VIVID DESCRIPTION:


The Community Assembly fulfils its purpose, achieves its goals, and stays true to its core values by its members engaging each other and the community with honest communication and having transparent actions in all of its dealings. Community Assembly representatives are knowledgeable and committed to serving their neighborhood and their city as liaisons and leaders.

The Community Assembly initiates and is actively involved early and often in the conception, adoption and implementation of local policy changes and projects. The administration and elected officials bring ideas to the Community Assembly in the forming stages for vetting, input and participation. The Community Assembly is a valuable partner to these officials and neighborhoods in creating quality policy & legislation for the common good.

The Community Assembly stimulates participation in civic life among our residents. Citizens that run for political office will believe in the importance of partnering with the Community Assembly and neighborhood councils. Those candidates' active participation and history with neighborhoods contributes to their success, enhancing successful partnerships between the Community Assembly and local government.

Presentation and decision-making process:

- 1. To speak at a meeting, a person must be recognized by the facilitator. Only one person can be recognized at a time. Each speaker has two minutes. When all who wish to speak have been allowed their time, the rotation may begin again.
- 2. When a proposal for action is made, open discussion shall occur before a motion is formed by the group.
- 3. Presentation timetable protocol
 - a) When a presenter has one minute left in the time allotted, the facilitator shall raise a yellow card and give a verbal notice.
 - b) Should any representative wish to extend the time of the presentation or comment/question period, they may make a motion to extend the time by five (5) minutes.
 - c) An immediate call shall be made for a show of hands in support of the extension of time. With a simple majority (50% plus 1) concurring, the time shall be reset by the amount of time requested.
 - d) Extensions shall be limited to two (2) or until a request fails to show a simple majority approval.
 - e) When the allotted time has expired, a red card and verbal notice shall be given.
 - f) As part of a final time extension request, the facilitator shall request a show of hands by the representatives to indicate which of the following actions the group wants to take:
 - o End discussion and move into forming the motion and voting,
 - o Further discussion.
 - o Table discussion with direction,
 - Request time to continue discussion at next CA meeting,
 - Request additional information from staff or CA committee, or
 - o Send back to the appropriate CA committee for additional work.

6. Updates/Announcements

<u>Fran:</u> Sharing announcements on behalf of Yvonne Trudeau with Parks Foundation. Grants go live Sept 15. The maximum amount was \$8k, it's been cut to \$6k. No single day events. It's for programs and capital projects. Deadline for applications is Nov30- a bit longer than in history.

- Applications from NCs continue to increase and Parks Foundation loves that! There is a great workshop at the Spokane Neighborhood Summit hosted by Amy Lutz on Grant writing 101.
- Kris: Urban Forestry committee met on Tuesday. There were two resignations and there are two spots open for volunteers right now. If you like trees, join them. This group meets once a month at the Finch Arboretum. Amber Ramierz with Urban Forestry reported recently on the \$6 million grant to city/conservation district. Grants now have a shadow over them- it appears that the administration will freeze them again. A new group called Friends of the Tree has been formed locally. They presented at last Urban Forestry meeting. Finch Tree Trot and Fall Leaf Festival needs volunteers- look on Urban Forestry page for more info. Working to hire one more person on seasonal urban forestry group. Nick Jeffries does a fantastic fuel reduction presentation. There are numerous projects still in the works for Fall. Urban Forestry also hired three interns part time. Two from Spokane County Conservation District and one from WSU
- <u>Luke-</u> P&P has been working year-round. If any committees have updates, please send them to Paul. Any edits will be compiled and voted on. Are there other volunteers that can help on this committee? Let Paul or Luke know. CA meeting is quite rigid- there are topics that would be beneficial to cover outside of this meeting. Is there any interest in an additional connection?
 - Bill- This is an alternate to an annual all-day retreat. This allows us to get into more details that we are able to at this meeting
 - o Krista- If there was a consistent meeting and time that would be helpful.
 - O Tyler- How would you choose the dates for this?
 - <u>Luke-</u> Admin has helped schedule in the past. Perhaps a poll or would be helpful to sync calendars.
 - o Mary-Consider the 5th Wednesday since CC/CD isn't using that day anymore.

