances, and replaces them with provisions that require landlords to allow portable cooling devices to ensure an ambient temperature at 80 degrees or lower, and requires landlord install and maintain cooling mechanisms for all residential units by the year 2031. This ordinance represents an expansion of Spokane's habitability standards and establishes cooling as an essential service on par with heating. The primary long-term goal of this ordinance is to ensure that 100% of residential rental units in Spokane provide adequate cooling to tenants by January 1, 2031.

ORDINANCE NO C36877

An Ordinance creating a condition of habitability for residential tenants and requiring that cooling be provided by January 1, 2031; amending section 10.57.140, enacting a new section 10.57.175 of Chapter 10.57 and repealing Section 10.57.170 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, according to the memorandum “Spokane Climate Impacts and Climate Justice,” average annual temperatures in Spokane have increased by 2°F since 1950 and peak August temperatures have risen 3.5°F since 1979; and

WHEREAS, extreme heat can cause illness and death; and

WHEREAS, the 2021 Northwest Heat Dome resulted in at least 19 heat-related deaths and over 300 people seeking medical treatment for heat related illness in Spokane County; and

WHEREAS, extreme heat is the number one weather-related cause of death in the U.S., killing more people most years than hurricanes, floods, and tornadoes combined; and

WHEREAS, poor outdoor air quality due to wildfire smoke often prevents residents from safely opening windows for cooling, making indoor cooling essential to maintaining the health and safety of Spokane residents; and

WHEREAS, establishing performance-based cooling requirements ensures that all landlords operate under fair and consistent habitability standards; and

WHEREAS, according to Spokane’s “Climate Risk and Vulnerability Assessment” the elderly and youth are particularly vulnerable to health impacts resulting from extreme heat; and

WHEREAS, RCW 59.18.060 requires a residential landlord to “keep the premises fit for human habitation”; and

WHEREAS, RCW 59.18.060 also requires that a residential landlord “provide facilities adequate to supply heat and water and hot water as reasonably required by the tenant”; and

WHEREAS, just as heating is an essential service to maintain habitability in the winter months, our changing climate now requires that cooling similarly be treated as an essential service to maintain habitability in the summer months.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does ordain:

Section 1. Chapter 10.57.140 is amended to read as follows:

Section 10.57.140 Private Right of Action

- A. Any person or class of persons who claim to have been injured by a violation of sections 10.57.020(H), 10.57.110, 10.57.120, 10.57.130, 10.57.160, 10.57.175, or 10.57.180 may commence a civil action in Superior Court, not later than three (3) years after the occurrence of the alleged violation to obtain relief with respect to such violation. Upon prevailing, such aggrieved person may be awarded reasonable attorneys’ fees and costs, and such other legal and equitable relief as appropriate to remedy the violation including, without limitation, the payment of compensatory damages, a penalty of up to \$500, and injunctive relief.
- B. If a landlord fails to comply with the requirements of sections 10.57.020(H), 10.57.110, 10.57.120, 10.57.130, 10.57.160, 10.57.175, or 10.57.180. and such failure was not caused by the tenant, the tenant may terminate the rental agreement by written notice pursuant to law.

Section 2. Chapter 10.57.170 entitled “Portable Cooling Devices” is repealed.

Section 3. There is enacted a new section 10.57.175 of the Spokane Municipal Code to read as follows:

Section 10.57.175 Cooling and Tenancy Habitability

- A. The definitions in section 10.57.005 apply to the terms in this section unless a different meaning is provided. In addition, for purposes of this section, the following terms are defined:
 - 1. “Cooling” means the use of passive cooling or mechanical cooling to maintain an indoor temperature in each bedroom of the dwelling that does not exceed 80 degrees Fahrenheit.

