

## **GREENING NEIGHBORHOODS – GRANT PROGRAM & GUIDELINES**

PROGRAM OVERVIEW	The Greening Neighborhoods Grant Program is part of the Forest Spokane Initiative. The Initiatives goals include planting 10,000 trees, perennial native vegetation and remove/reduce impervious surfaces.
	The Greening Neighborhoods Grant Program allows neighborhoods and other community organizations to work together to actively increase green infrastructure in Spokane's neighborhoods by applying for funding for street trees and/or other green perennial native vegetation. This grant is not to be used for anything other than street trees and/or perennial vegetation.
	The grant is open to neighborhoods, businesses, non-profits, schools, churchesetc. It is encouraged that multiple agencies work together to create successful projects and/or leverage funding. All grant applications need to be accompanied by a signature from the Neighborhood Council on the original application. All projects must occur on public right-of-way property, they must be maintained by the adjacent property owner(s), and be coordinated and approved by the appropriate neighborhood before submitting your application.
	<b>Trees:</b> Projects that plant trees will be given priority for approval. All tree applications must be scoped and approved by the Urban Forestry Department and the Project Coordinator. Planting location(s) and quantity will be determined by a Certified Arborist prior to application approval.
	Approved tree projects will have the option to coordinate a planting event with volunteers or the trees may be planted by the Urban Forestry Department.
	Combination applications that include vegetation and trees will require that the vegetation be planted by the group applying for the funding and the planting will be coordinated through a volunteer event.
	<b>Perennial vegetation:</b> Projects that aim to plant vegetation are to be community volunteer events. The applicant is solely responsible for coordinating the event with volunteers and the Forest Spokane Project Coordinator for plant selection and delivery. Events should be coordinated during the planting season, see timeline for details.

PROGRAM PURPOSE	The purpose of this grant program is to encourage the planting of trees and/or other native vegetation, such as, low shrubs, grasses and other perennial plants on public right-of-way property as part of the goals for the Forest Spokane Initiative to mitigate stormwater.				
FUNDING	<ul> <li>Neighborhood councils may submit up to 3 grant applications. Each grant application may not exceed the value of \$5,000 each. All applications will be graded against the Competitive Grant Criteria, provided below. Approval of al applications is at the discretion of the Project Coordinator.</li> <li>Applicants who apply to plant trees will be given priority for approval.</li> </ul>

The Agreement is a contract between the applicant and the City of Spokane that gives permission to the applicant to plant and maintain trees and/or vegetation that is being applied for.	
	<i>Greening Grant Application:</i> Identify optional planting locations and begin scoping your grant project include all project information within the grant application. Applications that aim to plant trees need to be coordinated with the Forest Spokane Project Coordinator. For all tree projects Urban Forestry will provide a scope for your	
PROCEDURES	Open application timeframe. Meet with the Project Coordinator for project and location scoping and approval. Prior to the June 30th deadline each of the following forms need to be signed and returned.	
TIMELINE & GRANT	<u>March 1, 2015 – June 30, 2015</u>	
	<b>Vegetation Projects:</b> Projects that aim to plant vegetation must provide all species names and quantities that you are applying for. All vegetation included in the application must be perennial. Contact the project coordinator if you have further questions regarding selection. Or visit the <u>Forest Spokane Initiative</u> page to find a list of suggested vegetation found under the Related Documents listing.	
	<b>Trees Projects:</b> All grants that include street trees need to be approved by the Urban Forestry Department prior to grant approval. The tree species are determined by each location and nursery availability. All street trees are chosen from the approved street tree list. <u>Please click here</u> to view the approved street tree list.	
	The Project Coordinator must obtain an original copy of the Grant and Maintenance Agreement with signatures from the applicant, the neighborhood and the City of Spokane before the planting event(s) occur. In addition, those that agree to care and maintain the tree(s) by means of watering and weeding need to sign and return the Waiver Release & Liability form to the Project Coordinator prior to planting.

	<i>Waiver &amp; Release of Liability:</i> All adjacent property owner(s) and/or entities who have agreed to care for the new trees/vegetation by means of watering and weeding must sign and return a Waiver & Release of Liability form.			
	The Waiver & Release of Liability form is also used during planting events as a Volunteer Waiver Form. All volunteers must sign and return the form prior to participating in the event.

OTHER REQUIREMENTS/CONSIDE RATIONS	• A water or watering source for the new plantings must be available and included in the Grant & Maintenance Agreement.			
	• Applicants are required to involve property owners in order to provide volunteer manpower in the planting, care and maintenance of the perennial vegetation.

	Applicants are required to involve property owners for permission to
	plant and commitment to care by agreeing to maintain newly planted tree(s) in a reasonable condition by watering them and by maintaining the area around the trees in reasonable condition by weeding them.
	<ul> <li>Species selection, size and quantity of tree(s) require approval by a Certified Arborist from the City of Spokane's Urban Forestry Department for public right-of-way property. The applicant is not required to get approval before applying; the Project Coordinator will arrange for the review upon submission of the application.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Projects that aim to plant trees will be given priority for approval.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>All plantings must account for required vehicular clearance recovery and unobstructed vehicle lines of sight when applicable.</li> </ul>
	• Awardees will be required to sign a Grant & Maintenance Agreement with the City of Spokane, agreeing to maintain tree(s) and vegetation in a reasonable condition by watering and maintaining the area around the tree/vegetation.
	<ul> <li>All plantings because they are required to be on public right-of-way property will require technical review and coordination with necessary city departments for approval of use.</li> </ul>
	• This application is open to other organizations to apply (organizations include but are not limited to, churches, schools, community centers, non-profitsetc) applying for this grant must work with and obtain signatures from their neighborhood council in order to get approved for funding.