AGENDA ITEMS:

7. City Council Update (Council President Wilkerson)

- Perhaps CA doesn't meet in Aug in 2026. Scheduled summer break?
- Climate Resiliency and Sustainability Board- amendment made "a qualified neighborhood council member". "Term is for three years". First reading Sept 15, final reading Sept 22.
- Response to H.O.M.E. ordinance. Chief Hall did a training bulletin for CP and provided resources. Luke will disseminate to all. Police share how this is impacting them.
- For school age kids, under the federal McKinney act, schools are required to support youth. If their family lives in a motel, campground, car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, there are resources available.
- Council meeting dates for 2026. Your council is supposed to be part-time. It is not. Working on survey to see what dates might work best for ongoing council meetings. It will come out early next week.
- Policies and procedures are tedious. Give Giacobbe or Chris Wright a call if you need assistance.
- Town Hall scheduled for District 3 on Monday, Sept 29 at 6pm at the West Central Community Center.
- The budget situation at City Hall is very real. The only thing left to cut is people and we don't want that. Loss of resources.
- Luis Garcia (Code Enforcement) says "the face of camping is changing. It's not tents, it's RVs now". Code Enforcement will need to work on this reality and what options are available.
- Questions
 - <u>Tyler:</u> Ongoing discussion about moving council dates from Monday. Why is this back again?

- <u>CP Wilkerson:</u> Monday is hard. Have we asked the community and ourselves is this the best day of the week? We want this decided before the election cycle. If the community says Monday is still the best date, then it is.
- Tyler: Word on the street is that the H.O.M.E. training bulletins were not circulated within police department until after the vote was taken.
- Gail: McKinney Vento comments- She drove a school bus for three years for these youth.
 Other than school bus drivers, there is another driving program called Hop-Jump-Skip.
 Like a personal Uber service but for these kiddos.
- Krista: About the budget, there is partially funded Capital projects on the list. Is this budget deficit why?
 - <u>CP Wilkerson -</u> no, it's grant funded. Those projects are timed to when the money comes in. There are also legality issues often with neighbors on these projects
 - Mary- This is given to us at Plan Commission too. Still going to find additional funding. They know it's not completely funded but still list the projects
- o Barbara Ann- why are the C.O.P.S. shops closing? Why was the Executive Director fired?
- Move to extend discussion by 5 minutes, first extension. Fran motioned; Christopher Savage seconded. Motion passes: 24- approve, 0- deny, 0- abstain.
 - o Fran- are we on a biennium budget? In the second year?
 - <u>CP Wilkerson</u> Yes and yes. Revenue is not coming in as projected. Adjusting budget for year two.

8. ONS Update (Heather Hamlin)

- So far this season, ONS and Streets have deployed 30 mobile speed feedback trailers for two week periods of time, and have 7 still to be deployed. The season will end on Oct 3 and a report including data collected will be shared with CA and Neighborhood Councils in November.
- 51 attendees have registered for the Spokane Neighborhood Summit to be held on Saturday, Oct 25 from 8 am 1:30 pm. Registration opened up last week and space is already 43% filled. If you or your neighbors are interested in attending, encourage them to register as soon as possible. Registration closes on Sunday, Oct 12. Don't miss out on the pre-Summit tour of the Spokane Police academy- scheduled for Wednesday, Oct 22 from 5:30 6:30 pm. More info on the flyer provided.
- The District 3 Town Hall will take place on Monday, Sept 29 at 6pm at the West Central Community Center. If your district 3 neighborhood council would like to table from 5:30 6pm, email Amber Groe by Sept 24.

9. Traffic Calming Projects Process (Jon Snyder, City of Spokane)

- <u>Jon:</u> Traffic Calming continues to grow. Here's the history
 - o 2009 red light camera revenue received
 - o 2011 first traffic calming cycle at City of Spokane
 - 2022 NCs would apply for projects. Nothing on arterials- just residential streets. 130+ projects added to list.
 - Changes from last year
 - State law changed
 - Traffic calming changed to Safe Streets for All
 - Federal grant received at end of 2023- \$9 million from federal and \$3 million from city.
 - Some existing projects from NC were included in these grant funded projects

- Transportation Commission was formed. It's not quite a year old. Council wanted
 Trans Comm to review projects and provide a full list for consideration.
- 27 x '27- Council said we need a safe system city-wide. We want safe connections between neighborhoods.
- Safety- 22 people died and over 100 serious injuries on our roadways. It's doubled in the past 10 years.
 - WA State numbers have been increasing too. For the first time in 8 years, the safety numbers went down at the state level

