I agree that the force used by Officer Spolski and C Johnson was reasonable and within policy. The suspect, Larry Walton had attempted to elude/evade the officers on his bike. Officers also indicated he reached in his pocket and was non compliant at time of arrest. The take down was a minimal use of force. The injury to his face/eye could have been caused from hitting a variety of items during the take down or prone cuffing. The officers and Cpl. Spiering did not view this as a use of force incident requiring a supervisor to respond. This was not done with any intent or malice but ignorance of the policy. Sergeant McNab has counseled Cpl. Spiering and he has gone over the policy with him. As stated by Sgt. McNab he is new to his corporal position and duties. I agree with Sgt. McNab's recommendation that his counseling should be enough to address this policy issue with Cpl. Spiering and nothing further is needed. I will also direct Sgt. Incident Being Investigated 14-378749 Use of force-Injury

#### **Officer Interview Summary**

After this incident occurred none of the officers attempted to notify a supervisor because none of them recognized it as a use of force where supervisor notification was required. This was discovered by Sergeant Boothe when he reviewed Officer Spolski's report. Corporal Spiering had responded to the scene and photographed Walton's injuries. I spoke to Corporal Spiering about the issue the next day. He advised that he was the highest ranking officer at the scene and failed to recognize the circumstances as a use of force requiring supervisor notification per SPD policy 300.5.1(a. visible injury other than minor marks from prone cuffing). Corporal Spiering understands his mistake and has since reviewed the policy. He has said to me that since he was the highest ranking officer on scene, he takes full responsibility for the error.

Officer Spolski's report does not identify what caused the cut above Walton's eye. When asked about this Officer Spolski advised that he does not know what caused the injury. He advised that the physical altercation with Walton was a matter of seconds and his primary concern was that he was accessing a weapon and had his attention focused on Walton's hands. Any number of things could have caused the injury including the ground or Walton's bike.

Officer Johnson stated in his report that Walton's bike bumped into Spolski's door. He advised when he and Spolski took him to the ground Walton fell onto the bike but he did not see what caused the cut to Walton's eye. He added that it would have been unlikely that Walton's head would have hit the vehicle door because when they took him to the ground it was away from the car door.

### Suspect Interview Summary

I was not on-duty when this incident occurred and was not able to speak to the male suspect, Larry Walton, until the following shift. Walton was still in jail when I was made aware of the incident. I contacted him on 11/10/14 around midnight. I noted the injury above Walton's right eye. It was a vertical cut that went through his right eyebrow and slightly above and below. It was approximately on inch in length. The right eyelid was also discolored in this area. In addition to the eye injury I noted some minor scratches to his forehead.

Walton stated the following: He didn't realize that the officers were trying to stop him. An officer pulled in front of him, grabbed the front of his jacket, and then pulled him downwards onto the ground. On the way to the ground his head hit the door jamb of the patrol vehicle

causing the injury to his eye. Once on the ground he did not resist and told officers he could not breathe. He said he may have lifted his head up a couple times.

Walton was adamant that he did not attempt to elude officers on his bike nor did he resist arrest. He was also adamant that his eye injury was caused by his head hitting the vehicle door stating he saw the door before he hit it.

I found some credibility issues in Walton's statement. I find it hard to believe based on the officer reports that he did not realize the police were trying to stop him. In checking his local criminal history I discovered he has numerous entries for attempting to elude the police as well as an officer Safety entry from 2012.

#### **Physical Evidence**

Photographs of injury, scene, bike.

#### **Investigative Summary**

Officer Spolski was attempting to stop a male on a bike for an equipment violation. The male fled riding recklessly into traffic almost causing a collision. Officer Spolski got into a position where he was blocking the male's path. While approaching Officer Spolski the male reached into his pockets causing concern that he was attempting to access a weapon. The male tried to ride past Officer Spolski. Officer Spolski tried to gain arm control but was only able to get a grip on the male's jacket. Officer Johnson arrived on scene and was able to assist. Together Officers Johnson and Spolski were able to take the male to the ground. The bicycle was in between the male and Spolski. The male fell onto the bike when he was taken to the ground. Once on the ground Officers Spolski and Johnson were attempting to execute prone cuffing. Their efforts were frustrated by the male continuing to resist. Once the male was handcuffed he stopped resisting.