2. "Indoor temperature" means the ambient temperature of indoor bedroom spaces as measured at a point three feet from above the floor and two feet from exterior walls.
 3. "Passive cooling" means the use of building design or nature-based solutions that prevent heat from entering a building and remove existing heat through methods such as shading, ventilation, insulation, building orientation, and material reflectivity.
 4. "Mechanical cooling" means the use of devices such as central air conditioning, an air-source or ground-source heat pump, or a portable air conditioning device.
 5. "Portable cooling device" means an air conditioner or evaporative cooler, including a device mounted in a window or that is designed to sit on the floor, but not including a device whose installation or use requires alteration to the dwelling unit.
- B. A landlord may not prohibit or restrict a tenant from installing or using a portable cooling device of the tenant's choosing, unless:
1. The dwelling already has a permanently installed and fully operational heat pump that can maintain adequate cooling in each bedroom of the dwelling unit, or
 2. The installation or use of the device would:
 - a. Violate building codes or state or federal law; or
 - b. Violate the device manufacturer's written safety guidelines for the device; or
 - c. Significantly damage the premises beyond the normal wear and tear or render the premises uninhabitable; or
 - d. If the device would be installed in a window, and:
 - i. The window is a necessary egress from the dwelling unit; or
 - ii. The device would interfere with the tenant's ability to lock a window that is accessible from outside; or
 - iii. The device requires the use of brackets or other hardware that would damage or void the warranty of the window or frame, puncture the envelope of the building or otherwise cause significant damages; or
 - iv. The restrictions require that the device be adequately drained to prevent damage to the dwelling unit or building; or
 - v. The restrictions require that the device be installed in a manner that prevents risk of falling; or

- vi. An electrical supply/source would be necessary to power the device that cannot be accommodated by the existing power service to the building, dwelling unit, or circuit.
 - e. In addition to the requirements in subsection (B)(2) of this section, the landlord may also require that the portable cooling device be:
 - I. Installed or removed by the landlord or landlord's agent; or
 - II. Subject to inspection or servicing by the landlord or landlord's agent. A landlord must provide at least 48 hours' notice prior to any inspection
 - f. A landlord is not liable for any interruption in electrical service resulting from the installation of a portable cooling device installed by a tenant, including interruptions caused by an electrical supply's inability to accommodate use of a portable cooling device
- C. Effective January 1, 2031, every dwelling unit governed by this chapter shall have adequate cooling in each bedroom of the dwelling unit. A dwelling unit without adequate cooling shall be deemed uninhabitable.
- D. Effective January 1, 2031, if, a dwelling or bedroom is inhabitable under this section, a tenant may provide a written notice of the defect given to the landlord pursuant to RCW 59.18.070. For purposes of this section, a lack of adequate cooling shall constitute a defective condition that is imminently hazardous to life under RCW 59.18.070(1). If, after receipt of written notice and expiration of the applicable period of time set forth in RCW 59.18.070(1), the landlord fails to remedy the defective condition, the tenant may
 - 1. Terminate the rental agreement and quit the premises upon written notice to the landlord without further obligation under the rental agreement, in which case the tenant shall be (a) discharged from payment of rent for any period following the termination date, and (b) entitled to a pro rata refund of any prepaid rent, and (c) shall receive a full and specific statement of the basis for retaining any of the deposit together with any refund due in accordance with RCW 59.18.280; and
 - 2. May pursue any other remedies set forth in this chapter or state law; and
 - 3. May install a cooling device(s) and deduct the cost from their normal rent through the process outlined in RCW 59.18.100.
- E. After the effective date of this ordinance, and notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B(2)(a)–(e), a tenant may install and deduct the cost of portable cooling devices from normal rent if their dwelling unit reaches an ambient indoor temperature at or exceeding 80 degrees Fahrenheit, and the tenant provides 24 hours of notice.

- F. A landlord of any dwelling for which building permits for its construction were issued on or after January 1, 2027, shall provide cooling via adequate cooling methods or facilities that:
1. Provide cooling in each bedroom of the dwelling unit;
 2. Conform to applicable law at the time of installation and are maintained in good working order; and
 3. May include central air conditioning, an air-source or ground-source heat pump, passive cooling design and techniques, a portable air conditioning device capable of filtering PM2.5 smoke particles that is provided by the landlord or other devices or methods that can maintain a temperature that does not exceed 80 degrees Fahrenheit.
- I. A landlord is immune from liability for any claim for damages, injury or death caused by a portable cooling device installed by the tenant.
- J. A landlord who must limit or restrict the installation of portable cooling devices for a building shall prioritize allowing the use of devices for individuals who require a device to accommodate a disability.
- K. All new leases, or any renewal of an existing lease, signed after the effective date of this ordinance shall be accompanied by a separate and prominent notice to tenants of their rights, responsibilities, and restrictions related to installation and operation of a portable cooling device.
- L. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to limit the responsibilities of landlords to provide reasonable accommodations under existing state and federal law.
- M. Inspections of residential rental property will include inspection to ensure adequate cooling is provided. A landlord that fails to comply with the provision of cooling consistent with this chapter may be denied licensure consistent with SMC 10.57.020.
- N. The City of Spokane may partner with energy providers, other regional partners, and state regulators to offer incentives or rebates for property owners who make energy-efficient improvements such as insulation, ventilating, air conditioning, weatherization, or heat pump installations, operations, and maintenance, on the condition that cost savings are shared with tenants.
- O. The City of Spokane may encourage the development of heat mitigating roofs and other passive cooling site and building features by exploring code updates and incentives in Downtown and other high intensity areas of the city to reduce energy use and improve resilience.