Timeline 2025

- Sept 17- Present large list of potential projects for Transportation Commission feedback.
 Public hearing that anyone can provide comments at. Show initial list, talk about how they are analyzing and hear public comment
- o Oct 7- Deadline for neighborhood councils to provide written comment
- Oct 15- Present narrowed, medium sized list for Transportation Commission feedback
- Nov 12- Final Transportation Commission hearing and vote. Final list will be forwarded to Council for action
- Nov 24- Council first reading
- o Dec 1- Council final reading and vote
- If the city can get this new list wrapped up in 2025, they'll get the best price for projects.
 Hoping to give them to the bid process in Fall so projects can get going in Spring.
- City plans to reevaluate this new process at the end to see what changes (if any) need to be made for the following year. This is a transition year.
- Attachments include list of projects. The word doc fleshes out the projects more. The timeline
 includes Abbey Martin's email address.
 - <u>Laura- If</u> there was a project on the list that did not get done, will it make it on the new list?
 - Jon- It could be. Only highest priority items were on list.
 - Andy-Can red light traffic camera catch me speeding away?
 - Jon- No for photo red it's only one direction.
 - <u>Carol-</u> Jon comes to Pedestrian, Transportation, and Traffic (PeTT) Committee. Thank you.
 What's going to sell my NC transportation projects?
 - Jon-Safety is number one. Connectivity is number two. Demographics is number three. Are we serving underserved communities? Has this NC received investments in the recent past?
 - Bill- Are you only considering projects on this list? We don't want some of these projects?
 - Jon- Happy to get feedback on new projects to put on the list. Please let Abbey Martin (ammartin@spokanecity.org) know. We built in a long lead time for this.
 - <u>Linda-</u> Programming of red lights. There are street derbies near her home. Sharp to Garland is a racing segment. Is it possible to reprogram some of the street lights to deter this?
 - Jon-Yes, it's something to look into. Police feel that red light traffic cameras don't deter racing. They hid their license plates, etc. Mayor wants to bring back Police Transportation Group.
 - O Anne- Should we push inexpensive or expensive projects through for my NC?
 - Jon-Advocate for the project that is important regardless of project price.
 - <u>CP Wilkerson-</u> There is one red light traffic engineer at the city of Spokane. Jon will elevate Linda Carroll's inquiry.

- Move to extend discussion by 5 minutes, first extension. Fran P. motioned; Christopher Savage seconded. Motion passes: 24- approve, 0- deny, 0- abstain.
- <u>Paul-</u> for this cycle under consideration, when will the budget constraints become apparent on these projects?
 - Jon- CM Zappone is trying to supersize the construction season to get these projects going. Additional revenue from red light cameras will assist with revenue (if vendor can provide)
- <u>Chris-</u> #27 Why is there no price or reduction in price.
 - Jon-Inga Note is not here tonight. When there is missing information it's because they
 are gathering details still. Hesitant to list a price that is misleading.
- <u>Fran-</u> All NCs need to look at this list. The number of projects is inequitable between the three districts. The goal is to balance the dollars between districts.
- <u>Dan-</u> Sept 17 meeting will be held at Council Chambers from 4-6pm. There is remote comment available as well!

10. Comp Plan Neighborhood Chapter Review (Mary Winkes)

- Mary: Bill, Stephanie, Linda, Laura, and Mary met three times to incorporate everyone's concerns.
 Read the redlining of changes. One whole section was suggested for deletion, but group added it back in.
 - <u>Carol-</u>likes the changes about neighborhood planning
- Paul- If the assembly takes an action to forward this, I have a follow up question after.
- Tyler- recused himself due to his conflicting role on the Plan Commission
- Move to send comp plan neighborhood chapter review revisions to city staff (Kevin and Spencer) as draft #3, Lorna motioned; Sara seconded. Motion passes: 24- approve, 0- deny, 1abstain.
 - Page 27- neighborhood facilities "we don't need to size specific on the buildings".
 - Mary and Linda- This was intentional. The original problem was that the thing that they thought needed to be defined was already defined in the glossary
 - CP Wilkerson Why did you put smaller in this sentence instead of no size?
 - <u>Linda-</u>Trying to distinguish between large public buildings and the smaller ones.
 - Mary- The ones that have not been defined in the neighborhood are like the community centers, senior centers.
 - <u>Laura-</u> Larger facilities were defined elsewhere. We didn't want smaller facilities overlooked.
- Paul- Deadline was involved. Why?
 - o Mary-Kevin is working on this first. His work is piling up. He wanted this done early so it didn't overlap with other work. Suggested we get this to him by October.
 - Paul- What do you expect the Planning Department's response to be? Comenting on it?
 Replying received? Agreeing to suggestion.
 - Mary-I can't speculate. There is no process for anyone giving comments beyond what their committees are doing right now.
 - <u>Luke-</u> Tirrell and/or Kevin may be joining CA next month or the month after to provide more information.

