

Deadly Force (Officer-Involved Shootings) Update

2025

From January 1 – July 31, 2025, there were two deadly force incidents.

- Incident 2025-20016302 (Pending Prosecutor Review): Incident 2025-20016302 took place on January 24, 2025, in the 200 block of East Sanson. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The case is with the prosecutor.
- Incident 2025-20027128 (Pending Criminal Investigation): Incident 2025-20027128 took place on February 9, 2025, in the 3300 block of East 11th Ave. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) is conducting the criminal investigation.

2024

From January 1 – December 31, 2024, there were six deadly force incidents.

- Incident 2024-20019659 (Pending Administrative Investigation): Incident 2024-20019659 took place on January 31, 2024, near Stevens and Cliff. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The prosecutor ruled the use of deadly force was justified. Internal Affairs will conduct an administrative investigation.
- Incident 2024-20027093 (Pending Prosecutor Review): Incident 2024-20027093 took place on February 12, 2024, in the 1100 block of East Wellesley. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The case is with the prosecutor.
- Incident 2024-20027307 (Pending Administrative Investigation): Incident 2024-20027307 took place on February 12, 2024, near Howard and Riverside. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The prosecutor ruled the use of deadly force was justified. Internal Affairs will conduct an administrative investigation.
- Incident 2024-20060204 (Pending Administrative Investigation): Incident 2024-20060204 took place on March 31, 2024, in the 1800 block of West Dean. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The prosecutor ruled the use of deadly force was justified. Internal Affairs will conduct an administrative investigation.
- Incident 2024-20073072 (Pending Criminal Investigation): Incident 2024-20073072 took place on April 18, 2024, in the 2000 block of W Longfellow. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) is conducting the criminal investigation.
- Incident 2024-20267061 (Pending Prosecutor Review): Incident 2024-20267061 took place on December 29, 2024, in the 800 block of W Cora. The Spokane Independent Investigative Response (SIIR) conducted the criminal investigation. The case is with the prosecutor.

2023

From January 1 – December 31, 2023, there were two deadly force incidents.

Precinct Updates

Adam Sector (Northwest)

Special Enforcement Missions:

- The Northwest had a spike in residential and garage burglaries in September. Leadership created a hot spot for proactive policing at Lincoln/Maxwell in response.
- The Precinct created hot spots at Northwest schools for the first week of school with an emphasis on traffic control and student safety.
- The HOT Team will be checking on some unlawful camping that is taking place at Clark Park.



Outreach:

Lt. Braun continues to conduct outreach at Garfield and Indian Trail elementary schools and visited the first week of school. Sergeant Brannon met with the principals at Salk, Glover, and Flett middle schools.

Baker Sector (Northeast)

Recent News: SPD Special Investigations Unit (SIU) search warrant uncovers large quantity of drugs, cash, guns, and explosives

Recently, members of the Special Investigations (SIU) served a search warrant in the 2600 block of North Freya. The search warrant yielded a large quantity of drugs, money, firearms, and explosives. The explosives were found to be a foreign military hand grenade, a training bomblet that was once part of a cluster bomb and a modified firework. Due to the presence of the explosive material, members of the Explosive Ordinance Disposal Unit (EDU) responded to safely remove the explosive items. EDU later rendered the items safe at a separate location.



At the completion of serving the warrant, the following was taken into evidence:



- \$255,000.00 in cash
- 63 firearms, 3 of which were stolen
- 1 pound of fentanyl powder
- Approximately 5 pounds methamphetamine

Charlie Sector (South)

Captain Jensen is coordinating Officer interviews for the gun violence research project being conducted by the National Institute for Criminal Justice Reform.

Captain Jake Jensen and his staff have been involved in neighborhood outreach. Officers attended neighborhood council meetings with Rockwood, Cliff/Cannon, Grandview/Thorpe, and South Perry Business District. They also met with Providence Health.

Special Enforcement Mission: Parks Patrol Emphasis

Areas of concentration: All city parks and natural areas in the South Precinct.

Goals: Education, Community Caretaking, Compliance with Park Laws, Compliance with Unauthorized Camping Laws, Reduction of Crime in the Area, Improvement of Quality of Life for Surrounding Neighbors. Tactics: Graveyard teams will patrol parks after hours. Mid shift teams will drive through Parks with issues to ensure no gatherings are starting to take place after hours. Officers are taking enforcement action on park hours – the hours of closure are 10 pm to 6 am (SMC 12.06A.040). Officers continue to experience issues with teens partying at various areas of our city. Most recently, we had a shooting in the area of 57th and Hatch where numerous teens had been partying and two subjects were shot. Officers are on the lookout for large teen gatherings at parks or public lookout areas.

