CITY OF SPOKANE




Mayor is Executive authority - responsible for operations and implementing policy




City Council is Legislative authority - responsible for financial oversight and law/policy making.


- Divided into **3 districts with two council members per district**; a Council President is elected city-wide
- Council President does not supervise other Council members (just Council staff outside the legislative aides)
- Each councilmember has a **legislative aide/assistant who helps** (scheduling, correspondence, research)



 wants and needs




NEIGHBORHOOD COUNCILS

Each neighborhood has a council made up of people who live in, own property in, or operate a business within the neighborhood boundaries.

• The council's role is:

- o To advise the city on policy as relates to their neighborhood
- Traffic calming, developments, police presence, etc.
- Create a sense of community for its members
- Educate its members
- Who to talk about an issue, how various city systems work
- Miscellaneous
- Historic district designation, signage, etc.