 - Paul- could be word smithed
 - Luke- we don't wordsmith at the table. Would need to kick it back to Committee.
 - o Tyler- members vs. nonmembers
 - Krista- participation is open to all. Voting is only open to members.
- Move to refer the Communication Committee's proposed policies and procedures to the neighborhood councils for review in order to prepare for a vote to approve at the October CA meeting, Dan motioned; Lorna seconded. Motion passes: 24- approve, 0- deny, 0- abstain.
- Move to nominate Sandra "Sandy" Wicht for the CA's reserved position on the Park Park's
 Development and Volunteer Citizen Advisory Committee (DV-CAC) and directs CA to
 communicate this action to the Park Board officials, Laura motioned; Debby seconded. Motion
 passes: 24- approve, 0- deny, 0- abstain.

12. CA Admin Nominations Committee (Tina Luerssen)

- <u>Tina-</u> Every year in Sept we form the Nominations Committee. Committee reviews attendance
 records to determines which reps are eligible. We reach out to all reps eligible to gauge interest
 and bring back names to October CA meeting. We vote in November and then they take their
 seats.
 - Eligibility- currently serving as CA rep or CA alt. Commit to serving one-year terms. Can be three consecutive terms. One year break then eligible again. Must have attended 6 CA meeting in the last two years. This
 - Nominations Committee to assist Tina
 - District 1- Tyler
 - District 2- Sandy
 - District 3- Dan
 - o Five positions on Admin committee. Only two are termed out.
 - o Fran- think about serving on this Admin committee. Interesting and you learn a lot.

13. CA Committee Updates

- BSN- <u>Tina-</u> Summit registration is open. Great info on website, excellent workshops. This year it will be held at Gonzaga University at Hemmingson Center. Free parking, including ADA parking. Volunteers needed: Andy, Angel (plus daughter), Stephanie volunteered. Summit is completely free and open to anyone in your neighborhood. Great knowledge to be shared. Please share with your neighbors!
 - <u>Tina-</u> preparing for 2025 good neighbor awards and ceremony. On the website, you can nominate folks for this award annually. Also accepting nominations for orgs or businesses within your neighborhood for this award. Jeanette Harris award too. Lifetime achievement award too. Nominate away! Those links will be coming from ONS and the due date is in November.
 - <u>Tyler-</u> would a school be eligible?
 - <u>Tina:</u> yes
 - If we get too many nominations from one neighborhood, those will be passed back to the NC to decide who should be spotlighted.

- Saturday, Dec 13 Good Neighbor Awards for nominees and those that nominated them attend.
- BSN working with CE Budget on funding. New needs have been identified. Certificates are nice, but maybe a tumbler gift would be better received.
- **Budget-** <u>Laura-</u> We want to spend the money as fast as we can so we can vote on the remaining pool of funds at the end of the year. Want to make the awards a tumbler instead this year. CA votes to order tumbler. Ask is \$1500. We want to order immediately.
 - o Receipt deadline for CE grants is September 22 at 8am
 - Debby- How much is really left? We were informed of \$2900 in July.
 - Laura- could be more. Being conservative with the \$1500 ask.
 - Move to approve \$1500 in CE grant funds for purchase of tumblers, Luke motioned;
 Debbie seconded. Motion passes: Roll Call Vote 22- approve, 0- deny, 2- abstain.
- Comms-Krista & Shawn-They will bring NCs together to act collectively. This idea of an annual report through CA is a calling card. This is what City Council will see. It's an ask from all 29 neighborhood councils. This idea is pulled from the ONS annual report. "That's great but we want the credit". We want photos, stories, statistics to drive attendance. Our question to you "is this something that we all support?" Is this something that you will promote to your council? Can we count on you getting this material into our hands by early January 2026.
 - Kris- We would even take a copy of the CE grant, photos from NC meetings, anything with hard number or record keeping.