Section 4. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the

validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

Section 5. Clerical Errors. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.

Spokane City Counsel Equity Assessment- Cooling Ordinance

1. What is the primary goal of the policy or project and/or the challenge you are attempting to address?

The goal of the proposed ordinance is to protect renters from extreme heat in their homes by requiring landlords to ensure habitable living temperatures, not exceeding 80 degrees Fahrenheit in bedrooms. Extreme heat in Spokane has led to numerous heat-related deaths and illnesses. This ordinance will enforce basic habitability and protect tenants, ensuring that their homes are safe.

2. Are there potential unintended consequences among populations like BIPOC, low-income, youth, people with disabilities, and renter households?

Renters, who are disproportionately represented among communities of color and lower-income households in Spokane, stand to benefit most from the protections of this proposed ordinance. Extreme heat disproportionately impacts low-income renters, communities of color, elderly residents, people with disabilities, and other historically disadvantaged groups who are less likely to have access to adequate cooling in their homes and are less able to absorb the cost of purchasing their own cooling equipment. Research shows that the vast majority of people, approximately 80%, shelter in place at home during extreme heat ([Gonzaga Climate Institute, 2025](#)). For those without cooling, shelter in place can be dangerous during extreme heat events as residents will be stuck in an uninhabitably hot space. By making cooling a condition of habitability, this ordinance shifts the burden of providing safe indoor temperatures from tenants to landlords, directly benefiting those who are most economically vulnerable.

3. What current inequities might this policy or project address? (consider all including race, gender, people with disabilities, geography, and income)

All people deserve living in conditions of basic habitability. Because cooling systems have not historically been required for a residence to be considered habitable, the burden of inadequate indoor temperatures has fallen disproportionately on those with little ability to address it themselves. Low-income renters are least likely to be able to afford their own cooling equipment, least likely to have the leverage to negotiate habitability improvements with landlords, and most likely to live in older housing that lacks adequate cooling infrastructure. Communities of color are disproportionately represented among Spokane's renter population and are statistically more likely to live in lower-quality housing with inadequate climate control. This ordinance would raise the livability standards for all Spokane renters, while delivering the greatest benefit to those who have historically been most exposed to risk, and least able to remedy the situation themselves.

4. Based on the data you have gathered and reviewed how might the policy or project impact disparities be affected? Will they improve or worsen? (Share data being used,

disaggregate by race/ethnicity, gender, people with disabilities, income, and age. Include geography)

This ordinance will positively impact disparities in home cooling availability. Currently, rental homes, and especially older rental properties, disproportionately lack cooling as landlords have not been required to provide it. This ordinance will close the gap by requiring landlords ensure temperatures are not higher than 80 degrees Fahrenheit in bedrooms.

a. Race/Ethnicity - Reduced Disparity

In Spokane, there is a statistically significant positive correlation between urban heat intensity and the percentage of residents who are non-white, Indigenous, or Black (r values between 0.5 and 0.6, $p < 0.0001$). In contrast, there is a significant negative correlation between urban heat intensity and the percentage of residents identifying as white ($r = -0.6$, $p < 0.0001$) ([Henning et al., 2023](#)). The proposed ordinance would reduce race-based disparities in heat risk by strengthening in-home cooling protections in rental units within disproportionately exposed neighborhoods.

b. Gender - Disparity Neutral

There is limited information on gender disparate effects in cases of extreme heat. It is worth noting that during the 2021 Washington heat wave, between June 26 and August 30, 2021, statewide heat-related deaths were 61% male and 39% female out of 157 total deaths ([Washington State Department of Health, 2021](#)). The proposed policy will have a positive, equitable impact regardless of gender.

c. People with Disabilities - Reduce Disparity

This ordinance would benefit people with disabilities, specifically those with mobility impairments. It is estimated that one in seven Washington State residents, or 14%, live with a disability ([Washington State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, 2017](#)). Following the 2021 extreme heat event, Spokane County's Medical Examiner's Office stated, "Many of the deceased had underlying health conditions which made them more susceptible to heat stress. Some also had cognitive impairment or mobility problems that limited their ability to remove themselves from the dangerously hot environment" ([Spokane County Medical Examiner's Office, 2021](#)).

