# City Government:

# **HOW DO I READ AN AGENDA?**

Reading a Council Agenda can be overwhelming for first time readers. Here are some acronyms as you make your way through:

- Consent Agenda The consent agenda typically includes uncontroversial items like contracts; these all get approved by a single vote. However, council members can request consent items be taken as separate votes.
- Legislative Agenda The legislative agenda is where each item is voted on separately. This includes large contracts, ordinances and resolutions.
  - First Reading Ordinances must be read TWICE before a final vote is taken. First reading allows testimony to be taken.
  - Final Reading Final reading is the second reading of an ordinance. The council will take final testimony and then take a vote.
- ORD = Ordinance Ordinances are laws being considered by the Council that would change the City's code, the Spokane Municipal Code.
- RES = Resolution Resolutions are non-binding. They
  typically make a policy statement, a request, or
  acknowledge people.
- OPR(Operations) = Contract Contracts in general must be approved by Council if they exceed \$50,000 in total value.
- **CPR(Corporate)** = Claims, payments and meeting minutes.
- SBO = Special Budget Ordinance Special budget ordinances are amendments to the City budget to allow for unexpected costs or grant awards to the City.
