

Purpose

The purpose of the Transportation Chapter is to:

- Recognize and establish an overarching vision and values for how Spokane residents envision the future transportation system
- Address the needs of ALL transportation users, regardless of mode. Walking, biking, taking transit, freight, driving - these should all be real options for Spokane residents.
- Develop updated street design standards reflecting national best practices to better serve the residents of Spokane
- Recognize and leverage the role transportation can play in creating a sense of place and improving quality of life.
- Provide guidance on how the city will identify and allocate taxpayer money to transportation projects

What are the DRAFT Goals of the Transportation Chapter?

Promote a Sense of Place Promote a sense of community and identity through the provision of context-sensitive transportation choices and transportation design features, recognizing that both profoundly affect the way people interact and experience the city.

Provide Transportation Choices Meet the city's mobility needs by providing facilities for transportation options - including walking, bicycling, public transportation, private vehicles, and other choices.

Accommodate Access to Daily Needs and Priority Destinations Promote land use patterns and construct transportation facilities and other urban features that advance Spokane's quality of life.

Promote Economic Opportunity Implement projects that support and facilitate economic vitality and opportunity in support of the City's land use plan objectives.

Respect Natural & Community Assets environment

Enhance Public Health & Safety Promote healthy communities by providing and maintaining a safe transportation system with viable active mode options that provides for the needs of all travelers, particularly the most vulnerable users.

Maximize Public Benefits and Fiscal Responsibility with Integration Design and maintain a fiscally accountable, environmentally responsible, and socially equitable transportation system that serves its users through coordinated planning and budgeting with other partners and utilities.

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The chapter has been streamlined, removing any redundancies and discussions that don't directly inform the policies they concern. So, we have gone from 10 Goals and 86 Policies to 7

The policies have been uncoupled from the Goal statements in recognition that every policy applies to multiple Goals

Integration

These days, "integration" sits at the center of the City's approach to infrastructure projects.

But what does that really mean?

Consider a three-dimensional view of the street. Included in that view are those traditional surface transportation pieces like sidewalks, bike lanes, and vehicle travel lanes. But that view also includes belowground connectivity for utilities—everything from water, sewer, and stormwater to natural gas, electricity, and telecommunications.

Under an integrated approach, the City now considers all the work that needs to be done along a street—above and below ground and works that into a single project that is more affordable and best serves the surrounding land issues