The prevalence of asthma and respiratory disease, which are significant risk factors during extreme heat events, has also been increasing. In 2020, an estimated 15% of adults in Washington reported being diagnosed with asthma, up from about 12% of the adult population two decades prior ([UW Climate Impacts Group, 2023](#)).

Renters with disabilities are limited by coping capacity in cases of extreme heat. Ensuring that bedroom temperatures reach no higher than a maximum of 80 degrees Fahrenheit would have a positive impact on people with disabilities by providing consistent and accessible protection from extreme heat. The proposed policy will have a positive impact for all persons regardless of disability.

d. Income - Reduce Disparity

There is a significantly strong positive correlation between urban heat and the percentage of the population living at or beneath the poverty line in Spokane ($r=0.7$, $p<0.0001$) ([Henning et al., 2023](#)). Data from King, Pierce, and Snohomish counties elaborates, stating approximately 66% of households earning \$50,000 or less do not have air conditioning. In those same counties, about 71% of rented homes lack installed AC systems ([UW Climate Impacts Group, 2023](#)).

These figures indicate that lower-income renters are substantially less likely to have in-home cooling locally and regionally. Rental homes, especially older rental properties, disproportionately lack cooling as landlords have not been required to provide it. By establishing enforceable indoor temperature standards in rental housing, the proposed ordinance reduces income-based disparities in heat exposure and strengthens protections for cost-burdened renters.

e. Age - Reduce Disparity

While 16.7% of Washington state's population was 65 and older in 2020, that number is projected to grow to 21.7% by 2040, exceeding 2 million vulnerable older Washingtonians. Older adults are inherently more vulnerable to extreme heat, and as this population grows, there will be more people directly impacted by a lack of cooling ([Washington State Department of Health, 2021](#)).

Additionally, 64% of residents are unlikely to check on neighbors during extreme heat events ([Gonzaga Climate Institute, 2025](#)). While this is true across all Spokane residents, it is especially concerning for older adults who may need additional assistance during extreme heat events. Adequate cooling in rental properties will ensure safer conditions for elderly Washingtonians.

5. Identify systems that can be impacted directly or indirectly. (internal, external)

Systems that may be impacted include Code Enforcement, as well as housing and landlord groups.

Spokane Code Enforcement will be impacted as Code Enforcement will integrate cooling compliance into habitability review of rental units.

6. Are you collaborating with individuals and communities most impacted – particularly Black, Indigenous People of Color – in the Policy or Project planning process? If not, why not?

In developing this ordinance, many different community advocates were engaged, including the Gonzaga Climate Institute, the Spokane Low Income Housing Consortium, the Spokane Housing Authority, the Tenants Union of Washington State, the King County Bar Association, the Northwest Justice Project, the Community Building Foundation, Spokane Neighborhood Action Partners, Growing Neighbors, and the Spokane Community Organized Response Network, among others. These groups consist of a diverse array of community members that will be directly impacted by the proposed ordinance.

7. What is your plan to include community members to ensure meaningful input from the planning phase through implementation and performance monitoring?

We plan to continue our collaboration with the Gonzaga Climate Institute, which plans to maintain contact with the groups named above to consider any input or concerns as they arise. Additionally, the Climate Institute is prepared to support the implementation of this ordinance by providing literature regarding landlord and tenant rights to landlords and tenants, as well as being available for consult with any other issues that might arise under the implementation of the proposed ordinance.

Evaluating and Improving

8. Based on the answers above, what specific changes need to be made to the proposal to achieve your goal and avoid the continuation of racial and other disparities (Ex. Partnering with and/or investing in groups representing communities most impacted by the proposed initiative.)

9. What performance measures will you use to evaluate the proposal's impact following implementation, including the impact on racial and ethnic disparities? Qualitative and quantitative measures are encouraged.

