City of Spokane Community Wildfire Protection Plan — 2024 Update

District Overview

The City of Spokane includes diverse service areas:

- Commercial/Industrial: Heavy, medium, and light zones
- Residential: Mixed urban and suburban housing, including the downtown core and Browne's Addition
- Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI): Expanding suburban growth into wildland areas
- Key Institutions: Growing medical and academic sector

The Spokane Fire Department (SFD) is a professional, fully paid organization with **375.63 employees** (350 uniformed, 25.63 civilian). The Department operates **16 fire stations**, covering **69.46 square miles** and serving a population of **229,447**. Services include fire suppression, EMS, hazardous materials response, technical rescue, fire prevention, and mutual aid to surrounding districts.

Key Concerns

1. Population Growth & WUI Expansion

Since the 2014 CWPP, Spokane has grown by over **30,000 residents**, with more than **58,000 homes** now in the WUI or intermix zones. Another **10,000 homes** are projected in the next 5–10 years. This growth challenges fire response due to **infrastructure lag** and **increased emergency calls**.

2. High-Risk Land Parcels

Many properties within SFD's jurisdiction are considered **high-risk WUI**, ranging from fragmented residential lots to large public tracts:

- The Bluff (700 acres)
- Palisades Park and adjacent lands (1,000 acres)
- Beacon Hill (1,000 acres)

3. Outdoor Burning Restrictions

Most outdoor burning is banned within city limits. Exceptions include **small recreational fires** (under 3 feet in diameter and 2 feet in height) for cooking or ceremonial purposes on private property.

Mitigation and Outreach Efforts

- The City owns 11,500 acres of land; 4,200 acres of this is unimproved forest needing treatment.
- In 2021, Spokane adopted the 2018 Wildland Urban Interface Code (WUIC).
- A **full-time Wildland Resource Planner** was hired in **2022**, focusing on:
 - Fuel reduction





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- o Public education on **Home Ignition Zones**
- o City-wide wildfire outreach initiatives

The **Community Risk Reduction (CRR) team**, led by social work professionals, delivers **individualized**, **person-centered education** based on national standards (NFPA, FEMA, WA DNR), covering:

- Wildfire preparedness and evacuation planning
- Creation of defensible space
- Use of "To-Go" kits
- Community engagement via councils and local media

Grant Support

In **2022**, SFD received a **\$1.5 million Community Wildfire Defense Grant (CWDG)**, matched with \$375,000 in contributions from:

- Avista Utilities: \$125,000 over 5 years
- Conservation Futures: up to \$50,000
- City of Spokane: \$200,000 (offset by in-kind match from WA DNR)

Recent outcomes include:

- 730 acres treated (2023–2024): thinning, pruning, and slash disposal
- 609 acres planned for treatment (2024–2025)

Critical Infrastructure in WUI Areas

Numerous vital facilities lie within WUI zones, including:

- Wastewater treatment plants
- Water pumping stations and towers
- Community college campuses
- Over a dozen public schools
- High-voltage transmission corridors

Strategic Partnerships

SFD collaborates with a wide range of partners:

1. Spokane County Wildfire Mitigation Coalition (SCWMC)





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- o Formed in 2024
- Hosts monthly multi-agency coordination meetings
- o Supports hundreds of acres in collaborative fuel reduction

2. Washington Department of Natural Resources (WA DNR)

- Works on cross-boundary fuel treatments
- o Provides inmate crews, post-release crews, and wildland fire crews for labor

3. City Parks Department

- o Allows SFD to treat unimproved city-owned parklands
- o Enhances fuel reduction efforts on thousands of acres

4. Avista Utilities & BNSF Railway

o Joint fuel mitigation under/around powerlines and along high-risk railways

5. Department of Ecology (DoE) & Washington Conservation Corps (WCC)

- o Ecologically sensitive thinning in riparian areas
- Hand crews working under the CWDG grant

6. Riverside State Park

o Cross-agency planning for more effective land treatment on over **10,000 acres** of parkland
