I attended Roll Call and observed as they impressively debriefed previous incidents as well as other expectations. I spent nearly six hours with Officer Chappell, and I found him to be

courteous, professional, and competent in his work. This shift was largely encompassed by a "shots fired" call for service, and we maintained a perimeter position while occupants of an apartment were questioned. Due to the nature of the call, a search warrant was written, requested, and received and officers were able to follow through on those investigative steps. I remained outside while the search was conducted, but Officer Chappell took his time to explain each aspect of what they were doing as it went along. After this call, Officer Chappell followed up on an investigation that he had started on a previous shift. This included several investigative steps in order to identify a person of interest as well as identify and work with a family member of the victim who lived in another state. Officer Chappell impressively handled these sensitive situations while on scene and provided significant attention to investigation and follow up. He did his best to educate me on his thought process prior to arriving at a call and how he confirmed facts from individuals. Officer Chappell's assessments and due care to follow-up investigation is laudatory and he will make an exceptional Detective when the opportunity presents itself.

We have noticed a very positive increase in officer interaction between our volunteers and your team since the inception of the new sector deployment. We had an incident last night and I wanted to provide my appreciation particularly to **Officer [Adam] Anderson** who showed tremendous initiative and compassion. On Wednesday night, a 17-year-old male walked into the COPS NW Shop and requested mental health help. He said a mental health professional from the SPD had helped him "a couple of nights ago" and he was again in need of assistance. He said he was suffering from deep depression after he was tossed from his home by his foster father, had been dumped by his girlfriend and had several other issues going on too numerous to mention here. We called Crime Check and put the call in for assignment (as there was quite a bit going on in the sector). When the call came up on his computer, Officer Anderson (who was in the back room eating dinner), immediately came out front and spoke to the young man. He arranged for an SPD mental health professional to come from the South Hill to speak with him. Then the officer took the young man back home presumably to intervene with his foster father and determine if it was safe for him to stay there. I was impressed with this officer. The compassion he showed to the young man was above and beyond.

Several of your officers arrived and worked very collaboratively with our staff to get the patient cared for in the safest, most effective manner possible given the circumstances. Our staff could not say enough nice things about the assistance that we received, and about the manner in which your staff stood by to help, should there been a need to do so. This kind of collaboration relationship is exactly what we are working to develop with the police, EMS, and the other mental health agencies in the area, in an effort to provide the best care we can for this group of patients.