After the five-year compliance period, the performance measure will be simply whether or not rental homes capable of maintaining temperatures at or below 80 degrees Fahrenheit in bedrooms during the summer months and extreme heat events. This can be reported and monitored both by tenants and by code enforcement during annual inspections.

10. Have you identified milestones that you will use to ensure ongoing review and periodic adjustments?

The proposed ordinance allows a five-year compliance period through January 1, 2031. This window was intentionally designed to give landlords adequate time to plan and budget for cooling upgrades. The ordinance is technologically neutral and allows landlords various options to ensure minimum temperature standards. Many portable cooling units are available commercially for less than \$200, a lower payment than most security deposits. Thus, the 2031 deadline should be achievable by the vast majority of rental properties, and this date will mark the primary milestone.

Upon passage, renters will be authorized to install their own cooling devices to protect against extreme heat and deduct the cost from their rent, subject to some exceptions.

After the 2031 compliance deadline, all rental units without adequate cooling will be deemed uninhabitable under Spokane standards and thus be subject to the full consequences of that label. City Code Enforcement will assume ongoing monitoring responsibility, treating cooling complaints with the same seriousness as any other habitability violation.

Barriers to improve policy or program

11. What limitations might complicate this proposal and what is the plan to address them? Are there recommendations for additional policy changes or programs?

By way of ordinance implementation, landlord compliance is a concern. Not all landlords will bring their units into compliance by the 2031 deadline. Code enforcement and reporting of uninhabitable residences by affected tenants will bring non-compliant landlords to the attention of the City. However, the ordinance's built-in tenant enforcement mechanisms distribute compliance accountability, rather than solely relying upon City enforcement.

Fiscal Note- Cooling Ordinance

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE making cooling a condition of habitability for residential tenants by January 1, 2031; amending Chapter 10.57 of Title 10 of the Spokane Municipal Code, Section 10.57.170 Portable Cooling Devices.

Summary and Background of the Legislation:

Extreme heat is a serious concern for the Spokane community, as a mass-casualty emergency in Washington and is the top weather-related cause of death in the U.S. The 2021 Northwest Heat Dome highlighted this danger, causing 19 heat-related deaths and over 300 to people to seek medical treated for heat-related illness in Spokane County. Patterns of increased heat will cause increasingly frequent and severe extreme heat events in the future, which will only exacerbate this risk.

Extreme heat poses a particular threat to individuals who lack access to cool spaces to recover, including those whose homes lack air conditioning or other cooling devices.

In 2024, The City of Spokane passed Section 10.57.170 on Portable Cooling Devices which prohibited landlords from restricting tenants from installing portable cooling devices, unless it would violate certain exceptions.

This ordinance will repeal and expand Section 10.57.170. It will expand the habitability standard for dwellings, and require landlords to ensure that dwellings are capable of maintaining temperatures no higher than 80 degrees Fahrenheit during the summer and periods of extreme heat. It will additionally prevent landlords from restricting tenants from installing their own portable cooling devices, unless doing such would violate certain exceptions.

3. SUMMARY OF FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Does this legislation amend the adopted budget? **No.**

Does the legislation have other financial impacts to The City of Spokane that are not reflected in the above, including direct or indirect, short-term, or long-term costs?

Estimated costs are minimally associated with existing monitoring and enforcement policies. Code enforcement staffing, inspection capacity, administrative overhead, and

any technology or systems needed to track compliance will be utilized through already existing channels.

The primary financial burden of this ordinance falls on the private sector, specifically landlords, rather than the City, an intentional design feature of the legislation.

Longterm effects of failure to implement the proposed ordinance would include possible strains on the health system due to increased 911 calls, hospital transports, emergency department visits, and hospital admissions in periods of extreme heat. ([UW Climate Impacts Group, 2023](#)). Impacts of extreme heat include increased illness and death, resulting healthcare costs, and productivity and wage losses. (*Id.*) As a whole, the United States stands to lose \$100 billion annually from lost labor productivity during periods of extreme heat, a number that is expected to double by 2030. (*Id.*) Spokane is no different and will face proportional losses during periods of extreme heat absent intervention.

No there are not.

This ordinance would likely originate from the City's code enforcement or housing division.

b. Is a public hearing required for this legislation?

Yes, a public hearing will be scheduled as part of the City Council's legislative process.

c. Does this legislation affect a piece of property?