"H.O.M.E. Starts Here" Implementation

Areas of concentration: The following areas have been identified as having unauthorized camping issues: LCHS area, Sunset Bridge area, Spokane River areas, Ben Burr Trail/Liberty Park, Chief Garry Park, Underhill Park, and I-90 corridor in East Central.

Goal: Engage, educate, and help navigate individuals camping or obstructing access to public property to appropriate resources through an engagement-first and enforcement-second model. The City Council expects a thorough review of the implementation of this ordinance and expects to receive a report and briefing from administration staff at the Public Safety and Community Health Committee following ninety days of implementation.

David Sector (Downtown)

Recent News: Downtown arson suspect is in custody

In the early morning hours of August 21st, 2025, SPD patrol officers responded to a series of fires in the downtown corridor. Three separate properties located in the 400 block of West Main, 400 block of West Riverside and the 300 block of West Spokane Falls Boulevard were damaged by intentionally set fires. Patrol officers worked diligently to secure evidence and were able to identify a person of interest. On August 22nd, Major Crimes Unit Detectives (MCU) were able to secure the needed video footage from

surrounding businesses and arrested Troy A. Silk (45) for 3 counts of 2nd Degree Arson. Silk was already in custody at the Spokane County Jail at the time of his arrest for unrelated crimes. The suspect in the string of arsons set in the Downtown area on August 21 remains in custody after the courts issued a \$50,000.00 bond after first appearance.

Wellness Training

SPD began Struggle Well training in September 2025. SPD has chosen Boulder Crest Foundation's Struggle Well program for officer mental health support and posttraumatic growth curriculum. Struggle Well is a prevention-focused program based on the science of Posttraumatic Growth designed for first responders.

It is a training that addresses mental health issues like posttraumatic stress, depression, and anxiety, and it provides tools for making struggles into strengths. The PTSD Foundation partners with Boulder Crest, as does UCF RESTORES, a nationally acclaimed nonprofit clinical research center focused on trauma recovery. Boulder Crest is a nationally recognized charity organization known for developing and delivering Posttraumatic Growth-based curriculum and programs that enable participants to thrive after trauma through research-supported, evidence-based methods. In a study of Boulder Crest's Warrior PATHH posttraumatic growth program, graduates reported 58% reduction in PTSD symptoms. https://bouldercrest.org/



Boulder Creek Foundation states that their posttraumatic growth "training programs teach our participants how to make peace with their past, live in the present, and begin planning for their future." Healing from trauma can look different for everyone, but in many cases, people dealing with trauma feel isolated from others and struggle with feeling connected with their loved ones and team members. They often turn to unhealthy things to cope with trauma. They may feel broken and ashamed that they are struggling.

Struggle Well is about building an environment of trust and connection in which people feel safe to heal through the five parts of posttraumatic growth. Education, learning about the painful and normal impacts of trauma, reduces fear and shame. Regulation is learning wellness practices that promote calm and clarity, that help people regain control of their lives. Disclosure is being able to process the trauma. Story is being able to

find a fresh perspective to start a new chapter after trauma. Service is about finding courage to help others and give back. Struggle Well also teaches about five domains where growth can occur: new possibilities (embracing hope); deeper relationships (good relationships are critically important when you are struggling); personal strength; appreciation for life (i.e., gratitude and knowing what's important); and spiritual and existential change.

Senior staff leadership took the class in September. SPD received grant funding from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission to provide three more classes for officers and professional staff.



Congratulations to our new Graduates

Congratulations to our eight officers who graduated from the Washington State Criminal Justice Training Commission's Basic Law Enforcement Academy (BLEA) on September 9, 2025. Class #918 will now undergo post Academy instruction before starting the Field Instructor Training phase.



"Know Your Limits" Education Campaign

SPD is increasing awareness about DUIs. The Spokane Police Department partnered up with the Greater Spokane Substance Abuse Council for the "Know Your Limits" program.

In recent weeks, the traffic unit's DUI officers have been visiting multiple bars and restaurants with breathalyzers, educating people about how impairment can affect them and the safety of drinking responsibly. T Officers asked people if they knew how impaired they were. People who volunteered guessed their blood alcohol level, and then blew into a breathalyzer to find out if they were above the legal limit to drive.

Chess with a Cop

SPD is starting a new youth outreach program called Chess with a Cop. Sponsored by the Spokane Police Foundation, the program is a partnership with the Greater Spokane Chess League. We will be using public libraries throughout different neighborhoods within our community.