Officer Spolski noted the male sustained a cut above his right eye and scratches to his face and forehead. The male was taken to the hospital where he received stitches for the cut above his eye. Photographs were taken of his injuries.

I examined Officer Spolski's vehicle on 11/10/14. I could not find any damage that would indicate Walton hit his head on the vehicle door jamb nor did I see any marks where the bike could have hit the vehicle.

Officer Spolski stated in his report that the reason for stopping Walton was due to no rear reflector. After the altercation he realized that there was a reflector but it was pointing downward. I examined the bike at property. The bike did not have a mounted reflector. Instead it had a LED lighted device that was clipped to a cargo rack mounted above the rear wheel. The light was attached with the lights pointing towards the ground. The lights were very dim and would not be visible if looking at the bike from behind. Photographs were taken of the bike and its light. I also examined the bike for any other damage or marks. I found no significant damage and noted the handle bars were still aligned with the front tire (something easily knocked out of plumb).

#### Use of force findings:

It is unknown how exactly the male sustained the cut above his eye but it happened at some point during the take-down or cuffing process. Although the cut is more severe than typical injuries sustained from prone cuffing, the mechanics of the altercation described in officer's reports are consistent with the male's injuries. There are two likely causes of this injury; the fact that the male fell onto his bike when he was taken to the ground and/or the male continued to resist once on the ground. Officer's Spolski and Johnson's reasonable use of force in this incident was within department policy. Even though it resulted in an injury that required medical treatment, the amount of force the officers used was minimal, appropriate, and effective.

#### Failing to notify a supervisor:

In regards to the policy violation 300.5.1 Notification to Supervisors, Corporal Spiering was the highest ranking officer on scene and failed to recognize this incident as a use of force requiring supervisor notification. As previously stated Corporal Spiering acknowledges his error and takes full responsibility. Corporal Spiering is fairly new to his position and still learning. From his first day as a corporal he has shown tremendous initiative in learning his new duties. In addition over the past few months Corporal Spiering has proved himself a capable leader in the field. Corporal Spiering and I have gone over this policy and I am confident that this would not repeat this mistake. Lastly this occurred on a night that was extremely busy to include an officer involved shooting. It is reasonable to believe that an officer under this type of stress would be more prone to a minor mistake such as this. Since I have already discussed the policy with Corporal Spiering I would not recommend any further action.

On 110914, I saw a male (later identified as Larry Walton) riding a red bike near Oak/Spofford. I did not see a rear reflector on the bike.

I activated my overhead emergency lights which are equipped on my fully marked black and white patrol vehicle and attempted to stop Larry for the violation. It was very dark out and I could barely see him since he did not have a rear reflector.

Larry looked back at me but continued to ride away from me. I activated my emergency siren to further notify him of my intent to stop him. Larry looked back several more times as he rode away north on Oak and then eastbound Augusta. He then rode south on Ash and then continued east on Spofford.

Larry approached Maple and dropped an item that was black in color. Larry road north on Maple nearly causing a collision with several cars that were northbound on Maple.

Larry then turned East on Augusta and then South on to Walnut. He was riding up a slight hill and appeared to be tired at this time. He then road East on Spofford and increased his speed again.

Another Officer was West on Spofford and with his overhead emergency lights on in an attempt to get Larry to stop. Larry road on the wrong side of the road and past the Officer. Another Officer attempted to block his path and get him to stop but again Larry road past the Officer.

Fearing that Larry would continue to flee and potentially cause a collision, like he almost did at Maple/Spofford, I speed up and got in front of Larry. Using a parked vehicle I placed my patrol car at an angle to the parked vehicle and opened my door to further block Larry's path of escape.

Larry attempted to ride between an approx one foot gap between my door and the parked car. As I got out of my patrol car Larry reached his hands into his pockets.

I told Larry to get his hands out of his pockets and to get on the ground. Larry refused to comply and continued to reach in to his pockets. It appeared as if Larry was searching for something in his pockets.

Fearing Larry was reaching for a weapon I attempted to grab his left arm which was nearest to me at the time. Larry was wearing a puffy loose

fitting coat and I was not able to gain control of his arm.