 - <u>Krista-</u> End project will be a static report. Not sure how to view/share videos. Refining acceptance criteria as we go. The tagline is "what's your win".

WHAT IS PROPOSED?


Spokane Public Schools (SPS) and Spokane Parks and Recreation (Parks) have joined a range of community partners to present this shared vision for the future of our city's parks, schools, and neighborhoods.

Spokane is experiencing historic participation in youth activities, adult recreation, and community programs. At the same time, many school buildings and park facilities are aging and need upgrades to function well and sustain increasing demand.

Working together, we're proposing a plan to improve parks and schools in every neighborhood to address the top needs we've heard from the community.

Together Spokane proposes two separate ballot measures – a parks levy and a school bond – that align to accomplish more than 200 projects across our community.

If both measures pass, we will complete 30+ additional projects that neither entity could have accomplished alone.



Projects

WHAT WILL IT COST?

The proposed Parks ballot measure is a \$240 million 20-year levy, while the proposed SPS bond measure is a \$200 million construction plan that would be paid off over 20 years.

The cost of both initiatives combined is 29 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value in the first year with an average increase of between 2%-3% per year calculated through 2030.

Homeowners can calculate the monthly increase to their tax bill at TogetherSpokane.org/Cost.

HOW CAN WE DO MORE TOGETHER?

If Parks and SPS were to do government as usual – in our silos with nonaligned ballot measures – we could achieve around 170 projects citywide for a taxpayer cost of 31 cents per \$1,000 of assessed home value.

Together, we can accomplish more than 30 additional projects with fewer tax dollars – a local property tax rate of 29 cents per \$1,000 of assessed home value in the first year.

This is made possible by:

- Coordinating facilities and programming for more access
- Joint funding and land use for efficient development
- Attracting more project partners to contribute private funds

As of July 2025, private partners have committed about \$11 million to infrastructure and/or programming for one or more projects. Find a list at TogetherSpokane.org/Partnerships.

WHAT'S THE TIMELINE?

Spokane voters will consider separate but aligned ballot measures as part of a November 4, 2025 ballot.

If both initiatives pass, major joint projects and schools projects would break ground within the first 5 years, while Parks projects would be completed over 20 years.



Communications Committee Policies and Procedures

October 2025

Mission Charge:

Serve as an information conduit to the residents, organizations and businesses of the city of Spokane to share and amplify the work of the Community Assembly and neighborhood councils as they address citywide neighborhood issues

Membership and Attendance:

- In addition to representatives of neighborhood councils, committee participation and membership shall be open to all interested Spokane residents and representatives of agencies, businesses, government, organizations and property owners.
- Attendance records will be kept in order to establish membership status for the purpose of official voting.
- Membership status is defined as recorded attendance at a majority of committee meetings during the previous six months.

Voting and Quorum:

- The committee will operate by consensus for its publicity work.
- A minimum representation of committee members from three separate neighborhood councils will constitute a quorum for the purpose of voting on a recommendation to the Community Assembly.
- A quorum being present, the text for an official committee recommendation to the Community
 Assembly will be formulated and agreed to by a majority consensus of all those attending a
 meeting before the chair proceeds to a vote.
- Once the text for a recommendation is determined, it is put to a vote of those individuals in attendance who represent neighborhood councils. A majority vote passes the recommendation; a tie vote fails. The number of yeas and nays will be included with the text that is passed.

Officers and Terms:

Chair, Vice-Chair, and Secretary
Calendar year term with elections in September.

Meeting Schedule:

2nd Monday of each month from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm in person. Additional meetings may be called as necessary.

Reports:

The committee's chair will report once per quarter, or more often, to the Community Assembly.

Advance Notice – 2026 CDBG Funding and Approved \$400K CA Set-Aside (From the CA/CD Committee)

Beginning approximately in mid-November, the CHHS Department will open the Request For Proposal (RFP) phase that enables Neighborhoods to request CDBG Funding for qualifying capital improvement projects. For 2026, the uses will not be limited to parks. A general list of qualifying projects is below.

