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SESSION 1

<u>Together We Are Stronger – How to unify the neighborhood councils in your district</u>

The ONES is a loosely formed group that's anchored in Northeast Spokane, but covers all of District One. ONES stands for Organizations for north east Spokane and it was formed to support community development in north east Spokane. Over the years, it grew to cover all of district 1 which now includes Riverside/ downtown.

Each neighborhood council in district 1 has a representative on the ONES, it's typically the chair of the neighborhood council, but it can be someone else.

The ONES maintain a 501C3 designation in good standing with the IRS and is beginning to act as the fiscal sponsor for neighborhood activities – most notably the Hillyard Parade which found itself without a 501C3. It has also acted as the fiscal sponsor for a smaller grant applicant.

We meet once a month and talk about what's going on in the different neighborhood councils in the district, how we perhaps can help, and we share resources and information with one another. Earlier this year, we went to a city council meeting together to testify about the state of many sidewalks and how we support a new system where the city pays for the restoration of sidewalks.

This workshop will share how the ONES works and also how a similar organization may be a good idea for your district.

Hot-Button Issues: How to Parlay Pique into Positive Participation

Facilitated by a present and a past neighborhood council chair, this workshop would draw on Emerson Garfield Neighborhood Councils' case studies with North Monroe updated and, much more recently, the Mansfield "Grocery," where neighbors focused on a single controversial issue and singly attended the neighborhood council (many for the first time) because of it. Facilitators will guide you through their approach on how they helped thes passionate participants become more involved in a productive or collaborative way.

The workshop would address topics like managing expectations and public-facing messaging as well as the council's role as a provider of resources (e.g., knowledge of protocols, City structure) and as a grassroots-City intermediary.
