This award is intended to recognize members of a team or unit for participating in an incident, event, or series of events, or project which has a substantial, positive impact on the community or police department. It must be superior in nature and further the department's mission and overall effectiveness. When the Special Awards Committee reviewed this nomination, it was clear that PACT is most deserving of this award.

The goals of the Spokane Police Department are to reduce crime, the fear of crime, and improve quality of life. One way our department is addressing these issues is to use PACT to focus on the repeat offenders, property crimes, and other criminal activity that increase the fear of crime and many times put the public in danger. Our two PACT teams have excelled in their mission.

Dayshift PACT has had tremendous success going after offenders. In the last 9 months, they have served over 235 felony arrests warrants. Their work has generated over 200 felony charges to include numerous vehicle thefts and related crimes, possession of stolen property, trafficking in stolen property, robbery, assault, unlawful possession of firearms, and possession of controlled substances. This team has executed 35 search warrants. Some of these search warrants were for chop shops. They are often called to assist the U.S. Marshal's Office to assist with locating and arresting fugitives. Their work has generated over \$87,000 in seizures.

Power PACT has a slightly different approach to addressing these issues. Oftentimes their approach focuses on fraud investigations. Property crimes suspects are commonly the same people that commit fraud therefore they use these investigations as tools that oftentimes lead to more crimes. In the last 9 months, Power PACT has charged over 80 fraud charges and another 150 felony charges to include vehicle thefts and related crimes, possession of stolen property, trafficking in stolen property, robbery, assault, unlawful possession of firearms, and possession of controlled substances. In addition they have served 149 felony arrest warrants. Their work has generated over \$23,500 in seizures.

PACT has been a great asset to other units within the Department. It is common for each team to be called on to assist with locating subjects that are wanted on major crimes such as homicides, shootings, and robberies. The intelligence information and sources these teams have, has led to numerous arrests of violent felons.

PACT members are dedicated to the mission. They have a lot of overtime that keeps them away from their families. It is not uncommon for members to work past their shift to accomplish the mission at hand. They will commonly drop what they are doing at home and come in to assist where needed. Oftentimes they spend their own time handling work related issues such as talking to informants, answering emails, and making phone calls.

Over this past year, the work that PACT has done has had a substantial positive impact on this community. The outcome of their efforts can be seen in the reduction of property crimes.