One significant difference between 2026 and last year is that the Neighborhoods will need to "partner" with an established, experienced non-profit organization. *Details of that partnership will be forthcoming soon*, but identifying contractors and managing the project itself will fall to the non-profit/Neighborhood partnership. However, original ideas will ultimately come from the Neighborhood Councils.

Completed responses to the RFP are due January 15, 2026, and will be scored by the Affordable Housing Committee of the CHHS Board as before. Their recommendation is sent to the CHHS Board which reviews it and sends a formal recommendation to the City Council.

The CHHS Department will provide technical assistance to the Neighborhoods throughout this process, like last year. *This includes an early ruling as to whether or not a given idea actually qualifies for a CDBG award*. The CA/CD Committee will provide overview and general suggestions for filing the grant request form, after a general "go ahead" is given by the CHHS Department.

Neighborhoods must also assign one individual who will become the "CDBG contact person" for proposed projects. Neither the CHHS Department nor the CA/CD Committee will give advice and direction to multiple people from one neighborhood.

Neighborhoods should begin thinking about projects that might qualify. The "Service Area" must be low-income as determined geographically by HUD census guidelines, OR the project must serve a "limited clientele" that meets low-income requirements, even if the building is in a neighborhood that does not qualify.

The required "partnership" might be with the owners or managers of a qualifying facility, if they are an experienced non-profit organization willing to share in administrative responsibilities throughout the project.












TEN MOST FREQUENT DOMESTIC VIOLENCE OFFENSES - 2025


















PEDESTRIAN INTERFERENCE CITATIONS - JANUARY THROUGH AUGUST



TRAFFIC CITATIONS AND INFRACTIONS JANUARY 2022 THROUGH AUGUST 2025




SERIOUS COLLISIONS - JANUARY THROUGH AUGUST

FATAL COLLISIONS - JANUARY THROUGH AUGUST



Pedestrian, Traffic and Transportation (PeTT) CA Meeting 9/23/25 at 6:00pm on Zoom

Attendance: Carol Tomsic-Chair-Lincoln Heights, Rod Moore-Riverside, Chuck Carter-Manito/Cannon Hill, Charles Hansen-Whitman, David Eagle-Chief Garry Park, Gene Brake-Emmerson Garfield, Cliff Winger-Shiloh Hills and Transportation Commission, Colin Quinn-Hurst-City of Spokane, Drew Redmond-STA.

The meeting is called to order by Carol Tomsic.

Colin Quinn-Hurst-Senior Planner, City of Spokane. Division Street Transit Oriented Development Project. cquinnhurst@spokanecity.org Colin introduced the updated planning process for the Division Street Transit Oriented Development Project once the North Spokane Corridor freeway is completed. Update to where they are at and what is coming next, including several community engagement meetings with first Wednesday 10/22 at Wonder Building from 5-8pm. This project started in 2024 with community surveys and workshops to imagine Division Street differently. Concurrent planning project partners with Division Connects, Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Framework Study, Housing Action Plan, Shaping Spokane, City of Spokane Zoning Code, and Spokane County Code and Ordinances and Comprehensive Plan. STA has been instrumental with future bus transit planning and could include transit lanes and light rail. What is going on behind the curb is that when the transit centers open, we are ready as a community to invest. Land use that supports transit, transit-oriented development including mixed use and residential at the transit center with all cluster services. This would develop a corridor wide vision, node-specific economic analysis, provide transit-oriented land use recommendations and tasks to enhance connectivity and multimodal infrastructure, establish a development policy framework, integrate community needs and desires, and provide implementation roadmap. Development interviews to discover the available land and zoning requirements at each node. How to enhance connectivity with current transit to these streets to get to the station without having to drive. How to integrate a policy framework into comprehensive plan. Feedback and community comments are key to this process. Looking especially at public-private opportunities. It's a tough sell to imagine Division without all that traffic but there will be a significant amount of traffic loss on Division once the North South Corridor opens. It will fill back up if we don't make a change while there is capacity. Examples of early days of Northtown Mall when it was more open air and walkable. Similar now to Kendall Yards, Monroe and Garland with future potential near Rowan. Explained DivisionConnects study and selection matrix areas including eleven projected nodes. The south couplet near Gonzaga, north couplet, Garfield Empire, Northtown, Rowan, Francis, Lincoln/Cascade, the Y, Whitworth, Mead and Northgate. The county feedback recommends moving from the Y node to the new Meadworks project. Each node will include a scoring scale based on housing density, range of landowners, education, major employers and transportation. Carol noted that the nodes are interesting and encouraged more neighborhood comments. Gene asked if they were still taking input about nodes. Colin said to look at the existing conditions report on the website discussing information about current vacant lots and opportunities. He added the North Monroe project is a great example of visualizing what it could look like where negative comments went away after the project was completed. Carol asked if the corridor is delayed, will the planning continue and that having buses on Division is needed. Drew said a phased approach will start in 2028. Carol talked about the limited crosswalks on Division as a significant safety issue. David Eagle commented that since Division is a state highway, not all intersections are crosswalks. Colin confirmed they are working on crosswalk improvements on Division and it's a high priority to improve crosswalks near transit stops.