This legislation affects properties within Spokane, but not one specific property.

d. Please describe any perceived implication for the principles of the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Does this legislation impact vulnerable or historically disadvantaged communities? What is the Language Access plan for any communications to the public?

This ordinance carries significant positive implications for the principles of the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Extreme heat disproportionately impacts low-income renters, communities of color, elderly residents, people with disabilities, and other historically disadvantaged groups who are less likely to have access to adequate cooling in their homes and are less able to absorb the cost of purchasing their own cooling equipment. ([Gonzaga Climate Institute, 2025](#)). By making cooling a condition of habitability, this ordinance shifts the burden of providing safe indoor temperatures from tenants to landlords, directly benefiting those who are most economically vulnerable.

Renters, who are disproportionately represented among communities of color and lower-income households in Spokane, stand to benefit most from these protections. The ordinance's provisions allowing tenants to withhold rent or deduct the cost of cooling devices when landlords fail to comply to provide meaningful legal tools to populations that have historically lacked leverage in the landlord-tenant relationship. Anti-retaliation protections further safeguard tenants from being penalized for asserting their rights, a concern that is particularly acute for renters who may fear eviction or rent increases if they raise habitability complaints.

The ordinance also directly addresses a known health equity gap. Heat-related illness and death fall heavily on vulnerable populations, many of whom are concentrated in historically disadvantaged communities. Making residences more habitable during extreme heat events is not only a housing policy but a health equity intervention.

Language Access Plan: Any public communications related to this ordinance, including notices to landlords and tenants regarding new rights and obligations, compliance timelines, and the process for reporting violations, should be made available in all languages spoken by a significant portion of Spokane's renter population. This includes, at minimum, Spanish and other languages consistent with the City's existing language access obligations. The City should coordinate with the Spokane Regional Health District and community-based organizations to develop and distribute accessible materials ahead of the 2031 compliance deadline.

e. Climate Change Implications

1. Emissions: Is this legislation likely to increase or decrease carbon emissions in a material way?

There is potential for a modest increase in carbon emissions, depending on how landlords choose to ensure cool dwellings. Additional air conditioning units and portable cooling devices may increase emissions. However, given the alternative options that landlords could choose to employ, it is unlikely that there would be a significant, material increase.

2. Resiliency: Will the action(s) proposed by this legislation increase or decrease Spokane's resiliency (or ability to adapt) to climate change in a material way? If so, explain. If it is likely to decrease resiliency in a material way, describe what will or could be done to mitigate the effects.

This ordinance materially increases Spokane's resiliency to climate change. Average annual temperatures in Spokane have already risen 2°F since 1950, peak August temperatures have risen 3.5°F since 1979, and summer temperatures are projected to increase by an additional 3.6°F by 2049. The region is expected to experience 20-30 extreme heat days annually by the 2050s, compared to an average of just three per year between 1971 and 2021. ([Spokane Climate Project, 2022](#)). By establishing a baseline standard of indoor cooling for all residential rental units, the ordinance ensures that Spokane's housing stock is better prepared to protect residents as these conditions worsen over time.

The ordinance also addresses the compounding effects of wildfire smoke, which increasingly prevents residents from opening windows for natural ventilation during heat events. By requiring landlords to provide mechanical or passive cooling solutions the ordinance acknowledges that heat resilience and air quality resilience are deeply interconnected challenges in the Inland Northwest.

f. If this legislation includes a new initiative or a major programmatic expansion: What are the specific long-term and measurable goal(s) of the program? How will this legislation help achieve the program's desired goal(s)?

This ordinance represents an expansion of Spokane's habitability standards and establishes cooling as an essential service on par with heating. The primary long-term goal of this ordinance is to ensure that 100% of residential rental units in Spokane provide adequate cooling to tenants by January 1, 2031.

ORDINANCE RELATING TO EXCESSIVE SPEEDING AND STREET RACING

Agenda Wording

An ordinance regulating aggressive speeding and street racing and enacting a new Chapter 16A.85 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

Summary (Background)

This ordinance expands enforcement to provide additional deterrence to aggressive speeding and street racing, and thereby, reducing dangerous outcomes. Establishes definitions and penalties for aggressive speeding, exhibition of speed, street racing, unlawful racing event and unlawful vehicle use. It also defines what video evidence may be considered by the Spokane Police Department under this section.

