29th and Grand Boulevard:

Sidewalk at southeast corner is very narrow, with right turning traffic at very close proximity. Pedestrian crossings compete with turning traffic, even with the lights.

Westbound traffic turning left onto Perry backs up well past Pinecrest regularly.

There are also two senior living facilities nearby with residents with varying levels of mobility.

There is the beginning of a turn lane which can offer slight refuge for somebody attempting to cross the street as a pedestrian. There is a raised divider to the west of the intersection which takes the place of the double yellow stripe a little further west. It is not adequate to provide any refuge for a pedestrian. The sidewalk on the south side of 29th is double wide which is much more pleasant than the narrower sidewalk found elsewhere along this route.

Comments:

Wilma	Sidewalks are blocked in certain areas by utility poles and other signs causing loss of up
Flanagan	to a foot or more of the width. Retaining walls and overgrown vegetation encroach in many areas. Long stretches have no shade, and very little has protection from splashing traffic in case of rain.
	I worked on this survey mid day on a sunny Monday. Saw two pedestrians and a cyclist at Pittsburg, 4 pedestrians at Southeast blvd and 1 cyclist. Disabled person used a wheelchair to cross at Perry to get to bus stop. His crossing was awkward and slow, and did not appear comfortable.
	General feeling along the sidewalk was fairly unpleasant with traffic going by at very close proximity at a perceived high rate of speed. The feeling adjacent to the new construction across 29th from Applebees was much more pleasant due to streetscaping, and separation of traffic from the sidewalk.
	Safe crossings are a long way apart, making this a most unpleasant area to be a pedestrian.
	I rode my bike on the sidewalk because the street felt very unsafe. I didn't feel safe on the sidewalk either, but perhaps a little less unsafe than I would have felt on the street, taking the lane.




Figure 4: Example of well-constructed and pleasant sidewalk with street separation.

Comments from NextDoor discussing specific intersections:

Lawonna Murphy-Patrick, Cliff Cannon-9 Sep

...Folks, I can't encourage you enough to share your input about this.

Crossing the street an intersections from Grand to Ray on 29th. This involves several intersections.

29th and Grand. Kids from Sac cross here all of the time. I see people cross to the islands avoiding the cross walks. I heard an elderly person say the cross walk lights don't give you adequate time to cross. What have you seen or experienced?

Arthur and 29th. Tough intersection to walk, bike and drive across. Sac kids who live around Hutton cross here as well.

Pittsburgh and 29th. What do you think of the concrete barrier at this intersection?

SE Blvd and 29th- very busy intersection. SE also has a bike lane. This intersection will be eventually be even busier with the Quail run development that will most likely happen.

The cross walk in front of Rosauers on 29th. I've seen elderly folks cross here. I worry for their safety.

Regal and 29th? One of the biggest clusters in the city....

Greg Francis, Rockwood-9 Sep

I cross frequently at 29th and Grand. The crosswalk time is really too short there as Lawonna mentioned. It's better than Arthur though, especially at night.

All of the other crossing spots are less frequent. Perry is fine because of the light. Arthur is challenging because of the hill and drivers being disinterested in stopping for pedestrians; the median helps though. Pittsburg isn't too bad because there is lots of visibility both directions. Southeast and 29th seems to be fine whenever I cross it as is Regal and 29th. I've never crossed at the crosswalks between Regal and Southeast but I would have concerns there; I feel sorry for the people in the retirement community there that want to cross to get to Rosauers or other location on the south side of 29th.

Demographic Maps from Demographics Now

Below are maps from Spokane Public Library's *Demographics Now* database showing census tract block groups with estimates for the number of people who reported walking to work, biking to work, riding the bus to work, and those with no vehicles in their household. These will give a good idea of the type of transportation being used at different points along the survey route.
