

# **Recommended Disposal of Sharps in Spokane County**



## **Residential Free Disposal**

Needles, syringes and lancets can be put in puncture-resistant containers (coffee cans, liquid detergent or bleach bottles – no milk jugs or soda bottles) with a label noting that the container holds sharps, needles, etc. Once secured in an

appropriate container, they can be disposed of – at no charge – in the Household Hazardous Waste area of any of the following facilities:

Medical sharps should never be flushed down toilets or drains.

### **Business Disposal**

Businesses may dispose of sharps by appointment only at the Waste to Energy Facility, 2900 S. Geiger Blvd. Call 509.625.6580 to arrange. There is a minimum fee for disposal. Businesses can also contract with a private collection company like Clean Harbors to manage sharps.

# Safe Medication Return Program Med-Project.org



Spokane County residents can now dispose of prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications safely, environmentally responsibly, and at no charge through a statewide program.

There are **two** main ways to return your unused medications. Both are FREE.

#### ➤ Mail in

Request a free prepaid envelope. Place unused medications in the envelope and mail the package to the address provided. There is no charge.

#### > Take it to a drop off site

Find the nearest drop off location and deposit medications in a kiosk. There is no paperwork needed and no charge.