I was able to grab Larry's coat and escort him to the ground to gain control of Larry and stop him from accessing any potential weapons. Larry's bike was between him and me at the time and it fell forward and on to the ground in front of Larry as I was escorting him to the ground. Larry fell on to the bike.

While on the ground Larry attempted to get away from me by twisting and turning his body. I placed my knee on the back of his neck and upper back to gain control as Ofc. Johnson arrived to assist.

Larry kept slipping out of my control raising his head several times as I re-applied my knee to the back of his neck and upper back.

Larry continued to twist and turn his body attempting to get away while reaching into the back of his pants and pockets. Ofc. Johnson was able to handcuff him and we were able to gain control of Larry.

After Larry was detained, handcuffed (DL), he was cooperative. Larry had a cut above his right eye and some other scrapes on his face and forehead. I do not know the exact cause of Larry's injuries. The cut had a slow drip of blood coming from it and there were some blood drops on the ground below.

Medics responded and advised that he might need stitches.

After further inspection of the bike, I saw that there was a rear reflector on the bike but it was pointed down so that it could not be seen.

I transported Larry to Deaconess where he received stitches to the cut above his right eye. The cut appeared to be approx one inch in length and vertical across his eyebrow. Around the cut it was swollen and turning black and blue.

Ofc. Mathew took custody of the bike and placed it on to property, see his report.

After Larry was cleared by Deaconess I booked him into jail for a DOC warrant. I cite/release Larry for fail to stop and no rear reflector.

On the 09 Nov.2014 at approx. 0209hrs I heard Ofc. Spolski advise he had a bike that would not stop for him. He advised the suspect was east on Augusta from Walnut.

I observed Ofc. Matthew stop his fully marked patrol car with emergency lights on to the east of the suspect. He stepped out of his vehicle and the suspect rode around Ofc. Matthew. I was able to drive past the suspect and stopped in the intersection to the east of the suspect. The suspect had to slow and drive around the passenger side of my vehicle. We then caught up to the suspect. He waved his right hand in the air and glared at us asking why we were chasing him.

Ofc. Spolski passed the suspect stopping his fully marked patrol car with emergency lights on and opening his door. The suspect continued riding and slowed but still bumped into Ofc. Spolski's drivers door.

At this point the suspect was under arrest for Failing to Stop. He refused to stop for a fully marked patrol car and had drove around two fully marked patrol cars with their emergency lights on.

Ofc. Spolski tried to control the suspect but he tried to pull away and would not comply with his commands. We did take control of his arms and guided him to the ground. He did trip over the bicycle as we guided him to the ground.

The suspect, later identified as Larry Walton, refused to place his arms behind his back. He continued to try and reach into his pants pocket. We were able to place him into handcuffs but he continued to twist and try to reach into his pants pocket. It should be noted we later recovered several needles from his pants pocket.

He continued to attempt to reach into his pockets until we placed him on his stomach where he continued to twist his body. He began screaming that he could not breath. We moved him to his side where he continued screaming and twisting his body. He eventually calmed down as we used VDI.

Walton had a small laceration on his right eyebrow. We requested medical attention and had a cpl take photos of the injury.

Walton was booked into the SCJ for a DOC warrant.

I turned WB on Spofford Avenue from Cedar Street. As I turned onto Spofford, I saw a bicycle traveling EB on Spofford Avenue with two fully marked patrol cars following behind with their emergency lights activated.

I activated my emergency lights and stopped in the roadway in an attempt to stop the subject on the bicycle. I began to exit my vehicle to tell the subject to stop but he moved to the left and rode past my patrol vehicle.

I got back into my patrol vehicle and drove around the block and located Officer Spolski and Officer C. Johnson detaining the subject at about 1300 W Spofford Avenue.

I examined the bicycle the subject was riding and discovered it was a Cannondale Silk Path 700 equipped with pedals which were designed for bicycle shoes to clip onto the pedals. The subject who was detained was not wearing shoes designed for the pedals.

Due to the subject's previous theft history, the value of the bicycle being \$500 to \$1000, and the fact he was wearing tennis and not cycling shoes, I believed the bicycle was not his and was stolen.