What impacts would the proposal have on historically excluded communities?

No known or anticipated impacts on historically excluded communities.

How will data be collected, analyzed, and reported concerning the effect of the program/policy by racial, ethnic, gender identity, national origin, income level, disability, sexual orientation, or other existing disparities?

Police citation data will be collected through the issuance of citations and penalties for the infraction, and available for analysis through the SPD webpage.

Data collection will be ongoing to assess effectiveness.

This ordinance increases safety for all users of public streets, to include pedestrians, other vehicles, all wheeled/rolling forms of transportation, as well as buildings and infrastructure.

ORDINANCE NO. C36883

AN ORDINANCE regulating aggressive speeding and street racing, and enacting a new Chapter 16A.85 of the Spokane Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, in 2023, thirty percent (30%) of fatal crashes involved speeding on Washington roads, and

WHEREAS, aggressive speeding and street racing continue to be a significant component of traffic deaths; and

WHEREAS, the use of a vehicle to engage in street racing or aggressive speeding upon the public streets results not only in unsafe traffic conditions for other vehicles, pedestrians, and property, but engenders fear and disinvestment among neighborhood residents and prevents peaceful enjoyment of property; and

WHEREAS, street racing and aggressive speeding create a public nuisance through accompanying noise and pollution that negatively impact the health and quality of life of Spokane residents; and

WHEREAS, street racing and aggressive speeding have become more prevalent in the City of Spokane, and Spokane is experiencing more fatalities and injuries from speed-related vehicle crashes than from homicides; and

WHEREAS, street racing and aggressive speeding unnecessarily expend law enforcement resources, and recent Spokane data shows an increasing speed related crashes causing serious injury or death in Spokane over the last 5 years; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that expanding effective enforcement and resources will provide additional deterrence to aggressive speeding and street racing, and thereby reduce dangerous outcomes arising from such conduct;

NOW, THEREFORE, the City of Spokane does hereby ordain as follows:

Section 1. That a new Chapter 16A.85 of the Spokane Municipal Code is enacted to read as follows:

Chapter 16A.85 Street Racing

Section 16A.85.010 Definitions

Section 16A.85.020 Prohibited Conduct, Penalties

Section 16A.85.030 Unlawful Vehicle Use

Section 16A.85.040 Notice of Infraction to Registered Owner

Section 16A.85.050 Video Evidence, Exclusive Use of Police

Section 16A.85.010 Definitions

- A. "Aggressive speeding" means the type of driving behavior that is likely to endanger other persons or property and includes speeding as one of the actions.
- B. "Exhibition of speed" means the operation of a motor vehicle to present a display of speed, maneuverability, or power. Exhibition of speed or acceleration includes, but is not limited to, squealing the tires of a motor vehicle while it is stationary or in motion, rapid acceleration, rapid swerving or weaving, drifting, producing smoke from tire slippage, or leaving visible tire acceleration marks on the surface of a paved or unpaved area, that is done intentionally to draw the attention of persons in the vicinity.
- C. "Street racing" means to (1) race a vehicle either against another vehicle or against a time whether or not there is an agreement to race but contesting speeds; or (2) drive a vehicle at excessively high rates of speed or acceleration or in another dangerous manner in an exhibition or contest of driving prowess, such as drifting, sliding, or emitting black smoke or excessive sound.
- D. "SPD" means Spokane Police Department.
- E. "Unlawful racing event" means an occurrence where street racing, aggressive speeding or exhibition of speed occurs using public highways, streets, or rights-of-way in violation of applicable motor vehicle and traffic laws, including RCW 46.61.500 and 46.61.530.
- F. "Unlawful Vehicle Use" means allowing or suffering use of a vehicle in an unlawful racing event.
- G. "Video evidence" means video generated by or for the Spokane Police Department, including cameras installed in or on police vehicles, body worn video, video obtained utilizing drone technology operated by the SPD, or any other video evidence obtained by the SPD and authorized for evidentiary purposes for violations under this chapter.

Section 16A.85.020 Prohibited Conduct, Penalties

- A. It is unlawful for any person within the City of Spokane to engage in an unlawful racing event.

