

Utility Service Line Repair and Replacement Program

Do you still have a **septic tank, need a sewer connection repair, or water line repair and need financial assistance?** We can help!

WHY: Making these repairs **benefits both the property owner, the city, and other residents** by protecting your investment and preventing pollution, so that we can all enjoy safe, clean water.

WHO: Property owners in the City of Spokane utilities service areas with an Area Median Income (AMI) of 80% or less.

WHAT: A **low-interest loan program for qualified property owners**. One of the challenges for property owners is securing the financial resources needed to make these repairs. This program can loan funds to complete the work at an affordable rate for those who qualify. Repayments will be included as part of the monthly utility bill.

Eligible Projects	Eligible Costs
Crushed, broken, leaking side sewer pipe	Excavation
Corroded, leaking, misaligned water service	Necessary on-site rerouting of pluming and associated repair
EPA Galvanized Requiring Replacement Pipe	New pipe, fitting, valves, and necessary parts
Long water service lines	Landscape repair
Private sewer	Connection to existing sewer pipes or manholes
Removal of septic system	Street, curb, and sidewalk repair
	Permits
	Tap and meter fees

Costs DO NOT include property enhancements, new development service connections, new sidewalk outside of construction area.

HOW: A property owner or the City can refer the property owner to the assistance program. A program administrator will manage the application and loan process.
