1. Solution Statement (How does this proposal help solve a COVID-19-related problem?):

COVID-19 has impacted development timelines, material costs, and the need for additional housing. Re-funding this lapseddevelopment incentive would provide needed relief for development projects that provide public benefit including bringing affordable housing and new living wage jobs to the community, protecting natural and historic resources, and advancing local, regional, and state economic development objectives.

2. General Description:

Funding to implement existing policy that provides operating rules and procedures for the award of financial assistance to development and investment projects valued at \$5m or more. Upon re-funding, "multifamily housing" should be added to the Projects of Citywide Significance Incentive Policy as a significant citywide public benefit. This project would include a modified scoring sheet emphasizing affordable housing and ARP eligibility.

3. Initial Eligibility Assessment:

Most likely eligible under Expenditure Category 7.1 (Administrative Expenses). Could be eligible under 3.10 (Housing Support: Affordable Housing); and 3.12 (Housing Support: Other Housing Assistance).

#### 8. Estimated Impact:

The City ran out of original funding in two years and had many more projects that would have liked to participate. As of January 2019, 206 housing units have been created through projects of citywide significance with an additional 165 units pending before the Project Review Committee. Re-funding this incentive is estimated to spur development of projects that provide public benefit.

9. Equity Analysis (What current inequities, racial or otherwise, would this project address?):

As established in Resolution 2021-0065, which Council passed unanimously in August 2021, the City of Spokane has a responsibility to promote housing stability, which is a mitigator of domestic violence and child abuse and neglect. This incentive is meant to promote much-needed housing development and other development projects that provide public benefit in Spokane.

Funding this project would allow individuals who have suffered economic hardship due to the pandemic to have an increase chance of being able to afford housing within the area by waiving permit fees.

### 2. General Description:

Reimbursement of permit fees to new owners of attainable housing 2022-2024 if the owners have a family income below 200% of AMI (under \$100K/year) and are first time home buyers. The reimbursement of fees will will reimburse the fees to the new owners upon proof of income eligibility, thus making it easier for them to afford the purchase.