- B. Violation of this section is a traffic infraction, which shall be assessed a penalty of \$500 upon first infraction, excluding any costs, fees, or assessments. A second violation shall be assessed a penalty of \$800, excluding any costs, fees, or assessments. Third and subsequent violations shall be assessed a penalty of \$1,500 per violation, excluding any costs, fees, or assessments. Penalties under this section may not be waived or remitted.
- C. Further violations of this section shall be a gross misdemeanor punishable as provided in RCW 46.61.500. In addition to the penalties provided for in RCW 46.61.500, upon conviction, the court may impound the person's vehicle for up to 30 calendar days.
- D. Violations of this section by the operator of a vehicle may be detected by the Spokane Police Department using video evidence that clearly displays the violation of this chapter, the vehicle used and the identity of the operator.

Section 16A.85.030 Unlawful Vehicle Use

- A. Any registered owner of a vehicle used in connection with conduct prohibited under this chapter, and who was not operating the vehicle at the time of the violation, has committed the infraction of unlawful vehicle use.
- B. Violation of this section is a traffic infraction, which shall be assessed a penalty of \$500 upon first infraction, excluding any costs, fees, or assessments. A second violation shall be assessed a penalty of \$800, excluding any costs, fees, or assessments. Third and subsequent violations shall be assessed a penalty of \$1,500 per violation, excluding any costs, fees or assessments. Penalties under this section may not be waived or remitted.
- C. Further violations of this section shall be a gross misdemeanor punishable as provided in RCW 46.61.500. In addition to the penalties provided for in RCW 46.61.500, upon conviction, the court may impound the person's vehicle for up to 30 calendar days.
- D. Violations of this section by the registered owner of a vehicle may be detected by the Spokane Police Department using video evidence that clearly displays the violation of this chapter and the vehicle used.

Section 16A.85.040 Notice of Infraction to Registered Owner.

- A. The registered owner of a vehicle shall be deemed in violation of section 16A.85.030 unless the registered owner overcomes the presumption in subsection

16A.85.040.C, or in the case of a rental car business, satisfies the conditions under subsection 16A.85.040.D.

- B. A notice of infraction must be mailed to the registered owner of the vehicle within 14 days of the violation, or to the renter of a vehicle within 14 days of establishing the renter's name and address under subsection 16A.85.030.F. The law enforcement officer issuing the notice of infraction shall include a certificate or facsimile of the notice, based upon inspection of video evidence, stating the facts supporting the notice of infraction. This certificate or facsimile is prima facie evidence of the facts contained in it and is admissible in a proceeding charging a violation under this section. SPD video evidence supporting the violation must be available for inspection and admission into evidence in a proceeding to adjudicate the liability for the infraction. A person receiving a notice of infraction based on video evidence may respond to the notice by mail.
- C. If the registered owner of the vehicle is not a rental car business, the recipient of a notice of infraction is not liable for the infraction if the recipient demonstrates, by a preponderance of the evidence, that at the time of the violation the recipient either was not the registered owner of the vehicle or that the vehicle was stolen.
- D. If the registered owner of the vehicle is a rental car business, the law enforcement agency shall, before a notice of infraction is issued under this section, provide a written notice to the rental car business that a notice of infraction may be issued to the rental car business if the rental car business does not, within 18 days of receiving the written notice, provide to the issuing agency by return mail:
 - 1. A statement under oath stating the name and known mailing address of the individual driving or renting the vehicle when the infraction occurred;
 - 2. A statement under oath that the business is unable to determine who was driving or renting the vehicle at the time the infraction occurred because the vehicle was stolen at the time of the infraction. A statement provided under this subsection must be accompanied by a copy of a filed police report regarding the vehicle theft; or
 - 3. Payment of the applicable penalty in lieu of identifying the vehicle operator.

Timely mailing of a statement under this subsection to the issuing law enforcement agency relieves a rental car business of any liability under this section for the notice of infraction.

Section 16A.85.050 Video Evidence, Exclusive Use of Police

Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all photographs, microphotographs, or electronic images prepared under this chapter are for the exclusive use of law enforcement in the discharge of duties under this chapter.

Section 2. Severability. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance should be held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity or unconstitutionality thereof shall not affect the validity or constitutionality of any other section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance.

Section 3. Clerical Errors. Upon approval by the city attorney, the city clerk is authorized to make necessary corrections to this ordinance, including scrivener's errors or clerical mistakes; references to other local, state, or federal laws, rules, or regulations; or numbering or referencing of ordinances or their sections and subsections.
