MYTHBUSTERS

Myth 1: "What Spokane is hearing and responding to is that Prop 1 enforcement is gone ... seven days of camping citywide, no tracking, no enforcement"

The proposed Obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance fulfills the will of the voters and the intent of Proposition 1. The proposed Obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance prohibits unauthorized camping on public property citywide, regardless of shelter availability. It provides that a notice be posted up to seven days before a citation may be issued to an individual violating the prohibition on unauthorized camping. Importantly, notice is not required to enforce the obstruction provisions of the proposed ordinance.

Myth 2: The obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance will "tie the hands of law enforcement" and will prevent people in need of help dealing with addiction and mental health issues from getting the treatment that they desperately deserve.

The proposed ordinance was drafted in consultation with the City Attorney's Office and with the support of law enforcement and housing and human services professionals. More specifically, the proposed Obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance establishes an opportunity for an individual subject to enforcement under the ordinance to avoid a citation by accepting navigation to substance use treatment, crisis stabilization, or housing.

Myth 3: The Obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance repeals sit and lie [or expands sit and lie citywide].

The proposed Obstruction and Unauthorized Camping ordinance is a citywide tool with a clear conduct-specific that is enforceable by law enforcement in all twenty-nine neighborhoods. The proposed ordinance consolidates components of sit and lie, unauthorized camping and pedestrian/vehicle interference into a single unified enforcement tool, citywide.



DIVISION STREET BRT

With the confirmation that the North/South Corridor (U.S. 395) is scheduled to be completed in 2030, we are even more excited for Division Street Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) to open concurrently in 2030!

With north/south vehicle traffic using U.S. 395, Division St. will be opened up for <u>Transit-Oriented Development</u> (TOD). With dedicated bus lanes, bike infrastructure, and plans to upzone the entirety of Division St. within the City of Spokane, the combination of BRT and TOD will bring a vibrant, walkable, bikeable central backbone to Spokane.

Division St. historic and current designation as the confluence of Highway 2 and U.S. 395 fostered a development pattern of big box stores, large parking lots, and very little on-street activation. With the proposed developments around BRT, Division St. will evolve from a major throughfare for freight and personal vehicles to an actual destination in itself.

Walkable neighborhoods are extremely popular in the places that implement them. Spokane already has several walkable nodes such as Downtown, South Perry, Garland District and Browne's Addition. Activating Division St. with the aspects of these neighborhoods people already love will transform Spokane's busiest street for the better. BRT also opens up connectivity within the city. People will be able to get to their destinations safely and quickly, regardless of the transportation mode they choose.

Council Member Klitzke was able to attend the Division St. BRT Round Table last week, where community members envisioned what opportunities for transformation these exciting changes will bring!