Adaptive Design Conversation- Carol announced that Jeff Mergler is traveling and won't be present tonight. She previously reminded us to look at the Traffic Calming Project Selection list and make changes or comments by the next Transportation Commission meeting 10/7/25.

Agency Updates- Drew Redman- STA. The September service changes started last weekend. More service in the Perry District and route changes into Liberty Lake. New double-decker buses are now in service to Cheney and go downtown to the University District. The 2026 draft preliminary service revisions are in progress and STA will be doing outreach next month and November. Next month a low-income fare will be introduced. Transit ambassadors are in bright green shirts on the buses now. The Week Without Driving Challenge is 9/29 through 10/5. You're entered to win a 31-day bus pass and STA gift bag every time you tap a registered Connect card or scan an eConnect QR code at the fare box. Carol commented about construction rerouting bus 35 coming further up Ray and the Southside Community center likes it as well.

Cliff Winger-Transportation Commission. His reports to the CA monthly with his comments and links and encouraged PeTT's to get copies. He sent out a notice regarding traffic calming and Safe Streets for All to the 29 neighborhood councils to get comments in writing by 10/7 or come to the Transportation Commission meeting 10/15 and make a public comment. Go to Transportation Commission website for projects. Look for comments from the 9/17 meeting on projects and summaries. Disadvantaged neighborhoods can get priority from traffic calming cameras. Check with Jon Snyder or Abbey Martin if you have questions on your projects. It was said some critical intersections should be communicated by PeTT's for projects not on the list. Carol will follow up with Cliff for specifics of these very unsafe intersections. Go back to your neighborhood councils to look at this list and make sure your needed projects are included.

Hearing: Traffic Calming Project Select for Cycle 14 (2027)

Summary of this hearing was submitted to the 29 neighborhoods.

Most Important: this program is transitioning from a 29 neighborhood traffic-calming initiative to a comprehensive city-wide safety program.

The new priorities will focus on "Safe Streets for All" and will emphasize traffic safety by considering: the reduction of deaths and injuries, enhancing safety for ALL users, incorporating diverse demographics, improving connectivity, utilizing adaptive designs, and eliminating neighborhood identification from the project. The City Council may mandate equal funding allocations for each City Council District.

Spokane Parks Foundation Grant Award Criteria (<u>www.spokaneparksfoundation.org/grants</u>) Please carefully review all of the following information to determine eligibility prior to submitting your grant application.

The Spokane Parks Foundation provides resources for vibrant, healthy and accessible park projects and outdoor recreation programs that take place in parks throughout Spokane County. Priority will be given to applications for park projects or programs that:

- increase park and recreation services to underserved areas or populations
- promote and provide inclusivity and accessibility for all individuals
- offer long-term significant benefits to the community
- enhance the quality of parks and quality of life for the community
- are from a private or non-profit organization or community group
- have not received prior funding from the Spokane Parks Foundation
- demonstrate active and committed community involvement
- demonstrate collaboration with other community funding

Grants must be used within a twelve (12) month period of time unless an extension is requested and approved.

Spokane Parks Foundation will not consider funding requests for the following projects or activities:

- routine maintenance
- events or festivals
- administration, salaries and operations
- debt retirement
- lobbying activities
- conferences, workshops, symposia
- endowments
- individuals
- programs with religious content
- replacement of lost/expired government funding

Grant are made to eligible organizations that meet one of the following criterion:

- tax-exempt under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3)
- a recognized Native American Tribe

- a public agency
- an unincorporated group or organization that has a 501(c)(3) fiscal sponsor
